CHOIR SUNDAY

A Music Extravaganvia

If you love music, <u>Choir Sunday</u>, <u>June 2nd</u>, is a Sunday you do not want to miss! This will be a grand finale to a fantastic season of music featuring a mass choir, guest violinist, and a spectacular postlude of organ and trumpet.

Our Offertory Anthem will be the last two choruses of *The Messiah: Worthy is the Lamb* and *Amen*. Written in 1741 by George Frederick Handel this oratorio draws from the King James Version of the Bible and the Book of Common Prayer. A musical meditation on Christ as the Messiah, it is structured by Handel according to the liturgical seasons of the church year beginning in Advent and concluding with Pentecost.

The text for *Worthy is the Lamb* is drawn from the Book of the Revelation to St. John. More specifically chapter 5, verses 12 and 13, describe all the creatures of heaven giving praise to Christ for his sacrifice that overcomes sin and death. This chorus is then followed by the glorious *Amen*, the concluding piece of the *Messiah*. Together these exceptional choral pieces put an exclamation point to the end of our formal music program and to the close of the season of Easter.

To perform this ambitious choral offering, Paul Reese, our Minister of Music, has drawn together many extra voices. In addition to the full membership of our Chancel Choir, there will be reinforcement by voices from the Handbell Choir as well as the general congregation. For those who are not able to make a regular commitment to the choir, this is your chance to take part in a choral crescendo.

Joining us this Sunday will be a special musical guest on violin, Nicole Sauder. Nicole is the daughter of Marylee Sauder and her sister, Maria, is a member of our Chancel Choir. Nicole is a brand new graduate of the prestigious Cleveland Institute of Music and will continue her music studies this fall at UCLA. This summer she will teach violin at the well-known Interlochen Arts Camp.

Our postlude, the *Final* from Louis Vierne's First Symphony for Organ, will have not only our own amazing Paul Reese on organ; he will be joined on trumpet by Bradley Mattson. Bradley, a new member of our Chancel Choir and newly Confirmed in the Episcopal Church, is a trumpeter extraordinaire. Bradley is a reservist in the United States Army Band.

Choir Sunday will also be our opportunity to say, "thank you", to our new music ministry leadership – Marilyn Winfield and Paul Reese. I had envisioned this first year for both of them at St. John's as a period of orientation. What I did not expect was that it would prove to be a year of orientation to all of us to a revival of our music ministry and to new horizons for what is musically possible.

As nine months of beautiful music at St. John's draws to a close we are especially grateful to our parish choristers and handbell musicians. Their practice and dedication is an expression of genuine commitment. Their offerings of melody and song awe us as gifts to our ears. Their leadership encourages us in our worship of God in Christ. They help us raise earth to heaven and to bring heaven to earth, with all of us giving glory to God.

What is a Vestry, Part 2

In the May "Messenger", I raised the question "What is a Vestry" and answered it by repeating the statement of Vestry duties found in the *St. John's Vestry Manual*. While that answer may have been accurate, it did not convey very well what goes on in the Parish Hall the third Monday evening of each month. Let me give you a few "snapshots" from our May Vestry meeting that tell a different, but complementary, story.

Vestry worships. Worship, in fact, forms the "bookends" of every Vestry meeting. The first item on the agenda after the formal "call to order" is a devotional period led by a different Vestry member each month. And the devotions are as varied as the members themselves, but they all help us to transition from whatever the usual business of our individual days to the ministry for St. John's Church that Vestry performs in its monthly meetings. Then at the conclusion of the meeting, we stand and celebrate together the Order for Compline, a service of evening prayers traditionally said before retiring at night.

Vestry celebrates. Mini celebrations frequently break out in connection with some report that given or action that is taken. This May, we approved a request from MDG committee to send funds to the Marion Medical Mission that will cover the cost of digging a fresh water well for a village in the African countries of Malawi, Tanzania or Zambia — where, without such a source of fresh water, 50% of all children under age 5 die of preventable, water-born diseases. We also sent up a spontaneous "Alleluia" (well, a toned-down one) for the beautiful and tasteful refurbishing of the Library on the second floor of Becker House, through a generous gift from Frank and Tina Cummins. Check it out (along with the renovated Nursery) — it's really a wonderful space for meetings, meditation or reading.

Vestry struggles. A surprising number of items that come before the Vestry are new ideas, proposed to solve problems or to enrich St. John's life. And with these, serious discussion typically breaks out — discussion, I might add, that often reminds us how diverse our opinions can be about some issues. Usually differences are resolved into a common ground of shared outlook which enables us to move forward, but occasionally a proposal is sent back to the originating group for more work, with the Vestry's unresolved conflicts duly and respectfully noted. Vestry members, after all, are human ... but thank God, we tend to be a gracious sort of human. And we are rarely boring!

Well, that was May's Vestry meeting — in its own way unique, but also typical of the energetic and joyful wrestling that goes on each third Monday of the month as we attempt to shepherd that wonderful family called St. John's down the uncertain streets of 2013. Talk to us, visit our meetings, pray for us.

John Herzog Vestry's Warden Last month, I was able to report that we had finished the 1st quarter with a positive balance between our revenue and expenses. While not being able to say that we repeated this feat in May, I can say that we continue to better than expected. After Easter, contributions almost always drop and this year was no exception. Our pledged contributions fell to 92.7% of budget. This compares to the end of March level of 98.7%. I am confident that we will see a rebound during the month of May. Other good news in the revenue category, we have been able to defer taking our quarterly draw on the investment income to the second half of this quarter. Those of us that watch the Stock Market are aware of the new "high" that have been occurring. By not taking the draw, we have been able to increase the value of our investments by allowing that money to work for us. Our non-pledged contributions continue to be strong, which has also helped our cash flow.


May is "spring taxes" time and St. John's pays taxes on all of its buildings with the exception of the church. May is also the month to pay several quarterly expenses. Because the budget spreads the total expense across 12 months, those expenses that are paid either annually, semiannually, or quarterly will appear to be significantly over budget. Our utilities are the only expense that is actually running higher than expected. The natural gas expense is on a 10 month budget, so we should see some improvement during the summer months on this line item. Overall, we continue to monitor our expenses very well and our assets significantly exceed our liabilities. This equates to a favorable fiscal position.

I know many are concern about the pending construction project. The Finance Committee is equally concerned and will be investigating every financing option available to us. However, until the design is settled and the construction bids are received, we have no solid numbers to work with. We simply ask for your patience and understanding that we do not have all of the details or answers.



Congratulations to our newly confirmed teens! On Sunday morning, May 12th, Bishop David Jones confirmed Molly Brenton, Julia Hasircoglu, Rachel Hreben, Joanie Kilhefner, and John Waskowicz. Our teens were surprised by an impromptu meeting with the bishop (at his request) in the library prior to the service. Bishop Jones asked them a series of questions regarding their understanding of confirmation: and they did great!!!! Pastor Jennifer was particularly proud!

It's hard to believe that summer is almost here. Our last Sunday of Church School and J2A classes will be held on Sunday, June 9th, Teacher Appreciation Sunday. Parents of pilgrims are invited to attend a special pilgrimage planning meeting between the services in the undercroft (J2A room). The liturgy will include a slide show featuring pictures from this year, and a brief presentation from children and teens regarding their experience of education at St. John's.

With the arrival of summer comes our annual Vacation Bible School- and as always, we need your help!!!! Particularly from our teens!! This year's VBS theme is "A-Mazing Mystery!". We will explore the mysteries surrounding the life and ministry of Jesus, beginning with the journey of the Magi (who were they *really???*) and ending with the story of Pentecost. Counselors will help our campers uncover their detective skills and solve puzzles, crack cases and apply their investigative skills to the greatest mystery and gift of all: the Word of God. All teens and children are invited to join Pastor Jennifer between the services for a "VBS Workshop" between 9:15-10:00 a.m. in the auditorium. We will work on preparing video segments of mystery stories to share for VBS.

The X-Teen Senior High Program will be help at Camp Mount Luther June 16-25, 2013. This week long emphasis on Youth Leadership and Adult Youth Leadership will focus on mission, spirituality and leadership development and includes an optional three day mission component. The program will begin on June 17th and the teens will be sent out to do mission work on 23rd, 24th and 25th with the closing Eucharist and debriefing on the 26th. All campers are asked to read the book, "The Hunger Games" before they come to camp. This is for youth who are 13 and older.

(BASIC) Brothers and Sisters in Christ will be help at Camp Mount Luther from August 4-9, 2013. The event is for children 12 and under, but teens are encouraged to serve as leaders. This event is a wonderful experience for our younger teens and children as well as our young adult and older teen youth leaders. We offer a counselors in training program along with counselor internships as we prepare for our diocesan children to spend a week learning, experiencing, being challenged in faith and fun.

Does becoming a Journey to Adulthood leader interest you? It is a complete youth ministry program of spiritual formation for 6th - 12th graders. It uses Bible study, prayer, rites of passage, outreach ministries and both serious and playful activities to underscore its core principles: To hear all the wonderful experiences that the leaders have had, join us on June 9 for Teacher Appreciation Service. PROPERTY CORNER

Manager's Report

We have made some enhancements with our welcome signs to include refinishing and rewording to increase our welcome to those not familiar with St. John's. This set-up will allow us to use larger computer generated signs within both sandwich holders on the sidewalk.

Ed Shoff is providing his security expertise for configuring our four routers for our campus. Unfortunately, delays in this process have us looking at being up and operational by the end of May.

An inspection of our fire alarm system is scheduled for this Thursday with Select Security and the City Fire Marshall's office. An inspection of our rental properties is scheduled for later in the month.

Old Business

Phase 4 Fire Alarm System – A summer installation is planned.

Courtyard Subcommittee Report –HARB shared with Pete and Doug the need for distinct construction characteristics between the old and new portions of our facility. They also received clarification on the storm water criteria for our project, indicating that several options could be considered that meet those requirements. Pete and Doug will be keeping the board informed through the approval process.

Painting – Plans are being made for the committee to address the re-finishing of the Sacristy. These plans were delayed by the preparation required for the remodeling of the Becker House Library and minor finishing up of the Becker House vestibule started by Paul Kreider.

Parking Lots Sealing/Lining – No need with the potential of excavating the parking lot.

Undercroft Redesign –Discussion was had regarding the moving of offices to have Paul Reese in proximity to the music room. Ethernet cable is being run to this area for Paul and a router for undercroft use.

Library Renovation – Completed. Awaiting signage.

Becker House Fire Alarm System – on hold until next year. At the recommendation of staff, a quote of \$4,985 was received for fire alarm system coverage within the Becker House and the passage. The proposal includes smoke detectors on every level and in the parish and financial secretaries' offices, two manual pull stations and two horn strobes. A \$10/month maintenance fee is associated with this additional equipment. Bill is working on zone assignments for this additional equipment and that of our courtyard accessibility project. It was felt this would be best planned in next year's budget.

Project Name – Bill asked everyone for ideas for a project name/theme. We have already received some ideas.

Nursery Improvements – Mostly completed. A bulletin board is all that remains thanks to Mike and Janice.

Ramp - Anti-slip strips – We will evaluate the practicality of this material for its function and our ability to paint with an anti-slip material.

Parish House - Coat Racks – We will evaluate this request for our cold months later this year.

Mission Action Plan –WiFi was included in our plans for 2012.

Security Drop Box – No progress.

New Business

May's Life Safety Inspections – Bill's inspection on May 1^{st} found the parish hall kitchen first aid kit in need of band-aids and the AED needing new pediatric pads. There remain areas in need of emergency lighting and exit signs, which hopefully will be addressed later this year.

Tobacco Policy – It was agreed to recommend the campus be a *tobacco free zone*. This was agreed to be presented to Vestry at their next meeting. Our Policy Use Form would have to reflect this policy.

LANCASTER INTERCHURCH PEACE WITNESS EVENT

Dr. Hossein Mousavian

Tuesday, June 4, 2013 at 7:30 pm

Church of the Apostles • 1850 Marietta Avenue • Lancaster PA

A native of Iran, Dr. Mousavian spent more than two decades working in Iran's foreign affairs. Since 2009 he has been a visiting research scholar at Princeton University's Woodrow Wilson School of Public and International Affairs. His experience and expertise will demonstrate how important it is for the United States to rethink its policy in the Persian Gulf and Middle East.

Will guaranteeing security and sustaining Iran's identity be priorities for the U.S.? It is argued that the U.S. would be far better served in its efforts not by championing a regime change, but rather by focusing on common goals shared by both nations. Together, Iran and the U.S. have the opportunity to create policies to facilitate both countries' security objectives. By cooperating in this manner, the U.S. would save much in terms of blood, budget, credibility, and influence. This focus on similarities between the United States and Iran could serve as a foreign policy model for the whole Middle East by demonstrating the effectiveness of two nations striving to cooperate with each other in order to create a more stable, secure, and economically prosperous region.

From 1980-1990, Dr. Mousavian was Editor-in-Chief of the daily newspaper Tehran Times. He also held a number of positions in the Iranian government in the 1980s.

COURTYARD COMMITTEE REPORT

Over the past few weeks we have taken some important steps in our courtyard project journey. There has been quite a lot of positive feedback for the proposed construction, which gives us all hope that something will transpire. There has been, however, a significant number of questions as well as concern regarding the look of the addition from Chestnut Street and the loss of the breezeway. These are very real concerns and I am glad that this information has come to our ears. We need to be a united and unified church to be able to undertake this tremendous opportunity. Should we have those who do not agree with the project, we need to hear from them to address their concerns and answer their questions. The goal of the project is to provide full handicap accessibility to all levels of the church, to provide an identifiable entryway to the church, to give us a great gathering space, to provide more columbarium space, and to rebuild and beautify the courtyard. The goal of the project is not to create division, to drive out parishoners, or to squelch the voices of the parish. This makes it imperitive to all to come to me or to another committee member with any questions or concrns that they may have. If you would like to comment on how great the project can be, we would love to hear from you as well.

The last committee meeting was excellent as we were able to hear the voices of those who were concerned with the loss of the breezeway, the look of the addition, and the potential cost of the project. We heard them and we listened. We have asked MM Architects for some additional views for the front of the church using our discussions as a guide. They will give us some additional renderings involving the area around the breezeway to give us more design choices. There was almost universal agreement regarding the design of the courtyard, the need for additional columbarium space, the lowering of the memorial garden to alleviate water leakage into the Sunday school room space, the need for an elevator, and the need for a ramp from the parking lot up to the courtyard. Once we receive the new renderings, we will present them to the congregation in a mini-meeting format. Hopefully one of the options will stand out and we will be able to move forward with the project.

Once the overall look of the project as been determined, we will embark on the design portion of the project. This will involve 3-6 months of designing and decision making involving everything from what type of building materials to be used (screws needed, glass, wood, steel, etc.), interior design of the addition, the look of the courtyard, etc. Hopefully by the end of the year, once the design phase is complete, we will have a better idea about the cost of the project.

I look forward to all of your comments and opinions.

THE SILENT "E"

Remember when you were a kid and you heard someone shouting, "Copycat, copycat"? Now all these years later, you remember that someone was you? As children, we learn to copy others: from holding a pencil to tying our shoes. These are natural things to copy and good things to learn. The questions about copying usually came as we age, when we start to ask ourselves, "Is this really a smart thing to copy and am I copying it the right way?" In 1 John 3:11, it says "Beloved do not imitate what is evil but imitate what is good. Whoever does good is from God; whoever does evil has not seen God." Obviously, this is excellent advice for all believers. Unfortunately, we have come to a time when we can't distinguish the "good" coming from God from the "evil" coming from people who say they believers in God.

One day, while I was on Facebook, "chatting" with a friend from high school, he said the most unusual thing. Steven said, "Julie, you've been blessed." I was like when what? If I remembered correctly, Steven was Jewish, when did he start using the word, "Blessed." After "chatting" a few times, Steven explained he had a life changing experience and now considered himself a "Messianic Jew". He still practiced all Jewish traditions, but he had been baptized in the Pentecostal Church and worshipped there every Sunday. So being the good Episcopalian I am, I told Steven about our church's daily readings and gave him sites to check out. Imagine my surprise when I got a message back from him saying "those sites were okay, but they were too Catholic" and according to the teachings of his church, all things Catholic are bad. My internal response was how could they be too Catholic? They're traditional! Nevertheless, I sent Steven a message explaining that the Episcopal Church is "via media" or the middle way: a combination of Catholic and Protestant.

So why do I bring this up? Because we have now entered into the church's most underrated season: the Pentecost season. The Pentecost Season is the season of the Holy Spirit, also known as the "birthday of the church." It is the time to spread the good words and good works of Jesus Christ and his apostles (and not just the twelve in the New Testament) to others. However, the question that usually arises is "how are we supposed to do that?" Well, by using the silent "E" word: Evangelism! Of course, when most people hear the word "evangelism" or "evangelist" or "evangelical" a dreary picture appears in their mind; they see someone walking along a stage shouting out random Biblical passages. When I hear the "E" word, I immediately picture Burt Lancaster as Elmer Gantry; Elmer Gantry was an evangelist; the evangelist who was set out to save your soul and clean out your wallet at the same time. Obviously these aren't the "true" definitions of evangelism or evangelist or evangelical.

Recently, Glenn Miller (our Evangelism steward) told me about "Transforming Evangelism" by David Gortne. In his book, David Gortne writes, "Evangelism cannot be about Church growth alone. Evangelism is concerned about human lives, and that Evangelism is a spiritual practice of gratitude from the wonder and delight of the Holy Spirit." Lastly, Gortne writes:

Evangelism in the 21st century is:

Not a program, but a spiritual practice
Not institutional, but individual
Not for empire, but for public exchange
Not starting with telling, but starting listening
Not "Come and See" without first "Show Me"
Not about citizenship, but about fellow pilgrimage
Not of or for the church, but of and for the Holy Spirit.

Stop and think about how all of the good works we do here at St. John's: the Jubilee ministries, the Millennium Development Goals, the J2A group, the Lay Eucharistic visitors (to name just a few) and how they fit into the description listed above. We are indeed an Evangelical Episcopal Church and the Pentecost Season is a great time to let others know this.

Advocacy

New initiatives toward Jubilee goals

"Jubilee Ministry Centers integrate Advocacy, Empowerment, Evangelism and Outreach into church life in a determined effort to improve the lives of poor and oppressed people."

In the midst of the busy work of serving the poor and oppressed people of our community and of the world, the goal of Advocacy is often put on a side burner—something to deal with after completing the upcoming disaster relief project or next week's community breakfast. Yet when I ask myself, how can I make the greatest, or most sustainable, difference in improving lives, I keep coming back to Advocacy. The good works that we do mostly alleviate suffering for a day. In order to reduce poverty, we must affect policy.

This could be through local, state or national governments. Or it might be an appeal to a corporation that is harming public health or the environment. There are many ways we can express our care for just causes.

But advocacy always comes down to one factor: big numbers. If, for instance, I do my part to save the environment by taking the bus instead of driving, I make a small difference. If all the members of St. John's do the same, and we each share this with our Facebook friends or make an announcement to our garden club, that difference is multiplied exponentially. Government and business leaders take notice. In the coming year, Jubilee Ministries will begin a fresh effort. John Gouveia has asked me to serve as coordinator of Advocacy Initiatives. In listening to coffee hour conversations I hear many voices of concern for This Fragile Earth, Our Island Home. I was delighted when vestryperson Debbie Carter came to me to ask if we could come up with an activity that would tie together her Stewardship program with stewardship of the environment. Thus April's "Date Night with the Planet" was born. The fourteen parishioners who attended expressed that they were inspired by the discussion on how we as individuals could make a difference. 
