BLESSING OF SAME SEX UNIONS

Our Sunday Adult Formation and Education (AFED) program begins on September 28th with a new format and focus. We will meet in the church from 9:15 to 10:00 AM. However, we will be meeting only one time a month. And we will be addressing topics of contemporary Christian ethical and social concern.

The Blessing of Same Sex Unions will be the first of the subjects to be considered. I have selected this issue because of its immediacy in our rapidly changing society and because of its centrality in the sacramental life of our church. Now that same sex marriage has been made legal in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania it is time for us in the Episcopal Church to discuss how this change will affect our life as a Christian community. Under what circumstances will the blessing of the union same sex couples be allowed? Are there guidelines that need to be followed? Do individual congregations have a voice in the decision making process?

As important as these questions are, I believe of even greater importance is what the churchøs teaching about the blessing of same sex unions has to tell us about our understanding of Christian marriage. If marriage is no longer only between people of different gender, how has our understanding of the sacrament of marriage changed? If our theology of marriage is no longer tied exclusively to scriptural passages about the joining of man and woman as husband and wife, how does that cast our expectations of heterosexual relationships in a new light?

In the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania we have clear guidelines to direct us. Our guidelines are in conformity with the resolution approved by the 77th General Convention of the Episcopal Church. Among their points:

Permission for the blessing must be requested of and given by the diocesan Bishop.

The request must be preceded by consultation between the clergy and vestry of the parish with the vestry voicing an affirmative consensus.

Only the rite approved General Convention may be used.

All couples must participate in appropriate counseling and spiritual guidance.

At least one of the couple must be a baptized Christian.

The liturgy is formally titled, *The Witnessing and Blessing of a Lifelong Commitment*. It begins with the Liturgy of the Word in much the same way as a wedding or Sunday service. Prayers and lessons are offered by the gathered community to support the couple in a relationship of mutual fidelity and steadfast love. In the exchange of Vows each is asked, õDo you freely and unreservedly offer yourself?ö and õWill you live together in faithfulness and holiness of life as long as you both shall live?ö In the Commitment, the couple pledge they will support and care for each other, enduring all things and forsaking all others as long as they both shall live. Rings are blessed and exchanged before the Pronouncement that the couple have bound themselves to one another in a holy covenant. The liturgy concludes with the Blessing of Godøs grace and love, and the sharing of the Peace.

THE REV. JOHN W. MORRIS (CONTINUED)

While this liturgy follows the outline of *The Celebration and Blessing of a Marriage*, it also challenges many deeply held and popularly based notions about marriage. Many in our society view marriage as individual civil right. Not so in the church. For the church, marriage is understood as a vocation, a particular way of holy living that requires the consent of the community in which we live. Most people think of marriage as a contract between two people, like a limited partnership that can be legally established or dissolved. Not so in the church. We believe marriage to be a covenant with the intention of being permanent as it is founded on the absolute, irrevocable love of God. Generally our culture equates being married with having children. While the church firmly acknowledges the importance of nurturing children, raising children is but one way for marriage to achieve its larger purpose of serving and securing the well being of the society in which we live.

These are some of the areas I hope to explore on Sunday, September 28th. I believe there is much here from which all of us can learn, whether we are of same or are of different gender relationship. As we develop a more understanding appreciation for others we can also grow more deeply in the grace that God holds for each of us and the calling God has for all of us in the ministry we share in Jesus Christ.

"Fourth Sunday Adult Forum"

St. John's is planning a new approach to adult formation this year: fourth Sunday adult forums. On the fourth Sunday of every month (with the exception of December and May) a special speaker and topic will be offered in the church from 9:15- 10:00 a.m. On the fourth Sunday of each month we will pause from the regular work of our ministry: our choirs won't rehearse between services, teachers won't offer church school lessons and our teens won't meet in individual groups. Instead, all members of St. John's will be encouraged to participate in age-specific formation.

Adults will be invited to gather in the church for facilitated conversation on a wide range of topics and children will be invited to gather in the auditorium to rehearse the Christmas pageant (which will still be held in the church), learn an anthem and create a special Earth Day pageant for the spring. Adult formation will continue to happen on the other Sundays in the Becker House, with the possibility of extending conversation from Fourth Sunday offerings. Our teens have been invited to join us for the adult formation conversation, with the exception of our Rite 13 teens, who will experience similar presentations each month but in language more accessible to emerging teens. Fourth Sundays at St. John's will provide a new and creative way to engage in theological conversation with one another. I hope you will come!

Popcorn Theology Begins: Friday, September 19th at 7:00 p.m. in Parish Hall

"Wish Me Away" (2011) - After a lifetime of hiding, Chely Wright becomes the first commercial country music singer to come out as gay, shattering cultural stereotypes within Nashville, her conservative heartland family and, most importantly, within herself. Wright gave the director unprecedented access over a two-year period, including her private video diaries, and the film layers her rise to fame (while hiding in the late 90's) with the execution of her coming-out plan, culminating in the exciting moment when she steps into the media glare to reveal she is gay. It shows both the devastation of internalized homophobia and the transformational power of living an authentic life. It also documents the conflicting responses from Nashville, the heartland and the LGBT community as Wright prepares for an unknown professional future.

A New Year

Where did the summer go? With Fr. John away on Sabbatical, a few things have been a bit different, but all in all, we've made it through these three months with no disasters. I'd like to call special attention to the fresh looks of a repainted sacristy and a repaired sidewalk on Mulberry Street $\hat{0}$ have a look if you haven't already $\hat{0}$ and to thank Bill Gross and the Property Committee for seeing these projects through to their conclusion.

A brief word about the year ahead in anticipation. The Feasibility Committee is in conversation with several groups to secure assistance in plotting an optimum course in connection with the "courtyard project" ô which now has become a substantial plan for improved accessibility and gathering space for our campus. We expect a report very soon in the new church year, and this will be a major step forward in this building venture.

You can also expect a few minor changes in the way some things are done. The Nominating Committee (which secures candidates for Vestry and Convention Delegates) is moving toward a slightly new mode of operation. In the past, the Nom Com has worked quite hard during the summer to identify Vestry candidates for the next year, but it has been their experience that folk are hard to contact at this time of year, and we all have a tendency to have our minds on our summer activities during summer months, resisting the task of giving thought to other matters. Because of this, the Committee will try to get this process underway earlier. So, expect to hear conversations about service on Vestry next spring before the distractions of summer begin to set in. Perhaps you can begin now to review various options that are available to you for service at St. John's.

One additional note: this Vestry article in the Messenger has usually been written by the Warden. While this practice will continue to some extent, we also will be encouraging other Stewards to share information about their Vestry ministries. Look forward to some variety and refreshing change in this way.

So, we're gearing up to go in this new fall season and we hope these and other innovations will help us find our way through the next year.

TREASURER'S REPORT

The news that I had to share with Vestry during the August meeting was not particularly good. The summer doldrums hit us hard during the month of July and as of that meeting appeared to be spilling over into August as well. As you can see below, the pledged contributions for the month of July were only \$21,053 and the non-pledged contributions were only \$2,762. To give you a feel for the difficulties this created, our payroll for the month of July was approximately \$20,200 and our utility bills were \$3,180. As you can see, this didn¢t leave us much to pay for all the other bills. In fact, we have now fallen 3 months behind on our commitment to the Diocese.

In order to pay some necessary bills, the Finance Committee has authorized taking our 4th quarter draw from the Endowment Investment Account earnings immediately. This coupled with the procedure of paying invoices just prior to incurring late fee penalties is hoped to be able to sustain us through the remainder of the summer and into the fall.

PARISH DIRECTORY

It is that time of year again when we ask you to visit the Parish Hall and review your personal information for our upcoming Stewardship mailing and Parish Directory.

It is <u>very</u> important that you review your *name, address, telephone number(s), e-mail address, and birth dates,* and make any necessary revisions. <u>This information will be posted from September 14 to</u> <u>October 19</u>.

Copies of the new Parish Directory will be available in the Parish Hall on Sunday, November 9 at the annual Parish Meeting.

Thank you for taking the time to provide us with accurate information for our church database, it is greatly appreciated.

The following resolutions were passed at the Vestry meeting on August 18, 2014.

- 1. Resolve that the St. Johnøs Vestry ratify the action of the Executive Committee in authorizing the Property Committee to complete the repair of the sidewalk on North Mulberry Street at a total anticipated cost of \$13,400 (\$10,500 of this has already been approved under a previous resolution). This project will be paid from the R3 Account.
- 2. <u>Employee Healthcare Benefits</u> ó Upon the advice of the Personnel Committee, the Vestry affirms the effort to contain health insurance costs for the parish while providing necessary healthcare coverage to its employees. The Vestry approves the following healthcare benefit offerings for all employees as approved by resolution in the 2013 Diocesan Convention which also complies with the mandate of 2012 General Convention. The plans to be offered to all employees are the Empire PPO 80/60 and Empire High Opt PPO. The Empire PPO 80/60 plan will be the standard offering with the cost being fully covered by the parish. Should an employee wish to maintain their current enrollment in the Empire High Opt PPO, they will be required to contribute the difference in the premium expense. The dental plan remains unchanged and the cost fully covered by the parish.

EPISCOPAL CHURCH WOMEN

There are two (2) fall dates for special events which join all women from the Diocese. Keep these dates on your calendar and please ask questions about how you can participate.

The Cape May, New Jersey Retreat is September 26ô 28. The theme is õHealing Watersö (what better place to be?). Registration forms are on the Parish Hall bulletin board. Your \$25 registration fee will be paid by St. Johnøs and the <u>deadline for registration is September 12</u>.

The Annual ECW Gathering, õCelebrating the Women of the Episcopal Churchö, is November 1st at Trinity Church, Jersey Shore, PA. Please join me while we celebrate our own Honored Woman.


MARTHA'S MINISTRY (Contact: Jeannie Zeller)

PROPERTY CORNER

With the advent of Sunday School and J_2A programs, much time and effort is being placed into these areas of our church campus. Walls and ceilings are being repaired and refinished.

Considerable effort has been expended bringing the new janitorial service on board. It appeared as though they were going to be performing the same level of cleaning as the previous company, as their phased-in approach was not resulting in improvements with our cleanliness. Their operations manager was out to review concerns with the restroom and choir room floors. These areas were cleaned, with the intent that all that would be required is a maintenance level of mopping in order to keep them clean. This situation will continue to be monitored.

The painting of the sacristy and rental properties was completed. Thanks goes to Janice Henry for her assistance in choosing colors for the Sacristy and the Altar Guild for cleaning the Sacristy out for painting. In addition to the preparation needed for the rental properties, much time was spent by our staff, appeasing our neighbors about the painting. Apparently, it was thought that aluminum capping was being used to cover our wooden surfaces.

Considerable time has also been spent on the parking lot and our sewer lateral undermining. After finding no break in our line, we have attributed the erosion to the test boring holes in the parking lot. While not wanting to fix the sidewalk for fear that it may sink again, RGS and ARM were asked for their input. RGS deferred to ARM, who administered the borings. And, after several attempts to meet with ARM, our friends, the McSherrys (of boiler room fame) were contacted to offer their thoughts on our situation. They suggested having the parking lot sealed and the surfaces around the church sloped away from the foundation, particularly around the compressors. While planning to do this work, it became readily apparent that we lack the equipment and product to use. Cold patch was used to plug/cap the boreholes and the area around the parking lot drain. And, we are trying to get a quote for filling the cracks with either hot tar or a 3405 polymer. While somewhat of a seasonal operation, a contractor came recently with hopes of providing a quote for the monthly meeting. While this project has been a work-in-progress pre-Easter, we should have the sealing performed ASAP to prevent any further damage of our parking lot, sewer pipe and underground electrical service. The sidewalk, with its liability exposure was an even higher priority, being completed in August.

Although not property related, much time has been spent on the WiFi and the computer upgrade and its affects on our e-mail. As of now, everything seems to be working well. However, this success was costly, going through several vendors and replacement of most of our equipment. We currently have a good working relationship with Emulous, who has remote access to our system for ease with making adjustments, repairs, etc.

We are updating our telephone list for Select Security. This list shall consist of the names and phone numbers of individuals to be notified in the event of an alarm going off in the church. These individuals are used to meet with the fire company and secure our facilities, including the alarm system when given permission by the fire department. While the church office and Property Manager are on the list, it is beneficial to have upwards of ten individuals on the list for times when people are out of the area and/or cannot respond. These people will be given keys so that the premises may be secured after access is given to the fire department.

Mark your calendars for our **Fall Clean-up on December 13th**. We will be starting at 9 a.m., meeting in the Parish House. A light breakfast is scheduled beforehand with our youth, who will be concluding a night watch from the evening before our cleanup. Come and share in our ministry of preparing our property for the celebration of Christøs birth. We hope you can make it and make a difference!

TO REACH THE CLOUDS

"How wonderful are the feet of those who bring good news!" Romans 10:15

While most of us are still in shock over Robin Williamsøs death, Iød like to tell a joyful story. In 2008, filmmakers, James Marsh (director) and Simon Chinn (producer) made an Oscar winning documentary called õMan on Wire.ö Man on Wire retells the story of Philippe Petit, a Frenchman, who in 1974 at the age of 24, walked between the Twin Towers on a high wire. Itøs hard to find the proper adjective to describe what he did because so many come to mind: remarkable, astonishing, and spell-binding are just a few. The story began six years earlier.

In 1968, while sitting in his dentist office in Paris, Petit read a newspaper article about the soon-to-be built World Trade Center (WTC) in New York City. The article explained how these buildings were going to widen the international business world and strengthen the business world of Wall Street. However, Petit wasn¢t interested in the business of the WTC; he was only interested in the height of these two new buildings. And then he started to plan the unthinkable: walking between them on a high wire. To train for this epic event, in 1973, Petit went to Sydney, Australia and walked over the Sydney Harbour Bridge. In January 1974, Petit, along with a few friends, came to the US, to see the WTC for the first time. After spending a month in NYC, his friends told him, õLook Phillippe, this isn¢t going to be possibleö, but one friend, Jean-Louis Blondeau encouraged him to stick with the õcoupö, as they called it. So for the next eight months, Petit and his friends traveled between Paris and NYC working on ways to make it happen. On a windy morning, in August 1974, Phillippe Petit walked between the Twin Towers for 45 minutes. Well, he did more than õwalkö; as Sgt. Charles Daniels of the NY Port Authority police said, õHe wasn¢t a tight rope walker; he was a dancer. I was spell bound by the watching of ití it was a once in a lifetime event.ö

It is a good thing to remember that even during tragedy, there is good news. And the good news is often laughter. Laughter in no way takes away the sorrow, but it does help to soothe it. While I was saddened by the news of Robin Williams is death, I started to remember watching him as Mork and saying õNanu, nanuö and I laughed. I remembered watching õGood Morning, Vietnamö and his performance as Adrian Cronauer, the military radio announcer who used humor during a time of war. And after watching õMan on Wireö, I started to picture the beauty of the Twin Towers again. I remembered that in 2000, I was standing on the 100th floor for a reception and looking out the windows; the view of Brooklyn was astonishing from that height.

As Robin Williams said, õComedy is acting out optimism,ö so letøs all try and be optimistic this month. Letøs all try and act in ways so we can bring laughter and joy into someoneøs life.
