PALM PASSION SUNDAY

Palm Sunday? Passion Sunday? Which is it? For Episcopalians it is both. Since the introduction of the 1979 Book of Common Prayer the official name of the Sunday before Easter is, "The Sunday of the Passion: Palm Sunday".

This has not always been the case, even though this was the earliest intent. In the 1549 Prayer Book it was titled simply, "The Sunday next before Easter". There was no reenactment of the triumphant entrance of Jesus to Jerusalem - no grand procession into the church or blessing of palms – because those of the English Reformation had an aversion to the blessing of material things. Not until the 1928 Prayer Book was the title, "Commonly called Palm Sunday" reintroduced, and in the decades following, was the reading of Christ's entering Jerusalem added to the lectionary.

The palm procession has its origin in the Holy Week ceremonies of the church in Jerusalem in the fourth century. Faithful pilgrims gathered on this day on the Mount of Olives. With singing and waving of branches they escorted the bishop, riding in their midst on a donkey, into the city. By the sixth century a procession had become part of the ceremonies throughout the Roman Catholic Church with the blessing and distribution of palms becoming the common practice three centuries later.

What has always been at the center of Palm Passion Sunday has been the reading from one of the Gospels of the Passion of Christ – his arrest and trial before Pilate and his crucifixion and death. In medieval times the recital of the Passion was performed with great solemnity and took the character of a sacred oratorio. Different cantors chanted the words said by the respective people in the drama – Judas, Caiaphas, Peter, Pilate, Jesus. Another cantor sang the narrative passages, and the choir took the part of the crowd. Following the Reformation members of the congregation were included in the devotionals. This has become the template for our reading of the Passion on Palm Sunday.

This year on Palm Passion Sunday at St. John's we will elaborate on that practice. Whereas in the past different readers representing different figures assembled in front of the congregation, this year we will have just four readers, representing different voices of the congregation, reading from the center of the church.

This model was suggested by Tom Bond who chairs our Lector ministry and who taught Liturgy at Notre Dame University. It retains the ancient tradition but makes it less like "a play" and more recognizable as a proclamation of the Gospel. It changes the focus from a Gospel proclamation to the congregation, to a Gospel proclamation by the congregation. It honors our understanding of liturgy and the precise meaning of that word: "the work of the people"

Palm Passion Sunday spans the ministry of Jesus from triumph to death, and carries us emotionally from exaltation to grief. It shows to us in Jesus the fullness of our humanity and of his divinity. Palm and Passion belong together because they represent the Oneness of Christ and his Oneness with us. It deserves to be called Palm Passion Sunday.

MDG CHALLENGES FOR APRIL

MDG Challenge for April 6th

Twenty years ago today, on April 6, 1994, a plane carrying President Habyarimana, a Hutu, was shot down. Violence began almost immediately after that. Under the cover of war, Hutu extremists launched their plans to destroy the entire Tutsi civilian population. Political leaders who might have been able to take charge of the situation and other high profile opponents of the Hutu extremist plans were killed immediately. Tutsi and people suspected of being Tutsi were killed in their homes and as they tried to flee at roadblocks set up across the country during the genocide. Entire families were killed at a time. Women were systematically and brutally raped. It is estimated that some 200,000 people participated in the perpetration of the Rwandan genocide. In the weeks after April 6, 1994, 800,000 men, women, and children perished in the Rwandan genocide, perhaps as many as three quarters of the Tutsi population. At the same time, thousands of Hutu were murdered because they opposed the killing campaign and the forces directing it. Today is the 20th anniversary of the genocide in Rwanda. Let us hold these people in our thoughts and prayers and actively participate for peace in our midst and in our world.

MDG Challenge for April 13th, Palm Sunday Faith is taking the first step even when you don't see the whole staircase.

Six weeks ago, we each stepped into the Lenten season. Many of you made commitments stepping toward peace, stepping toward sharing kindness, stepping toward caring for our brothers and sisters regardless of their beliefs. As we envision Christ taking those steps on Palm Sunday, envision your steps beyond this holy season and how to continue care to those in our midst and in our one world. We do not have to see an end to begin a journey.

The friendships developed between our teens at diocesan events often last a lifetime and yet, our teens work hard- really hard- to build upon these relationships with new friends, creating a community that is both tightly bonded and open to newcomers.

In their own words, "As a community of faith we are always looking for new people to join us and share in our fellowship. We look for those who wish to grow in their faith, define their faith, question their faith and those who may have no faith at all. Our hearts are open to explore endless possibilities, amazing mysteries, and the spectacular works of God in our every day lives. Our main task is to take the love we receive at events and spread it throughout the world. In all of our works we strive to show the love of God and make the world a better place by sharing the Gospel of Jesus Christ." We have a lot to learn from our teens as a church.

At St. John's, we are blessed by an extraordinary group of young people that have become known as leaders in our diocese. In large part because of the energy, love and support they receive from Mary Ellen Kilp, our J2A Youth Ministry Co-Coordinator and Diocesan Youth Ministry Co-Coordinator (not to mention all-around amazing woman), our teens are deeply invested in the work of the larger church. A few examples? Five teens from St. John's recently attended "Happenings", a diocesan youth designed and lead retreat held at Camp Mount Luther. Emma DiPace, Amelia Dissinger, Aaron Hasircoglu, James Woolson and Cameron Watts represented St. John's as they explored their faith in what is consistently described as a "life-changing experience". If you are curious- ask them about it! Joanie Kilhefner, a graduating senior at St. John's, served as staff.

Two of our teens, Emma DiPace and James Woolson, attended a Province III youth event in March. This annual gathering of high school teens from Province III (including dioceses from Virginia, West Virginia, Pennsylvania, Delaware and Maryland) was held at the North Bay Adventure Camp. The event included amazing speakers, small group experiences, ropes courses, games, live music and ample worship. It is a wonderful way to connect with other youth in the Episcopal Church.

Later this summer our diocese will be sending twenty four teens to the Episcopal Youth Event, a gathering of teens from across the Episcopal Church that happens every three years (similar to convention). This year's EYE will take place at Villanova University in Philadelphia. David Kilp, a young adult from St. John's, is serving in an internship for the Diocese of Pennsylvania and is contributing in a significant way to the organization and implementation of EYE.

Teens and children are all-too often dubbed the church of "tomorrow", but as our teens rightly name, they are also the church of today. We are blessed by the extraordinary witness of these young people to the love and grace of our Lord, a love that they show, both on their lips and in their lives.

Dear Sisters and Brothers of Central Pennsylvania,

It is my pleasure to announce that last week, the Standing Committee voted to nominate the Right Reverend Robert Gepert, D.D. as Provisional Bishop (Interim Bishop) of our Diocese. The election will take place at the 2014 Diocesan Convention (June 13-14). This choice has been done in consultation with the Presiding Bishop's Office and my support. He will join us later in Lent as Assisting Bishop until the vote of Convention and will then lead the Diocese through this current discernment season and the consecration of the next Diocesan Bishop on September 12, 2015.

Bishop Gepert has ministered as a parish priest and Cathedral Dean in the Dioceses of Bethlehem, Washington and Easton (Maryland); and has served as Diocesan Bishop of Western Michigan for 11 years. He and his wife, Anne Labat-Gepert, are recently retired and living in Lancaster, PA.



TREASURER'S REPORT

I am sure that we are all glad to see this winter come to an end. February was a difficult month for anyone attempting to get to or from the church. It is no surprise that both our pledged and non-pledged contributions were down from our projected budget level. Fortunately, we still had cash from the end of last year and the extra boost from those that paid their entire pledge in January. Just a reminder that if you find it difficult to keep track of where you are with respect to your pledge, using the automated electronic transfer will keep you up to date. In case you were wondering, the single monthly electronic transfer transaction is less expensive for St. John's than processing 4 or 5 weekly checks.

Expenses for the month of February are as we all would expect. Everything is under or on budget with the exception of Snow and Ice Removal. At \$3357 we have spent nearly twice our allotted amount. In spite of this uncontrollable expense, our Property Committee and Property Manager have managed to keep the total Property Ministries expenses well within budget.

Beginning next month, I will again add monthly and year-to-date income and expense numbers to my monthly note. I have not included them up until now, because the first two months are usually A-typical. As always, if you have questions or concerns, please feel free to contact any member of the Finance Committee or Vestry.



Justice Not Just Us

How will what we are doing here affect or involve those living in poverty?

This has been the driving question for Jubilee since the last Diocesan Convention. Each of our Jubilee Ministries leaders had a chance to offer a response at our February meeting. This will lead our agenda at future meetings as well.

We are not doing this work alone. If we were, it would be impossible. We wish to thank the Diocesan Operation Understanding Grant Committee for providing financial support to two of our ministries. Building Hope will be receiving a grant of \$500.00 to provide services to high school students who are at risk of being bullied or homeless or a number of other issues that children should not have to address. Eagles Nest received a grant of \$350.00 for continuing there service to students at Fulton School. This is the twelfth year that Eagles Nest has received a grant from the Diocese, a most unusual length of time for grants.

Recently we have given greater focus to our efforts to provide more nutritious foods to our neighbors. We have received some educational materials through the Lancaster County council of Churches and are integrating this into our efforts. We are concerned with those living in poverty who suffer from obesity. We now realize that this obesity is a product of malnutrition. We can help improve the overall health of some of our neighbors by providing healthier foods. Please see two additional articles (pages 18 and 20) within this newsletter that address these efforts.

We are starting another in-house effort within St. John's to address this also. Doug Brown has offered a plot of land at his home for us to grow fruits, vegetables and spices. We will be looking for volunteers to help at all stages. We are going to organize it so that people will be able to take turns rather than having to show up every time there is work to be done. More details will come as they are available. We are not alone. We have partners in our efforts to affect or involve those living in poverty. With our partners, and the efforts of those we are trying to help, we will help them achieve economic justice. It is justice for all, not just us.

Food Pantry Offerings - It's Your Choice!

Christian Education is conducting a special drive for our food pantry during the season of Lent. The food pantry committee thinks this is a super idea, but we are asking you to consider reading labels before you purchase food (for the pantry or for yourselves). Watch carefully for sodium, fat, and sugar. If we start feeding ourselves in a healthy manner, we might change the way we think about food for the food pantry. Here are some examples:

Cereals – Most popular cereals (with advertising aimed at children), are full of sugar.

Oatmeal (½ c, cooks in 5 min)	3 g fat	No sodium	1 g sugar	150 calories	5 g protein	4 g fiber
Shredded Wheat (1¼ c)	1 g fat	No sodium	No sugar	170 calories	6 g protein	6 g fiber
Cheerios (1 c)	2 g fat	160 mg sodium	1 g sugar	100 calories	3 g protein	3 g fiber
Froot Loops (1 c)	1 g fat	135 mg sodium	12 g sugar	110 calories	1 g protein	3 g fiber

Mac 'n' Cheese – 1 c. serving

Betty Crocker	1.5 g fat	490 mg sodium	240 calories	8 g protein
Cheese Club Shells	13 g fat	860 mg sodium	300 calories	11 g protein

Canned Meat – serving size varies

White Chicken	3 g fat	35 mg cholesterol	240 mg sodium	10 g protein
Tuna	1 g fat	25 mg cholesterol	180 mg sodium	10 g protein
Beef Stew	10 g fat	30 mg cholesterol	990 mg sodium	10 g protein
Spam	16 g fat	40 mg cholesterol	790 mg sodium	7 g protein

Soup – serving size varies by brand and flavor

Chicken Noodle	3 g fat	1 mg cholesterol	870 mg sodium	3 g protein
Tomato	0 fat	0 cholesterol	480 mg sodium	2 g protein

Rice – serving size: 1/3 c. dry

Rice-A-Roni has about 600 to 1100 mg of sodium per serving, depending on flavor.

Suggestion: purchase rice in 10 – 15 lb. bags, divide into 4 c. allotments, put in zipper bags – no sodium!

(Keep in mind the serving size; most of us eat more than one serving. In fact, the FDA has recently proposed changes to nutrition labels to show "realistic" serving sizes: http://www.forbes.com/sites/nadiaarumugam/2014/02/28/fda-proposes-changes-to-nutrition-label-including-more-realistic-serving-sizes/)



We talked about our concerns for all those throughout the world, as well as those here at home whose basic needs for food, clothing, shelter, healthcare and education are not met. There were a wide range of solutions and commitments that people saw and experienced. There are those we are aware that have committed their lives to living and working in foreign lands with those in need, sometimes ultimately giving their lives. There have been those that have travelled and have seen the needs to be so great that they were inspired to leave behind their personal possessions. There are those who regularly help to collect shoes for **Soles for Souls**, donate food to the Food banks and help with the distribution. There are those who organize collections in their neighborhoods and invite their neighbors to leave items in a box on their front porch.

The one common thread was the feeling of the enormity of the problems as a whole; hunger, shoes, transportation, healthcare, education, etc. But, then we looked at ourselves as individuals and tried to define "I am____", each of us trying to fill in the blank to determine what we can do, what impact we can have to make this "One world" better for everyone. What seeds can each of us plant to have an impact, small or large on all of our concerns for our "One world"?

FOOD HUB INITIATIVE



Add Your Voice on How St. John's Can Support Community Food Hub Initiative

During our Jubilee Ministry Sunday on March 30, Joel Cliff shared information with the congregation about the Lancaster County Council of Churches' exciting new food hub project.

Slated to begin operation in late 2014 or early 2015, the food hub will transform the way our community addresses hunger, greatly expanding the capabilities of the council's current food bank. It will be a gateway to connect the 11% of county adults and the 18% of our children who are food insecure with much more of the abundant nutritious food that is currently available in the area. The hub will be a unique operation in the county, equipped and ready to accept vast quantities of food from the Central PA Food Bank and many other sources, including local growers. The hub will then distribute this quantum leap in supply to 130+ food banks and community meals throughout the county, including the many area churches who operate such programs.

This growth in capacity presents new opportunities to benefit St. John's own hunger outreach, so please let Father John know of your support for the food hub and that you'd like St. John's to include consideration of a financial donation to the project as part of our 2015 budget.

COURTYARD PROJECT & GARDEN MINISTRY

Courtyard Project

The courtyard project is moving steadily forward even though few signs of this have been seen. We have been keeping in constant contact with MM architects as we continue to work intimately with RGS associates. MM have been in a holding pattern as we work through our storm water design. We are currently in line to receive funding from the city, but it is up to us to complete the design process and to schedule construction (with the city's blessing) before the grant money evaporates. The money does not look like it will dry up this year, but we are unsure of next year. This has us focused on getting our storm water design completed so that we can move on with the project should this be needed.

A few weeks ago RGS had given us a design for managing our storm water. We felt that this design did not fully fit our needs (such as fears of sink holes, water infiltration, maintenance costs of porous asphalt, durability of porous asphalt, etc.) so we asked for more design options. We received those options last week and the courtyard/property committees are currently pouring over their details. News will be forthcoming from this.

As it stands right now, we are getting very close to having a breakthrough. A core contingent of parishioners has been established for a capitol campaign feasibility study. Once we receive rough guestimates for construction costs, the feasibility study will commence. Big things are afoot! More news will come soon!

Garden Ministry

St. John's will once again have a parish garden. A garden was maintained faithfully by the Martin's for many years and this year it will be returning, but to a different location. The garden will be located at Angela and my house at 1993 White Oak Rd. Strasburg. It is 12 miles south of Lancaster off 222 south. We will have the garden tilled and ready for volunteers as soon as the weather warms (which is very soon!). Currently we are looking for volunteers to help with the garden. No experience necessary and all tools will be provided. Since the garden is at our house, facilities and refreshments will be provided. Please let me know ASAP if you would like to be involved in this ministry. Spring is almost here and seeds will need to be planted very soon. I will communicate news via email as well as through announcements at church. The food that will be grown will be used in the following ways: supplementing our food pantry, distributed at community breakfast, any function at St. John's requesting produce that is in season, and the Lancaster County Council of Churches. There is also talk of placing produce on the breezeway as was done in years past by the Martin's (proceeds to benefit the garden ministry and Jubilee ministries). The food that we will grow will be distributed to the underserved in our community. Currently the food pantry does not allow healthy options for those in need. If anyone has recently been to the grocery store they will know how expensive produce is and see why it is hard for the poor to obtain healthy food. We will be growing almost 100% organic foods and bugs are included at no charge. We are very excited about this project and hope you can join us in the adventure!

PROPERTY CORNER

Members of the Courtyard Committee joined the Property Committee for our March meeting. Thanks to Doug Brown for providing updates and next steps.

Increasing our bandwidth

Comcast is scheduled to install cable service on March 10, increasing our bandwidth to accommodate more robust and reliable Wi-Fi access, as well as paving the way for future web streaming of our services. Emulous Communications will be involved to ensure a smooth transition with our telephone system.

Rebounding from a rough winter

Due to a very demanding winter weather season, budgeted funds for snow and ice removal have been depleted. Bill Gross is currently addressing leaks and other damage caused by frozen gutters and overflowing downspouts.

Safeguarding God's Children

Bill installed a window on the nursery door to enhance our safeguarding efforts. He also placed a mirror in the room to provide full visibility from the door.

Fresh coats of paint are on the agenda for our rental properties on Concord Street, as well as the sacristy. Thank you to Dave Martin, Mike Kilhefner, Pam Loose and Anne Labat-Gepert who have volunteered their painting talents to assist with refurbishing the Minister of Music's office.

NEW PIANO FOR OUR SANCTUARY

Many of you probably noticed a new person in the nave on Sunday, March 16. Actually, person might not be quite the right description, although I'm treating her as such. A new entity in the form of a vertical piano has come to live with the congregation of St. John's. Please welcome her! I thought it might be interesting to share the back story behind the acquisition of this instrument, to tell you a bit about the instrument itself, and to invite you to enjoy it in several ways.

I have been interested in obtaining a piano for the nave almost since my arrival in the summer of 2012. There were the usual difficulties, funding, timing, plus the challenge of finding a piano that would fit into the aesthetic and spatial concerns of St. John's neo-gothic architecture. After receiving support for this idea from liturgy team and vestry, Ken and Deb Smith offered their support for the project providing further incentive to start the process. Over Christmas break I stopped into Reifsnyders, but was unimpressed with their offerings until I sat down at a beautiful, vertical Steinway. I had no idea newer pianos like that one existed! It was of a size that would fill the nave with sound, but fit the parameters that it must be an upright. It also had the visual beauty to complement St. John's architecture. Although the price was excellent, it was higher than our original budget, and it sold while we were in discussion. Fortunately, others were available, but were located in California, Arizona and Hawaii. I asked vestry if they would send me to Hawaii to evaluate that instrument, but that request was turned down J. Those pianos also sold before we could make a move. Things began to look bleak.

Meanwhile, the choir had an amazing response to the information that we were looking into buying a piano. Joan Lorenz felt that a quality piano would be a fine memorial gift to remember her husband, Robert Lorenz, and others also came forward. Vestry approval to purchase a Steinway K-52 in Walnut was granted. Now we just had to find one. Steinway only makes about 30 of these pianos a year, and only a fraction of those in the desired finish, so there are not that many around. Many creative Google searches and phone calls later, I came into contact with a dealer in Edison, NJ. The dealer was helpful, but the K-52 he had was in the process of being sold. We hung up, but 30 minutes later he called me back and said he knew an individual who had the instrument we wanted and thought we could work out a deal. Sure enough, a week later it was delivered to St. John's.

Why this particular brand, model and finish? Steinway has been a respected name in pianos for well over 100 years both in America and Europe. In an age of machines and automation, Steinway is still committed to hand crafting each piano from the finest quality materials. Steinway pianos from as far back as the 1860's are still valued, rebuilt and used. The K-52 has been built since 1903 and incorporates many of the features of Steinway grand pianos and boasts a soundboard with the same approximate sounding area as a 5'10" grand. Simply put, this piano will be the St John's piano for decades, and possibly centuries, to come. In purchasing this piano, St John's made an investment in the present and future music ministries of the church.

How might you enjoy this instrument? First, it will be used regularly in worship for prelude and to accompany the choir. Having a piano in the nave greatly increases the amount of repertoire we are able to present. In smaller services, such as Sunday evening Lenten prayer, it will accompany congregational singing. Listen and delight in the intimate sounds of this instrument and feast your eyes on the beauty of the cabinetry. Second, I invite you to play the instrument. Give me a heads up to make arrangements to have it out and open, and you are more than welcome to enjoy making music with it (and the same is true for the organ).



Together, I anticipate enjoying this instrument for years to come.

TASKING RISKS

1 Corinthians 1:20 Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world?

Do any of you watch the TV game shows? Growing up, I used to watch The Wheel of Fortune with my father, followed by watching Jeopardy with my mother. There was a simple joy in calling out letters with my father and answering questions with my mother. And, of course, there was my mother's dream that I'd one day be a contestant on Teen Jeopardy. After all, what mother doesn't dream her child will be on Jeopardy? Imagine the happiness you'd feel if people all over the country could see that your kid isn't only smart, but that she's winning enough money to put herself through college.

I felt that way after watching last year's Teen Jeopardy challenge because of one of the contestants. Last year, one of the contestants was a young Black man, named Leonard Cooper. Finally, after being bombarded with stereotypes about young Black men, via social media and TV news, I finally got to see a "regular" Black teenager. And by regular I mean: he was smart (he got accepted into Brown University), he was funny (he told a great story about a joke his classmates played on him), and he had an outrageous afro. And I do mean outrageous afro. He looked like he had walked out of the 1970s.

But what I really liked about Leonard Cooper was what he did the second night of the final game. For those of you who don't watch Jeopardy, there are questions known as daily doubles where a contestant can risk any dollar amount they want to answer the question. On the second night of the final challenge game, Leonard Cooper risked all of his money, \$18,000, on a daily double question about John Steinbeck novels. There was a silence in every home in America when Alex Trebeck asked the question followed by a sigh of relief when Leonard answered it correctly and doubled his score. And there were applause when he won Teen Jeopardy even though he didn't know the correct answer to the Final Jeopardy question.

Leonard Cooper had done something most of us would never do, especially where money is involved. He took a risk, a gigantic risk. The fact that he was willing to take that risk is why I like him so much. I learned a great lesson from this young man. I learned that sometimes you have to be willing to take a chance and step outside of your comfort zone. We all spent last month in some type of prayer. Well, this month is the time to start taking risks by responding to the answers we received.
