WHY YOU SHOULD OBSERVE HOLY WEEK

Everybody loves Easter. This is particularly true, Iøve observed, at St. Johnøs. It is not Christmas which is our most attended worship. Itøs Easter. Last year our combined Easter Sunday attendance was 450. This number is almost equal to the number of every man, woman and child in the parish. Everyone shows up for Easter.

Easter at St. John is great. The music is especially spectacular with the additional instrumentation, this year with õ*Bravura Brass* õ. The Choir holds nothing back when it comes to anthems and singing hymns. The Flower Guild goes all out decorating window sills, chapel and high altar.

Of course there is the Easter egg hunt with the excitement of children seeking and finding and sometimes hording eggs, and the delight of adults watching all the action. And there is the St. Johnøs tradition of the Easter Sunday Parish Breakfast ó an exceptional gift for all on an exceptional Sunday.

Easter is the easy part. Holy Week is the challenge.

The Holy Week triduum ó Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday ó takes commitment. It means setting aside our valuable but ordinary time and making it more valuable and sacred. It means not just showing up for the Easter Sunday tailgate party but being there through the whole game. It means learning not only Godøs promise for us in the Easter resurrection of Jesus. Holy Week shows us what we need to get there.

There is a lot to Holy Week and especially at St. Johnøs. Maybe you canøt do it all. But maybe you can pick some or even one of the Holy Week observances to attend and experience.

Did you ever have your feet washed by someone else? Try the Maundy Thursday service. It is a pretty awesome feeling, having someone wash your feet. You feel humbled and exalted, awkward but affirmed, and all at the same time.

Have you ever seen a õLive Sculptureö? Come to the early Good Friday service. Our teens take the traditional Stations of the Cross and using their own bodies turn the Way of the Cross into works of art.

We have all heard the Passion Narrative read to us. Imagine what it might sound like to you if you heard it sung in the style of classical music. If that sounds appealing, come to the evening Good Friday service.

St. Johnøs experienced the Great Fire in 1938. But at the Saturday night Great Vigil of Easter Eve service, we begin by igniting a fire ball in the center of the nave of the church and light all our candles from it in the way that for centuries it has been done in Jerusalem in the Church of the Holy Sepulcher in the tomb of Jesus.

Everybody loves Easter. And so we should. It feels good to shout once again, õAlleluiaö. It feels good to remember that Christ is risen. Being part of Holy Week makes that Easter feeling even better.

You really dongt want to cheat yourself. You want to treat yourself well. You really dongt want to miss out. In the days just before Easter you should give yourself a gift of sacred time and observe Holy Week.

THE REV. JENNIFER E. MATTSON

Two of my children were recently sitting at our kitchen table playing a game when I heard one loudly proclaim δ I win! I win! δ O. The other child immediately chimed in δ I win too! I win too! δ On Saturday, March 14th The Rev. Canon Audrey Cady Scanlan was elected as 11th Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Central Pennsylvania, pending the required consents from a majority of bishops with jurisdiction and standing committees of the Episcopal Church. It was a true δ win, win δ moment in the life of our diocese- a moment that found its beginning in the hard work of our search committee.

Under the leadership of Charlotte Weaver-Gelzer our diocese committed to a prayerful, intentional search process for our next bishop. We engaged in open and sometimes difficult conversations about who we understood ourselves to be and what we hoped for in our next bishop. A profile was developed that compiled this information and honestly reflected both the challenges and joys of being together in this diocese. The result of this extraordinary work was an extraordinary outcome: three candidates who would all make great bishops. I believe our diocese would have blessed by the leadership of any the three candidates presented, but I am particularly excited by the election of The Rev. Canon Audrey Cady Scanlan.

There is much to commend. She was born in New York but lived in Connecticut for the past fifty years. She served her diocese as Canon for Mission Collaboration and Congregational Life in the Diocese of CT. Her ministry included financial counseling and strategic planning for congregations; property discernment and development; building leadership capacities; addressing conflict; walking with parishes in all seasons of their congregational life; encouraging and facilitating Missional Experiments in Connecticut and building networks and Communities of Practice across a diocese of 168 parishes.

She described herself in this way: õI am a child of God and a disciple of Jesus Christ. I work to follow the teachings of our Lord and to share his love with others. By the grace of God and the power of the Holy Spirit, I am strengthened and encouraged and given a new chance each day to do my part in bringing Godøs Kingdom to come. I am a diocesan administrator who is passionate about the Church and who has great curiosity and joy in following God faithfully to what will be Godøs next õnew thing.ö (Isaiah 43:19)ö

The Rev. Canon Scanlan was elected on the 2nd ballot out of a field of 3 nominees. She received 79 votes of 147 cast in the lay order and 50 of 79 cast in the clergy order. An election on that ballot required 74 in the lay order and 40 in the clergy order. The election was held during the diocese's Electing Convention for the 11th Bishop of Central Pennsylvania held at St. Stephen's Cathedral in Harrisburg, Pa.

Under the canons (III.11.4) of the Episcopal Church, a majority of bishops exercising jurisdiction and diocesan Standing Committees must consent to the bishop-elect's ordination as bishop within 120 days of receiving notice of the election. Pending this approval, The Rev. Canon Scanlan will succeed Bishop Nathan Baxter, who retired last May after serving the Diocese for eight years, and Provisional Bishop Robert Gepert. The consecration is scheduled to take place September 12, 2015, at the Downtown Hilton, Harrisburg, Pa.

Upon hearing the news of The Rev. Canon Scanlan's election, my daughter Anna Gail responded õCool! A girl bishop!ö. My son William immediately asked õCan boys be bishops too?ö





VESTRY RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were passed at the Vestry meeting on: March 16, 2015

- 1. ACS On Demand Resolved, in support of the continuing effort to make financial information more readily available and to improve transparency of operations, the Vestry approves the purchase and installation of the ACS module On Demand at a one-time cost of \$550 and an on-going cost of \$17 per month (\$204 annually). The expense is to be charged to budget line item 01-5108. This expense was provided for in the 2015 budget approved by Vestry. This comes from the Finance Committee and has been vetted by the Executive Committee. Bob Murphy called the question. Motion carried.
- 2. <u>Purse</u> Resolved, that in celebration for the eight years of priestly service by the Rev. Jennifer E. Mattson to St. Johnøs Church, Lancaster, the Vestry authorizes the invitation to the members of the parish for the collection of a purse to be presented to Pastor Jennifer on May 17th, her last Sunday at St. Johnøs. *This resolution comes from the Executive Committee. Toni Ehrhart called the question. The motion carried.*
- 3. Repair of Kitchen Equipment ó RESOLVED, that the Vestry authorizes the expenditure of \$867.98 to repair one of the kitchen dishwashers, and \$161.98 to repair one of the kitchen automatic coffee makers. The total expenditure of \$1029.96 is to be paid from the ECW restricted investment account. This resolution was submitted by the ECW. Leslie Morgan called the question. Don Durand seconded. The motion carried.
- 4. <u>Episcopal Election</u>: RESOLVED, that the Vestry of St. Johnøs Episcopal Church, Lancaster celebrates the election of The Rev. Canon Audrey Cady Scanlan as the Eleventh Bishop of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania and sends to Charlotte Weaver-Gelzer our warmest thanks for her dedicated leadership of the Diocesan Search Committee in assisting our diocese in deeper self-understanding and aiding our discernment of Godøs calling of our new Bishop.

This comes in coordination with a letter from Charlotte Weaver-Gelzer. This courtesy resolution was written by Father John in recognition of Charlotte's 18 months of gratis work to the diocese, as chair of the Diocesan Search Committee. Father John's motion was seconded by Leslie Morgan. The motion carried.

PASTOR JENNIFER FAREWELL

We hear this passage every Sunday. It surprises me sometimes, that I can hear the words over and over, maybe for years and then, õAh, hah!öí . finally the words connect with our actions.

Spring is finally here, at least officially by the calendar. The Lenten season is concluding and we will be starting the Holy Week events by the time you read this. How will you sum up your intentions from this Lenten season? Did you give something up and/or did you take on something new? How will this season@s activities impact you going forward?

Mother Nature interfered with some of the Lenten plans we had for this year with those õSö and õIö words (I donøt want to hear or say the snow or ice words again for quite a while) but, we made it through and what we did accomplish was very meaningful.

Through the MDG Sunday night programs we heard from Mayor Gray about Gun and violence issues in the City. We heard from Fred Pinguel from CeaseFirePA regarding that organization sefforts against Gun violence in PA. You can learn more about them at www.ceasefirepa.org.

We watched a video presentation by Author/Novelist Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie entitled õThe Danger of a Single Storyö; made available through TED Global. You can view the video by going to this site, http://www.ted.com/talks/chimamanda_adichie_the_danger_of_a_single_story?language=en.

We heard from Bill Cater regarding his trip to Kenya and the work and efforts of the Kiwanis Club to eliminate the threat of Tetanus, improving the health of women and babies. Bill shared a story, of visiting a village and seeing how simply and humbly the people lived; one room huts where an entire family and their farm animals lived (there were lions to be concerned about). And, he shared a story of the people at talents, their bead craft work, their music, singing and dancing which they were eager to share.

MDG GOALS UPDATE (CONTINUED)

As different as these topics may seem, there were common themes that could be seen throughout these programs. The MDG committees underlying focus was on getting to know our neighbors near and far and that is an important place to start. We need to do some homework and not just take one storyo as the absolute fact(s). If you only hear one story about some violence or a shooting in the City and, you hear it over and over again well then you may believe on, the City is a violent and unsafe place to be or goo. Show a people, as one thing over and over again and that is all they will be known as.

If you only see or hear about poor people in Africa then, when you meet someone from an African country (and yes, there are many countries in the õcontinentö of Africa), what is your preconceived idea of them? Do you think, that they come from a place of very little food, water or education? What talents could they have? What do we really know about them or, our neighbor right outside our front doors? COUNCIL OF TRUSTEES

As some of you know, at the 2014 Diocesan Convention, I was elected to something called the Council of Trustees. To be honest, at the time of the election, I did not know what that meant. For the last six months, under Bishop Gepert¢s leadership, we have learned how we should make the Council of Trustees an important part of diocesan leadership. I am beginning this series of articles for two reasons. First, so that any future candidates for this position can have an understanding of the commitment they are being asked to make. Second, so that we all have a clearer understanding of why and how this council is important to all of us in Central Pennsylvania. The first two articles will lay the foundation of understanding where the council fits. The next few will discuss how we act in accordance with established committees and ministries. After that I will be reporting and updating on the activities where I am primarily involved. I invite any of you to discuss any of these with me at your leisure.

First let me state that I am not the St. Johnøs representative to the Council of Trustees. I was elected at the Diocesan Convention. As such, though my opinions will be informed by my membership at St. Johnøs and my living in Lancaster, my actions will have to be judged on how they advance the interests of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania. At the 2014 convention, the following resolution was passed in support of our Provisional Bishop in his ministry of shepherding Godøs people through present challenges and opportunities and into Godøs future.

õWe continue to pledge our commitment to reflectively, innovatively and collaboratively implement his recommendations and vision to:

Move forward in a process of mutual formation, addressing the health of ourselves, our parishes, and our diocese as we prepare to welcome our next bishop;

Own the work of healing and community, taking responsibility for our own actions;

Use all available mission and ministry opportunities to reconcile ourselves with God and each other;

Be accountable, transparent, and self-aware to promote healing in our diocese;

Pray the Scriptures with intentionality, co-operate, see the world beyond ourselves, sacrifice for the sake of our ministry, and stay within our roles;

Embrace the work of reform, promoting gospel principles, and living into communal norms.ö

Our work is broader than that of a church vestry in certain areas. We are to carry out the work of the Diocesan Convention while it is in recess. Our role is to give some meaning to a phrase that sometimes sounds a bit trite: õWe are the diocese.ö

Next month, I will write about the promises Council members make to God, our Diocesan Community and each other as Trustee Members.
