SPRING PARISH MEETING

On Sunday, March 15th we will meet in the Parish Hall from 9:15 AM to 10:00 to elect our next delegation to Diocesan Convention and to hear and discuss the latest reports on the health of our parish and our diocese.

Our meeting comes the day after the election of our new bishop. On Saturday, March 14th our clergy and our lay delegates will chose between the three nominees ó **The Rev. Canon Audrey Cady Scanlan, The Rev. Canon David Anthony Pfaff, The Rev. Doctor Douglas Everett Sparks** ó to become the Eleventh Bishop of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania. We are especially grateful for the commitment and service of those representing St. Johnøs ó Mary Ellen Kilp, Marylee Sauder, Aaron Spicher, David Kilp and Charlotte Weaver-Gelzer. They have been diligent in attending the õWalkaboutö, the delegate orientation training, and to reporting to us at the parish mini-meeting. We look forward to receiving their final report about our next bishop and to discharging them with our thanks.

Because we will also be voting to replace them. At our spring Parish Meeting we will elect our next group of delegates and alternates to the Diocesan Convention to be held Friday and Saturday, October 16-17, at St. Lukeøs Episcopal Church in Altoona. Our Nominating Committee composed of Debbie Carter, Bob Kilp, Glenn Miller, and Bob Murphy will present a slate of candidates for your consideration and election. While the floor will be open to nominations for the **Election of Diocesan Delegates**, I invite you to use the preferred procedure and contact any member of the Nominating Committee with the name of candidate to represent St. Johnøs.

We will also receive the latest **Financial Report**. Our Treasurer, Steve Latshaw, and our Vestry Steward for Finance, Charley Braught will be on hand to share with you the year-end report for 2014, the budget report for 2015, and the report on the status of endowment and restricted funds. They will also report to you on the work of Financial Focus to make our accounting fully transparent and consistent with generally accepted accounting practices and principle.

You will also hear the report from our **Feasibility Committee**. Doug Brown, Debbie Carter and Rosemary Coverly have been working with our stewardship consultant, Scott McKenzie of Horizon Stewardship. Scott has conducted an initial face to face survey of twenty parish members. Another fifty parish members have been surveyed on line. The result of this research will be made known to you as the vestry considers whether to move forward toward a capital campaign and building program.

In my spring State of the Parish to be read at both services I will build on the **2015 Mission**Imperatives for our parish adopted by your vestry: + Begin to develop a 3-5 year Strategic Mission Action

Plan that integrates our objectives for property, personnel and finance. + Provide greater support for our Lay

Eucharistic Visitor and senior member ministries. + Enhance our New Member ministries especially for

parishioner follow up contacts with newcomers. + Fulfill our commitment to becoming a completely safe space

of all children using the Safe Church Program. + Nurture thoughtfully and prayerfully generationally

leadership in our parish and especially with our Jubilee Ministries using the Appreciate Inquiry process. I will

also give the latest up-date on plans for the departure of Pastor Jennifer and for her replacement.

We have been meeting as a parish for one hundred and sixty years. This Parish Meeting promises to be

historic. I hope you will make every effort to attend.

"PAJAMA SUNDAY" - SUNDAY, MARCH 8

Wear pajamas to church!!! Donate pajamas for children and teens in need!!!

Every night after dinner my children enjoy a warm bath and put on soft, clean pajamas. This is immediately followed by bedtime snack and the reading of stories. It is a nightly ritual that we all look forward to. A nightly ritual with a soothing, predictable pattern: bath, pajamas, snack and books. Our routine communicates safety and warmth in the midst of all that is unpredictable and sometimes hard in life.

Imagine, instead, what it must be like for a young family staying overnight in a shelter. There is no family bathtub, with special shampoos and favorite soaps. No neatly folded towels waiting to be enjoyed. And frequently there are no pajamas or books either. Many of the children fall asleep in the clothes they were already wearing.

Alyssa's Bedtime Stories wants to change this. Founded by a local teen living in Lancaster, the organization collects used books and new pajamas for children living in local shelters. Alyssa describes her mission in this way:

"I enjoy helping others and I wanted to give kids that don't have much a way to forget their troubles by reading. Books have helped me, and I want to share my love of books and reading with kids to help them too. I have been collecting used books from family and friends for the last year and donating them to organizations in Lancaster County, PA that help children who don't have a home. Some of these places include Milagro House, Clare House, Domestic Violence Services of Lancaster County, and many more."

Inspired by her story and example, the children of our Church School want to help. On Sunday, March 8th, St. John's will host the first-ever "Pajama Sunday", an opportunity to collect new pajamas for children and teens living in local shelters. All donations will be given to Alyssa's Bedtime Stories. Pajamas of every size are welcome and will be collected that morning. As a way to have fun and call attention to this worthy ministry, children, teens and brave adults are welcome to wear church-friendly pajamas on Sunday morning. Bathrobes and slippers are welcome too!

Sometimes the small things in life really do matter: like the simple pleasure of putting on a clean pair of pajamas. Please consider joining our Church School children and teens in supporting this simple but important ministry.

Dear Bishop Irala:

Thank you for your letter expressing your desire to continue a Companionship with the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania.

As you may know, the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania will be electing a new bishop in March and consecrating that bishop in September 2015. Because of this transition in the episcopacy and because there is a lack of interest, at this point in time, for maintaining the companion relationship with S\(\tilde{a}\) Paulo, I have allowed the Companionship to expire as of December 31. 2014.

It will be up to the new bishop and the people of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania to determine the next steps they wish to take regarding diocese-to-diocese relationships. I have informed parishes here that if they have a working relationship with a companion parish in your diocese, they are welcome to continue with that parish-to-parish relationship.

I wish you and São Paulo many blessings as you labor for the sake of God's kingdom.

During this Lenten season, I prayerfully thank you all for your continued support of this truly uniting ministry of God's love and caring for each other.



VESTRY RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were passed at the Vestry meeting on: February 16, 2015

- 1. <u>Secretary to the Vestry</u> Resolved, that the vestry of St. Johnøs Episcopal Church, Lancaster elects Robert Kilp to serve a one year term as Secretary to the Vestry.
- 2. <u>Treasurer</u> Resolved, that the vestry of St. Johnøs Episcopal Church, Lancaster elects Stefan Latshaw to serve a one year term as Treasurer.
- 3. <u>Assistant Treasurer</u> Resolved, that the vestry of St. Johnøs Episcopal Church, Lancaster elects Edward Bednar to serve a one year term as Assistant Treasurer.

Resolutions 1 through 3 were voted on all together. These resolutions originated from the Executive Committee. Jane Lee moved to call the question. The motion carried.

4. Clergy Housing Allowance of Resolved, that the total compensation paid to the Rev. John W. Morris for the calendar year 2015 shall be \$88,520 of which \$42,620 is hereby designated as housing allowance pursuant to section 107 of the Internal Revenue Code. And be it further resolved that the total compensation paid to the Rev. Jennifer E. Looker for the calendar year 2015 shall be \$54,080 of which \$25,445 is hereby designated as housing allowance pursuant to section 107 of the Internal Revenue Code.

This resolution originated in Executive Committee. This resolution must be presented each year in accordance to I.R.S. guidelines. Edit to Jennifer E. Looker to Jennifer E. Mattson. Don Durand called the question to approve as amended. The motion carried.

5. <u>Policy on Contracts</u> 6 Resolved, that the vestry approves and adopts the Policy on Contracts (2/6/15) recommended and presented by the Finance Committee.

This resolution came from the Finance Committee to the Executive Committee for submission. Toni Ehrhart called the question. The motion carried.

6. <u>Feasibility Committee</u> ó Resolved, that the vestry reaffirms their commitment to the work of the Feasibility Committee in the discernment of our capability to improve our facility and handicapped accessibility, spirituality and welcoming.

This resolution originated in Executive Committee. Leslie Morgan called the question. The motion carried.

- 7. **2015 Mission Imperatives** ó Resolved, that the vestry adopts for 2015 the following Mission Imperatives:
 - + Organize a three to five year strategic mission action plan for St. Johnøs that integrates our objectives for property, personnel and finance.
 - + Provide greater support for our Lay Eucharistic Visitors and senior member ministries.
 - + Enhance our New Member ministries, especially with follow up contact.
 - + Fulfill our commitment to becoming a completely safe place for all children.
 - + Nurture thoughtfully and intentionally generational leadership in our parish, especially for our Jubilee Ministries.

This motion originated in Executive Committee. Sue Heilman called the question. The motion carried.

VESTRY RESOLUTIONS (CONTINUED)

8. <u>J2A Fund Raisers</u> ó Resolved, that the St. Johnøs vestry approves the following J2A fund raisers for 2015: Advent Wreaths and Roping Sale, Scrapbook Event, Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper, Blueberry/Strawberry Festival, Dinner with Talent Show and Auction, Mini-Golfing, Chocolate Egg Sale, Pretzel Sandwich Sales.

This question was submitted by the Journey to Adulthood group for their annual fundraising permissions. Sue Heilman called the question. Julie Gittens seconded the motion. The motion carried.

BUILDING PROJECT FEASIBILITY STUDY

Following our 2011 parish survey about property priorities, our Courtyard Committee has been exploring how we might implement the features that we identified as our highest priorities: courtyard refurbishing and increased handicapped accessibility. The committee engaged Marotta/Main Architects to develop preliminary designs that would incorporate these features, and those designs have been shared during parish meetings.

Our next step has been to determine whether our congregation has the capacity and interest to fund this project, so a Feasibility Committee was selected to conduct a feasibility study. We engaged The Rev. Scott McKenzie, of Horizons Stewardship, to guide us through this process.

A brochure has been developed to present an outline of our proposal. (A copy of that brochure is on our website. Choose **Ministries**: **Acting in Service** and look under **Property**.)

During the last week in February, Scott interviewed a sample of parishioners from about 20 households as the first part of this study. Last week, several additional parishioners were asked to participate in an online survey. The combined input will be used to gauge whether we gre ready to proceed to the next step: a capital campaign to raise funds for this project.

The committee looks forward to sharing the results of this feasibility study with you in the near future.

PROPERTY CORNER

The committee regretfully accepted the resignation of Mike Heider. Mike brought his many years of experience as a craftsman in the construction industry to our committee. Citing increased demands on his time, Mike will be sorely missed. On a brighter note, the committee welcomes Debbie Smith as our new Vestry Steward of Property.

We are quickly going through our budget for snow removal this year. This situation has been compounded by the melting and refreezing of ice and the frequent dustings we have had, requiring multiple applications of ice melt. These conditions have led to our application of an anti-slip material on our lots and walks to enhance traction. Every effort is being made to use matching colors of this material. We have already experienced at least two falls on our campus due to weather conditions thus far. We hope to avert any more falls.

Dealing with the colder temperatures has been further hampered by heater failure in both rental properties and a frozen pipe in one of them. We managed to restore these services as quickly as possible to thwart further damage to our properties and discomfort to our tenants.

A jurisdictional inspection of our boilers by Hartford Steam Boiler on January 16th resulted in a certificate being renewed for meeting minimum requirements. Previous recommendations regarding the temperature/pressure gauges were found completed. Boiler 2 was not functioning during our recent cold spell due to a locked rotor condition of its pump. Although restored, the pump will need to have a bearing replaced. The service of the kitchen hood liquid agent suppression system was also completed in January.

The lift rental company has hired a masonry contractor to fix the holey wall. They are just waiting for the weather to break to complete the work. The work will include leveling off the opening by replacing missing bricks and replacing this portion of the wall with a removable fence. Cracks and coping will also be repaired/replaced. While talking repairs, our last attempt for resolution with UGI regarding the curb damage on Concord Street proved beneficial. While accepting no wrong doing for the damage, UGI indicated it just isnot worth their time going back and forth on this matter. They have made arrangements with their sidewalk restoration company to repair the damaged curb on Concord Street.

Although more of a communications item, much time has been spent with replacing our phone system. We are continuing to realize the systemøs many benefits throughout the set-up process. Please thank Drew Dorgan for the phone system the next time you see her. It is hoped we will have less dropped calls through these many efforts with her generous donation.

Much time has also been spent on our recycling program. We moved to a weekly pick-up to more effectively handle our output of such materials. As part of this ministry involves expanded/foam plastic materials, we have researched our current process in order to enhance earth friendly disposal means. We continue to monitor these options.

We were subpoenaed for the preliminary hearing for the suspect apprehended for stealing our downspouts. The hearing was held and a guilty plea was entered beforehand. In addition to jail time, a fine and restitution were ordered. Through this victim/witness program, we hope to recover some, if not all of this loss.
