SABBATICAL LEAVE

I will be on sabbatical this summer from June 2nd to September 2nd. The purpose of my leave is for vocational discernment and preparation for my last years of full time parish ministry at St. John's before my retirement. The tools I intend to use to this end include vocational counseling, spiritual direction, prayer, reflection, retreat and renewal.

As a three month sabbatical following seven years of service is standard practice in our diocese, I began my planning last summer with a conversation with Bishop Baxter. The Bishop directed me to vocational resources from which I selected Dr. Perry Hazeltine of the Samaritan Counseling Center to act as my vocational guide. We have been meeting monthly to help define my expectations for my sabbatical and begin to envision what my ministry might look like following my retirement from St. John's. He has also offered a syllabus of books on the topic of "golden aging" to better inform my decision making.

Spiritual direction, the second element of my sabbatical, will be addressed during a week of retreat at Holy Cross Monastery in West Park, New York. Holy Cross is an order of Episcopal monks and I will be working with Brother James Dowd, who visited with us at St. John's two years ago. Brother James will be helping me with the question, "What is God calling me to beyond St. John's?"

The month of July will be a dedicated time of reflection. I have accepted an invitation for a "summer cure" to serve at St. Cuthbert's Chapel on MacMahan Island in Maine. On Sundays I will be leading worship for the small island's community of summer residents, leaving lots of free time for reading and meditation. Cindy will be with me and we expect that our children and New England members of the family will be driving up to visit.

Most of August will be spent in Fort Myers, Florida, relaxing and getting a "taste of retirement". My best friend from seminary lives in the area and this is a possible retirement spot. Cindy and I will be trying Florida on for size to see if it feels like a fit for our future.

During my absence our Assistant Rector, Pastor Jennifer, will act as priest in charge. She will assume my executive roles as chair for Staff, Ministries Council, and Liturgy Team. Your Senior Warden, John Herzog, will become the chair of the Executive Committee and Vestry. Pastor Jennifer will continue to provide leadership in the primary clergy ministries of Worship, Pastoral Care, Education and Evangelism. The areas of ministry – Community, Communication, Outreach, Property, Finance and Stewardship - where lay leadership is primary will be maintained by your vestry Stewards.

Pastor Jennifer will be assisted by an all-star lineup of noted preachers to help with services on Sundays and Wednesdays. Our special guests will include the Rev. Beth Mollard, the Rev. John Emmert, the Rev. Barbara Serras, and the Rev. Megan Malick and the Rev. Paul Eyer, both of whom are from the United Church of Christ tradition.

Additional pastoral support over the summer will be provided by a new Lay Pastoral Assistant, Linda Bruce. Linda previously served as Parish Visitor at St. James'. A cradle Episcopalian from New Jersey, Linda holds as BS degree from Mansfield University. She has also done course work through the diocesan School of Christian Studies. Linda will be available for hospital visits on Tuesdays and Thursdays, and to provide emergency pastoral care.

This is an example of one of the benefits for the parish from a clergy sabbatical leave – it creates opportunities for new ministries. Likewise, Pastor Jennifer will have the chance to experience being "priest in charge". However, while she will be stepping into new roles, we should not expect her to do two jobs – hers and mine. Sabbatical is meant to create space for new lay leadership to emerge.

I anticipate that upon my return we will be concluding the discernment step, the first step, of a possible capital campaign and building program. If our vestry concludes that St. John's is ready to commit to capital campaign, I will be ready to lead that commitment and guide the parish through the building program. Once that has been concluded, I feel confident that I will be ready to embrace a new call into retirement.

My hope is that the months ahead will prove to be a time of growth toward the future both for me and for St. John's. As I look forward and prepare for what it is that God is calling me, I will be praying that as a parish we will do the same – being alert to the prompting of the Holy Spirit, ready to explore new ministry, and confident of the new vision of mission that Christ has in store for us at St. John's Church.

THE REV. JENNIFER E. LOOKER

"Graduate Sunday"

We will celebrate with our graduates on Sunday, May 4th at the 10:15 a.m. service.... and I'm feeling more than a little sentimental. Perhaps you are as well. In the past six years, our newest graduates have celebrated Rite 13, planned a pilgrimage, been confirmed in their faith and met faithfully as a group to talk about everything from exams to beliefs about God. They've journeyed together to England, supported one another during the ups and downs of life and shared the stress of college applications. They've cheered one another on, celebrated each other's happy moments and have served this church in a way that is real and lasting. Whether serving at the altar, in the nursery, in the kitchen, during VBS, or in an adult forum – these young adults have made a lasting impact on our life at St. John's. Molly Brenton, Julia Hasircoglu, Rachel Hreben, Joanie Kilhefner, have been an integral part of the life of this parish. The same is true of their leaders, Matt and Mary Woolson.

And so in the spirit of sentimentality, a few words of advice from an unlikely source: "You are what some have called "The Greatest Generation". Not many- but some- so far just me. And I'm counting on you to not make me look like an idiot for saying that. So be great- no pressure. Whatever your dream is right now, if you don't achieve it, you haven't failed, and you're not some loser. But just as importantly-and this is the part I may not get right and you may not listen to- if you do get your dream, you are not a winner. After I graduated I moved down to Chicago and did Improv. Now there are very few rules to improvisation, but one of the things I was taught early on is that you are not the most important person in the scence. Everybody else is. And if they are the most important people in the scene, you will naturally pay attention to them and serve them. But the good news is you're in the scene too. So hopefully to them you're the most important person, and they will serve you. No one is leading, you're all following the follower, serving the servant.

You cannot win improv. And life is an improvisation. You have no idea what's going to happen next and you are mostly just making things up as you go along. And like improv, you cannot win your life. In my experience, you will truly serve only what you love, because, as the prophet says service is love made visible. If you love friends, you will server your friends. If you love community, you will serve your community. If you love money, you will serve your money. And if you love only yourself, you will serve only yourself. And you will have only yourself. So no more winning. Instead, try to love others and serve others, and hopefully find those who love and serve you in return."

These words, said by Stephen Colbert (the person, not the character) during his commencement address at Northwestern University in 2011, give good simple advice: try to love others and serve them. You cannot win your life. But life can be pretty good. Sometimes surprising, occasionally overwhelming, but always a gift. So to our newest group of graduates: congratulations on a life well lived and the life that is yet to unfold. We will remember to send you packages filled with cookies; we just ask that you come back to visit from time to time (ok, maybe more than occasionally!). Know that you are always welcome here and that we will be praying for you, rooting for you and celebrating each life accomplishment as it comes. And if life doesn't unfold in all the ways you hope and expect, know that that is ok too, and that the church will always be there to support you when you need it. Congrats graduates!!!!

SENIOR WARDEN

Conference of Wardens and Vestry Members

On Saturday, April 12, Bob Murphy and I spent the day in a conference of Wardens and Vestry members from churches in the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania. The conference, held at St. Andrews Church in Lewisburg, was convened by Bishop Baxter as a time for conversation between himself and the attendees, and conversation among the attendees themselves. There were also informational times when Wardens and Vestry members were given a report about the search for a replacement for Bishop Baxter, and there was a session on how the annual parochial report could be used for church planning.

This session on the parochial report was a look at an actual study that had been conducted over a five-year period at one of the Diocesean parishes. Various categories in the report — attendance figures, baptisms, deaths, pledges, income, etc. — were plotted to show the five-year trends, and then the trends displayed by the several categories were correlated in an attempt to discern inter-relationships. The most striking effect that that study was reported to have was its impact upon the attitude of the congregation — it had been generally perceived by parish members, largely by anecdotal stories and discussions, that the church was in decline. The report — to the contrary — was able to document that parish life was quite stable and that commitment had grown stronger. The report also yielded a few suggestions about planning for future growth. The over-all outcome was seen in a change from gloom to quiet joy and renewed energy on the service of the parishioners.

The conversations among conference attendees were also interesting. They revealed, among other things, that most of the attendees came from congregations that were considerably smaller than St. John's. Several were currently without Rectors, and some of these were finding it difficult to find interim help. One parish had to share a Rector with other congregations. There was a bit of anxiety expressed about the best process for securing both temporary and/or permanent parish leadership — and one congregation had been without a Rector for over four years.

I came home from the convention with three clusters of ideas swimming around in my head. The first was that there are always new things to learn and try in our life as a church. Might a similar study of St. John's parochial reports be helpful to us? Perhaps, and that possibility will be explored. Secondly, St. John's is a blessed congregation! We, of course, have our problems and challenges — differing from those of other parishes as our size and circumstances also differ, but I had a wonderful feeling of appropriate pride as I had the opportunity to share what was going on in our church as part of the larger conference conversation. Things are generally good here! And third, faithful and energetic Episcopalians are found in churches of all types and sizes, and they are full of hope and determination as they move forward in difficult times.

It was great to be a part of that group!

VESTRY RESOLUTIONS

VESTRY MEETING: APRIL 21, 2014

1. Minerva Bowers Trust Usage

Whereas: The Vestry found it necessary to borrow \$75,000 from the Unrestricted Endowment Investment Account in 2010 and had pledged to restore the money as soon as practical.

Resolve: Upon the recommendation of the Finance Committee the Vestry directs the Treasurer to place the \$68,575 received from the adjudication of the Minerva G. Bowers trust into the Unrestricted Endowment Investment Account and reduces the outstanding "loan" from the Endowment Fund to \$6,425.

2. Funding of the Rector's Fund

Resolved: The Vestry authorizes the annual transfer of \$2000 from the Restricted Investment Account Rectors fund to the Rector's Discretionary Fund checking. A transfer of \$500 is to be made at the beginning of each calendar quarter.

3. Mary Lou Higgs Memorial "Student Assistance Fund"

Resolved that the vestry establishes as a Restricted Fund, the Student Assistance Fund with the following purpose and procedure:

The purpose of the Student Assistance Fund is to provide enhanced support for students who are homeless or at risk, especially those attending Robert Fulton Elementary School. Requests for financial assistance can be made by the Principal or school staff authorized by the Principal and must be submitted in writing through the Eagle's Nest coordinators for vestry approval.

4. Lay Pastoral Assistant

Resolved that the vestry endorses the engagement of Linda Bruce to provide lay pastoral assistance during the Rector's Sabbatical Leave from June 2 to September 2, 2014.

POPCORN THEOLOGY

"Inside Job"

Friday, May 9, 2014 - 7:00 p.m. - Parish Hall (Contact: Debbie Carter)

Inside Job provides a comprehensive analysis of the global financial crisis of 2008, which, at a cost over \$20 trillion, caused millions of people to lose their jobs and homes in the worst recession since the Great Depression, and nearly resulted in a global financial collapse. Through exhaustive research and extensive interviews with key financial insiders, politicians, journalists, and academics, the film traces the rise of a rogue industry that has corrupted politics, regulation, and academia. The film, narrated by Matt Damon, was made on location in the United States, Iceland, England, France, Singapore, and China.

TREASURER'S REPORT

We have finished our first fiscal quarter with a better than expected income level. I would like to thank those who were able to complete their 2013 pledges this past month. That extra "shot" of cash certainly helped us off to a good start. I also want to thank those who were able to catch up on their 2014 pledges. The combination of these two actions has allowed us to remain current with our Fair Share pledge to the Diocese, while handling all of our bills.

Careful expense management has become a standard operating procedure at St. John's. Being able to report that our Vestry and all of the various ministries are working hard to keep all of our expenditures within budget guidelines has become the norm rather than the exception. This is certainly an excellent habit to have as we prepare for a potential capital campaign. As promised last month, the status of our income and expenses through the end of the first quarter are provided below.

I can also report that our clean up of our account practices and accounts is moving forward. Our financial advisor and I will be meeting with the accountants to begin the review process of our books for 2009, 2010, and 2011. 2012 and 2013 fiscal years will be ready for final review within the next few weeks. With our finances in order, we will ready to approach both the Diocesan Standing Committee and local financial institutions regarding the necessary financing of our Courtyard/Welcoming Center project.

The Vestry, Finance Committee and I welcome your questions or concerns. Thank you everyone who support St. John's ministries through your giving and your involvement.

Posting should be updated after three weeks; and

JUBILEE MINISTRIES

Doing More With Less: A Fallacy

In the last few months, Jubilee has expanded the ministries in the church to:

- included Building Hope;
- started a new church garden;
- begun to refocus our Food Bank/Door Ministry efforts;
- made a donation to the Lighthouse Academy that is supported by the Rafiki Foundation.

The challenge to each of these is in replying to these needs without adding to the church's deficit. The Jubilee Ministries have been self supporting over the years primarily because of generous donations made by some individuals, grants from the Diocese and others, and your purchase of Grocery Cards on Sunday mornings. We urge you to continue and even increase your support of our ministries because the needs are not going away.

In addition to the above we will be working on some fun(d) raising efforts like the Shop for a Cause that took place after press time. These efforts will primarily be away from the church, and will be in compliance with the new fund raising policies.

So far this year, Building Hope received a \$500.00 grant from Operation Understanding. Eagles Nest received a \$350.00 which was less than previous years but it was the 12th consecutive year that we received a grant from Operation Understanding. This is a most unusual length of time to receive a grant from the same source and highlights our need to become more self supporting.

We ask your financial support of our Jubilee Ministries simply because we are meeting the needs of others. This is what makes us who we are. We cannot do more with less.

FULTON SCHOOL PARTNERSHIP

A new opportunity has come to support our neighborhood school during the early summer weeks. A Summer Leadership Academy is being held for selected 4th and 5th graders starting the day after school ends in June. Dear St. John's Family,

You may have wondered, "Who are these Power people that we're praying for?" So I am writing both to express appreciation for your prayers and to enlighten you a bit about the recipients.

Mary Power, my sister-in-law, was diagnosed with Stage IV breast cancer last summer. She has been undergoing hormone treatment (to "starve" the cancer), and she and my brother have radically changed their diet and activity level. Her most recent PET scan showed no visible cancer, and her oncologist told her to come back in 6 months – Alleluia! (Lent will be over by the time you read this.)

Robert and Joan Power are my parents; my dad has had Parkinson's Disease for about 20 years. Last fall, PD-related hallucinations compelled my normally-gentle father to react with dangerous behavior, and he was hospitalized for several weeks. Fortunately, my parents' retirement complex opened a new memory-care unit, and my father is now settled in and dealing much better with his mental state. (He and I are currently working on his memoirs, actually a series of short stories from his childhood and professional life.) His situation is far from ideal, but it's far better than when he was an hour away from Mom.

All three Powers are now graduating to the Wednesday healing service prayer list, but I wanted to thank you all for your faithful prayers for them during these past several months!

A CURE FOR AFFLUENZA

Then they began to beg Jesus to leave their neighborhood. Mark 5:17

Recently there has been a great controversy over the statue in front of St. Alban's Episcopal Church in Davidson, NC. Kate McIntyre, a church member who loved public art, left St. Alban's \$22,000 to be used for some piece of memorial art work. St. Alban's used the money to hire Timothy Schmalz, a Canadian artist, who designed a life-size bronze sculpture of a homeless Jesus Christ lying on a park bench. If not for the holes in the homeless man's feet, signifying the crucifixion, most people living in Davidson didn't realize it was Jesus Christ. They all thought it was just another homeless man.

The reaction to the sculpture by the people living in Davidson was mixed. Some loved it, however, the majority of the residents in this upper middle class neighborhood, didn't. A woman, who was driving by it in her car, called the police when she got home to complain about the homeless man who was sleeping in front of the church. Another resident asked why the money hadn't been put to another use. Most residents complained saying that the statue was a horrendous way to depict Jesus Christ.

The Rev. David Buck, St. Alban's rector, wasn't surprised by the negative reactions and neither am I. We, Americans, suffer from a disease called "affluenza", a term coined by psychologist G. Dick Miller. Affluenza is a disease that makes you believe that you are better than other people based solely on your financial situation. Luckily for us though, there is a cure for affluenza. I discovered its cure during this year's Lenten season. During this year's Lenten series, we spoke about St. John's Millennium Development Goal of ending hunger. I was able to learn about the problem of hunger in different parts of the world as well as right here in Lancaster City. The people who attend the weekly community breakfast and use our food bank are prime examples of it.

When you grow up in a capitalist country where poverty is viewed as a wholesome thanks to TV shows like "The Waltons", you tend to forget that waking up or going to sleep hungry aren't fun or wholesome. This is why we must be more assertive in our ways (individual and as a group) to try to find ways to end hunger. The ways to do it here at home are actually quite simple:

- 1) Donate food (especially fresh fruit and vegetables) to our food bank.
- 2) Volunteer at the Saturday morning community breakfast (see David or Sue Martin for more information).
- 3) Buy grocery cards.

And finally, invite people (friends, neighbors, and yes, strangers) to visit St. John's for a Sunday service. The simplicity of inviting a person here on a Sunday morning might encourage them to come back the following week. It's time to stop acting like the people of Gerasene and asking people to leave because of what they're doing, but rather, inviting them to stay in spite of what they're doing.
