St. John's 2015 Capital Campaign

Sunday, August 23rd we take our first steps in our capital campaign, "Honoring our Past Welcoming our Future". At the 8:00 and 10:15 AM services we will commission those who have joined the capital campaign leadership team. Between the services, from 9:15 to 10:00 AM, we will hold in the parish hall a parish mini-meeting on our capital campaign plans with time for discussion, questions and answers.

Those on our leadership team represent the deep talent and rich diversity of the people of St. John's. They are committed building on the accomplishments and generosity of the generations that have gone before by equipping St. John's for mission and ministry into the 21st century. Presently the leadership team numbers over sixteen households. We welcome any of our parish families to join our leadership team.

Phil Becker is our capital campaign Chair. Phil will act as the chief lay spokesperson for the campaign. He will help design the campaign, maintain contact with the different leadership teams and by his leadership provide the momentum and excitement for our campaign.

Mary Waskowicz and Debbie Carter are our Campaign Coordinators. Their job is to keep the campaign running smoothly: maintaining rosters and mailing lists, directing communications, organizing meetings. While Mary's focus will be on the capital effort, Debbie will be keeping an eye on our annual pledge drive.

Bruce Morgan will be heading up our Communication Team. Bruce will be calling upon the expertise of those on our Communications Committee: Jill Gross, Mary Woolson and Debbie Carter. They will be in charge of our printed materials and our electronic communications.

Our Prayer Team is at the heart of our capital campaign. It is the spiritual dimension which makes this not a fund raiser but a faith raiser. **Fred and Eleanor Honaman, Lois Kelly, and Rob Ashton** have offered to take the lead on ensuring that every member of the parish is invited into a spiritual journey through the use of a Devotional Guide, prayer event and the prayer, "Lord, what do You want to do through me?"

Ted and Pam Loose, Scott and Sherry Quall, and Kevin and Janice Henry make up our Advance Commitment Team. Each family will be hosting a gathering in their home. This is based on the biblical model in I Chronicles 29 that led King David's building of the temple.

Our Youth Team will be led by **Mary Ellen Kilp**. This team will be working with our children and youth to encourage their participation and teach them stewardship values and scriptures.

The Gratitude and Ministry Team, led by **Sue Heilman and Cynthia Minnich**, will kick off our capital campaign on Sunday, October 18th. Through the use of testimonies, banners, and Gratitude Cards, this team will remind us that stewardship is not as much about bricks and mortar as it is about ministry that changes lives.

Bill Cater will coordinate our Celebration Team. They will plan a church-wide festive event of hospitality, food and fellowship which celebrates our faith and enthusiasm as a congregation.

The Connection Team is chaired by **Tom and Kendall Stonerook**. This team will maintain the stewardship connection with all the members of our parish - both those who participate in the capital campaign and annual pledge drive and non-supporting members as well.

The last team is what we are calling the Generational Gifts Team. There are many people who have historic connections with St. John's but are no longer local and yet still care about our parish. We are asking **Dave and Sue Martin** to direct this team to reach out to them and affirm their relationship with St. John's.

I am grateful to this cadre of parish leaders for stepping forward as we begin our journey of stewardship and faith. Our success will depend on your support. Prayerfully consider saying "Yes" when they invite you to share in this historic ministry which promises to preserve what we have received and extend St. John's mission and ministry to generations yet to come.

WELCOME THE REV. DR. BARBARA J. SERAS



Barbara's call to St. John's was affirmed by the Vestry at their July 20th meeting and she will begin full time ministry as our new Assistant Priest on August 1, 2015.

Preaching is a significant part of my spiritual life. At Ordination the Bishop declared: ð[y]ou are called to work as a pastor, priest, and teacher, together with your bishop and fellow presbyters...ð* Preaching integrates all three roles and whether I preach weekly or bi-weekly, the rhythm of sermon preparation shapes and defines my day-to-day Christian life.

And that rhythm is the mirror image of the congregation. The congregation continues to reflect on the Sunday gospel. The preacher, however, moves to the next week's readings asking: what phrase or word ðjumps outð or stirs the heart or pierces the soul? What is the Spirit saying? How is this gospel relevant today in the life and ministry of the Congregation?

Yet in truth, sermons are the work of the Holy Spirit. For the most amazing, awesome experience comes in worship as the sermon seems to ðlift off the pageð and the Spirit carries the Word to our minds and hearts.

For the past three weeks, our gospel was taken from Mark, the sixth chapter. Next week, we will hear from the Gospel of John.

Yet, I am not quite ready to move on...

For as the gospel was read aloud, the words of the last verse took hold: ð...and [they] begged him that they might touch even the fringe of his cloak; and all who touched it were healed.ð**

All who touched it were healed...all. All...healed.

Some preachers skirt around these words altogether. Others refer to spiritual healing. Many offer alternate translations: to save, keep safe and sound, to rescue from danger or destruction. This preacher wrestles with the Word: All...all were healed.

For whatever the Greek translation, the healing--if for any one of us--is for us all...

In this past month, our sermons and our reflections have raised important questions of faith and ministry. Discussions and discoveries will continue as each and all ponder prayerfully: What is Christ's call to this parish and to each one of us? How will our dioceses and most importantly, how will our parishes be best resourced to accomplish those calls to ministry? How will we shape our theology and worship to embody our emergent understanding of what it means to include all God's children? How will we experience and discover God everywhere?

And most importantly, how will we accept and live into the healing, reconciling reality of God's love for us all?

May it be so! *Barbara+*

Dear People of God in the Episcopal Diocese of Central Pennsylvania:

Grace and Peace in the name of Jesus.

I write to you to convey my greetings as I begin work in our diocesan offices and to share with you the joy of the work of our General Convention in Salt Lake City, Utah, held in these past two weeks. At Convention I was welcomed into the House of Bishops and have witnessed the workings of both the House of Bishops and the House of Deputies in their striving to be faithful to the Gospel.

The work has been broad and deep and I know that in the weeks and months to come, our deputation will share the fullness of the Convention's deliberations. In this letter, I want to highlight two significant accomplishments on the part of our Church.

On Saturday, June 27, 2015 we elected The Rt. Rev. Michael B. Curry, Bishop of North Carolina, to be the 27th Presiding Bishop of The Episcopal Church. Presiding Bishop-elect Curry is the first African American to be elected to this role in our history. He is a gifted preacher and is passionate about evangelism and social witness. Commenting on his election and the future, Bishop Curry said, "Our work is actually the work of participating in the Jesus movement, which seeks to realize God's dream and seeks to accomplish God's mission in this world."

Bishop Curry will take office on November 1, 2015 following his consecration at the National Cathedral. He will succeed The Most Reverend Katharine Jefferts Schori, who has served as Presiding Bishop for the past 9 years. I look forward to Bishop Curry's spiritual leadership of the Church. I believe that the focus that he brings on our participation in God's mission as followers of Jesus is key to our vitality.

On Wednesday, July 1, 2015, the Convention passed two resolutions making canonical and liturgical changes to provide marriage equality for Episcopalians.

One of the resolutions changed the wording of the canon titled "Of the Solemnization of Holy Matrimony" to remove references to marriage as being between a man and a woman. The other resolution presented new liturgies to accommodate same-gender marriage in The Episcopal Church, including a revised version of the current liturgy in the *Book of Common Prayer* that

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uses gender-neutral language. These liturgies were approved for trial use in the next triennium in each diocese with the permission of the Bishop Diocesan. The resolution also allows priests who find it not morally consonant with their own beliefs to decline their participation in these rites. At the same time, the Bishop will be bound to make these liturgies accessible to all couples who desire them. These deliberations were carried out with a great measure of prayerfulness and respect for those in each House with dissenting opinions. The grace of God carried the day in allowing these changes to come about and for God's unending measure of inclusivity and love to prevail. I look forward to meeting with the clergy of our diocese for conversation about these changes and to discuss them at our fall Convocation meetings, as well.

I am proud of our Church and the way that it has listened closely for the Spirit of God to direct us. I am heartened by our willingness to be bold in the name of Love. And I look forward with eager anticipation to the good work that we will do together, in the name of Jesus.

Glory to God whose power working in us can do more than we can ask or imagine: Glory to him from generation to generation in the Church, and in Christ Jesus for ever and ever. (Ephesians 3:20, 21)

SafeChurch Moving Forward To Enhance Our Culture of Safety

Early this year, St. John's signed a covenant with the Samaritan Counseling Center's SafeChurch program to work toward creating a parish culture that understands the perils of child sexual assault, has the knowledge to discuss it openly and honestly, and puts in place a policy, procedures and conversations that help us create the safest environment possible for children in our care.

The policy is only the foundation, the outline, for the broader work that we will do as a parish to create a safe environment for children in our care. At the end of this calendar year, the SafeChurch Committee will turn over the reins to a new committee called the Child Protection Committee (CPC). The CPC will be charged with ongoing parish education and continuing to enhance the culture of child safety at St. John's. The committee will include representatives from St. John's ministries that work with children, vestry members and other interested church members.

One aspect of the broad SafeChurch program is to ensure all volunteers who work with children and teens at St. John's have background clearances by the end of this calendar year. There will be someone at the SafeChurch table in the Parish Hall every Sunday between services to help with clearances and to answer any questions you may have.

Here are some important SafeChurch dates:

August 17 ô Vestry will be given the draft SafeChurch policy for discussion and review.

October 10 ô The Samaritan Counseling Center will hold a retreat for survivors of childhood sexual abuse. Survivors from St. John's are invited to attend. For more information, please visit the SafeChurch table in the parish hall.

October 11 ô A Samaritan representative will make a SafeChurch presentation in the Parish Hall from 9 a.m. to 10 a.m. between services.

November 14 ô A large SafeChurch training session will be held for church staff and volunteers. All are encouraged to attend. Details coming soon.

With all of us working together, we are strengthening our parish family ô at church, and in our everyday lives.

SENIOR WARDEN

In the heat we are currently experiencing, it is hard to believe that Back-to-School ads featuring fall clothes and supplies are on television. It seems to have had the desired effect. I was in a store last evening where the people in line around me had binders, notebooks, pencils and backpacks as part of their purchases.

We here at St. John need to do a bit of early advertising. Vestry is an active and vibrant group of parishioners, who are diverse as individuals, but work as group for the common purpose in the leadership and guidance of St. John. Each brings their own personalities and talents. Each year several seats become available due to the conclusion of the terms of a portion of vestry members. (Once a vestry term is fulfilled, that person must take a minimum of a year away prior to seeking election to Vestry again.). Each Vestry member represents a ministry in the church and acts as a liaison to that ministry or serves as Junior or Senior Warden. You can find these ministries listed by the names of the current Vestry members in several locations, including the weekly bulletin.

VESTRY RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were passed at the Vestry meeting on: July 20, 2015

1. Assistant Priest ó Resolved, that the Vestry of St. John's Episcopal Church, Lancaster, PA affirms the call of The Rev. Dr. Barbara J. Seras as Assistant Priest at St. John's and supports the Ministry Covenant Agreement with The Rev. Dr. Barbara J. Seras striking section B2. Toni moved. Bob seconded. Motion passed.
2. Advisory Committee ó The Rector and Vestry share their thanksgivings with those on the Assistant Priest Advisory Committee: Sue Heilman, Pam Loose, Karen DiPace, Mary Ellen Kilp; for their insightful interviewing and wise counseling, and congratulates them on their recommendations of The Rev. Dr. Barbara J. Seras, and discharges them with grateful appreciation. Bob called to question. Motion carried.
3. Floor Care ó At the request of the Property Committee, the Vestry authorizes the expenses of \$1,775.00 payable to Jan-Pro Cleaning Systems of Central Pa. from line item 01-5140, Building Repairs Expenses, for floor care. (This is regular maintenance on the floor in the All Purpose room. Sue Heilman called the question, and Bob Murphy seconded. Motion carried.
4. Vestry Position - It is resolved that Jennifer Hreben will be appointed to the open seat on Vestry. This appointment will last until the next election of Vestry, when she may be elected to fulfill the remaining time on the term of the seat left open. Sue called the question. Bob seconded. Motion carried.
5. Freon Leak ó Resolved that the Vestry of St. John's Episcopal Church, Lancaster PA affirms and approves the expensing of \$2612.00 to J & J Heating and Cooling of Lancaster PA for labor and materials to repair the Freon leak (additional freon needed to replenish the system will be an additional expense.) J & J quote reference is SR-191, line item 01-5140. *This resolution was tabled until next month to attempt to answer the questions.*



TREASURER'S REPORT

I am happy to report the addition of Gina Keiser to our financial staff. Gina comes to us with experience in ACS, the software package used to handle our finances. Gina also has experience in grant writing, which will be of value to us as we move forward in our capital campaign. Gina will continue to work part-time for St. John's York while she expands her work schedule to include us 2 days a week. Initially, Gina will be learning our procedures in order to be able to cover for Barb during vacations and other absences. Another assignment that Gina will be handling will be the implementation of ASC On-Demand. This new module will make access to information more readily available to everyone. Please join me as we welcome Gina to St. John's.

The last 2 months, I provided details in 2 different formats, pie charts and bar graphs. I was hoping to get some feedback as to which one better explained how we were doing. Unfortunately I received no comments on either presentation. So not knowing if these were better/worse/or same as just giving the numbers, I'm going back to just numbers.

We finished the first half of the year dead even between income and expenses. Pledged contributions are about \$4000 ahead of plan and non-pledged contributions are about \$4500 behind plan. Overall contributions from all sources are about \$3000 ahead. Jubilee income is about \$1000 ahead in spite of slower than expected grocery card sales. Our total income from all sources year-to-date is \$323,428.11. I am putting an asterisk (*) on this number which I will explain later.

Expense management is rapidly becoming one of St. John's strong points. Our total expenses through the end of the 2nd quarter were \$323,574.43. This is significantly below plan. What this implies is that we are only doing those things that are absolutely necessary. While it is not always the best strategy, it is one that allows us to maximize our financial resources.

You will notice that if we subtract the total expenses from the total income we get \$-146.32. Another way to say this is that we have broken even through the first half of the year. Now for the asterisk the income number includes the endowment earnings draws for the 3rd and 4th quarters. This amounts to \$23,420. It is very likely that we will need to make some additional draws in order to complete the year in the same position that we are now. I am confident that we will be able to minimize the additional amount and will end the year in the best position that we have ever been in.

Thanks for all that each of you do to support the ministries of St. John's.

It's been a HOT July!! This will be brief but the Property Committee has been very busy trying to anticipate the future needs of our precious buildings, including air conditioning. Please read the report that Bill Gross sends from the Property Committee meeting to the Messenger. July's Vestry meeting was busy with Property Committee resolutions for maintenance and repairs. These are similar to the everyday issues we all have to deal with at home and come down to how do we pay for what needs to be done. As the building ages, it only creates a greater need for maintenance. It's important to stay in front of that need to reduce our costs.

It is my privilege to be part of the future of St. John's.

We thank Drew Dorgan for her recent donation of two HP multi-function laser printers. One was placed on each floor to provide equal access to everyone in the office.

We are off to a busy start with summer. With all of the rain, the clearing of drains and downspouts is a high priority, while we maintain dehumidification and mold prevention. New strainer screens had to be replaced as they were trapping everything coming down the spouts, resulting in clogging. The idea is to trap those materials, which may clog the underground, while permitting finer materials to flow through our system. We upgraded to a heavier 1/2" versus lighter 1/4" mesh to allow better flow and prevent the screen from entering and clogging the underground pipe. We continue to monitor this situation. We will be replacing the passage spout, which has deteriorated, causing some leaking.

Considerable time has been spent on a sanctuary screen concept. The main benefit of the concept has the screen concealed behind the dorsal. We welcome feedback, suggestions or other ideas to fulfill this need. We had been receiving complaints about the cumbersome and less aesthetic means, using the ropes and clips, which still required the screen to be rolled down and up.

Also, much time has been spent drafting our long range planning agenda for predictive maintenance purposes. This plan will be very important moving forward as more and more of routine maintenance items such as pointing, windows, roofs, and walking surfaces are not receiving adequate budget allotments to maintain their condition. Currently, 50% (roughly \$60K) of the Property Ministries budget is handling repairs and maintenance. This creates a very difficult/challenging task for the Property Manager. Our priorities are constantly changing, meaning we are still putting out fires. After awhile though, there isn't any water left to put out the fires. If we are able to plan out some of these medium to high cost maintenance items, monies can be set aside and earmarked for a specific item(s) in need of replacement or refurbishing. We estimate having over \$30K of pointing that needs to be done before winter. If we only allot \$5K per year to replace our mortar, we find ourselves in a position where we'd never be able to thwart the added damage that will occur due to wet/dry and thawing/freezing weather conditions.

We recently had our stained glass evaluated by Willet Hauser Architectural Glass. There are two major points coming out of this report. First, how do we plan for window maintenance? The evaluation recommended roughly \$10K of repairs on each side of the Nave, not including the clerestory. And, a historical restoration needed on the breezeway window, the one originally over the altar. Second, how do we protect our investment via insurance? This appraisal came in over \$1.1M. Our insurance limit on Fine Arts is \$1M. The committee was asked and provided recommendations to our Finance Committee, so that they would proceed with obtaining the adequate coverage.

PROPERTY CORNER (CONTINUED)

A resolution was presented and accepted for Jan-Pro to perform floor stripping/refinishing at \$1,775 for the lower level of the Parish House after Vacation Bible School. This proposal includes multiple applications on the All Purpose Room floor due to its heavy wear from use.

A presentation was also made for the repair of a Freon leak of our cooling system. With the many dollars that have been spent on Freon and the environmental impact of this gas going to atmosphere, there exists a significant need for the leak to be repaired for \$3,000. Plans call for the repair to be made after our cooling season to help prevent interruption and reduce the amount of Freon release.

As you can see, the work of your property committee has a significant impact on the many ministries here at St. John's. Feel free to join us at 7 p.m., the first Monday of every month in the Becker House.

Before we know it September will be here and we will have an updated Calendar for the fall events.

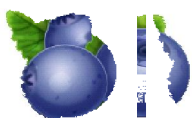

MDG UPDATE

As we enter the dog days of summer, the MDG committee continues our research and questioning who, where, what and how we at St. John's will build a global partnership. Our goals are to recommend a partnership that will be inspiring to all, provide for building interpersonal relationships, as well as having a fundraising component.

The organizations being considered are: World Bicycle Relief, Rafiki Africa and Echo. The questions we determined that needed to be answered by our organizations are:

- What would be the involvement between us and them, what personal interaction with those who benefit from the partnership?
- What involvement is there for young people?
- What involvement is there for adults?
- What would they expect from us financially to make a partnership worthwhile?
- Tell us what specifically our money will go for? How are we really helping?

We did meet on 6/23/15 with Dorothy Dulo regarding Rafiki Africa. We learned a great deal about the organization and that much more than education for k-12 is provided the Luo Community in Western Kenya. We hope to meet soon with and/or obtain information and answers for World Bicycle relief and Echo as well. We will keep you updated as we progress.

In the meantime, there are two items we wanted to share. Rafiki has a special opportunity to raise \$20,000 by August 5th, 2015 to be matched at a ratio of 2:1. Also, you may remember last year the MDG began presenting local opportunities that serve to create and maintain partnerships. We began with an annual event held in September called the Pedal Harder Ride. The Pedal Harder Ride began as a casual friends and family ride in 2010 to remember Glen Lapp and his love of the open road. Glen was a passionate cyclist and had a love for all physical pursuits. Glen was one of 10 volunteer aid workers killed in Afghanistan in 2010. The 6th annual ride will be held on 9/12/15. Again there will be an opportunity for a 60, 25 and 10 mile ride. Also, there is the option for a 5k walk. After the event there will be opportunity for Rehydration + Refueling + Remembering at Tellus360. For more information and registration please visit www.pedalharderride.com. This year, all funds raised through the Ride will be sent on to Nepal for earthquake relief.

FANTASY ISLAND

But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth. Acts 1:8

Last night, while I was watching TV, I came across a show from my past, Fantasy Island. I am sure you all remember Fantasy Island, Ricardo Montalban (Mr. Roark) and Herve Villechaize (Tattoo), yelling, "De plane, de plane!" I started to wonder what I would do if I could be on Fantasy Island. After all, who doesn't want to go to Fantasy Island once in a while? Would I spend my weekend living out a childhood fantasy or meeting someone famous from the past, or would I do what Jesus suggested to the Apostles in Mark 6:31 and just spend my time resting. I realized if I really wanted a chance at Fantasy Island, I have to start to do is to use my time more wisely!

While reading the book "Evangelism isí" by the Rev. Clinton M. Marsh (the United Presbyterian Church), I learned how to look for simple ways to fulfill the difficult task of evangelism. The first rule is always remember if the project is Jesus Christ focused and the Holy Spirit driven, it's evangelism. There's no need to be embarrassed by this; it's something we should all start to embrace. Or, better yet, we can start calling ourselves, Crazy Christians. PB Elect Michael Curry said, "We need some crazy Christians. Sane, sanitized Christianity is killing us. That may have worked once upon a time, but it won't carry the Gospel anymore. We need some crazy Christians like Mary Magdalene and Harriet Beecher Stowe. Christians crazy enough to believe that God is real and that Jesus lives. Crazy enough to follow the radical way of the Gospel." And the easiest way to become a Crazy Christian is by using Evangelism wisely.

The Rev. Marsh said, "Evangelism is faith in action." I believe this to be especially true of St. John's, a Jubilee parish. Our evangelism is in our Jubilee ministries, our Sunday school classes, and our youth programs. August is the perfect time for all of us to start planning for the fall. Because we all have outside lives, and a million things to do, we often wait until the last minute to do things related to our particular ministries. Now is the perfect time to start to mark our calendars with specific routines, be it daily, weekly or monthly, so we can achieve success with our ministries. (It's also good to remember things change and not to get too frustrated and/or disappointed, when they do.) Now is a perfect time to start asking other people, not involved in your ministry, to join it. Now is a perfect time to ask other people for their feedback and ideas regarding your ministry. And now is the perfect time to start praying for guidance.
