#### **APPRECIATIVE INQUIRY**

Tell me a story about the high point experience you have had in your congregation. What made it an exciting experience for you?

What are the things that you value deeply ó specifically, the things you value about yourself, being a parishioner, in your church?

What do you think is the core value of your church ó the value that gives life to your church?

These are three of the key questions posed by Appreciative Inquiry. Appreciate Inquiry or AI is a positive strength based approach for designing leadership, team and organization development programs. It has been used by such institutions as the United Way and Penn State University as well as smaller organizations to develop new visions of positive change.

We at St. Johnøs have been invited by the Diocese to participate in this new program offering. The training for AI requires thirty six hours of instruction over three weekends and involves the selection of a study project in an area of our parishøs ministry.

Julie Gittens, newly elected to the vestry, and I have volunteered to be the AI representatives from St. Johnøs and in December began our training. Gathering for our first weekend at Camp Hebron we joined with representatives from four other churches ó Christ Church, Williamsport; St. Johnøs, Marietta; Christ Church, Berwick; and St. Lukeø, Altoona ó to learn the AI principles and practices that lead to positive change.

Our study project is our *St. John's Jubilee Ministries – Renewing our Vision for the Future*. We selected this area of our parishøs ministries because of its history, its centrality to our churchøs identity and its present state of transition.

St. Johnøs Jubilee Ministries is one of the original Jubilee churches in our diocese, established in 1988. It is one of the premier Jubilee Ministries in our diocese and is the active mission core of our congregation. It is also entering a period of change. Because of the new national church accounting requirements funding for Jubilee has now been integrated into overall ministry operations of our parish. This has brought the need for clearer communication and greater coordination. We are also entering a period of leadership transition as our founding figures begin to step back and look to the next generation for leadership and guidance.

In the months ahead, Julie and I will be reaching out to our Jubilee õstakeholdersö, those in our congregation and community who have interest or influence in our Jubilee Ministries. These include but are not limited to vestry, staff, Ministries Council and the leaders of our fourteen Jubilee Ministries. In pairs, small groups and plenary gathers we will reflect on and discuss provocative questions designed to empower them to be agents of positive change, building on our core strengths, to draw out a vision for the future of Jubilee.

Together we will move through the four stages of Appreciative Inquiry. DISCOVERY: Study the best of what is. DREAM: Envision what might be. DESIGN: Decide the ideal organization. DESTINY: Living into a new future based on positive change.

The AI experience has the transformative power to carry the best of our Jubilee Ministry into the future. For twenty six years Jubilee has been a gift of God to our parish and to our neighbors in need in our community. May we all join together in helping to create a renewed vision for Jubilee that these gifts may continue to be a blessing for us and for all we seek to serve in the name of Jesus Christ.

# THE REV. JENNIFER E. MATTSON

Two years ago I shared my identity with you as a survivor of sexual abuse. I was, and remain, profoundly grateful for the genuine love and support I received. I am also grateful for the commitment that our congregation has expressed to becoming a truly safe church. We have continued our work with the diocese in requiring and updating background clearances for all staff members, volunteers and parish leadership. An updated database is being maintained in our parish office. The vast majority of our volunteers, teachers and leaders have been trained in Safeguarding God's Children. The diocese will be providing further training opportunities in 2015.

Our vestry approved a policy (based on diocesan policy) at the December meeting for striving to become a truly safe church. This policy includes a vision statement and best practices and procedures for ensuring that St. John's is a safe place for all. In an effort to further strengthen this effort and deepen our commitment to being a safe community, our vestry expressed full support of participation in the Samaritan Counseling Center's Safe Church program, a nationally accredited and recognized education and training program to create safe churches and communities. This is a major commitment and a major step forward.

The Safe Church Project, as offered by the Samaritan Counseling Center, has theology at its core: *No longer will violence be heard in your land, nor ruin or destruction within your borders. You will call your walls Salvation and your gates Praise. Isaiah 60:18 (NIV)* They describe the project in this way: õNo matter what our faith tradition, we can agree that Isaiahøs vision is one to which we aspire for our churches, homes and communities. Making this vision a reality does not happen without intentional hard work. The Safe Church Project offers a path for churches to move toward this vision through a process of shifting congregational culture to one in which adults are equipped and inspired to be proactive in preventing child sexual abuse not only in the church, but in the broader community.ö

By participating in the Safe Church project, St. John's will receive:

\* 24 hours of training for a core team

\* Interactive policy template with best practices to create or upgrade church policy

\* Two educational presentations for congregation at church

\* Retreat for adult survivors of child sexual abuse in the congregation

\* Awareness raising and worship resources

\* Four hour training for staff and volunteers on mandated reporting, prevention and response

\* Prevention curriculums for children

A committee of three to five St. John's members will meet once a month, beginning this February, with other local churches to learn, share and strive to become a safer place. We will continue to work with the diocese in maintaining national and diocesan standards and training. The Safe Church Project will strengthen and deepen our work. As the quote (unknown) so eloquently puts it: õIt shouldn't hurt to be a child.ö

# Transitions

In 2001, I was one of a half-dozen retiring Bethel University profs who were asked to address the student body as part of a "Last Lecture" series. I chose to spin my comments primarily to graduating seniors who, like me, were soon to face a significant change in their life patterns. I tried to look back over 35 years of teaching, and ahead to an unknown future, in such a way that the seniors might also reflect on their college years in anticipation of . . . of what? Little did I imagine when I wrote that speech that in a little more than a dozen years, I would watch my two sons move half-way across the country, put three houses on the market, move twice  $\hat{o}$  one of those being to a new city where I knew absolutely no one, change to a new church of an entirely different denomination, lose my wife of 45 years to cancer, and meet and marry another lovely woman  $\hat{o}$  and move to her home.

The remarks that I made in 2001 have returned to stare me in the face more than once. What I told the students is that transitions are uncertain times, but they also can provide remarkable opportunities to reaffirm values and priorities, and to ask again: what have I accomplished that is of true worth, and what should my life be like in order to be a life that is worth living? Transitions give us unique opportunities to address such questions and to change the way we go about living. Transitions can also threaten us because they may challenge cherished plans, threaten the status quo and nudge us out of our comfort zones.

In 2015, St. John's Church will go through a "feasibility study." These studies are typically viewed as processes that help us answer the question: do we have the resources to move forward on our new projects. I would like to suggest that such a view of our feasibility study is too narrow. We ought rather to be asking the question: are we ready to enter a period of significant transition? After all, projects of this magnitude can be full of surprises, unintended consequences ô good as well as not so good ô and new opportunities for ministry and growth. St. John's could change! So during 2015, perhaps we should be taking aim not only on our resources and financial capacities, but equally on our values and ministry potential. What are we doing that is of true value? Might God wish to redirect it? It is important to be asking: are we willing to manage this project. It is equally important to ask whether we are willing to have God's Spirit, working through this process, manage who we are and who we will become. Or is the status quo too comfortable?

Personally, I am now off on my own transition. I want to thank the St. John's family for the four and a half years that I have been with you. You have introduced me to, and welcomed me into, the Episcopal Church in the best possible way. I shall always remember this time and be grateful to you for the way you have received me into your hearts in a city where I knew no one. And now it's time for us both to move on . . . to what? Neither of us know, but I ask for your prayers ô as I promise you mine ô that we continue into that future of God's Spirit.

So off we go i up, up, and away!

John Herzog Senior Warden Thank you to all who were able to attend the Parish Meeting. I hope that the information that I presented was both understandable and helpful. For those that were not able to attend allow me to give you a synopsis of the presentation.

We have completed are work of cleaning up the chart of accounts and have received the financial reviews for 2011, 2012 and 2013 from our independent accounts, Trout Ebersole & Groff. With the completion of these tasks, we are in a position to ask the Diocese for permission to incur debt (get a loan for the construction) and then to approach the appropriate financial institution. We are also in a position where we can more easily provide reports to the various ministries. Beginning this month, I am including a balance sheet report to our Vestry. The asset side of the balance sheet report was summarized for the meeting. I can report that the Parish has over \$7.5 million in assets. This report will also be useful as we investigate financing for our construction. Preliminary numbers were shown for the expense side of the 2015 budget. The income side will be set after December 1, when we have received nearly all of the pledges for 2015.

With respect to this year, I am happy to report that our pledged contributions at 97.8% of the expected level. This is better than last year by nearly 5%. Our cash flow continues to be a challenge, but we are meeting all of our bills.

The expenses continue to be managed extremely well. It is a tribute to your Vestry, Property Committee, Property Manager, and our Financial Secretary that we have been able to manage our cash flow so successfully. The monthly numbers are shown below. Please remember that the income includes approximately \$40,000 additional draw from the Endowment earnings.



# **VESTRY RESOLUTIONS**

The following resolutions were passed at the Vestry meeting on December 15, 2014:

- 1. <u>2015 Budget</u> ó Resolved, that the vestry of St. Johnøs Episcopal Church, Lancaster approves for 2015 a spending plan with projected income of \$563,190 and projected expenses of \$731,183. *After a long discussion, with additional income and expense numbers added, and some changes to the budget, Glenn Miller moved that we accept the budget as amended. It was seconded by Bob Murphy. The motion carried.*
- 2. <u>Amos Martin Fund</u> Resolved, that the vestry approves the expensing from the Amos Martin restricted fund a sum of \$1300.00 payable to Gerald Heilner for Christmas brass. *This resolution came out of the executive committee, requested from Paul Reese. John Herzog moved to approve the resolution. The motion carried.*
- 3. <u>Additional December Endowment Draw</u> Resolved, that the St Johnøs Episcopal Church, Lancaster authorizes the Treasurer to draw from St Johnøs Episcopal Church, Lancasterøs Unrestricted Endowment Funds up to \$90,000.00 to insure that all due accounts payable and payrolls are paid prior to December 31, 2014. This resolution is to assure expenses and required transfers incurred in 2014 are paid in 2014, and that St. Johnøs Episcopal Church, Lancaster maintains its credit worthiness. *Charley Braught called the question, and it was seconded by Leslie Morgan. Leslie Morgan moved to make amendments to the wording in the original resolution. It was seconded by Peter Eaton. Bob Murphy called the question. The motion carried.*
- 4. Resolved, It is with great pleasure that the St John's Vestry expresses its sincere thanks to the members and friends of our Parish who made The Annual Fall Cleanup a smashing success! We especially want to voice our deepest admiration for and commendation to the St John's Youth who jumped in and defined the meaning of a "good day's work". With their help, (and for the first time in recent memory), we accomplished every single task on cleanup agenda! This was presented by Peter Eaton, and seconded by John Herzog. The motion carried.

# **VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES**

There are opportunities for adults from St. John's to assist in facilitating an overnight shelter at the YWCA. The shelter is intended to provide women and children safe overnight accommodations when the Water Street Mission is full. St. James has volunteered to find volunteers for two weeks during the winter months. The coordinators are reaching beyond St. James congregation to fill the needed positions. The first week was December 1-7. Marylee Sauder along with Sue and Dave Martin participated in the December week. February 9-15 will be the next week for volunteer opportunities. Spots are available for that week. Questions about the shelter experience can be addressed to Marylee, Dave or Sue.

There are two levels of volunteer service available. Greeters which arrive at 6:30 p.m. and stay until 9:00 p.m. (6 persons are needed each night). Overnight volunteers report at 6:30 p.m. and stay until 7:00 a.m. the following morning (2 women and two men are needed each night). A training session for volunteers for February is scheduled for Sunday, February 8, at St James (11:45 a.m.) in the church Parish House. ### Food Pantry Overflows with Wedding Love!

In response to a request from Pastor Jennifer and Bradley, we celebrated their union with contributions to the food pantry: overflowing tables and over \$2000 at last count! This year¢s needs (among our neighbors) have vastly exceeded last year¢s needs (an average of 10.9 boxes/week as compared to 7.4 during 2013), and your generosity has allowed us to

continue to meet those needs.



# **PROPERTY CORNER**

We have never had a cleanup as successful as the one a couple of weeks ago! Our task list is purposely over extended just to be sure we have enough work of varying difficulty to keep every one busy. And, everyone kept busy completing absolutely everything on our list and, then some. It is not often that such an event receives a Vestry commendation. Young and old of many talent ranges and varying commitments of time contributed to make this event the huge success. And, for this great effort, your property committee is extremely grateful.

While talking help, leave removal has taken considerable time and effort. The election day and weather related delays havenøt helped. We have been blessed with people like John and Helen Miller donating their time to spruce up the grounds. I offer many thanks to all of those who have helped in this effort.

We had more of our copper downspouts stolen or damaged. While able to get the person apprehended, it is costing us hundreds of dollars to replace something for which the thief is getting just a small fraction in scrap value. It is costing hundreds of dollars just to replace these spouts with aluminum. I have been subpoenaed to appear in court as part of a cost recovery effort by a victim/witness program.

While considerable time has been spent evaluating and devising a solution for our underground downspouts, Klines was contacted to route the pipe to see if that would free the backflow of water from the undergrounds.

After considerable thought and record review, job descriptions were created for Property Manager and an Information Technician. These tasks were completed upon requests by members of the Personnel Committee for determining our parishøs needs in the two technical arenas.

After a considerable review of our insurance documents, we will be contacting the Church Insurance Company of Vermont to review our policy(s). Of concern with them, are the \$9,000 contents values for the Becker House and the \$4 million umbrella coverage. We plan on using half of the building coverage as a value for the contents coverage. Policy changes have been difficult to track, as they have only been documented in cover pages at policy renewals and not entered into the policy coverage and exclusions portions of each policy year. So, unless one is able to track all of the changes in each of the policy yearsø changes, it is easy to overlook that which is covered and excluded, as it is not reflected in the current policy yearsø documents.

We were contacted by Steve Latshaw, our treasurer to switch our electricity provider. After looking into different company rates a decision will be forthcoming.

We have had a quote from Arborists Enterprises for the pruning of our trees for \$4,600. A post holiday trim is planned to remove large dead limbs and balance the weight of some of our larger trees, while they will be offering a 10% discount for all work being performed.

# **POPCORN THEOLOGY**



We're writing this while preparing for Christmas. You're reading this while reflecting on recent memories of our Christmas worship and celebration. The spirit of Christmas begins early, and continues for a long time. As the giver of every good and perfect gift calls us to mimic God's own giving, continue that giving, always. We're writing this "thank you note" for the gifts you've given, and continue to give throughout the year, to support the initiatives and organizations working to eliminate extreme poverty - working to fulfill the Millennium Development Goals. Over the past seven years the MDG committee reviewed and selected partner organizations because they matched the criteria we laid out. We are looking for opportunities to involve folks of all ages in the congregation. We're looking to develop Sunday School curriculum, newsletter and website information, adult discussion and bible study materials that will give each of us opportunities to learn, discuss our interests, and discern our roles in giving our gifts, by grace and through faith. We're looking forward to having meaningful discussions with you and getting your input. So thank you for all your gifts, and thank you in advance for your work and support to come.

# FORGIVENESS LEADS TO RECONCILIATION

A voice says, "Cry out!" And I said, "What shall I cry?" Isaiah 40:6

> Are you crying out? Are you shouting out? Or are you remaining silent?

If you remember, last month, Pastor Jennifer gave a very moving sermon the Sunday after a Staten Island grand jury decided not to indict any NYC police officers in the killing of Eric Garner, a man accused of selling taxfree cigarettes; a death that was ruled a homicide by the Richmond County coroner. Eric Garnerøs death followed the shooting death of Michael Brown in Ferguson, MO. The St. Louis grand jury also decided not to indict the police officer involved in the shooting. Although these killings happened in different cities, two things remained the same: the killed were Black men and the killers were White police officers. These killings have driven most of us to our breaking points. Weøre upset, weøre angry, we frustrated and we donøt know what to do.

Surprisingly enough, I found solace in an article written eighteen years ago by Archbishop Desmond Tutu, titled õForgiveness is Liberating.ö In 1995, the South African government passed the Promotion of Nationality Unity and Reconciliation Act, one part of this act was the Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC). People thought this new law and the TRC panel (Archbishop Tutu was a member) were both disappointing and doing nothing to solve the problem of racism in South Africa. Archbishop Tutu wisely replied, õThe TRC is NOT required to achieve unity and reconcile our nationô it is required to promote it, to contribute to it.ö He also stated the reconciliation would only occur if everyone was willing to forgive one another. Here¢s one example of forgiveness and reconciliation he gave: õIn Bisho, some former Ciskei Defense Force officers testified about the Bisho massacre. One of them alienated the people with his insensitive tirade. Then another confessed his part and asked for forgiveness. In the audience were people who had been wounded in that incident, people who had lost loved ones; but when that white army officer asked for forgiveness, they did not rush to strangle or assault him. Unbelievably, they applauded.ö The audience forgave the second officer because rather than try to justify his actions, he admit he had done wrong. The humbleness of his confession allowed the people to forgive him. The first step towards reconciliation.

However, in order to reconcile with the other side, you have to learn about the other side. And the only way to do this by meeting with them and talking to them. This is why I am urging all the members of St. Johnøs (teenagers and adults) to take next monthøs (2/7) THRIVE class at St. Edwardøs on Harrisburg Pike. The theme is Overcoming Racism: Cultivating Transformation. The keynote speaker will be Dr. Felicia Brown-Hayward, the chairperson of Diversity and Educational Equity Committee at Penn State Harrisburg. A few of the workshops will be: Modern church through the eyes of Absalom Jones; the myth of the post-racial society, Anti-Oppression, Music from Lift Every Voice and Sing (LEVAS) and What is racism. These workshops should be used as a first step toward achieving the Diocesan goal of eliminating racism and increasing racial justice work here in Central PA.

So, I ask again:

Will you cry out? Will you shout out? Or will you remaining silent?
