"GOODBYE SUNDAY" Farewell Pastor Jennifer

On Sunday, May 17th, we say õgoodbyeö to Pastor Jennifer, Bradley and their children Anna Gail, William, and Thomas. It will be a day-long celebration of thanksgiving for their ministry and their life with us at St. Johnøs.

In the morning, Pastor Jennifer will preach at both the 8:00 and 10:15 AM services. Between the services starting at 9:15 AM in the Parish Hall we will honor Jennifer with a farewell party. The children and teachers of the Church School are preparing a special photographic remembrance album to present to Pastor Jenn. The leaders and the teens of the Journey to Adulthood group are writing ocaritaso, personal gift notes sharing their memories and thanksgivings for Jennos ministry with them and their hopes and prayers for her in the future. The wardens on behalf of the Vestry and congregation will gift Jennifer with a handsomely framed photograph of St. Johnos Church, to always remember us by.

In the evening, beginning at 4:00 PM will be Choral Evensong with St. John& Chancel Choir and select singers from St. Martin-in-the-Fields Episcopal Church, Chestnut Hill. St. Martin& is Bradley& former parish where he sung as a member of the choir. In his role as St. John& Choir Warden, Bradley was instrumental in bringing these two great choirs together. Pastor Jennifer will serve as officiant for the service. She will be chanting the clergy portions of the liturgy. While we will have a chance on May 3rd to experience Evensong at St. Martin& (you will recall that we were snowed out on March 1st), our May 17th hosting of Choral Evensong will be one last musical gift from Jennifer and Bradley to all of us.

A gift that we are all invited to share is the collection of a parting purse for Pastor Jennifer. To simplify the collection and accounting, a letter has been sent to all households in the parish. With the letter is a designated gift envelope. You may either return the envelope in mail or bring it with you to church and drop it in the collection plate. Please make the check payable to St. John & Church. While your gifts are welcome at anytime, we would prefer to receive them before May 17th so we can present Pastor Jennifer with the parting gift check.

The ministry of Pastor Jennifer has touched the lives of all of us and in so many ways. Whether you got to know her through her pastoral visitations in the hospital or homes, or through her sacramental counseling for weddings, baptisms or burials, or through her work with our children and teens, or through her leadership on vestry or any number of other parish ministries, you know that Pastor Jennifer is a stellar person, an awesome role model for our youth and an exceptional priest of the church.

St. Johnøs has been blessed by Pastor Jenniferøs ministry with us these past eight years and those blessings will live on past her leaving. The ministries she nurtured, those she revived, those she initiated and those leaders she served with will continue on as her legacy for years to come.

"Always We Begin Again"

I keep a small, pocket sized book on my desk that is titled õAlways We Begin Againö. This book was a gift from a priest that I deeply admired. It has journeyed with me from college to seminary to chaplaincy to St. John's. It was written by an attorney who wanted to find balance and spiritual depth in his life. He discovered the rule of St. Benedict and interpreted it using modern language. The result was õAlways We Begin Againö. I love the title as much as the book. It reminds me that each day is a new beginning, and that God invites us to have courage and faith in its unfolding.

It is difficult to say goodbye to you. It is difficult to find the right words. St. John's has been a place of profound formation: in my vocation, in my family, in my sense of personal identity. I have had many new beginnings in your midst. I became a priest, a mother, was divorced, remarried. My own life narrative has been one of nearly constant change and new beginnings. But equally formative have been the vocational milestones along the way: baptisms, weddings, funerals, prayers for the sick, prayers for the dying, visits to the homebound, lessons with children, retreats with teens, coffee hour conversations and every kind of meeting and committee imaginable, not to mention worship of profound beauty and depth. Every day has been a new beginning. My formation as a priest- a formation that was deeply shaped by you- has been one of nearly constant learning. I am so grateful for all that I have experienced.

You have taught me that it takes courage to age with grace and gratitude; that dying is rarely easy, but often sacred beyond imagining. You have taught me that healing comes in surprising ways, and that new life is always beckoning. You have taught me that it is almost always better to listen than to speak; that sometimes a simple touch or quiet song can express a sentiment deeper than words. You have taught me that joy is contagious and powerful, that kindness is a language that requires no interpretation, and that although we are children of God we shouldn't take ourselves too seriously. Your faithfulness, quiet devotion, genuine welcome, and real commitment to serving others have made a deep and lasting impression. I believe that I am a better priest and person for having served in your midst. I'm so profoundly thankful.

It is difficult to leave St. John's, but I trust and believe that the timing is right. I feel genuinely called to devote myself to the role of mother for a period of time, and look forward to returning to ministry in the future. Our family will continue to live in Lancaster, a community that we have come to genuinely love. We are planning on attending St. Martin-in-the-Fields in Chestnut Hill, Philadelphia, where Bradley sings in the choir.

St. John's is a truly remarkable place, and you will always hold a special place in my heart. I know this is true for my family as well. In the words of one of my favorite hymns: O God beyond all praising we worship you today and sing the love amazing that songs cannot repay; for we can only wonder at every gift you send, at blessings without number and mercies without end: we lift our hearts before you and wait upon your word, we honor and adore you, our great and mighty Lord.

You have been a genuine gift from God. I marvel daily at the many blessings I have known in your midst. I will hold you in my hearts and prayers as you obegin againo with a new priest and a new beginning.

SAFE CHURCH



Having "Safe" Conversations As We Embark On "Safe Church"

St. Johnøs is now three months into its participation in the õSafe Churchö program ô a yearlong endeavor designed to help create the safest environment possible for our children. With guidance from Samaritan Counseling Center professionals, St. Johnøs Safe Church committee is participating in monthly meetings with eight other local churches to learn ways to enhance the culture of safety within our parish and to write a comprehensive policy aimed at keeping our children safe.

St. Johnøs Safe Church committee is working closely with clergy and staff, Vestry, Church School and J2A leaders and teachers, and others in the congregation to create a comprehensive safety policy and initiate conversations around child sexual abuse prevention. As it states in the first section of the draft policy, St. Johnøs is participating in Safe Church because we have õa responsibility to ensure that children in our care grow and develop in a church environment that is safe and with a church family that empowers them to speak up if they believe something isnøt right.ö

As our parish begins having some of these difficult conversations, please remember that the person you're talking with may be a survivor. It is important that we choose our words and sentiments carefully. We can ensure our conversations are õsaferö by avoiding stereotypes about how abuse impacts survivors and avoiding harsh or angry words to describe our feelings about sexual abuse.

If you are a survivor or impacted family member and would like resources or a safe space for talking, please reach out to our clergy. Father John and Pastor Jennifer have close contacts at the Samaritan Counseling Center and both are available as a safe space. If you are a survivor and are comfortable offering suggestions for how to enhance Safe Church activities, please talk with a committee member ô Cynthia Minnich, Cindy Morris, Mary Woolson, or Marylee Sauder.

These conversations arenot easy for any of us to have, but by addressing them together, we strengthen our parish family ô at church, and in our everyday lives.

From these numbers, I believe that you can see that the church is not about to go bankrupt any time soon. Over the past 4 years, St. John& has had several necessary expenses that were either unplanned (the recent õsink holeö), capital in nature (the fire safety upgrade), or long overdue (correcting our accounts). I would point out that we made no additional draws from the Endowment in fiscal years 2011, 2012 or 2013. While we have had a deficit budget every year for at least the last 10 years, St. John& Endowment continues to grow and the church continues to expand its ministries.

I hope these figures relieve some anxieties regarding our financial condition. If you have any questions or concerns regarding our financials, please contact any Vestry member, Finance Committee member, or myself.

VESTRY RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were passed at the Vestry meeting on: April 20, 2015

Administrative Support ó Resolved that, at the request of the St. Johnøs Episcopal Church Finance Committee, the Vestry of St. Johnøs Episcopal Church hereby authorizes an additional expenditure of up to \$15,000 (including wages, payroll taxes, and any associated expenses) for the balance of 2015 for the purpose of adding a part-time administrative support person to the church staff to assist with the preparation of a Financial Secretary Operations Manual, to serve as a back-up resource for the Financial Secretary, as required, to assist with the implementation of ACS õOn Demandö and ACS õAccessö, to aid in efforts to eliminate any requirement for continuing services from a financial consultant, and to perform any other administrative functions that the Rector assigns.

This resolution comes from the Finance Committee. Sue Heilman called the question. The motion carried.

Assistant Treasurer ó Resolved that at the request of the Finance Committee, the Vestry appoint Cynthia Minnich to be an Assistant Treasurer and authorizes her to be an approved signer of checks written upon the General Fund at the request of the Treasurer or if the Treasurer is unavailable.

This resolution comes from the Finance Committee. Sue Heilman called the question. The motion carried.

<u>Amos Martin Fund</u> ó Resolved that the Vestry authorizes the payment of \$1400 to the musicians for the Easter services from the restricted Endowment Amos Martin account.

This resolution came from the Worship Committee. Leslie Morgan called the question. The motion carried.

Pointing 6 Resolved, that the Vestry approves the expensing of up to \$5000 from Building Maintenance (01-5138) and up to \$2500 from 209 Rental Repair and Maintenance (06-5152).

This resolution came from the Property Committee. Sue Heilman called the question. The motion carried.

<u>Horizons Stewardship</u> - Resolved that the Vestry accepts the feasibility report from Horizons Stewardship and authorizes the payment of \$3862.00 from the Restricted Endowment Labyrinth account.

This resolution came from the Stewardship committee. Leslie Morgan called the question. The motion carried.

<u>Vestry Steward</u> ó Resolved that the Vestry accepts the nomination and election of Bruce Waskowicz, as a Vestry member to serve as the steward for Stewardship for the remainder of the term for 2015.

This fills out the term until the end of the year for the Vestry position vacated by Marylee Sauder, who resigned to focus on the work of the "Safe Church" initiative. An election will need to take place at the fall Parish meeting to elect a candidate to fulfill the remainder of the unexpired term, at that time. This resolution comes from the Nominating Committee. Julie Gittens called the question. The motion carried.

Lastly I want to take a moment to share with you something that I experienced on Maundy Thursday. It was wonderful to see all of the congregation at the evening service, but especially the 33 young people who came from all over the diocese for the annual J2A lock-in. It was a very personal privilege to be able to take part in the foot washing. Besides the solemn act of washing feet, as Christ did for his disciples, it was even more meaningful to be a part of the service at St. Johnøs where clergy, youth and Vestry all participated. It left a profound sense of thankfulness. If you have an opportunity to participate in the future, please consider it.

FEASIBILITY REPORT SUMMARY

On Monday, April 20, the Vestry met with Scott McKenzie, our stewardship consultant from Horizons Stewardship. In an hour-long presentation, he shared his observations and recommendations based on his personal interviews and online surveys. What follows is the Feasibility Report Summary that was emailed to the members of the Vestry. The Vestry felt this report should be made available to the whole parish and they invite your comments. At their May 18th meeting, the Vestry will consider how we at St. John should move forward.

ANALYSIS AND OBSERVATIONS:

- 1. This study was conducted with personal interviews and online surveys. 53 out of 75 giving households responded to our request for an interview or online survey. This is an above average response rate. Considering the response rate, Horizons Stewardship is confident in the observations, projections and recommendations.
- 2. While many churches continue to decline, St. Johns remains stable and strong. In 2013 the median worship attendance for all Episcopal churches was 61. With an average worship attendance of 185 your church is larger than over 75% of all Episcopal churches. With a diocesan average attendance of 70, St. Johns is a flagship church within the diocese. 92% of respondents view St. Johns as either stable and steady or dynamic and growing. 8% responded with declining and dying.
- 3. Like many churches, a significant percentage of giving households (27.8%) give less than \$500. This number indicates a need for stewardship development. With a median Lancaster county household income of \$56,000, there is clearly significant room for increased giving to the ministries and mission of St. Johns. Stewardship taught and practiced as grounded in gratitude, revealed in prayer, and lived in faith can and will have a positive impact. Remember, giving and stewardship are first and foremost spiritual issues.
- 4. The average church pledge in your diocese was \$2,041. St. Johnos average pledge was over \$2,300. The average giving per attender in your diocese was \$1,794. St. Johnos average gift per attender was \$2,113.
- 5. 92% of people indicated they are either familiar or very familiar with the church expansion and renovation plans. This is a very positive response. Clear and consistent communication will be of critical importance as we move forward with a capital campaign.
- 6. 62% of people believe the expansion and renovation plans will further the churchs ministry and mission. Only 6% of people said no, the plans would not enhance mission and ministry. This is critical to a successful campaign. Successful campaigns are less about bricks and mortar and more about building mission and ministry.

FEASIBILITY REPORT SUMMARY (CONTINUED)

- 7. 92% of respondents are supportive or very supportive of the decision to conduct a capital campaign.
- 8. Of those surveyed, 79% indicated their willingness to consider some level of gift. 12% were unsure. Only 9% said no. While it is common in feasibility surveys to **not** see the majority of lead gifts surface, the success of the campaign will, in our experience, depend on leadership gifts larger than \$10,000. 15 gifts were indicated higher than \$10,000. Major leadership gifts, especially those that surface early in a campaign, will encourage others to prayerfully consider their gift and other leadership gifts will follow. One gift was indicated between \$100,000-\$149,999. In order to raise one million dollars, experience tells us that the top ten gifts will need to equal \$350,000 to \$400,000.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

- 1. In light of the data gleaned from this study, Horizons Stewardship recommends St. John Episcopal Church proceed with a capital campaign in the Fall of 2015. Based on the giving levels indicated in the survey, we find a reasonable expectancy of the total raised in a 3-year giving campaign to be \$620,000 to \$730,000. Though a capital campaign could yield more or less than the reasonable expectancy, this is a conservative projection based on the responses received.
- 2. The campaign will focus on raising maximum number of pledged dollars from August through December.
- 3. The total project cost should not exceed 2 times the amount raised in this initial campaign. Based on my projections I recommend developing a plan with a cost of \$1.2-\$1.4 million. This would require 2 consecutive capital campaigns. Many people expressed concern over the total cost of the project.
- 4. Once the final plan is developed there should be a series of town hall meetings to present the plan and the vision for enhanced and expanded mission and ministry. Once final pledge numbers are in and town hall meetings conducted, Vestry will be able to make an informed decision.
- 5. In order to improve overall stewardship there are a few key recommendations.
 - Continue and strengthen your focus on lives changed because of giving. Give a specific example/witness of how someones life was changed because of the ministry of St. Johns.

FEASIBILITY REPORT SUMMARY (CONTINUED)

- Have clearly stated expectations for people who take positions of leadership in the church. They should be: tithe or be working toward tithing, regular attendance in worship, and involvement in some kind of mission/outreach beyond the walls of the church.
- Have clearly stated expectations for people who join the church. They should be: tithe or be working toward tithing, regular attendance in worship, and involvement in some kind of mission/outreach beyond the walls of the church. Remember, growing churches do not focus on membership, they focus on discipleship.

KEYS TO SUCCESS:


First and foremost the leadership and people of St. Johnos must be willing to embark on a journey of faith. Horizons believes that lasting and life-changing stewardship is grounded in gratitude, revealed in prayer and lived in faith. God, what am I most deeply grateful for?+ God, what would you have me do with the resources you have blessed me with?+ God, how are you calling me to step out in faith and do more than I may have ever imagined?+ If church leadership is willing to model this process and encourage others to follow, this campaign will succeed.

Members of St. Johns will be more likely to embrace this journey of faith when they are convinced their church has a life changing vision for mission and ministry in the community and world. We need to state the vision clearly and help people see in very practical terms how these changes will enhance mission and ministry. This campaign cannot be about simply building but must be about lifting up mission and ministry.

Once the campaign is initiated, there must be a strong emphasis on major gifts by the leadership team and pastors. It is extremely important that leadership gifts surface early in the campaign to have the effect of raising the belief and willingness of others to honestly pray for Gods guidance in determining their family gift.

People give generously and sacrificially <u>always</u> in response to Gods Vision to reach people and transform lives.

LECTORING

A Well-trained Tongue...

i was a title of a book written about the many aspects of the ministry of lector. It included many things which those of our sisters and brothers among us that serve by proclaiming the Scriptures at worship exemplify each week. A lector does not simply read aloud the words on a page but proclaims the living Word of God. At worship we believe that the person or minister before us is an instrument through which God and Jesus are speaking directly to us. Our responses to the announcements before and after the readings bear this out. Therefore lectoring is more than reading. Proclamations involve communication ó bringing the words on the page alive so that they not only enter our ears but also our hearts.

Over the last couple of years, we have taken steps to assist our lectors in their service. We have provided opportunities for formation. We have made changes to the form of the texts they use for proclamation. Now, at the 10:15 service, we are going to employ two lectors in order to give them more frequent opportunities to proclaim. Just as musicians needs to use their gifts with regularity, so, too, the proclaimer. Fr. John and Pastor Jennifer are also models of this. Their excellent proclamation and preaching skills have been honed through frequent use.

...and a Well-trained Ear...

is the other side of the coin. Communication not only involves speaking but also involves listening. Listening is more than just hearing the words. Listening involves taking the message to heart ó entering into the message and owning it. The stories and lessons we hear proclaimed at worship are not only something that happened to others in the past but happens to us (or should, if we are truly listening). God uses both the proclaimer and the listener. With changed hearts we go out to the world to bring about the kingdom. Our Jubilee ministries and other efforts are the results of our listening to the proclamation of the Word. The Word of God is more than the printed words in our Sunday programs. Just as our lectors are asked to bring the Word to life by communicating, we as listeners are asked to go beyond the printed words and respond both in and out of worship.

Dear Friends,

In this, my first and last õMessengerö article to all of you, I carry the heavy burden of saying both hello and goodbye to you as a congregation. As I take stock regarding our time together, what gives me the most pause is seeing now -with the benefit of hindsight - the glorious ways in which God brought us together.

It seems more than any other theme, what brought me to the Anglican Communion, was the warm embrace of <u>friendship</u> that I felt over the span of years. As a child we often attended Bruton Parish Church in Williamsburg, VA, when visiting my Cousins Joan and Bill, whose friendship has been deeply formative in my life. As a Student in London, I attended Westminster Abbey, and in time was welcomed as a regular, and embraced as a friend by Julian Empett who sings there full time. The penultimate of this was my friendship with Paul Reese who invited me to sing with the choir at St. Johnøs. Yes, <u>friendship</u> brought me down the Canterbury trail, and brought us together, like an exclaimed õamenö at the end of a prayer. Before we knew one another ó God knew us. Before we were working ó God was working.

I count you all the very best and dearest of friends, with whom I have dearly enjoyed a sweet fellowship. As the hymn says, Jesus is õour maker, defender, redeemer, and <u>friend</u>ö and he brought us together in this way. On my second Sunday with you, you served me communion by name, and I have not looked back since. Being joined together some time later with Jennifer and the children in marriage has also been a profound gift. With our marriage, õthe prayers of the peopleö became our daily lives and I witnessed the 24/7 complete circular dedication to one another we all have - a living, breathing example of our Eucharistic theology.

Recalling the words from Zephaniah, I have experienced *God in your midst*, and in many ways our time together *saved* me. In being just who God created you to be as a congregation, your community of faith *rejoiced over me with gladness*, and *quieted me with love*. We exulted together with loud singing, both in the choir, and together as we worship. Sharing in the work of the gospel with all of you through music has been a particular blessing. For this I thank the St. Johnøs choir most of all.

With all that I am, I thank God for putting us on this mortal coil together for a time in this brief, uncertain life of pilgrimage.

COMMEMORATING THE END OF THE CIVIL WAR

The following story appeared in a 1916 Lancaster New Era column that identified St. Johnøs as the first Lancaster church to toll a bell early on the morning of April 10, 1865ô the end of the Civil War. It read that õJohn Ferrier, Sexton of St. Johnøs, had gone off to war. He left his wife at their home next to the church. In his absence, Mrs. Ferrier took over her husbandøs church duties, including ringing the bell.ö

According to the New Era column, õMrs. Ferrier was upset early on the morning of April 10 because one of her children was ill and her husband was far away. She and the child were sitting outside on the porch. A railroad employee she knew passed by and consoled her. He said she would not have to wait long for her husbandøs return: Robert E. Lee had just surrendered his army to Ulysses S. Grant. Mrs. Ferrier was elated. She and another of her children, Ellie Ferrier, hurried to the church to ring the bell in celebration.

Mrs. Ferrier carried a white handkerchief and Ellie, a small American flag to wave from the belfry. They rang the bell a bit after 2 a.m. and people tumbled from their beds, hurriedly donned their clothes and ran into the streets,ö according to the newspaper column. õIn the darkness, they could barely see Mrs. Ferrier and her daughter waving from the belfry.

Night watchmen quickly spread the news around Lancaster and practically everyone arose to see what was going on. An hour after St. Johnøs bell had rung, others took up the refrain,ö the newspaper column related, õand by six oøclock the town was agog with sound. Every bell in the neighborhood was pealing. Jubilation reigned.ö

Commemorating this event at St. Johnøs on Thursday, April 9th, parishioner Barbara Graeter stepped in to the role of Mrs. Ferrier and waved to onlookers from the main steps of St. Johnøs as Aaron Spicher (our Verger), rang the church bell at 3:14 p.m. for 4 minutes. Father John led prayer, for those who gathered, with a Litany of Thanksgiving for National Life and the Collect for Heroic Service from the Book of Common Prayer.

MDG GOALS UPDATE

How does God's love abide in anyone who has the world's goods and sees a brother or sister in need and yet refuses help?---1 John 3:17

The Lenten season seemed to fly by quickly this year. Although the uncooperative Weather caused cancelations of the first two planned events, the MDG committee was able to host 3 Sunday evening events filled with meaningful content. Our focus was on getting to know our neighbors *near and far*. Last monthos MDG article summarized our 1st two programs and the 3rd and final night exceeded our expectations. Our guest speaker was Fatih Akdemir who is a volunteer at the Turkish Cultural Center and the Assistant Administrator of Religion & Volunteer Services of the PA Department of Corrections. Our program was *Learning about Islam*. We learned a great deal about our guests and we encourage you to visit the website for the Turkish Cultural Center to learn more about their activities and events, http://lancaster.tccpenn.org/.

Our program topics throughout the season were very different but *very* enlightening. It is concerning how what we believe or think we understand is possibly influenced by not having enough information, being fearful to õopenö the door to learn more and quite possibly find new friends. The common thread to all that we heard seems to be the title of our one presentation, <u>õThe Danger of a Single Storyö</u>.

What sources do we use to inform ourselves about any topic? Is it the local newspaper, our favorite TV or radio news program? Do you read or listen to more than one source? How about the internet or books? How about attending a Cultural event different from your own? Which of these influences what we think or believe about our neighbors near and far? How willing are we to open our doors, our hearts, or our minds to new things, ideas or people? There is such a wide range of opportunities for learning, for getting to know our neighbors near and far. The MDG committee has shared and will continue to share opportunities as we learn of them.

We also are working on a Book list that we will be sharing next month in the õMessengerö and on the St. Johnos website. We as a Parish have touched a large number of places and people throughout the last nine years of working the Millennium Development Goals. The last goal still in progress is the Building Global Partnerships.

The MDG Committee is in the process of discerning which outreach ministry will be the focus of support from St. John's. Who shall we establish a Global partnership? The large world map posted in the parish house shows the world wide points where St. John's has given support though the MDG Committee. You are encouraged to look at the map and read the information about these ministries from the centerpieces on the round tables. The following three ministries have been selected for consideration in choosing one to build our initial global partnership.

The World Bicycle Relief

This organization, a non-profit, is based in Chicago. They specialize in large scale, comprehensive bicycle distribution programs to aid poverty relief in developing countries around the world. Their programs focus on education, economic development, and health care. As of November 2014, they have been able to distribute more than 217,000 bicycles and trained more than 1,000 bicycle mechanics in the developing world. They serve many countries in Africa, Philippines, Peru, and South East Asia.

MDG GOALS UPDATE (CONTINUED)

"While bicycles are distributed for a variety of uses to farmers and health care workers, the most frequent use is for educating girls. Girls have many chores to do at home before and after school. If time runs short, they often don't make it to school, so of all the bicycles WBR gives to students, about 80% are given to girls. A bicycle can reduce the trip to and from school from an hour or more each way to about 20 minutes each way. Rather than only going to school one or two days a week, these girls can go to school every day simply by giving them a bicycle." You might remember the bicycle which for a time was located in the parish house as a reminder of this ministry support.

õSimple, sustainable bicycle transportation multiplies an individual's efficiency. Compared to walking, bikes improve access to education, healthcare and economic opportunity. They increase carrying capacity and accessible travel distance while decreasing the time it takes to commute to schools, clinics and markets.ö http://www.worldbicyclerelief.org/

Rafiki Africa Foundation, Alendu Kenya

Their mission--õRafiki Africa exists to work together with African communities and provide practical resources, training, real and lasting hope, dignity, encouragement, spiritual growth and guidance to bring them to a place of Optimum Health. **Optimum Health** refers to the capacity of individuals and families to work together to sustainably transform the conditions that promote their spiritual, emotional, economical, social, physical and environmental well being. **Capacity** is the ability of individuals and families in a community to have the desire, vision, resources, knowledge, power and support to work together to achieve Optimum Health.

MDG GOALS UPDATE (CONTINUED)

Established in 2007 by Dorothy Dulo and Roger Godfrey who are the owners of the African food stand õRafikiö at Lancaster Central Market. õThe Rafiki Africa Foundation envisions a community in which individuals and families have the hope and capacity to build and manage conditions that promote Optimum Health. Today Rafiki Africa works in the community of Alendu serving over 300 students, 400 families and thousands of children.ö

A part of the Rafiki Africa Ministry is Community Education in the form of *the Lighthouse Academy*. It has grown from one Kindergarten class in 1998 to that class now being in the 11th grade. õLHA is a K-12 school. K-8th grade students are on site at the Alendu campus with a maximum enrollment of 200 students. 9th ó 12th grades are in partnership with other High Schools. LHA enrolls students who are at risk for not receiving education anywhere else due to poverty or being orphaned and abandoned. The school provides students with two meals a day, all school supplies, healthcare, social clubs, sports and other activities.ö õOther community education initiatives include adult skill classes for women; scholarships for high school and college; after school tutoring; children reading and writing program; and continuing education for our local staff.ö http://www.rafikiafrica.org/

Ito Ito a simple exchange between a mother and a son. In fact, if we were to imagine this parable as a stereotype, we would picture Mary, the Jewish mother, telling her son what to do, and Jesus, the Jewish son, looking at his friends, with a frustrated face, thinking, on When is she going to stop telling me what to do? Ironically, of course, this Jewish son, does more than what his mother wants, he didnot simply turn water into wine, so the wedding guests could continue celebrating. He turned the water into a better wine. His first miracle. And ito proof that Mary knows how great her son is.

Growing up Motherøs Day is very important if you have older siblings, because thereøs a fear of owhat if I get her something (name sibling) has already gotten herö. 
