CONTINUING EDUCATION

"We have left undone those things we ought to have done."

This quote from the old Confession of Sin summarizes my status regarding my continuing education. According to my contract with the parish I am supposed to be taking two weeks every year for professional development. In addition the vestry annually approves \$700 in the budget for this purpose. Despite this encouragement, and my strong personal interest, I have failed to take full advantage of these incentives. I did attend last year a week long conference last on vocational planning, but in my eight years with St. John's, that's about it.

My reasons (or excuses) for this lack of diligence has been the priority of my other pressing commitments to the parish, the diocese, the community and my family. I believe all these to be valid. I also believe none are absolute. While St. John's has made major and healthy changes these past years, and is poised to consider more, I feel the parish is in a stable place and if I'm absent for a time, will do just fine. I have a high confidence in our parish leadership, staff and particularly our assistant rector, Pastor Jennifer.

This summer I will taking my first baby steps in the direction of professional development. I am taking three days to intentionally address two topics. The first is the history of St. John's. This is more than a curiosity for me. The focus of one of my undergraduate majors was the history of 19th century religion in American. I am anxious to read Arthur Lord's, <u>A Brief History of St. John's Episcopal Church</u>, as well as its two source works, <u>Historical Sketches of St. John's Free Church</u> and <u>A Parochial History of St. John's Episcopal Church</u>, written by M. W. Geist in 1901. I am particularly interested in the history of the relationship between the parish and the neighborhood community.

My study is also part of a research project being carried out by our verger, Aaron Spicher with support from our parish secretary, Patti Means. Aaron is cataloguing all the memorial gifts we have received through our history. Patti will be documenting them for inclusion in the new Book of Remembrance located in the Chapel and is now on display on the recently donated book stand hand made by Nelson Craige.

My second area of attention will be planning for sabbatical. In the months of June, July and August of 2014 I will be away from the parish to reflect on the future of my ministry and ready myself for my last years at St. John's. In addition to meeting with Bishop Baxter for his counsel, I hope include spiritual direction, silent retreat, vocational counseling and maybe some reflective fly fishing. I look forward to sharing with you in future Messenger articles the details of the sabbatical plan.

It is never easy in our busy lives to take time out for ourselves. Even simple things like recreation and exercise are difficult to incorporate into our schedules. Harder still is the challenge to dedicate time for spiritual development and personal growth. Yet when we do, we are exceedingly rewarded not only by a higher quality of life but a greater self to offer in return. This is the biblical truth of sabbatical or Sabbath time. So for me the question is, "Do I really have faith to trust this ancient promise of God? *John*+

Monthly Monday Muddling

First, some definitions (New World Dictionary of the American Language): muddle – 1. to mix up in a confused manner 2. to confuse mentally, befuddle and especially, muddle through – to manage to succeed in spite of apparent blunders or confusion

Every now and then, Vestry finds itself "muddling through" something. It's not totally rare for us to be considering items about which no one on Vestry has special expertise or previous experience. And especially in such situations, our combined naivete has the possibility of producing a discussion that might be visualized as a squirming octopus, void of any head that would unite the tentacles. But after the (apparently) necessary period of floundering about has run its course, a resolution emerges that seems to get everything (and everyone) together, and brings us to the destination where we needed to arrive. And when that happens, we sometimes find ourselves smiling with that collective realization that what we experienced as a "muddling through" proved rather to be God's Spirit helping us through a process of discernment.

Don't get me wrong — most of our Vestry meetings are quite predictable and orderly. And we're delighted to affirm our belief that God is a God of orderly processes who leads us through that very orderliness. But occasionally something comes along for which there is no pattern, so we have to create one so that we can move forward. And at such times, the path forward can appear to be a bit void of orderliness. That is what it's like — sometimes — to try to shepherd St. John's Church in the 21st century. Momentarily frustrating; ultimately rewarding! Really — Vestry members are quite in agreement that the time spent in this service provides a level of satisfaction that is more than commensurate with the time and energy invested, even with the muddling.

The month of August is a time when the Vestry is prayerfully looking around for two or three persons to replace people who are coming to the end of their three-year term on Vestry. We hope that, at the same time, there are individuals in the Parish who are prayerfully looking around to see whether they should be involved in St. John's life in a new or different way. For some of you, that new way might be service on the Vestry. Talk with any of us about this — our names are all listed on the back of the Sunday Service Bulletin. We want you to have as much good information as possible to help guide your discernment process.

And we'd love to share with you the mystery of monthly Monday muddling.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Thanks to having 5 Sundays in the month, June financials came in a little better than May's results. Pledged contributions continue to track below budget at the 90% level. I must remind everyone that while we are taking our summer vacations, the bills and expenses continue to need paying. Efforts to "catch-up" or even pay ahead are greatly appreciated during these summer months. The non-pledged category continues to be strong. If current trend continues for the remainder of the year, these contributions will amount to over \$50,000. Our total contributions are at 95.9% of budget, which is very encouraging.

Expense control continues to be a top priority. All of our major expense areas are well under budget. We thank the Finance and Property Committees for working together to maintain our facilities while being mindful of our cash flow. Our new procedure for paying the Diocesan Fair Share is working well. We are 100% current on our pledge as of the end of June. Last year at this same time we were already falling behind.

VESTRY RESOLUTION

The following resolutions were approved at the St. John's Vestry Meeting on July 15, 2013:

Percolation Testing

Resolved, the St. John's Vestry approves the expensing of up to \$5,300 to RGS Associates to conduct stormwater management percolation testing for the Courtyard project to be funded from the Labyrinth Fund.

Courtyard Design

The Vestry of St. John's directs the Courtyard Committee to commission MM Architects and RGS Associates to develop a comprehensive design proposal for the courtyard and accessibility project. To contain professional design fees, a single design is requested, the "all glass" option, which was preferred by HARB (Historical Architectural Review Board) and the Property and Courtyard Committees.

PROPERTY COMMITTEE MINUTES

JULY, 2013

Present

Phil Becker, Rich Collier, Bob Fields, Fr. John, Grant Hansel, Bill Gross and Cynthia Minnich attended the meeting. The committee welcomed Cynthia back from a brief medical respite.

Bill Gross opened the meeting at 7:03 p.m. with the manager's report.

Manager's Report

A recent power outage resulted in half a week of electrical troubleshooting and identification of distribution means. PPL was called in to review their service during this incident. It was then determined that someone had opened a breaker in the nave panel, which caused the outage. All of our panels are now labeled to identify them and show how they receive and distribute their power. Such identification will ease future troubleshooting efforts.

Doug Brown has finished the repairs for the car crash and has begun our annual repointing at our narthex entrance. I'm in the process of assembling documents to file a claim with the Church Insurance Company. We may still be out our \$500 deductible, despite every effort being made by our insurer to recoup this amount.

The inspection of our rental properties has resulted in a need for painting all of the exterior trim of both properties. All I'm waiting for is decent weather to do so. Smoke detector replacement and shock protection of a bathroom outlet have been already completed. A re-inspection is scheduled for next Monday.

Much time and resources have been used to handle mold remediation in the Sunday School level of our Parish House. Black lights, dehumidifiers, and revamped drainage means are currently being employed to mitigate this condition.

Old Business

Phase 4 Fire Alarm System – We will be looking now into an October installation, as a result of discussion with the Finance Committee.

Courtyard Committee Report – Doug was on vacation but, reported to Bill that he would be providing a resolution to Vestry for our percolation tests for the storm water management system. Our 2007 geothermal test well results were already provided to Doug to aid in this effort. He also reported that he would be asking for pricing on 2 designs, one incorporating arches and the other without arches, as there seem to be an even number of parishioners interested in both. The property committee was surprised to learn of the equal interests, thinking there would be more space without the arches. The committee recently received a resignation notice from Dave Martin, citing insufficient time for him to serve with his other commitments.

Painting – Plans are being made for the committee to address the re-finishing of the Sacristy.

Undercroft Redesign –We are planning to have Paul Reese in proximity to the music room. Ethernet cable is being run to this area for Paul and a router for undercroft use. This process is planned for after the webstreaming hard drive has been installed.

PROPERTY COMMITTEE MINUTES (CONTINUED)

Becker House Fire Alarm System - on hold until next year.

Nursery Improvements – Mostly completed. A bulletin board from Pastor Jennifer is all that remains.

Parish House - Coat Racks – We will evaluate this request for our cold months later this year.

Security Drop Box – The drop box has been delivered and awaiting installation.

Tobacco Policy – A discussion has been had at Vestry meeting, which will probably continue during some future meetings. Our Policy Use Form would have to reflect this policy. The Property Committee remains in support of a policy on tobacco use on the church campus.

New Business

July's Life Safety Inspections – Bill's inspection today was unremarkable. Clark Fire Protection is scheduled for their annual extinguisher service Wednesday of next week.

Mutual Ministry Review – Please contact Peter or Fr. John with your thoughts on our property program.

Reminders

Next Meeting – The next Property Committee meeting will be on August 5th, 2013 at 7 p.m. at the Becker House.

Our options are to ignore the reality or face it. In choosing to face it, I will present the picture to you on a regular basis so that we can all act in time. We can either act to increase our funding, or reduce our missions, or some combination of the two. I choose to present the picture to you in the hope that we can increase our funding and continue, maybe even expand, our mission.

I want to thank those of you who have made directed contributions to Eagles Nest, MDG Committee, Community Breakfast or any other Jubilee Mission. I want to thank those of you who have purchased Grocery Cards. Your treasure has enabled us to accomplish our mission statement: Grow in God. Act in Service. Witness in Love.

St. John's Advocacy Initiatives

Advocacy Initiatives

As St. John's Advocacy Initiatives begins to take shape, it is important to point out that our scope is not limited to action on the environment. That's just the squeaky wheel that's getting the first grease. When you get back from summer vacation we will roll out some projects that will endeavor to tackle serious subjects in an enjoyable, community based way. But for now, here are some resources you may want to check out.

Citizens' Climate Lobby, ccl-nynjpa.com

Last year Rev. Jerry Lee Miller started a Lancaster chapter to work hand-in-hand with the well-established York chapter, headed by Jon Clark. CCL is proposing that U.S. reduce carbon emissions by cutting use of fossil fuels, especially at power plants. The group is for a carbon use tax and for divestment from corporations that are heavy coal users. They work closely with Bill McKibben of 350.org, a leader in the movement to reverse climate change. Members meet monthly for a national conference call with well known scientists who provide us with in-depth background on climate change. We are encouraged to write letters to the editor. There are also opportunities to rally and speak to lawmakers. CCL favors a positive appeal based on science, rather than angry protest.

HIVE of Planet-Loving Activity, search the group on Facebook

This is a local, grassroots response to environmental problems—fracking, pollution, carbon and methane emissions, chemicals in our waterways, farm runoff and more. HIVE members may attend rallies in protest, but they acknowledge that there are many ways to register our concern. They often present their love for the earth through song, dance, art and storytelling. Events and meetings are posted on Facebook; if you "Like" their page, updates will be sent to your feed.

St. John's is happy to be their partner and encourages our members especially to attend their free and excellent lectures.

Episcopal Public Policy Network, episcopal.grassroots.org

Did you know that the our national church places an advocate (lobbyist) in Congress to promote legislation that supports issues Episcopalians care about—feeding the hungry, refugees, immigration, human trafficking, education (basically, the MDG's) and "this fragile earth, our island home"? On the newly refreshed Episcopal Church website, the above link works. If you sign in, you will receive occasional updates on pending legislation. You can let your lawmakers know your opinion simply by clicking the button. On a recent post from EPPN I was delighted to find this:
