CONVENTION AND BEYOND

This year's Diocesan Convention was exceptionally significant for us at St. John's as well as for our diocese. Among the resolutions that were passed, three in particular stand out: Gun Violence, Voting Rights, and Conversation and Reflection on Those Living in Poverty. These resolutions were endorsed by our Jubilee Ministries and discussed at our Sunday morning Adult Formation and Education Gatherings. They generated much passionate debate at Convention and were amended along the way in an atmosphere that was Christian as well as candid, respectful and open to compromise. Equally noteworthy was the visible role played by our St. John's delegation and parish leaders. With the ten parishes of the Lancaster Convocation serving as this year's Convention host, St. John's leadership was central. Judy Donnelly, the Convocation's Co-Convener, used her considerable organizational skills to help successfully manage what by all accounts was a particularly smooth Convention.

Pastor Jennifer as the Liturgist for Convention helped design uniquely moving worship experiences for Compline, Morning Prayer and the closing Holy Eucharist. She was assisted by Aaron Spicher, Convention Verger; David Kilp, Compline Officient; Fran Gouveia on recorder and guitar, Bradley Mattson on trumpet; Paul Reese, Choir Director; with Sue Zuke, Ken Smith, John and Fran Gouveia and Joannie Kilhefner composing the core of the Convocation Choir. Additionally, the other members of our delegation, John Herzog, Charlotte Weaver-Gelzer and Mary Ellen Kilp, served as Greeters, Registration Assistants and general volunteers.

We can be especially proud of our youth representatives. Joannie Kilhefner was part of the newly instituted Diocesan Youth Presence at Convention. This group of a dozen teens from around the diocese speaks on behalf of all their peers while learning about leadership at a diocesan level. David Kilp, one of our elected delegates, was one of only two youth with voice and vote at Convention.

St. John's Church, Lancaster is a principal parish of our diocese. Numerically speaking we are one of the largest Episcopal Churches in the mid state, and the quality of our ministries is at the top. Your clergy serve in key diocesan leadership position. Pastor Jennifer is an elected member of the Council of Trustees – the diocesan equivalent of a parish's vestry. I have been appointed by Bishop Baxter to chair the Congregational Development Commission who has oversight for the health of our sixty six churches and their clergy. And at this year's Convention we were honored by the election of Penn Glazier to serve on the diocesan Ecclesiastical Court.

It is my hope that we will continue to build a deeper and stronger relationship between our parish and our diocese. I would like to have all diocesan resolutions presented to the parish before Convention and following to have a report to the congregation. I would like to see our youth continue to be leaders in our diocese. I can imagine a St. John's Nominating Committee who invites members to serve at a diocesan level in the same way we do parish and vestry leadership.

A diocese is only as strong as its parishes. And parishes are only as good as their diocese. Having St. John's leadership serving our diocese can only serve to make all our ministries better.

THE REV. JENNIFER E. LOOKER

After three years of prayerful discernment, careful planning and creative fundraising, our pilgrims are preparing to depart for England! The group includes adult chaperones Matt and Mary Woolson, Mary Ellen Kilp, young adult chaperone David Kilp and our teens: Molly Brenton, Julia Hasircoglu, Rachel Hreben, Joannie Kilhefner, and John Waskowicz. They will depart from St. John's on Friday, August 2nd, and arrive in London early Saturday morning. They will return to "the states" on Sunday, August 11th.

Our pilgrims will stay in London for the duration of their pilgrimage, with day trips to Canterbury, Oxford, Stonehenge and Bath planned. Each day will begin with Morning Prayer and end with Compline, either led by our teens or experienced in local churches. The pilgrimage will include ample opportunity to see the "C of E" (Church of England) up close and in action. Our group is particularly blessed by the opportunity to participate in a program specifically tailored for J2A pilgrims offered by Canterbury. They will enjoy a tour of Canterbury with attention given to their own faith and formation in the larger context of the Anglican Communion. A tour of Westminster Abbey is also being planned. Time will be given for experiencing the larger culture, including visits to the Tower of London, The London Eye, Westminster, Big Ben, the Olympic Village and of course, Buckingham Palace.

The opportunity to embark on pilgrimage is a life-changing experience. Our teens have intentionally and prayerfully prepared for their time together. After three years of growing as a group, they will depart in a few short weeks. But before they do, we will have two more opportunities to send them off in style. On **Saturday, July 13th, St.** John's will host a **Blueberry Festival** to celebrate and support our pilgrims. We have been gifted with a huge crop of blueberries that will ladled on fresh ice cream, baked into cobbler and sweetened (just slightly) for jam. The evening will begin at 7:00 p.m. with a concert in the church. Paul Reese will play the organ, Bradley Mattson the trumpet, and a variety of other musicians- including our J2A teens- will round out the evening. A festive blueberry reception will be offered in the courtyard, during which "blues" music will be played to set the tone. Tickets for the event (which includes both the concert and reception) will be sold for \$5- a really great deal!

On **Sunday morning, July 28th**, we will invite our pilgrims to come forward for a time of prayer and blessing. We will **commission our pilgrims** as representatives of St. John's, The Diocese of Central Pennsylvania and the larger The Episcopal Church (they have promised to leave their jeans and sweat pants at home!). I hope you will join me in praying for our pilgrims during this extraordinary time. They are an incredible group of adults and young people, and I have every confidence that they will continue to grow in their faith and formation, and will bless us richly as a congregation upon their return.

On **Sunday, September 22nd, our pilgrims will share their experience** with us at both services. We can look forward to pictures and stories that evoke, in some small way, the significance of what they will share together. In the meantime, may we join together in prayer and thanksgiving for what will undoubtedly be the experience of a lifetime.

VESTRY'S WARDEN

The Times They are a Changin' (Bob Dylan)

In the June Vestry meeting, Charlie Braught made the comment: "During the summer, the Church doesn't go away." That was almost a subtheme beneath much of our Vestry discussion. Fr. John sketched out his plans for the summer. The report from the Nominating Committee suggested that summer was one of their most active times. Pastor Jennifer described conversations that were soon to take place between herself, Karen DiPace and Mary Ellen Kilp about the grouping of our youth in Sunday School for the fall — and also about teaming up with St. James for VBS next month. Indeed, the Church doesn't go away."

But Charlie also said (though not in these words) that as the Church goes on, it changes. Charlie is in a good position to make that observation because he was a member of the Vestry a number of years ago, before an extended period of time when he lived away from Lancaster. One of the major areas of change is that of finance, the area for which Charlie serves as Vestry Steward. And one of the major tasks to which the Finance Committee has set itself is to bring St. John's methods of accounting into "GAAP Compliance." And what, you might ask, is that?

GAAP stands for Generally Accepted Accounting Principles. As the phrase suggests, over the years, certain accounting practices have proven themselves in the world of finance and have been accepted as the standard to be followed by industry and financial institutions. The assumption of GAAP by everyone means that various "players" in the financial world are, in many important ways, all "on the same page" in the way they operate and thus may have confidence in one another for following procedures that are regarded as financially sound.

At present, St. John's Church is not a player. We are following an accounting system that has grown as the Church has grown, but it has failed to serve us well as our organization has become more complex, and it is out of compliance with the rest of the accounting world. Over the past several years, Steve Latshaw has worked diligently with the Finance Committee in an attempt to make revisions in our system so that it is more appropriate to our ministries and more functional. What these efforts have made crystal clear is our need to become GAAP Compliant. And this is no trivial matter. Our dealings with the larger world of finance make it urgent that this be done as quickly as possible. Our ability to effectively manage our own financial house also depends on it. This step is not inexpensive, but it also is not avoidable.

In the June Vestry meeting, this financial discussion took the form of the Resolution regarding a Financial Advisor that is reported elsewhere in this issue of the Messenger. Please read it carefully. We hope as soon as it is feasible to provide a forum for discussion, questions and answers about this process ... and about the "new look" of finances at St. John's. Watch for announcements.

PROPERTY COMMITTEE MINUTES—JUNE, 2013

Present

Phil Becker, Doug Brown, Rich Collier, Bob Fields, Bill Gross, Mike Heider, and Peter Eaton attended the meeting. Fr. John had a Finance Committee meeting for this evening, making him unavailable for our meeting. Cynthia Minnich was recovering from her ills, while Janice Henry had a conflict

Peter Eaton opened the meeting at 7:05 p.m. with the manager's report.

Manager's Report

Much time and resources have been expended on the WiFi set-up thus far. There have been some snags, for which I have yet to hear back from Ed Shoff. We will be losing our manufacturer's technical support window soon unless we purchase an extension for this service. At this point there has been such reconfiguration of our equipment by Ed that I would probably not be able to do anything.

Considerable time and effort has been expended in coordinating the building repairs from the auto accident. The driver's insurer has not returned my calls thus far. If this continues, we may have to obtain legal council to pursue this claim. Doug Brown will be doing the repairs and I have also asked him to perform our annual repointing at our narthex entrance. He has started repairs.

The inspection of our fire alarm system that was scheduled for May 16th with Select Security and the City Fire Marshall's office was rescheduled for the completion of our phase 4 in June. The Fire Marshall's Office didn't have approved plans for phases 2 and 3. Select Security will be addressing this situation. An inspection of our rental properties is scheduled.

Old Business

Phase 4 Fire Alarm System – We will be looking now into an October installation, as a result of discussion with the Finance Committee.

Courtyard Subcommittee Report – Doug reported good progress with our mini-meetings and the table to address questions and concerns about this project. We will probably need to get Vestry approval for our percolation tests. A need has been demonstrated for a model to show our campus for clarification.

Painting – Plans are being made for the committee to address the re-finishing of the Sacristy.

Undercroft Redesign –Discussion was had regarding the moving of offices to have Paul Reese in proximity to the music room. Ethernet cable is being run to this area for Paul and a router for undercroft use.

Library Renovation – Completed. Bill is working on Library entrance signage.

Becker House Fire Alarm System – on hold until next year. At the recommendation of staff, a quote of \$4,985 was received for fire alarm system coverage within the Becker House and the passage. The proposal includes smoke detectors on every level and in the parish and financial secretaries' offices, two manual pull stations and two horn strobes. A \$10/month maintenance fee is associated with this additional equipment. Bill is working on zone assignments for this additional equipment and that of our courtyard accessibility project. It was felt this would be best planned in next year's budget.

PROPERTY COMMITTEE MINUTES—JUNE, 2013 (CONTINUED)

Project Name – Bill asked everyone for ideas for a project name/theme. We have already received some ideas.

Nursery Improvements –Mostly completed. A bulletin board is all that remains thanks to Mike and Janice.

Parish House - Coat Racks – We will evaluate this request for our cold months later this year.

Security Drop Box – The drop box has been ordered. An installation this month is anticipated

Tobacco Policy – A discussion was had at the last Vestry meeting, which will probably continue during their future meetings. Our Policy Use Form would have to reflect this policy.

New Business

June's Life Safety Inspections – Bill's recent inspection was unremarkable.

Mutual Ministry Review – Please contact Peter or Fr. John with your thoughts on our property program.

REFLECTIONS FROM JULIE GITTENS

Independence Day

One of the joys of being an American is holidays. We Americans love holidays. We average at least one holiday a month to celebrate just about anything. Some holidays are religious, some are historical and some just are. If we can celebrate it, we'll have a holiday and if we're really lucky, Congress will make it a national holiday and we can have the day off from work. Of course, in July, our holiday is Independence Day, the Fourth of July. There's a great joy to Independence Day; it's a day for a family get together, picnics, cookouts, and a day for just having fun. It's the day we remember what being an American is all about; the day we celebrate our freedoms.

If we Americans love one thing as a much as our holidays; it's our freedoms. We talk about our freedoms all the time: our freedom of speech, our freedom of religion, our freedom of assembly. What's funny, at least to me, is how Jason Whitlock, a sportscaster with Fox News, described these basic human rights most Americans take for granted. During a debate about banning college football, hosted by NYU, Whitlock said, "In the USA, we have Freedom and then, we have Free Dumb." The latter he said applies to people who like to abuse the freedoms set forth in our Bill of Rights and Constitution by their language, their attitudes and their personalities.

After I heard him say this, I had to laugh, because Whitlock was stating a simple truth about being an American. We have freedoms and with these freedoms come the right to be dumb in how we express them. If there are two things Americans will agree and argue about it's our freedom of speech and our freedom of religion. We hold those freedoms to be what makes being an American so special. We have a right to say whatever we want without fear of government retribution and a right to have any religious belief or disbelief we want. The irony, of course, is that our founding fathers never envisioned the 21st Century. They never envisioned the internet, chat boards or Facebook. It never accorded to them that the freedom of speech would be abused by people posting spiteful and hate-filled messages on the internet. And they certainly never envisioned that these same people would use their freedom of religion as a reason why they make these comments.

There are things we Episcopalians consider as the standards of our Church, our faith: protesting against racial and ethnic violence, feeding the hungry, clothing the poor, healing the sick. Most Americans consider us "liberals" because of it. So the question is "are we being liberal Americans or are we just being good Christians?" Do the freedoms expressed in our Constitution explain why we act the way we do or does our faith? Are we willing to listen to what the opposing side says because as Americans we remember the freedom of speech or because as Christians we remember these words, "You have heard that it was said, 'You shall love your neighbor and hate your enemy.' But I say to you, love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, so that you may be sons of your Father who is in heaven; for He causes His sun to rise on the evil and the good, and sends rain on the righteous and the unrighteous." Matthew 5:43-45.

This year we opened our doors to Building Hope. This is a project that was conceived and implemented by a group of 11th and 12th graders from Lancaster Catholic High School. Each Tuesday evening they offer a program that is aimed at providing a safe place for homeless teens. In effect, it is teens helping teens. St. John's was the fourteenth organization the students approached and the only one to say yes. We have been hosting Building Hope for four months now and lately other churches have come to the teens asking them to open the program there. The students have told the other organizations that they want to be sure it is successful here before expanding to other locations. Even though it is only one evening per week, and they know the need exists every night, they are not prepared to do more yet. Recently, Building Hope was featured in Lancaster Fine Living. It has also been visited by Children and Youth, Lancaster City Police Homeless Project and a County Commissioner. Each came because they wanted to network with Building Hope. We have a small cadre of members who serve as hosts each week. We are amazed at the depth of some of the discussion groups. The program will continue over the summer with a two week break.

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JUBILEE MINISTRIES (CONTINUED)

While we offer no financial support to Building Hope, we recognize that St. John's incurs some costs in offering its buildings to outsiders. These are some of the costs you help defray by buying Grocery Cards. Jubilee Ministries are designed to operate at "no cost" to the Operating Budget. In effect, this is true because we do not make a contribution to Utility costs or time that our staff may spend doing some behind the scenes work. However, at the end of each year, any surplus is turned over to the Operating Budget to help reduce the overall deficit. So please, purchase Grocery Cards and help us to continue to be known as "St. John's Jubilee Center."

While many folks are generous and regular with their donations, <u>many ignore it</u>, or simply just plain forget. The following startling fact of finance may just shake us up a bit: Since the start of this year, <u>the bills for coffee alone are \$600</u>, while the deposits from the basket have only been \$250!

Another sad fact is that much of the prepared coffee every Sunday, is wasted. Many mugs are returned with a half a cup of coffee remaining and some full pots of coffee have to be washed away. Let's see what habits we can change. That's the hard part!

Thanks for taking the time to care, so we can continue to 'smell the coffee'!
