CHRISTIAN LIFE LEARNING

Each of their contributions is vitally important. The personal care and attention that they give to each of our students is the formative element of their growing spirituality. The time they spend together in the classroom is their weekly witness of faith. It is through them that Christian discipleship is first taught and learned by our young members. Through the formal curriculum our students are introduced to the building blocks of living a Christian life, and it is through those classroom relationships that the meaning of a life in Christ is role modeled for our next generations. Those in our classrooms are more than instructors and educators. They are Christian life teachers.

And we are all Christian life learners. It begins with our experience of Baptism and Eucharist, our inclusion in God's family and our family meal. It continues in the Nursery in the feeling of safety and security. Our faithful understanding grows and changes as we develop and get bigger until as adults we take full responsibility for our faith formation through the stages of adult life: marriage, parenthood, empty nesting and retirement.

It is that later stage of retirement that will be the focus of my sabbatical reflection. For me, it is just the latest piece of Christian life learning which starts and continues with Christian life learners like you.

THE REV. JENNIFER E. LOOKER

Summer has arrived! And I couldn't be more delighted. I cherish all that summer brings: gardens in bloom, walks in twilight, waves crashing upon sand, the smell of barbecue, the taste of sweet corn..... the summer months bring a bounty of blessings. But this summer is particularly exciting for me. Fr. John is going on sabbatical, and I couldn't be more delighted. I'm delighted that he will enjoy a period of refreshment and spiritual renewal, and I'm delighted by the opportunity this provides us in his absence. It will be a formative time for me as your priest in charge, and it will be a formative time for our community as we minister together during Fr. John's absence and encourage new leadership and growth.

A few things I'm looking forward to this summer: first, a truly dynamic lineup of preachers. I will be supported by guest preachers twice a month, including: The Rev. Beth Mollard, The Rev. Paul Eyer, The Dr. Rev. John Emmert, The Rev. Megan Malick, and The Rev. Barbara Serras. Two of our preachers come from the United Church of Christ, The Rev. Paul Eyer and The Rev. Megan Malick. Both are dear friends and accomplished preachers. The other preachers are colleagues from our diocese; each with unique voices and perspectives to offer from the pulpit.

Secondly, and equally exciting, I will be supported in pastoral ministry by Linda Bruce, who in addition to bringing a wonderful set of pastoral gifts and qualifications, is one of the most genuine and down to earth people I've ever had the privilege of knowing. I feel profoundly blessed that Linda has agreed to serve in this capacity. She will be available for hospital visits twice a week, which allow me to minister in a way that feels less "crisis" response and more balanced in nature.

Thirdly, and not surprisingly, St. John's has a busy and engaging summer of ministry planned. We will celebrate the end of our Church School and J2A programs with an all parish picnic on Pentecost Sunday, June 8th. But just to be clear: this in no way signals the end of active ministry at St. John's. Diocesan Convention will be held at State College on June 13th and 14th and our delegates will be called upon to make important decisions. God willing we will elect Bishop Robert Gupert as our Assisting Bishop for the next sixteen months. We will elect members of the Standing Committee, Council of Trustees and the Disciplinary Board. We will elect representatives for next year's General Convention- during which our next presiding bishop will be elected. We will also vote on resolutions and approve (or not) the recommended budget.

July will be equally formative with the arrival of EYE (Episcopal Youth Event), a very special gathering that Emma DiPace and Amelia Dissinger are attending, organized in part by David Kilp during his internship with the Diocese of Pennsylvania. July will also feature Diocesan Youth Mission Week, "Beach Party" Vacation Bible School, and a very special Blueberry Festival featuring musical guests.

In addition to providing parish leadership, maintaining program ministry and liturgical and pastoral presence, my principal focus this summer will be threefold: organizing our record keeping for Safeguarding God's children training and clearance forms, planning a fall Adult Education offering on Same Gender Blessings and working with Paul to continue to build our music program by offering a concert series during the academic year and more evensong opportunities.

The summer months are a time for refreshment, but also growth. I'm excited by the many opportunities and possibilities the next few months will bring, and look forward to sharing in them with you.

Looking Forward to a New Vestry Year (Already!)

On November 9th, the Parish will gather for its Annual Meeting. One of the items of special importance will be the election of new members to the Vestry, replacing those whose terms of service end on December 31st of this year. This *Messenger* article fulfills the obligation stated in our By Laws to announce to the Parish the process that will be followed in this election.

Throughout the summer, the Nominating Committee will be meeting to initiate this election process. We will lay out our schedule for the year and begin conversations with individuals regarding their interest in serving on the Vestry. Any member of St. John's can nominate another member as a candidate for Vestry, and any member that wishes to be considered for Vestry service is encouraged to make this known to a Nominating Committee member (cf. below). Each candidate must submit a signed statement that they are willing to stand for election. All nominations, whether made by the Nominating Committee or by another Parish member, must be given, together with the nominee's statement of their agreement to stand for election, to the Secretary of the Vestry on or before the regular October Vestry meeting (October 20, 2014). The nominating process ends on that date.

Written notice of the slate of candidates will be sent to every member of St. John's Church immediately after the close of the nominating process. The names on the ballot will be read from the Chancel at all services on the two Sundays immediately preceding the Annual Meeting. It is also the custom at St. John's to post pictures and brief biographic statements of each candidate in the Parish Hall during this time. The election of candidates to the Vestry will be made official by vote of members present at the fall Annual Meeting in November.

We encourage all members of St. John's to keep this process in their thoughts and prayers, and to participate in it according to the above procedure and as prompted by God's Spirit. We are in the initial stages of a significant period in St. John's Parish life, with more than the usual problems and challenges, but also affording remarkable possibilities for ministry, outreach and evangelism in Lancaster. This is a time when we all should consider carefully those whom we would like to have as our Vestry leaders, and whether God might be opening to us — to you — a new opportunity for service.

VESTRY RESOLUTIONS

VESTRY MEETING: MAY 19, 2014

1. Assistant Treasurer – Resolved, that the Vestry authorizes the creation of the position of Assistant Treasurer with duties including but limited to the following.
 1. Serve on the Finance Committee which is responsible for the budget preparation and investment oversight.
 2. Ensure that the church's fiscal policies are in accordance with national and Diocesan canons, the church's By-Laws, and state and federal laws.
 3. Ensure that the church's fiscal policies are reviewed and that they are adhered to.
 4. Assume the duties of the Treasurer whenever the Treasurer is incapacitated or unavailable.
 5. Act as an authorized signer for Parish accounts.
 6. Communicate semi-annually with the Investment Advisor and prepare the quarterly investment reports for Vestry.
2. Wardens – Resolved, that having reviewed the amended Position Description for Junior Warden and Senior Warden, the Vestry of St. John's approves the descriptions of these ministry positions.
3. Feasibility Committee - Resolved, that the St. John's Vestry establishes a Feasibility Committee to assess the fundraising capacity of the parish for a capital campaign, to interview if deemed appropriate outside consultants to recommend to the vestry, and to report to the vestry their findings; and be it further resolved, that the vestry appoints the following members of the parish to serve on the committee: Steve Latshaw, Rosemary Strickler, Ted Loose, Debbie Carter, Fr. Morris (Ex Officio).
4. Storm Water Management – Whereas, St. John's has done due diligence in thoroughly researching through RGS Associates our storm water management options, and determined option #3 to be the best with a projected cost of \$65,500; and whereas if approved by the City of Lancaster the projected cost of option #3 to St. John is \$6,500; be it resolved, that the Vestry of St. John's Church adopts option #3 as our storm water management plan, directs RGS and MM Architects to incorporate option #3 into the building plan; and authorizes the Executive Committee to contact the Office of the Mayor to secure sufficient assurances to move forward.
5. Student Assistance Fund – Resolved that the Vestry authorizing the expensing up to \$600 from the Student Assistance Fund held in the Reserved Accounts for the purpose of providing lunches for twenty two select 4th and 5th graders from Fulton Elementary School who will be attending the summer Literacy and Leadership Academy at Covenant United Methodist Church, June 11 through July 3, 2014.
6. Sewer Line Repair – Resolved, that the Vestry approve the expenditure of up to \$10,000 to:
 1. Repair the damaged sewer line adjacent to the Mulberry Street parking lot; and
 2. Restore the brick sidewalk paving at the excavation site.

VESTRY RESOLUTIONS (CONTINUED)

We have received a bid of \$8,500 from J & J Heating and Cooling, for the excavation, repair, and replacement of soil in the excavation area, which Bill Gross, property manager, has encouraged us to accept. It is anticipated that the cost of repairing the brick sidewalk will not exceed \$1,500. This expenditure will be attributed to the budget line item Repair and Maintenance Expense, account # 01-5140. The funding of this project will be facilitated via the Restricted Funds R-3 Account.

7. Computer Replacement – Because the church office’s operating system requires an upgrade, resolved that the Vestry authorize the expenditure of \$2,343.97 to cover the purchase of three desktop computers, software and a new server as well as the installation work performed by Emulous Communications, which provides telephone services to St. John’s and has been vetted by Bill Gross for IT Services. This expenditure will be attributed to the budget line item #01-5108-Computer Systems Expense.
8. Painting – Resolved, that the Vestry of St. John’s Episcopal Church approve the following maintenance expenditures to be completed by Brent Kaufman Painting, during the month of June, 2014:
 1. Exterior painting of the Concord Street properties, not to exceed \$4000.00. This expense will be charged to budget line item #06-5152.
 2. Sacristy painting not to exceed \$2500.00. This expense will be charged to budget line item #01-5138.

PASTORAL CARE

TREASURER'S REPORT

In spite of having an excellent Easter attendance, our contributions for the month fell short of expectations. This income shortfall has continued the cash management challenge. Unfortunately, we were required to take our 2nd quarter draw from the investment earnings early in May rather than in June as planned. This will result in a difficult summer from the cash flow perspective. I ask everyone to please keep in mind that while your family is taking a well deserved vacation, the bills of the church must still be paid.

Expenses continue to be managed very well. All of the ministry areas are within normal tolerance of their budget. As you will see in the Vestry action for May, there are a number of large expenses coming up that must be addressed. The sewer line repair will be paid out of the Restricted "R3" account, but the replacement of our "XP" operating system computers and the painting of the Sacristy must come out of the operating fund. This will place an additional challenge on our budget and cash flow. Below are the income and expense numbers for April:

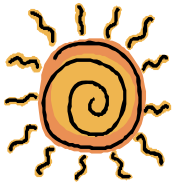

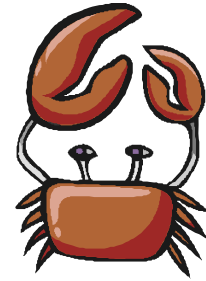

The Millennium Development Goals Eight Goals for 2015

1. **Eradicate extreme poverty and hunger**
2. **Achieve universal primary education**
3. **Promote gender equality and empower women**
4. **Reduce child mortality**
5. **Improve maternal health**
6. **Combat HIV/AIDS, malaria and other diseases**
7. **Ensure environmental sustainability**
8. **Develop a global partnership for development**



It started with a United Nations resolution in the year 2000. It was endorsed by the Episcopal Church in 2003. St. John's Parish began working in 2006, on ways to contribute and help reach the goals.

“The Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) were established in 2000 to reduce the number of people who live in extreme poverty by 2015. These eight goals were developed by the international community, including leaders from 191 countries. They have also been endorsed by development institutions and religious bodies worldwide.”—ER&D website.

Well, here we are halfway into 2014 and what has been accomplished you may ask? If you go to the United Nations website <http://www.undp.org> under the MDGs you can click on each of the goals listed and see the 2013 report. There also several progress reports broken down by regions and countries. There are successes and there are shortfalls which vary between the countries and each of the goals.

There is also a plan for what comes after 2015, launched by the United Nations Development Program. Three of the goals, involving poverty, slums and water are stated to have their goals met ahead of the 2015 deadline but, there is much more work to be done. “On 30 May 2013, the High Level Panel released its report, “A New Global Partnership: Eradicate Poverty and Transform Economies through Sustainable Development,” which sets out a universal agenda to eradicate extreme poverty from the face of the earth by 2030, and deliver on the promise of sustainable development.”— www.undp.org, Post-2015 Development Agenda. There also was a report presented by the UN Secretary-General on the MDGs and the post 2015 agenda in September 2013 “A life of dignity for all: accelerating progress towards the Millennium Development Goals and advancing the United Nations development agenda beyond 2015”.

MILLENNIUM DEVELOPMENT GOALS

The conversations and building on the MDGs will continue. The Episcopal Church continues to be involved in the evolving post-MDG development agenda and has (or will be this Spring) be formally adopted as a member of the Economic and Social Council of the UN (<http://www.episcopalchurch.org/notice/presiding-bishop-executive-council-opening-remarks>)

St. John's MDG committee spent the 2013-2014 program year addressing primarily, Goal #2: "Achieve universal primary education" but, keeping all the prior year's goals close to heart. The committee has sought to inspire and educate the members of St. John's regarding the MDGs and the many organizations there are to support so as to help reach the goals. St. John's has raised money for, as well as individuals who made direct donations, to fund the building of wells, to buy solar cookers, to buy farm animals, to help solve agricultural problems, to buy bicycles, to buy school supplies and pay teachers and tuition. We have recycled and conserved as well as, collected and donated a whole lot of shoes.

I have only been part of the MDG committee for the past three years and honestly before joining this committee, I had not a clue what an MDG was. I definitely have been inspired and educated and along the way acquired a broadened sense of community and a new found meaning for "the Kingdom of God". The conversations and the work are ongoing and, "I am.....One World" will not be filed away but, what's next is the logical question. What other opportunities are there to make an impact? And, we are all making an impact little by little; one can of food, one pair of shoes, one book, one teacher and one well at a time. It is about personal commitments (large and small) but it is also about building partnerships locally and abroad. We know the goals and each of us knows our own answer to "I am.....One World" and what we can do to help make our world a better place for all people.

What we do next, what shape the MDG committee takes and what partnerships we build, as we approach 2015 are the questions the committee members ponder this summer. We will continue to share MDG challenges and we will share information as we find opportunities in the upcoming months such as, the "Pedal harder ride" on Saturday 9/6/14. This annual Bike ride is done in memory of Glen Lapp and the medical team who died in Afghanistan in 2010.

As always, the MDG committee welcomes all who would like to join us. We will not be meeting in the months of June or July. We will resume our meetings on the 1st Thursday of each month, on 8/7/14 at 7pm.

FAMILY REUNIONS

*And he said to them, "What are you discussing with each other while you walk along?"

Last month, I attended the celebration of the ministries of the Rt. Rev. Nathan Bishop (Bishop of Central PA.) and his wife, Mary Ellen Baxter, in Harrisburg with Carolyn Maxey. It's been a few years since I've been to Harrisburg; I must admit looking at the Susquehanna River brings back wonderful memories of home. One of the joys of attending this celebration was seeing some of the people I met at the THRIVE meeting in Altoona earlier this year. My favorite part was the sermon given by the Rt. Rev. Although I haven't seen some of my former classmates in 30th years, thanks to Facebook, (yes, Facebook), it seems like some of us are still walking down hallways of Ramapo Senior High School, trying to get to class on time. It brings to mind the meaning of family lines and friendship lines. Some of us are closer to friends than family members; sometimes it's due to childhood events we had no control over, other times it's simply due to distance.

As we know, some of Jesus's apostles were brothers, related by the same father; others weren't. However, from Jesus's teachings on helping other people, even those different from them, those men learned that family extends beyond a blood relationship. A family is a group of people who are related in love, in friendship and by similar interests. A family member is a person you can turn to in a time of joy and in a time of sorrow. Our family isn't simply where we were born or what we were born into; our family is also the people we welcome into our lives. 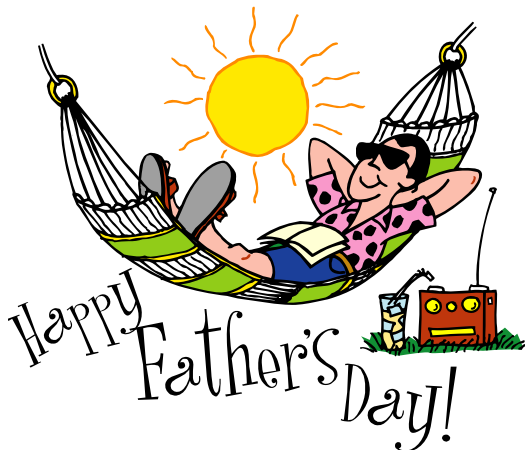
