GROUNDED IN GRATITUDE

St. John's Pledge Drive and Capital Campaign

Gratitude Sunday, October 18th will be the official õkick offö of our 2015 Pledge Drive and Capital Campaign. In the weeks that follow we celebrate our ministries, grow more deeply in prayer, and explore the meaning of faith and sacrifice as we prepare to make our pledges of commitment to support the mission of our church in the coming year and the years to come. Where we begin, however, is with gratitude to God.

The goal of our pledge drive and capital campaign is NOT to raise money. The goal is to change hearts and lives. Our gifts and pledges will go to sustain our parish ministries for 2016 and the mission of our church in Lancaster for generations to come. But our focus is on people, not mortar and bricks. What God wants is not dollars and cents. What God asks of us is to give our thanks and praise.

To be a steward of Christ means that we live our lives grounded in gratitude. That is the primary stewardship principle - thanksgiving. Thanksgiving lies at the heart of everything we do when we follow Jesus. That is why our Sunday worship, our celebration of the sacrament of the Holy Communion, is also called the Eucharist which is the ancient Greek word which means *to give thanks*, and the core prayer of our worship is called the Great Thanksgiving. The first thing God calls us to do on the first day of the week is to first give God praise and thanks.

On Gratitude Sunday we will see samples of thanksgiving and witness some of the abundance of what God has given us. At both the 8:00 AM and 10:15 AM services members of St. Johnøs will share using õgratitude cardsö how their lives have been touched and changed by God through our community at St. Johnøs Church. In these tiny tributes of personal testimony we will see clearly why we give thanks to God for having St. Johnøs as our spiritual home.

The following Sunday, October 25th, our attitude of gratitude will shift from the personal to the shared as we give thanks to God for the many ministries at St. Johnøs. Our Ministry Celebration Sunday will be a joyful reminder of how through our combined efforts as a church St. Johnøs is lifting up the lives of our neighbors in need, locally and globally. As thanksgiving is the first principle of stewardship, the first practice of stewardship is when our gratitude overflows in gladness of self giving ministry.

The true spirit of gratitude is not limited to the present. True gratitude reaches back to the past and extends forward to the future. Everything we have today we received from those who went before. Everything we have today will one day be bequeathed to those who are to come. *Honoring our Past...Welcoming our Future*, the theme of our pledge drive and capital campaign, captures for us the fullness of our gratitude as stewards of Jesus Christ.

It is into this depth and breadth of thanksgiving that I invite your participation. While I hope you will respond generously to our appeal, what I pray for is for you to grow spiritually and faithfully grounded in gratitude of Godøs abundant and limitless love for you.

On the Road to the Washington National Cathedral . . .

The National Cathedral in Washington DC is an amazing place! It is a destination site for pilgrims, visitors and tourists who come to the Nation Capital. Tens of thousands come to the Cathedral every year.

The Cathedral hosts the Acolyte Festival every year about this time. And this October 10th several of our acolytes and adults will join others in our Lancaster Convocation for the event. We will travel together by bus giving us a time to meet acolytes from the Lancaster region churches. Our acolytes will vest and process as part of the Holy Eucharist. They will attend workshops, tour the Cathedral with a special tour by Father Casey of the Cathedral Gargoyles.

Established as a õHouse of Prayer for All People,ö the Cathedral is the place where Americans come for a time of prayer and worship in some of the brightest and darkest times of our history. It is a reminder that we Americans are called today as throughout our national history to be united as a people of faith and prayer.

The Cathedral is an integral part of our Nations life and history as well as the life and tradition of our Episcopal Church. And that for me is awesome.

The Cathedral is also an Episcopal parish: the Church of Saint Peter and Saint Paul. It is the seat of the Bishop of Washington AND the Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church. The Rt. Reverend Michael Curry will be installed and seated there as the 27th Presiding Bishop in November.

The Cathedral is located on Mount Saint Alban, over 50 acres and the highest point in Washington D.C. The Cathedral is almost the length of two football fields with two huge towers, a carillon with 53 bells and 112 gargoyles, including Darth Vader. Inside, there are more than 1500 separate pieces of needlepoint, 10,650 pipes in the great organ, and a stained glass window with a piece of moon rock.

For in the 1790%, when the Capital City was designed, land was set aside for a "great church for national purposes." And later, Congress gave the Episcopal Cathedral Foundation a charter from Congress to õestablish and maintain within the District of Columbia a cathedral and institutions of learning for the promotion of religion and education and charity." And construction started on September 29, 1907, by President Theodore Roosevelt was completed 83 years later to the day when the "final finial" was placed on September 29, 1990 by President George H. W. Bush.

I am excited about going to the Cathedral, about traveling together, having time to worship and pray with acolytes from across the Church and nation, and experience the unique beauty of our Washington National Cathedral.

It will be the first for some of us to the Cathedral and what I hope will be one of many for us all!

SAFE CHURCH



Why Participate in SafeChurch? And, What Events Are Next ...

A few people have asked: õWhy is St. Johnøs participating in the SafeChurch program?ö The short answer is: St. Johnøs has committed to creating an environment that is safe for children, that empowers children to speak up when something does not seems right, and that gives adults the knowledge to help a child in need ô within the walls of our church and beyond. Together, we create a safer parish and a safer world.

Moving forward, here are two important SafeChurch dates:

On Sunday, October 11 at 9 a.m. in the Parish Hall, a Samaritan Counseling Center SafeChurch representative will offer an educational session on õgroomingö behavior, which is the very calculated process that perpetrators use to identify and õgroomö potential victims long before sexual assault takes place. Grooming entails befriending the child and befriending his or her parents or guardians to gain their trust, which then makes it more likely that the offender can get away with the crime. We encourage all adults in the congregation to attend this educational session. The information you learn may help you help a young family member, friend, neighbor or a child in St. Johnøs care. Volunteers who work with children should definitely plan to attend.

PLEASE NOTE: This information may be triggering for survivors. This information will not be discussed during the church services, but will be discussed in an honest way during the educational session from 9 to 10 a.m. ALSO, all children and teens will be in a session together in another area of the church. They will not be at the educational session.

PLEASE SAVE THE DATE: On Saturday, November 14 from 8:15 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., the Samaritan Counseling Center SafeChurch organization will offer a training at Highland Presbyterian Church, and our staff and volunteers who work with children are encouraged to attend. The information will include identifying signs of child sexual abuse, reviewing clearance information, and ô this is important ô learning how to report a suspected case of abuse. By law, volunteers who work with children are mandated reporters. This training will cover a person responsibilities as a mandated reporter. There is a sign-up sheet for this training on the bulletin board in the Parish Hall.

These programs are intended to educate us as a parish so we can work together to keep our children safe and to build a culture that lifts up and empowers everyone in our parish family. Please plan to attend both programs!

VESTRY RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were passed at the Vestry meeting on: September 21, 2015

- 1. <u>Capital Campaign Funding</u> ó Resolved, upon the suggestion of the Capital Campaign Committee and with agreement by the Finance Committee, the Vestry approves the direction of \$100,000 from the Dr. Joseph and Nancy Eckenrode estate bequest and \$50,000 from the Nelson and Peggy Craige estate bequest to be used for the Capital Campaign. With this action the Vestry acknowledges the gracious gifts from these estates and affirms the desires of these faithful parishioners to act in support of the goals of this campaign. *This resolution comes from the Executive Committee. Sue Heilman called the question, the motion carried.*
- 2. <u>J2A Fundraisers</u> ó Resolved, that the St. Johnøs Vestry approves the following J2A fundraisers for 2015-16: Advent Wreath and Roping Sale (November 1-December 6, 2015), Scrap booking event- February 26 -27, 2016; Shrove Tuesday Dinner -February 9, 2016; Blueberry or Strawberry Festival ó summer 2016; Auction/dinner/talent show March 12, 2016; Mini Golf May 1, 2016; Chocolate Easter Egg Sale ó February 1- April 1, 2016; Sandwich sales (Sept, Oct, Nov, Jan, Feb, March, April, May). *This resolution came from J2A through the Executive Committee. Sue Heilman called the question. The motion carried.*
- 3. Extra Draw ó Resolved, at the recommendation the Treasurer and agreement by the Finance Steward, the Vestry approves the taking of up to two additional draws of \$11,710 from the Unrestricted Endowment Investment Account. The Vestry approves this action in in order that St. John's will be in good standing with all financial obligations. This resolution comes from the Executive committee. After a recommendation from the Finance steward to increase the resolution to two draws, there was a lengthy discussion. Bruce Waskowicz called the question. The motion carried.
- 4. Lancaster City Whereas, in 2013 St. Johnøs Episcopal Church began a dialogue with Lancaster city officials regarding storm water management on our Mulberry Street parking lot; and Whereas, in 2013 St. Johnøs retained the services of MM Architects and RGS Associates to develop plans to remediate the surface areas on Mulberry Street; and Whereas, since 2014 St. Johnøs has been in dialogue with Lancaster city officials regarding proposed city improvements to Mulberry Street; and Whereas, St. Johnøs is presently in a capital campaign to raise the funds necessary to correct our hardscape on Mulberry Street; and Whereas, St. Johnøs received from the Lancaster City Bureau of Engineering correspondence dated August 12, 2015 citing property deficiencies on Mulberry Street and specifying all corrective work to be completed no later than November 30, 2015; Be it resolved, that the Vestry of St. Johnøs Episcopal Church, Lancaster, respectfully asks the Lancaster City Engineer to extend the date of completion and to incorporate all corrective work with the storm water management plan. This resolution comes from the Executive Committee. Sue Heilman called the question, the motion carried.

TREASURER'S REPORT

We are through the summer and I can report that we have been able to keep up with most of our bills. That is the good news. The not so good news is that we had to take our 4th quarter draw from the investment earnings along with 2 additional draws in order to pay all of the critical bills. Unfortunately, this means that we have fallen behind, again, on our Fairshare pledge. We were expecting a õbounceö in contributions with the restart of Sunday school and the return from õchurch summer vacationö. Unfortunately, this did not occur. In an effort to catch-up the Vestry has authorized 2 additional draws to be taken at my discretion. I thank the Vestry for this action primarily because it will help us avoid õEmergency Requestsö.

The current cash flow statement showing expenses and revenue is posted on the bulletin board in the Parish Hall. You will note that our pledge income continues to be ahead of budget. This is due to 2 things. First, several members paid their entire pledge at the beginning of the year. This is very helpful in that it relieves considerable pressure during the winter when high energy bills and snow removal are encountered. The second reason is that we received several pledges after the budget was set. The budget was not adjusted for these pledges as a buffer against the normal shrinkage encountered by people leaving or not being able to fully meet their pledges.

Expenses continue to be maintained exceptionally well. All ministries are within reasonable tolerance of their budgets. We are grateful to all of the various ministries leadership for efforts to be faithful stewards of all of our resources.

Thanks to everyone that has endeavored to keep current with their pledges. As always, I encourage you to contact any member of the Vestry, Finance Committee, or myself concerning any questions or concerns that you may have.

PROPERTY CORNER

Upon having two resolutions passing Vestry last month, we had the Freon leak repaired and the first phase of the pointing finished two weeks ago. Both of these repairs were below their anticipated costs. A+ Masonry shall be returning the first week of November to work on the second phase of pointing, which includes the rental and church buildings. In addition, time has been spent restoring the insulation on the coolant lines to prevent loss and condensate damage, especially in the organ blower room. The adhesive was found to be failing with insulation in the compressor stockade, while insulation was missing in the blower room.

Also the lower level floors of the Parish House were stripped and refinished. We thank everyone for their patience with having the finish cure, as it took longer due to the loose tiles in the Sunday School area. It is believed this situation was caused by water damage in this area. After completion, it was determined that the finish had trapped some debris in several areas, requiring the company to come back and refinish these areas.

Considerable time since our last meeting has been spent creating a new lease agreement for our rental properties and a 2016 Property Budget proposal. Deb Smith spent considerable time with the planning and budget preparation, for which we are extremely appreciative. Both sets of drafts are going through their review and comment phase. The budget addresses most, if not all of the Immediate Attention items in our Long-Range Maintenance Plan.

You may recall the impetus of generating new lease documents was to increase our rental income, which was last increased in 2011 and to provide an understanding of improved access for inspections. Also, appliance repair and utilities responsibility are also hoped for a competitive nature. These lease documents include an <u>Application for Lease</u>, which was intended to lay all of our cards onto the table with future tenants. With getting this information to them in the early stages, much time could be saved in the lessee qualification process. The lease documents need to be presented to our tenants at least two months prior to their taking affect, which is why we are working on them now to take affect in January 2016.

A letter from the City of Lancaster was received regarding the Mulberry Street Project. In it, they provide a deadline of November 30, 2015 for having the brick sidewalk leveled, tree boxes constructed and the parking lot apron replaced. We are soliciting quotes for our sidewalk brickwork, including a membrane where the Mulberry Street sidewalk meets the church building. This control, along with the improved pitch and poly-sand topping should significantly reduce rainwater penetrating our foundation here. We are still awaiting numbers while they obtain the scope of tree root work required from the city arborist. Concern was shared regarding our work being demolished by the Cityøs work, particularly as it applies to a rain garden at the corner of W. Chestnut and Mulberry Streets. Review of plans sent to Penn DOT for approval revealed that everything the city is doing is from the curb out, while everything they are requiring of us is inside the curb and on our property. Fortunately, some of the work the city was requiring was already completed with the sewer lateral work last year.

Just a reminder that our Fall Clean-up is scheduled for Saturday December 12th at 9 a.m. We hope to see everyone as we prepare the church for the celebration of Christøs birth. Your Property Committee is one of the few committees whose work impacts St. Johnøs many ministries. Please join us at 7 p.m. on the first Monday of every month in the Becker House if you would like to join us.

The Temples: as Solomon and Jesus Knew Them

The Rev. Canon Mark Scheneman, Priest-In-Charge of Bangor Church, Churchtown and retired Rector of St. Johnøs, Carlisle, will present a program on the construction and worship at the great Temples in Jerusalem. õThe Temples: as Solomon and Jesus Knew Themö will feature over 60 slides with current photos of Temple Mount today, as well as maps and artistic recreations of how the Temples looked. The program will also delve into the construction methods and cultic temple worship, using both biblical and archeological resources. Fr. Mark just returned in the spring from his 6th trip to Israel. In 1995, he served while on sabbatical as Chaplain of St. Georgeøs Anglican College in Jerusalem. Fr. Mark is on the faculty of the Stevenson Diocesan School, teaching history courses. He is also a colonial re-enactor and bagpiper. He holds Masters degrees from the General Theological Seminary and Temple University, and a Doctor of Ministry from the Eastern Baptist Theological Seminary in Philadelphia.

About Bangor Episocopal Church



Welsh settlers founded Bangor Episcopal Church in 1722 as one of the first Church of England congregations in the colonies and named it for Bangor Cathedral in Caernarvonshire, Wales. The settlers had come to the area to work in the area@s iron industry.

The original log church was constructed in 1734 and replaced by a stone structure in 1756. The current building dates to 1830. Its ornate belfry was added about half a century later and was restored in 2009. Services are held each Sunday at 10:00 a.m.

DIOCESAN CONVENTION 2015

Jesus said to them, :The light is with you for a little longer. Walk while you have the light, so that the darkness may not overtake you. John 12-35

This year's convention will be in Altoona, PA, October 16-17. Along with Fr. John and Mother Barbara, the following church members will be attending as delegates: Debbie Carter, David Kilp, Fran Gouveia, Charlotte Weaver-Gelzer and Sue Heilman. Bob Kilp and I will be attending as sub delegates. After last month's Convocation meeting, Sue Heilman and I wanted to let you know the items up for discussion.

Resolution 1: Engage with the Church and the Community

- 1. Create and share a clear message of their Churchøs mission and work that will help all members of the broader community to know who the parish is and what it offers as a community of faith;
- 2. Develop a plan of financial stability that will enhance the use of, and help sustain, the property and buildings of the parish as a witness of the presence and compassion of Christ in the community; and
- 3. Partner with other institutions and individuals of the community in furthering programs and relationships that enhance compassion, justice and the respect of the dignity of every member of the community, as we seek and serve Christ in all creation.

Basically what St. Johnøs does as a Jubilee ministry center.

Resolution 2: Care of Godøs Creation

- 1. Each parish in the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania be encouraged to study the health of its local watershed and how each member of the community can become better stewards of the watershed;
- 2. Each parish be encouraged to partner with other institutions in its community in specific efforts of environmental education and actions that will improve the stewardship of the Chesapeake Bay and all of Godøs Creation.

In other words, let keep the Susquehanna and Potomac Rivers clean. No fracking.

Resolution 3: Stewardship of Godøs Creation

Each parish of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania be encouraged to help sponsor and have its members participate in õEnergy Efficiency Education and Workshopsö, striving to teach members of the parishøs broader community how to have more energy-efficient buildings and lifestyles that will help us all be better stewards of Godøs Creation.

In the future, there will be teaching classes to talk about appreciative inquiry and Jubilee ministries.

Resolution 4: Committee on Social Justice and Equity

1. The formation of a committee called The Committee on Social Justice and Equity, bringing together established groups and persons from our Diocese involved in anti-racism work, prison ministry, criminal justice system issues, domestic violence, human trafficking, child abuse, and other social justice ministries.

DIOCESAN CONVENTION 2015 (CONTINUED)

- 2. This Committee be charged with gathering data and information for diocesan wide dissemination and providing leadership to the Diocese by assisting parishes and convocations in their work on these matters, helping to provide appropriate training, being a clearing house of information, helping to coordinate efforts among parishes and/or convocations.
- St. Johnøs is currently working on one of these issues as we start to become a Safe Church. It wouldnøt be a bad idea to think about starting Jubilee ministries that work on the other subjects listed.

Resolution 5: Quality Education for All

- 1. Take Christ into our neighborhoods by endorsing church-school partnerships as a way to address education inequity in our Commonwealth
- 2. Explore possible partnerships with other Pennsylvania dioceses to request the õAll Our Children National and State Networkö, Boston, Massachusetts, to convene, before October 2017, a symposium on alleviating child poverty through church/school partnerships in public education.
- St. Johnøs does excellent work with school-aged children through Eagleøs Nest, Angel Tree and the Martin Luther King Jr. Celebration.

Resolution 6: Using Education Policy and Community Dialogue to Respond to All Forms of Racial Injustice

- 1. The Diocesan Task force on Eliminating Racism be tasked with developing activities to be used by congregations, convocations, youth groups and at Diocesan-wide events to engage one another and to educate our Diocese on the issues involved in all forms of racial injustice
- 2. A call upon our Diocese and individuals and congregations within our Diocese to find productive ways to respond to racial injustice, strengthened by the Gospel, our Baptismal Covenant and the Five Marks of Mission, recognizing that many Episcopalians find it challenging to understand or know how to respond to 21st century institutional racism that occurs in our churches, in our communities and in our culture.
- 3. The Diocesan Task Force on Eliminating Racism be tasked with collecting stories from congregations, convocations and individuals on what has been and what is being done to combat racism in our communities.
- 4. Urges congregations, convocations and individuals to develop ways for listening to the diversity of our neighbors in order to develop reconciling relationships through (a) listening campaigns, (b) developing partnerships with other churches and organizations to collaborate in best ways to eliminate racism in all its forms, (c) facilitating neighborhood prayer walks and (d) developing õstorytellingö and õspeak outö events, designed to facilitate action and healing.

Please remember St. Johnøs is in a predominately Black and Latino neighborhood. These resolutions speak to St. Johnøs and the actions we can take to be friendlier with the people in our area.

Resolution 7: Abolish the Death Penalty in Pennsylvania

- 1. Call upon Governor Tom Wolf to continue the death penalty moratorium he has placed in effect and to introduce and support legislation to eliminate the death penalty in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
- 2. This resolution and GC Resolution D025 be forwarded to Gov. Wolf and to governors in all states where the death penalty is still legal, encouraging them to submit and support legislation in their respective states to abolish the death penalty.

DIOCESAN CONVENTION 2015 (CONTINUED)

This resolution is a perfect way to let Governor Wolf and our State Representatives know you dongt support it either. They all have a Facebook or a Tweeter page were you can let them know your thoughts.

Resolution 8: Safe Environment (Alcohol Policy)

- 1. Requests that the Bishop Diocesan appoint a Task Force on Alcohol and Substance Abuse to study General Convention Resolution A158, entitled "Substance Abuse, Addiction and Recovery", to discern how this resolution impacts the parishes and organizations of our Diocese.
- 2. Assure that all Episcopal Churches in this Diocese provide a safe, welcoming environment for all people in recovery.

As a Jubilee ministry church which has opened our doors to AA, NA, and VA meeting groups, this may be the perfect opportunity to ask members if they or their families have anything theyød like to share with us.

REFLECTIONS FROM DAVID DISSINGER

Father John Morrisø concluding paragraph to his article in the July õMessengerö states:

"Worship is not about rubrics and rules. Worship is about being gathered in God's presence to recall and celebrate who we are as God's people. When this is uppermost in our minds, it will be inmost in our hearts, and evident to all around us."

This mindset may be hard to maintain for those of us who worship within the tradition-rich liturgy of the Episcopal Church, but it follows the teaching of Jesus. In the July 30 meditation of õForward Day By Dayö, the author writes, õJesus reminds those gathered that there is a problem when we worship rules, í when we forget that, the ÷whyøis so much more important than the ÷howø The writer goes on to say, õí confusing the importance of why and how makes it easy to separate ÷usøfrom ÷themø Once we do that, we feel righteous when we spew meanness and draw battle lines and lose the point entirely.ö

That is a pretty strong comment, but when we read the 7th chapter of the Gospel of Mark, when the Pharisees confront Jesus about his disciples eating food with õuncleanö hands, Jesus replies, õIsaiah was right when he prophesied about you hypocrites; as it is written: õThese people honor me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me. They worship me in vain; their teachings are but rules taught by men.ö Mark 7:6-8 NIV.

Jesus summarized, õYou have let go of the commands of God and are holding on to the traditions of men.ö Those words hit hard. Even though the Episcopal Church is a very accepting denomination when it comes to different lifestyles, when it comes to differences in worship styles, that is where we seem to have a problem. We love our traditions, but often our traditions are not Godøs traditions. Our love of traditional worship style and rules is wrong-headed when it focuses on rules and the resulting non-acceptance of others. We do not honor God when we do this.


