WELCOME THE REV. DR. BARBARA SERAS

Interim Assistant Priest

I am pleased to announce that our Interim Assistant Priest is the Rev. Dr. Barbara Seras. Barbara is no stranger to St. Johnøs. As a resident of Lancaster for the last eight years, Barbara has not only worshiped with us at St. Johnøs. During my sabbatical leave she assisted Pastor Jennifer, celebrating and preaching on Sundays.

Barbara is a native of Central Pennsylvania. Born and raised in Carlisle, she was baptized as an infant in the Greek Orthodox Church. She attended Chatham College in Pittsburgh before entering Dickinson School of Law. While practicing law she was also a small business owner and operator. In 1990 she entered the Master of Divinity program at Seabury-Western Theological Seminary in Evanston, IL and following graduation was ordained to the priesthood in 1993.

Barbaraøs ministry experiences include being Program Director for Episcopal Social Ministries in the Diocese of Maryland where she coordinated summer day camps and youth employment program for inner city children in Baltimore. She served as Assistant to the Rector at Christ Church, Columbia, MD, as Rector of St. Markøs Church, Highland, MD, as Rector of St. Maryøs Church, Woodlawn, MD, and Associate Rector for St. James, Lancaster. For two years Barbara also tested her vocation as a religious sister at the Episcopal convent, the Community of St. John Baptist in Mendham, NJ. The past eight years, Barbara has been the Coordinator for Province III of the Episcopal Church.

As Interim Assistant Priest at St. Johnøs, Barbaraøs ministry will cover four areas. She will be assisting in the celebration of Word and Sacraments on Sundays, Wednesdays and other liturgical events. She will be visiting with homebound parishioners and with those who are hospitalized. She will share in the greeting and welcoming newcomers to St. Johnøs. And she will be the weekly and monthly meetings that support these ministries.

We expect Barbara to be with us as Interim Assistant through the middle of July. During this time I will be interviewing candidates for the permanent position of Assistant to the Rector. This will be a full time position which will include and expand those areas assigned to the Interim plus leadership in the area of Christian Education and Formation for Children and Adults. I am being assisted in the search process by an Advisory Committee including Pam Loose, Vestry Education Steward; Sue Heilman, Vestry Steward for Pastoral Care; Mary Ellen Kilp, J2A Coordinator; and Karen DiPace, Church School Director.

I am grateful to have a priest with Barbaraøs breadth of depth and experience to assist our mission at St. Johnøs during this time of transition. I hope you will join me in welcoming Barbara to St. Johnøs Church.

THE REV. DR. BARBARA J. SERAS





It was the summer of 1988. The 69th General Convention of the Episcopal Church convened in Detroit Michigan. It was my first of eight General Conventions (and still counting). General Convention is the governing body of The Episcopal Church that meets every three years. When in session, it is the largest legislative body in the world. Over 800 deputies in the House of Deputies* and several hundred bishops in the House of Bishops represent the dioceses of the United States and 16 sovereign nations. The Triennial of the Episcopal Church Women also meets. And with support staff, media and reporters, exhibitors and vendors, an army of volunteers and folks like myself coming as visitors and observers another several thousand attend.

In \$\infty 88\$, I attended with a small group of youth and adults from my home parish. The cost was considerable and we spent months working together to raise funds to get us all there. Pooling resources and creativity we designed and sold Navy Blue T-Shirts with white lettering: \(\tilde{0}\)Home is Where the Church Is\(\tilde{0}\). I cannot remember where we came up with the slogan but I remember it felt special. And the T-shirts were a hit in our parish and at Convention!

Two years later, I traveled the Holy Lands with St George College, Jerusalem and with Christians from around the world. During the month long pilgrimage, strangers became companions and friends. We spent one night in the Sinai desert, sleeping out under the stars. As I prepared to sleep, my eye caught that saying on my old well-worn shirt: õHome is where the Church is.ö I chuckled but thought: In a way, I am õhome.ö That night I began the discovery of that statement significance for my life.

In the years that followed, I often experienced õhomeö in different places and among amazing people...some expected and others unawares. In a word, it is <u>Community</u>, in Greek, *koinonia*, a term of great depth and richness bespeaking commitment, involvement, sharing, and intimacy. Community that lasts a short interval or a life time, being connected in Community is a life line for me.

For Community honors and respects each other and above all Christ Jesus. Community is where each of us can be who we are, and become who we are called to be. It is that place where all of us can invite others to do the same.

In Community, I find my home. In Community, I find that peace and hope, reconciliation and healing from God alone. It may be other places. But I believe that as each of us commits to live with integrity, there is no better place to call home.

St. Johnøs has been õhomeö for me this past year. I have experienced the joy of vibrant worship in word, song and prayer. I now look forward to knowing each of you more fully and to share more completely in the life and ministry of this Community.

Yes, Home <u>is</u> where the Church is. And for this interim time, I am grateful and delighted to call St Johnøs home.

SAFE CHURCH



St. John's Is Working Together On "Safe Church"

St. Johnøs is now four months into its participation in the õSafe Churchö program ô a year-long endeavor designed to help create the safest environment possible for our children. With guidance from Samaritan Counseling Center professionals, St. Johnøs Safe Church committee is participating in monthly meetings with eight other local churches to learn ways to enhance the culture of safety within our parish and to write a comprehensive policy aimed at keeping our children safe.

St. Johnøs Safe Church committee is working closely with clergy and staff, Vestry, Church School and J2A leaders and teachers, and others in the congregation to create a comprehensive safety policy and initiate conversations around child sexual abuse prevention. As it states in the first section of the draft policy, St. Johnøs is participating in Safe Church because we have õa responsibility to ensure that children in our care grow and develop in a church environment that is safe and with a church family that empowers them to speak up if they believe something isnøt right.ö

As part of our commitment to becoming a safe church, all volunteers who work with children and teens are required by law to submit background clearances. New volunteers must have forms submitted by this July. A volunteer will be available in the Parish Hall between services to assist with filling out all necessary forms.

If you are a survivor or impacted family member and would like resources or a safe space for talking, please reach out to our clergy. If you are a survivor and are comfortable offering suggestions for how to enhance Safe Church activities, please talk with a committee member ô Cynthia Minnich, Cindy Morris, Mary Woolson, or me.

With all of us working together, we are strengthening our parish family ô at church, and in our everyday lives.


TREASURER'S REPORT

We are now officially one third through our fiscal year and nearing the infamous õsummer doldrumsö. While our financial statement says we are no longer õin the blackö, it is only by a small amount and can easily be explained. First, April is the beginning of a new fiscal quarter. This is the time that we catch up on our Diocesan pledge. Also, we pay quarterly pension payments for our staff at the beginning of each quarter for the prior quarter. Finally, as we all are aware, April is the time for spring taxes. Even though we do not pay taxes on the church sanctuary building, we do pay taxes for the parish hall, office building and rental buildings. From the budget perspective, these expenses are spread evenly through the entire year, so it would appear that we are over budget for the year.


St. Johnøs is grateful to have been remembered by Nancy Eckenrode and have received a gift of \$300,000 from her estate. The Finance Committee will make a recommendation to the Vestry on the use of this money. Regardless of how it is used, it will greatly benefit all of the ministries of the parish. I encourage everyone to prayerfully consider including St. Johnøs in their estate planning so that we can continue to support and grow all of our ministries.

VESTRY RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were passed at the Vestry meeting on: May 18, 2015

- 1. Wonder Voyage ó Resolved, that the Vestry approves the disbursement of \$750.00 from the J2A restricted account for Wonder Voyage deposit for the J2A Pilgrimage. *Resolution came from Executive Committee. Sue Heilman called the question. The motion carried.*
- 2. <u>Baltimore Yearly Meeting</u> ó Resolved, that the Vestry approves the disbursement of \$1350.00 from the Memorial Funds given in memory of Mary Lou Higgs for the Baltimore Yearly Meeting to cover the expenses of one Eagles Nest student to attend two weeks of summer camp. *Resolution came from Executive Committee. Wording was edited to cover the expenses of "one" student. The second scholarship is being paid by the camp. Sue Heilman called the question. The motion carried.*
- 3. <u>Earthquake Relief</u> ó Resolved, that the Vestry directs that all funds received for earthquake relief in Nepal be directed to Episcopal Relief and Development. *ERD was recommended by the staff. Toni Ehrhart moved to approve. Julie Gittens seconded. The motion carried.*
- 4. <u>Consecration Gift</u> ó Resolved, that the Vestry approves the expensing of \$100 from line item 01-5`124, Vestry Retreat, for the Diocese of Central Pennsylvaniaøs õGifts for the Bishop Electö. *Resolution came from Executive Committee. Pam Loose called the question. The motion carried.*
- 5. Personnel Policy of Resolved, that the Vestry approves and accepts the Personnel Policy and Procedure Manuel Handbook as presented by the Personnel Committee, and thanks the members of the Personnel Committee, especially Bob Lee, Chair, for their thoroughly professional work. Charley Braught made a motion to table this resolution until the next meeting to allow Vestry time to digest the manual.
- 6. <u>Capital Campaign Account</u> óResolved, that the Vestry authorizes the Treasurer and Financial Secretary to establish all income and expense account necessary to support the upcoming capital campaign. It also designates the Columbarium, Labyrinth and CD Transfer sub-accounts within the Restricted Endowment Investment Fund to be income sources for the capital campaign. *Resolution came from Executive Committee. Leslie Morgan called the question. The motion carried.*
- 7. <u>Capital Campaign</u> ó Resolved, that the Vestry of St. Johnøs Episcopal Church Lancaster accepts the Feasibility-Readiness Report prepared by Horizons Stewardship and engages Horizons Stewardship as our Capital Campaign Consultants for a fee of \$30,501 to be expensed from the Capital Campaign Account. Resolution came from Executive Committee. Leslie Morgan called the question. The motion carried.
- 8. <u>Eckenrode Bequest</u> ó Resolved, that the Vestry of St. Johnøs Episcopal Church, Lancaster, Pennsylvania, expresses on behalf the members of the parish, their profound appreciation and thanksgiving for the generosity of the bequest to St. Johnøs from the estate of Nancy Eckenrode, and sends to the members of the Eckenrode family, our pledge to appropriately acknowledge, and honor the memory of Joseph and Nancy Eckenrode. *Father John submitted this. Sue Heilman seconded. Pam Loose called the question to approve as amended. The motion carried.*

"LEMONADE TIME!"



Volunteers are needed to serve cold lemonade after the second service starting June 7. It's the easiest request I've ever made. PROPERTY MANAGER'S REPORT

It is good to see the first quarter financials showing our property expenses remaining below budget. This committee places much thought and consideration into all of the improvements and maintenance that extend into our many ministries. With the use of our facilities increasing, it is becoming harder to meet the demands that maintenance places on any facility. We are closely approaching a use capacity where some of our space (BH & APR) will require more frequent cleanings. Increased HVAC use requires more frequent filter changes and increased component replacement costs. Our parking lot, while just recoated and relined last fall, is showing signs of the rough winter. Maintenance to areas, like the parking lot, is being placed on hold, as we await the decisions made from a very encouraging feasibility study to our courtyard accessibility project. In the meantime, the ramp, its door and auditorium windows will show signs of maintenance needs, as well.

Increased security will no doubt be a benefit as we embark on our Safe Church Initiative. Our current method of keyed access may be more appropriately replaced with a system providing for a higher level of control and accountability. This system should also allow tracking of building use, which has challenged our planning efforts for space use.

The \$5,000 isnot going as far as it use to with our annual re-pointing or mortar repair of the brick joints, especially after the winters we we been having. While the spot treatment has been effective at maintaining our joints, it has resulted in a myriad of different mortar shades on the same wall. The steeple is one of those areas identified and should not be subject to a multitude of colors in order to maintain the aesthetic beauty of our church. Such work requires a lift and the costs of obtaining a lift for multiple procedures is considerable when compared to getting it all repaired at once. When considering the additional costs (\$3,000) and the additional color, we may want to consider having at least the steeple done all at one time (\$20,000). As we move forward, having entire spans done at one time will only enhance the aesthetic value of our buildings.

While speaking about values, considerable time was spent discussing our insurance policy with our Church Insurance Group® account representative. Our representative wanted to be sure we had adequate coverage for our exposures. While we had spent a considerable amount of time reviewing our policies (umbrella & BH contents values), our dismay was again expressed regarding the policy language (or lack thereof) as it applies to exclusions. The rep wanted to be sure we had sufficient coverage for exterior property (or property outside of the walls). Attention was then drawn to our compressors, as the limit for exterior property was \$50,000. She stated that she would look into the coverage to see if such equipment would be covered under the building and contents, but wanted us to send pictures of this equipment for their records. After completing this task, they responded that this equipment is handled, as part of the building coverage.

As you have heard, it has been a very busy month. This work has come at the expense of other matters that were on the agenda, such as the fire alarm system plan and training and the after action reports (AAR). You may recall that the AAR® were established as a means of documenting problems we have encountered and the solutions we have chosen to address them. In lieu of an operations manual, one would simply perform a word (or phrase) search for an issue that comes up and the word document would highlight all of the areas addressing the specific issue. It was thought this method would be a more productive way of avoiding ore-inventing the wheelo when problems come up, especially infrequently.

We recently noticed evergreen bushes planted right up against the All Purpose Room wall. While an understanding was in place for the planting of vegetation in this area, it did not include its placement directly against our building or in front of our windows. Both Phil Becker and Aaron Spicher concurred with the assessment and recommended a dialogue with our neighbor, especially while the plantings were still fresh and more transplantable. Our neighbors have since moved these plants, after my meeting with them.

Thanks to Phil Becker, Andy Carroll, Janice Henry, Cynthia Minnich, and Deb Smith for the support you have not only offered to me, but to the many ministries here at St. Johnøs. Submitted by, *Bill Gross*

When I took over as Jubilee coordinator, I had no idea what it meant to be a Jubilee Center nor what a Jubilee Ministry was!

What Is A Jubilee Ministry And A Jubilee Center?

A Jubilee Ministry is a part of a Jubilee Ministry Center, the way the Episcopal Church addresses domestic poverty by empowering the poor and oppressed in their communities by providing direct services, such as food, shelter, healthcare, and by advocating for human rights

History Of The Jubilee Ministries

We were designated as a Jubilee Center in 1988 under Fr. Pete Greenfield. St. Johnøs was the 2nd Jubilee parish in the diocese and one of the first in the country. We have integrated Advocacy, Empowerment, Evangelism, and Outreach into our church life as we strive to improve the lives of underprivileged people.

So What Does It Mean To Be A Jubilee Ministry?

It has become the core of our church and to remove it would be nothing short of disastrous. We have about 100 of our adult members engaged in at least one Jubilee ministry and many of our members serve in multiple ministries. Fr. John believes that we are the largest Jubilee ministry in the diocese. We have external collaborations with other churches (First Reformed and ALERT which involves 10 churches), Sauderøs Eggs (donate 30 dozen eggs a month for 15 years for comm. breakfast), Fulton School, and even Starbucks as they give 60 lbs. of coffee grounds for the garden weekly.

What Does St. John's Need To Do To Maintain Its Jubilee Status?

According to the Episcopal Church application form we must meet the following criteria: be an Episcopal church, must work among and with poor and oppressed people, our mission and ministry must be rooted in worship, and must include several programs (including at least on human rights advocacy program and one human services program). Once designated we must do the following: demonstrate the operation of its programs to others as models, maintain on of ites, act as a resource center and funnel for information, and be subject to annual review.

Our Newest Ministry

I am extremely proud of our newest ministry since it fills a vital need of the poor and oppressed in our community, the organic garden ministry. Believe it or not we live in a fresh food desert. Where can you get fresh produce in Lancaster? Southern Market? Grocery Stores? Have you seen the price of organic produce lately? My family is well off and we would go broke trying to buy organic produce. How is someone who is struggling financially going to afford any? The answer is you dongt. These people are forced to buy what they can afford, which is the worst possible food for them to eat, processed food. This is where the garden comes in. We have set out to provide fresh, organic produce to those who desperately need it.

JUBILEE MINISTRIES (CONTINUED...)

The Idea Of The Church Garden

The church garden had its beginnings at the Mearøs farm, which was operated by the Martinøs several decades ago. My family has decided to continue the tradition with a new wrinkle. Instead of sending the food to the Council of Churches, we started sending the produce to church to be handed out on Tuesdays and Thursdays when our food pantry is in operation. This was working well to a degree, but the number of people coming to our doors was inconsistent. We wanted to help more people. During our community breakfast at First Reformed several of us came up with a great idea. Why not hand out the produce at breakfast to mitigate the not-so-healthy pastries that we give out? This turned into our church setting up several tables in the First Reformed courtyard where everyone going to breakfast would have to walk past it not once but twice. We put anything that is in season out on the tables and stood back as we didnøt know what to expect the first time we did it. About 20 minutes into breakfast Dave Martin came downstairs looking for plastic bags as he ran out. Debbie Carter ran home and brought all that she had which was barely enough. I donøt remember how much I brought, but I do know that there was nothing left. We were cleaned out on day one.

If you would like to see pictures of the tables you can see one in the brochure or you can contact Jill Gross for some. We continued handing out the produce throughout the summer and fall providing well over 1/2 ton of organic produce with at least 600 lbs of white potatoes alone. One thing that we learned was that looks meant a lot to the people whom we served. Here is the list of produce that we gave out: onions, garlic, lettuce, spinach, swiss chard, kale, white and red potatoes, carrots, parsnips, radishes, sweet corn, zucchini, cucumbers, green beans, peas, sugar snap peas, several types of tomatoes, peppers, and eggplants.

We will be removing kale, swiss chard, lettuce, spinach, and some heirloom tomatoes from the garden this year, but adding (fingers crossed) strawberries, red raspberries, black raspberries, winter squash, and tomatoes that look like the ones you would buy in the store.

In closing from James 2:14-18:

What good is it, my brothers, if someone says he has faith but does not have works? Can that faith save him? If a brother or sister is poorly clothed and lacking in daily food, and one of you says to them, õGo in peace, be warmed and filled,ö without giving them the things needed for the body, what good is that? So also faith by itself, if it does not have works, is dead. But someone will say, õYou have faith and I have works.ö Show me your faith apart from your works, and I will show you my faith by my works.

A cold start to spring has pushed back the planting and now the lack of rain has brought everything but the weeds to a standstill. I will need help on the following Fridays so that we can harvest whatever is in season to bring to the community breakfast at First Reformed: June 19, July 17, August 14, September 18, and possibly October 16. I am hopeful that we will have berries to share as it is hard to beat fresh strawberries, black raspberries, and red raspberries.

I have a bee hive at the garden, thanks to Dave Martin, and the bees will be arriving in mid-May. The honeybees will help boost the production of the garden and the berries by up to 50%. If you are allergic to bees please be prepared if you choose to help in the garden. The garden is located at Angela and my house about 12 miles south of Lancaster in the middle of Amish country. We will need help weeding, hoeing, planting, and harvesting. This ministry positively impacts the diets of well over 100 people a month. 

For almost nine years (I have only had the pleasure of the last 4) she has shared her life, faith, compassion, passions and love with us. Also, as promised we have a book list to share this month. There are recommendations from several readers, of books we invite you to add to your summer reading.

Again, we will not meet the 1st Thursday in June as is our regular meeting day. We are scheduled to meet again on 6/25/15 at 7pm. In the meantime, please continue to read the MDG challenges and incorporate them in to your week as well as, find a new inspirational read on our new reading list. Together, we can make our world community a better place for all Godøs children.


