


A Note from Maine!

The temperature ranges from the 50's to the 70's. Each morning begins and every evening ends with crackling fire. At night, we're lulled to sleep by the soft sounds of surf washing over the rocky shore, a short walk from our front porch.





This is St. Cuthbert's Chapel which is very charming. The steeple bell is rung exactly 10 minutes before the service and precisely at 9:30 a.m. to begin the service. Music is provided by a reed organ—a big harmonica—but my first Sunday, the organist's boat was sunk by hurricane Arthur, so we sang acapella!

SENIOR WARDEN

August: Time to Gear Up!

August is here again! If you could sniff around St. Johns, you would find a number of ways in which people have been very busy preparing for the start-up of our fall season. You would also find others whose work hasn't changed much from the rest of the year. Here's a quick review of a few of each:

Music: Choir and Bell Ringer directors have been reviewing selections and putting together their schedules for rehearsals and for special as well as regular performances. At the same time, we have enjoyed special summer music.

Education: In addition to the usual summer preparation for the start-up of Sunday classes in youth education, there are some innovations in the works that will give a slight tweek to our whole educational schedule, and will especially affect adult ed. Watch for them!

Food Shelf: This ministry has not slowed down at all through the summer ô hunger takes no "vacation." And we have had special efforts from many parishioners to strengthen food gifts through our parish garden. And the fall will bring some changes in the way this service to our community will be organized and strengthened.

Building maintenance: The sacristy has been given a new face-lift, as has some of the rental property rooms. Work continues on sidewalk and parking area renovations. And regular maintenance has had no summer off!

Office: More-or-less full steam ahead all summer long! Hats off for faithful and tireless work.

Finance: Unfortunately, bills keep arriving that need to be paid even though giving falls off during the summer. This calls for judgment and juggling on the part of our financial staff. August carries a quiet, implicit hope that things will soon turn around as the parish returns to its regular (non-summer) habits. As summer draws to an end, more than a few givers realize that they need to play catch-up in their stewardship commitments. Twould be great to begin September with healthy financials. Can you help us out?

Worship: Amidst all the variables and unpredictables of the summer, worship at St. Johns remains rock solid. The weekly service of our Lay Ministers, ushers and pastoral staff (the more so with the absence of Fr. John) is something that we tend to take for granted at St. Johns even in summer ô until, sometimes, we miss the rejuvenating experience of liturgy and eucharist while on vacation. Supremely, God took no vacation during the summer, and God will lead us into our fall season through the Holy Spirit. Up, up, and away ô there are great things ahead!

TREASURER'S REPORT

As is so often the case, I have good news and not so good news to share with you. The good news you may have already seen in the bulletin earlier in the month of July. Our pledged and total income continues to be ahead of plan. The not so good news, our non-pledged income is lagging compared to both the target budget and last year. Other good news is the expense control being exercised by your Vestry and various ministries leadership is keeping our expenses well within tolerance of our budget target levels. The not so good news, expenses continue to be greater than our income.

The Finance Committee dedicated most of its monthly meeting addressing the cash flow issue. Our priorities have been and continue to be, 1) payroll, 2) operational expenses, and 3) our Diocesan Fair Share. All invoices are paid just prior to incurring a late fee penalty. The Diocesan Fair Share has been taking the biggest hit and is currently 3 months behind. We are also investigating paying some of our quarterly bills and the monthly or installment basis.

How can you help? There are about 20 weeks left in the year. If each household could give just \$5 a week we would realize approximately \$14,000 from our pledging families and at least \$2,500 from our non-pledging units. Will this balance our budgetí obviously not. It will, however provide us with additional cash to meet our continuing obligations.

Here are the numbers for the end of June, which is also the end of our fiscal 2^{nd} quarter:

I would also like to tell everyone of a very special gift that St. Johnøs received. In August 1986, Minerva Bowers entered Life Eternal. In her will she did two (2) things. First, she established a Trust for the care of a very close friend. The second is that she made St. Johnøs one of the beneficiaries of that Trust upon the death of her close friend. The friend recently also passed and St. Johnøs has received \$68,575 as its share of the residual of that Trust. We cannot thank Minervaøs family, but we certainly remember her in our prayers for the blessing and example that she has given us.

Finally, just a reminder of an opportunity that is available in the form of the Assistant Treasurer position. If you are interested in more information regarding the position, please contact me.

Just put your plastic grocery bags in the wicker hamper near the font. Thanks again, and keep up the good work!

A BIG thanks to all of you who bring in fresh, canned or dried foods and fresh eggs for our food pantry at St. John's. You cannot imagine the delight of the people who are receiving the food from our garden. Fresh fruits and vegetables, as you all know, are very expensive and are not easily purchased by our clients. They are very interested in what we have to give them and how to prepare it. On July 19 we had the added pleasure of being able to give out fresh food from our food-bank garden to the people who come to eat breakfast at the First Reformed church on the third Saturday of each month. We had carrots, red-skin potatoes, zucchini, cucumbers, green beans, kale, Swiss chard, garlic and onions ALL from our food-bank garden. The garden is located at the home of Doug Brown and Angela Cuthbert in Quarryville. So an added thanks to Doug, Angela and all the workers who help in the garden. We can always use more help. The start and finish are located at the Lancaster Church of the Brethren, 1601 Sunset Ave, and Lancaster PA 1760. The registration deadline is 8/29/14.

PROPERTY CORNER

The Property Committee did not meet in July, due to vacations; however, we are in full swing with the painting of our rental properties (exterior) and the Sacristy. Some prep work was necessary, like the replacement of some shutters, entrance post tops and a cellar door.

We are bringing a new cleaning company (Jan-Pro) on-board for the Parish Hall and Church. I am slowly getting them up to speed.

The new computers have been brought on-line and are functional for the most part. We are still addressing some issues with Patti Meansøe-mail and will be touching base with Drew Dorgan.

The WiFi appears to be up and running after a system-wide revamping by Emulous. So far, so good in this regard but, Iøm keeping my fingers and toes crossed.

BrentMore Construction was in to repair roof leaks in the breezeway tower, which appears to be working after their second attempt.

Important troubleshooting the erosion in the parking lot, responsible for the sidewalk sinking. I met with the McSherrys (civil engineers), who confirmed that the parking lot and adjacent areas are sinking. They recommend the coating/sealing of the parking lot after the holes are filled/sealed. After this is completed, I will be giving the go-ahead to the sidewalk pavers to restore the sidewalk so that it drains toward the curb away from the parking lot. The parking lot work is temporary in anticipation of digging up this area for the stormwater system.

The Property Committee will be meeting again Monday, August 4th.

The Fireworks of Neutrality

But wanting to justify himself, he asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" Luke 10: 29

Recently I was up late one night listening to the radio when I heard one of my favorite Elton Johnøs songs, õTiny Dancerö. After hearing this one line, õJesus freaks out in the streets handing tickets out for Godö, I suddenly remembered the Fourth of July. This year, Independence Day fell on the first Friday in July, and as we all know, First Fridays are a big thing here in Lancaster City. Since I had the evening free, I decided to take a walk into Penn Square before going to see the fireworks at Clipper Stadium.

Well, I didnøt have to go to Clipper Stadium to see any fireworks; they were already going off when I got to Penn Square. There were two groups of people, ages early to mid-20s, each stating their side of the cause. Interestingly, both groups were Christians; however, each had a very different interpretation of the Bible. One group was very conservative; they were reading Bible passages, primarily from Pauløs letter to the Romans, regarding homosexuality. The other group was members of the GLBT community; they were holding up signs in protest to what the conservative Christians were saying. I spoke to both groups. After listening to each side, I did end up supporting one group over the other. In fact, I ran into Bob and Anne Gepert and their friends, Karlah and Wendell Gibbs, and pointed to the signs I had written for one group.

The reason I mention this is because Iøm trying to work my neutrality button. By neutrality button, I mean that Iøm trying to listen to both sides equally, before choosing a side to support. In the matter at Penn Square, the decision was an easy one to make. However, regarding the current war between Israelis and Palestinians finding neutrality hasnøt been as easy to do. Iøve been reading news articles from different sources to hear both sides of this decades old conflict. A lot of my childhood friends are secular Jews so their support of Israel was automatic, and for me to tell them that Iøm also looking at this from the Palestinians point of view has been seen as a betrayal by a few of them. I donøt want my friends to think that Iøm betraying them or that I donøt support Israel; what Iød like them to see is why Iøm remaining neutral on this issue. And on this particular issue, I think both sides are equally right and equally wrong. I pray there will be a non-violent reconciliation of differences.

There is no law that says because you belong to a particular group, you must support everything the group does. But the only way this will happen is if we learn to take off our group labels before taking sides. As Jesus explained in his parable of the Good Samaritan, people arenot always what they seem to be. We need to remember that the person we least expect to be our neighbor will most likely end up being our best friend.
