from Fr. John W. Morris, Rector

"We invite you to prepare for worship by listening quietly to the Prelude."

Beginning Sunday, July 5th and for all future Sundays, the invitation quoted above will appear in the 8:00 AM and 10:15 AM worship bulletins. The quote will be printed in the order of service just below the Prelude.

This decision comes following extensive discussions by the Liturgy Team and the Worship Committee under the topic, õWorship Normsö. This agenda item addressed a wide range of concerns including: conversations by adults in the congregation during the playing of the prelude and postlude; noise made by children during the worship service; the role of the choir and other liturgical leaders in worship; and the need for children to leave during the service to use the bathroom.

The Worship Committee reached specific conclusions on each of these topics. For children who need to use the bathroom during worship, they should be accompanied by a parent. This is consistent with SafeChurch policy and practice. Those in the choir and in other liturgical roles need to remember that they are leading the congregation in worship. Visiting with each other should be done before and after vesting, and gentle coaching of young acolytes is to be encouraged. Children in the congregation should likewise be assisted by their parents their participation in worship, while we all need to remember worship is for Godøs children of every age. Those who wish to listen to the Postlude at the end of the service are welcome to move to the front of the church. However, given that the Postlude follows the Dismissal, most people will chose to exit the sanctuary and greet one another as they do so. By contrast, before beginning the worship service, all are asked to enter the sanctuary quietly and listen respectfully as the music of the Prelude prepares all in the congregation for worship.

While I agree with these norms and hope they will be followed, I donøt believe they should be enforced. I see that part of the reason we are a inoisyøcongregation is that we like each other, we are happy to see each other, we want to talk with each other. Presently, when we come to church the only gathering space is in the church. The natural tendency is then to meet and greet in church. Should we one day have a narthex that replaces the breezeway and offers a space to visit before we enter church, our need for preworship noisiness will be abated.

I also believe that worship is not only about God. Worship is also about the way we live together. If we respect one another in worship, if we nurture good spiritual practice by children and adults, if we are thoughtful about those we are worshiping with, we will be a better community in every other way. Graceful worship will flow simply into grace-filled living.

Worship is not about rubrics and rules. Worship is about being gathered in Godøs presence to recall and celebrate who we are as Godøs people. When this is uppermost in our minds, it will be inmost in our hearts, and evident to all around us.

Update on Clearance Fees for Volunteers and Staff

On June 10, 2015, Governor Tom Wolf announced that the processing fees for Child Abuse Clearances and PA Criminal Record Checks will be eliminated for volunteers working with children, and cut from \$10 each to \$8 each for employees ô beginning July 25, 2015.

This action by the governor does not affect the fees charged for FBI fingerprint checks for employees and for volunteers who have not lived in Pennsylvania for 10 years. Those fees are not controlled by the state and will still be in force.

New volunteers must have clearances by July 1, 2015, and current volunteers have until July 1, 2016, to get clearances. For current volunteers who have not yet gotten or updated their clearances, it makes sense to wait until after July 25 to apply for clearances. That way, you save \$20. Even though, by law, current volunteers have until July 1, 2016, to get clearances, St. Johnøs is moving to have all volunteers cleared as soon as possible to align with our Safe Church covenant.

The Safe Church table will be staffed at coffee hour between services. If you have questions or would like to sign up for clearances right there on the spot, please visit the table in the Parish Hall. Thank you to the volunteers who already have applied for clearances or passed on copies of the clearances they received for their work.

As weøve mentioned before, if you are a survivor or impacted family member and would like resources or a safe space for talking, please reach out to our clergy. If you are a survivor and are comfortable offering suggestions for how to enhance Safe Church activities, please talk with a committee member ô Cynthia Minnich, Cindy Morris, Mary Woolson, or Marylee Sauder.

With all of us working together, we are strengthening our parish family ô at church, and in our everyday lives.

TREASURER'S REPORT


Last month I used a bar graph to illustrate our revenue and expenses. I hope that it was helpful and not too confusing. This month I will show the same basic information, except as a pie chart. As stated last month, my purpose is to find the best way to present the financial information in a clear, understandable format. If you like one way better than the other, please let me know. Silence will be considered approval.

The good news continues this month. Our pledged contributions continue to exceed expectations and our non-pledged contributions did some õcatch-upö. The net result is that our total contributions were \$9080 better than expected. When we couple the excellent contributions with the diligent effort of our ministries leadership to be good stewards of our sources, we end up showing a positive balance in our revenue and expenses. I have been your Treasurer for 8 years and I have never seen positive net revenue at the end of May.

While this news is all good, I must remind everyone that the õsummer doldrumsö are upon us. I wish everyone a great summer, but please remember that the church still needs your support to pay the bills.



The following resolutions were passed at the Vestry meeting on: <u>June 15, 2015</u>

1. Personnel Policy ó Resolved, that the vestry approves and accepts the Personnel Policy and Procedure Manual Handbook as presented by the Personnel Committee, and thanks the members of the Personnel Committee, especially Bob Lee, Chair, for their thoroughly professional work. This was presented to the Vestry last month by the Executive Committee, but was tabled at the suggestion of Charley Braught. Leslie Morgan called the question, Toni Ehrhart seconded. The stewards were all in favor with one abstention. The motion carried.

FOOD PANTRY



Last year, we served an average of over 10 neighborhood families or individuals per week. So far this year, we have averaged just under 6 families or individuals per week. We hope this decline in demand means that the economic conditions are improving in our neighborhood, but there may be other factors in the decline, and we're not making any assumptions yet. We'll keep watching the trends.

(Near the end of 2014, we began recording names of our guests, and we found that a few people had been coming to get food more often than once per month. Now that we are all informed, everyone is following the same guidelines.)

We began 2015 with a fabulous response to our **Souper Bowl of Caring** fundraiser for the food pantry. Including matching funds, we raised \$2108! In the first four months of 2015, we we spent \$470 to fill the gaps between donations and distributions, so we we in pretty good shape, so far.

And then, early in June, we got another <u>very</u> special gift! Mike Kilhefner won a radio contest (96.1 WSOX), and he gave the prize ó TWO \$250 Giant gift cards ó to our Food Pantry! So weøve been taking advantage of some great sales at Giant!

BIRTH OF A NATION

We are always confident; even though we know that while we are at home in the body we are away from the Lord-- for we walk by faith, not by sight. 2 Corinthians 5:6

Last month I had the privilege of attending a THRIVE (Theological Hope to Renew and In-Vigorate Episcopalians) gathering in State College, PA. Three workshops were offered: 1) Jumpstart!, a class presented by the Episcopal Church Building Fund (ECBF) which discussed the fears of the decline in Church membership/attendance, the decline in church finances and the future of congregations, 2) Person Directed Framework: Learning to Listen to Another, a class that taught people how to become more responsive and transform themselves when dealing with situations that often leave us feeling confused, scared or frustrated, and 3) Storytelling and Church History presented by the Diocesan Eliminating Racism Task Force, the class I took.

This Eliminating Racism class was separated into two sessions. The morning session was titled õStorytellingö and it allowed us (black and white church members) to discuss racism in our personal, work and, yes, Church lives. It was very refreshing to listen to other Church members discuss episodes from their past (some uplifting/some not) and still feel a sense of family among all of us. We are united as Christians and members of the Episcopal Church who truly want to work on ways to eliminate racism here in Central Pennsylvania. We realize in order to do this all Church members (teenagers, millenniums, middle-aged and elderly) are going to have to take part in these classes. The fear of listening to a story isnot nearly as harmful as ignoring the story.

The afternoon class was a discussion on Church history, in particular LEVAS (Lift Every Voice and Sing), the African-American spiritual hymnal and the stories of Richard Allen and Absalom Jones, two former slaves who became priests. Richard Allen, whose viewpoints were more Wesleyan founded the African Methodist Episcopal Church (AME), while Absalom Jones, the more Anglican, founded the first African Episcopal Church. Prior to this, blacks were allowed to attended Sunday services, but they had to remain in the back, they had to come forward to receive Holy Communion before the white members and leave immediately afterward. Absalom Jones didnøt think this was a very õEvangelicalö thing to do. After speaking with the Bishop, he learned all things necessary to be a priest in the EC and was allowed to open the African Episcopal Church of St. Thomas. St. Thomas is located in the Overbrook neighborhood of Philly. I suggest everyone take the trip down there to see the beauty of the Sanctuary, as well as to hear their choir and band sing songs from LEVAS.

As your Evangelism steward, imagine my surprise when I went to Church the following Sunday and heard Mother Barbara® wonderful sermon about Evangelism and the Pentecost season. Yes, it® the Pentecost season, otherwise known as Ordinary Time but, I assure you, there® nothing ordinary about it. Now is your chance to spread the Good News about Jesus Christ, the Episcopal Church and St. John® in particular, to other people. Evangelism is the perfect tool to use to help fix the mistakes of America® history (past and present) of racial bigotry, anti-sexism and anti-sexual orientation. There® no reason to be shy about it. Sing out songs of joy filled with laughter and praise and introduce yourself and others to the beauty of evangelism.
