STEWARDSHIP of a Different Kind

By this time we should all be well aware that our 2015 Pledge Drive and Capital Campaign has begun. Over the past months we commissioned our Capital Campaign Committee members, held a Parish Mini-Meeting, and commissioned our Prayer Team who has reached out to every family in our parish. We celebrated Gratitude Sunday and began to õgrowö leaves on our Gratitude Tree. We shared personal testimonies on Ministry Celebration Sunday and have gathered in homes to listen to each others stewardship stories.

This is a very different kind of stewardship program from what we have seen in years past. Much of what our prior stewardship efforts have focused on our parishøs financial information and on building trust. Call it õStewardship 101ö.

People at St. Johnøs had a lot of questions about our budget and spending. Indeed, there was much to be confused about St. Johnøs finances. Our Treasurer, Steve Latshaw and the Finance Committee worked hard to make the numbers more transparent with powerpoint presentations at all our parish meetings. The vestry followed through on our commitment to make us compliant with GAAPP, generally accepted accounting principles and practices. Today, all our bookkeeping is CPA certified.

As a congregation we are much better informed about our financial ministry. As a parish we now have finances we can trust. Trust provides us the confidence to know all our gifts are used rightly. Trust allows us the courage to move forward in mission. Trust is the cornerstone of every congregation stewardship.

Having secured your trust, St. John¢s can now address the next level of stewardship education ó teaching biblical stewardship principles and encouraging personal stewardship practices. This is at the heart of our 2015 Pledge Drive and Capital Campaign.

Gratitude is the key stewardship principle taught to us in Holy Scripture. God, our Creator and Maker, is also the giver of all good gifts. Our faithful response to God is to give God thanks. Thanksgiving or Eucharist is the core of lives as faithful Christians. Everything we do as followers of Christ is motivated by what God in Christ has done for us.

Self giving in return is the corresponding stewardship practice. This giving of ourselves can take many different forms- ministries of service, offerings of prayer and praise, disciplines like pledging and tithing, sharing our stewardship stories in encouragement to others. All of these are expressions to God of our deep gratitude.

Our 2015 Pledge Drive and Capital Campaign is embedded with these stewardship principles and practices. I pray that you will experience the benefit of these in your personal journey of faith. I look forward to celebrating these stewardship principles and practices in our annual stewardship programs in the years to come as we explore this stewardship of a different kind.

St. Johnøs is back in full swing! And it is exciting to experience the lively worship and faithful ministry from Sunday services focusing on Education, Choirs and Ministries to the startup of Eagles Nest, J2A sandwich sales, youth activities and regular committee/ministry meetings. It is a first year for me already filled with good times and fond memories.

This past month, it has been particularly gratifying to watch and participate in the Communityøs preparation for the Capital Campaign. It is a historic time as the parish again focuses energy and resources, this time making St Johnøs facilities accessible to all by creating a church that is totally barrier free. And this November 6, 7 and 8 marks a special time as the Community takes pause to celebrate and to pray togetherí to give thanks for the Godøs blessings in years past and to seek Godøs guidance as St. Johnøs journeys into the future.

The preparations of the Prayer Team have been my focus. The Prayer Event, on Friday evening and Saturday morning, offers a unique worship experience at St Johnøs. Most importantly this prayer time together prepares our hearts as we move into the next stages of our work together. It is our time for each of us and all of us to ask: õLord, what do you want to do through me?ö Praying together makes all the difference.

The Prayer Event both days begins in the Parish Hall. A Prayer Team member will greet you and answer any questions you may have. Coming to the Parish Hall provides a time to transition from the cares and challenges of the day and enter into the sacred space of prayer. There will be a PowerPoint to explain more about the prayer activities available:

Five Prayer Vignettes - From the French word õvigneö, a prayer vignette is gathering of sacred art arranged to invite prayer. Prayer cards at each vignette invite focus and guidance. Gazing upon an image in the vignette, prayer deepens. Pray at one vignette or all five. The Vignettes are available throughout the Prayer Event.

Taize Worship – Taize comes from the ecumenical monastic community founded by Brother Roger in Taize, France. It is a unique worship service of repetitive singing of simple harmonized tunes, interspersed with readings, prayers and periods of silence. The Taize service will be offered Friday at 7 PM.

Labyrinth ó The labyrinth is a õwalking prayerö used as early as 1000 AD in Christianity. It is a model or metaphor of the Christian life of pilgrimage or journey with God. Labyrinths are in Chartres Cathedral, France and at Grace Cathedral, San Francisco or simply built in fields and meadows. Our labyrinth is available throughout the Prayer Event with a special Labyrinth Walk for Children on Saturday at 11 AM.

To experience all the offerings, requires a block of time. May the Good Lord open that time for you. But if for some unavoidable reason you cannot get to the Prayer Event, please remember the time wherever you are and join in the prayer.

May God Lord bless all our endeavors this weekend of Prayer and Celebrationí and always.

SAFE CHURCH



On Monday, October 19, the Vestry approved the SafeChurch policy, a document that was written over the past nine months by St. Johnøs SafeChurch Committee with guidance from the Samaritan Counseling Centerøs SafeChurch professionals and with input from ministries across St. Johnøs.

St. Johnøs has committed to creating an environment that is safe for children, that empowers children to speak up when something does not seems right, and that gives adults the knowledge to help a child in need ô within the walls of our church and beyond.

At St. Johnøs, our mission is to õGrow in God, Act in Service, Witness in Love.ö The policy notes that as the children and teens at St. Johnøs grow in God, we want to provide a safe church environment where they ô and their families ô feel loved, protected and empowered.

Children are a central part of our identity and mission at St. Johnøs. Each child and each person is created in the image of God and deserves care, respect and honor. As our children grow in body, mind and spirit, we have a responsibility as a parish to nourish them and protect them. We have a responsibility to ensure they grow and develop in a church environment that is safe and with a church family that empowers them to speak up when something does not seem right ô whether itøs at church or outside church.

This is just one aspect of the theology behind our SafeChurch work at St. Johnøs. We will highlight other aspects of the theology in other issues of The Messenger. The SafeChurch policy will be available to all parishioners. Thank you, one and all, for your commitment to furthering our culture of safety and empowerment.

Reminder: On Saturday, November 14 from 8:15 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., the Samaritan Counseling Center SafeChurch organization will offer a SafeChurch training at Highland Presbyterian Church. VESTRY RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were passed at the Vestry meeting on: October 19, 2015

- 1. <u>SafeChurch Policy</u> óResolved, that the Vestry of St. John Episcopal Church, Lancaster, Pa., accepts and approves as the policy statement for our parish the SafeChurch Policy as presented by the SafeChurch Committee on this date, October 19, 2015. This resolution comes from the Executive Committee. Vestry had a chance to review it from last month's meeting. Bill Gross had six points of question about the policy. Marylee Sauder recommended that the Vestry pass this resolution, and being a living document, these six points can be addressed at a later date. Pam Loose moved to accept the resolution. The motion carried.
- 2. <u>Annual Contract Review</u> ó Resolved, upon the advice of the Finance Committee, the Vestry directs that all annually recurring expenses, covered by a contractual agreement with a vendor, be reviewed on an annual basis for satisfactory performance of the vendor and the competitiveness of the current vendor¢s charges. The contracts should be opened for rebids on a regular interval not to exceed three (3) years in duration. This resolution comes from Finance Committee, vetted through the Executive Committee. There was a discussion about how much other work will be necessary to make this happen. It was mentioned that it could be delegated. Pam Loose called the question. The motion carried.
- 3. Extra Draw ó Resolved, at the recommendation of the Finance Committee, the Vestry approves the taking of an additional draw from the Unrestricted Endowment Investment Account to pay the outstanding Diocesan Fairshare pledge, the invoice for the pointing work by A+ Masonry, and the invoice for J&J Heating for the A/C repair. The amount to be drawn not to exceed \$22,000. This resolution comes from the Finance Committee. Sue Heilman called the question. The motion carried.
- 4. Rental Property Management & Resolved, in order to improve the investment return of our rental properties located at 209 and 211 North Concord Street, Lancaster, Pa., the Vestry approves the research of feasibility and options to hire a professional rental properties management firm to assist St. Johnøs Episcopal Church in this endeavor. Sue Heilman called the question. The motion carried.
- 5. <u>ACS On-Demand Installation</u> ó Resolved, the Vestry approves the movement of ACS database to õThe Cloudö at a cost of \$800 and the acquisition of the Access software at a cost of \$275.00 to be charged to line item 01-5108 Computer Systems Exp. *Father John moved that we approve this resolution. It was seconded by Leslie Morgan*. *Sue Heilman called the question. The motion carried.*
- 6. <u>Amos Martin Fund</u> ó Resolved, that \$1,350 be transferred from the Amos Martin Fund to the general fund to cover the Christmas Eve performance of the Lancaster Brass headed by Jerry Heilner. *Submitted by Minister of Music, Paul Reese. It was seconded by Leslie Morgan. Pam Loose called the question. The motion carried.*

TREASURER'S REPORT

As you may recall, last month I relayed to you the necessity of asking Vestry to authorize an additional draw on the investment earnings. Vestry responded by authorizing 2 such draws. The first was taken immediately in order to cover the next payroll and the second was held in the hope of sufficient contributions to cover pending bills. Historically, we have had a bounce in the contributions after the summer. This year there was no bounce. Consequently, we had to take the second authorized draw at the beginning of October to pay quarterly pension payments and a few other similar bills. Unfortunately, we fell further behind in our diocesan Fairshare among others. Upon the advice of the Finance Committee, a request was sent to Vestry to pay these invoices from the Endowment Fund. It is not something any of us wish to do, but it is necessary. Our day-to-day expenses are not out of line. However, to be good stewards of what we have requires us to spend money to maintain it. I encourage everyone to look at the posted reports. You will see that we are being \tilde{o} The Good Stewardö by investing in our ministries and infrastructure.

I would like to remind everyone that St. Johnøs has in excess of \$7 million in assets. Of that, nearly \$230,000 is available cash. We are not destitute. We are not on the brink of collapsing. We are a viable parish that continually takes on new projects. As Fr. John has reminded us, we are a flag ship parish in youth and outreach ministries. The upcoming building project will provide new ways to serve our community as well as each other.

I would like to close on a personal note. I have been honored to be the Treasurer for St. Johnøs for 8 years and have served on the Executive Committee for 10 years. After prayerful discernment, I have decided that it is time for me to step down. I have advised both the Vestry and Finance Committee that I will not be accepting reappointment to this position in February. The position of Treasurer has been a very fulfilling duty and I strongly encourage everyone to prayerfully consider submitting your name to the Finance Committee for consideration.

VESTRY CANDIDATES

PROPERTY CORNER

Due to unseasonably low temperatures, we had to switch to heat the first weekend in October. The boilers were fired up on Saturday, while water was left in the Parish House water line, in case we run into an Indian summer, requiring cooling. With some planning, we were able to get ahead of the rain by inspecting drains and downspouts. With the leaf fall starting early, many downspout strainers were found full of leaves. The courtyard drains were no exception, except that both of these were found 75-80% blocked with a cured plastic material, which had been poured into them. The staff and property committee reported no knowledge of anything being poured into them. However, it may have been excess floor finish from the floor refinishing of the lower level of the Parish House. This situation will be brought to the attention of Jan-Proß area supervisor.

It has been a year now since our curb on Concord Street has been damaged. After several calls to the city, Doug Lamb Construction and UGI, it may be time for us to cut our losses and arrange for the repair of the damage ourselves. Although UGI was accepting none of the responsibility for the damage, they had offered to make the repair, as a courtesy to the Church. Several months and phone calls later, the repair still hasnot been made. After considering the safety issues the curb presents, we will be making these repairs and sending the invoice to UGI for compensation.

Much time has been spent with both the Property and Finance committees preparing the Property Budget for the 2016 Annual Operating Budget. This year, any repair/maintenance items exceeding \$2,000 will be placed into a Capital Expense category for separate approval and funding by the Finance and Executive Committees prior to being approved by your Vestry in order to determine a funding source. The idea here is to produce a higher level of spending accountability, while balancing the budget.

A review of our rental properties was made on September 24th with Jeff Lefevre of Berkshire Hathaway to gain a perspective on rental and sales potential of both 209 and 211 N. Concord Street. The review was arranged by Janice Henry, with Deb Smith, Vestry Steward ó Property and Bill Gross, Property Manager attending. Jeff also reviewed our existing and proposed rental agreements. He acknowledged that we arenot able to meet our full potential in either of the markets due to the condition of the properties and that challenges exist, especially with our 211 tenant. Our review of 211 discovered a cat, while 209 had a running toilet, which was repaired the following day. At least one of our tenants will need to be removed in order to make the much needed repairs to these properties. There has been some discussion on a rental manager for these properties.

Your Property Committee is very excited about our Capital Improvement Project, scheduled for next year. Not only will the project address accessibility issues on our campus, it will also address some of our pressing needs regarding our courtyard deterioration and ground/storm water management, which continue to menace our property. Our September 21st request for extension for walkway improvements was approved by Rob Ruth, City Engineer by phone on Friday October 2nd. With the repaving projects scheduled on both streets, he asked if there would be any utility work performed as part of the improvement project. He also asks that we keep him abreast of timeframes, so as not to conflict with the cityøs construction efforts.

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PROPERTY CORNER (CONTINUED)

Fr. John reported on his meeting with Donald Main of Main ó Marotta Architects. He reported on the firmøs plans to have construction begin in the middle of 2016 and the need to form committees, one of which would be to monitor construction and meet during construction on a bi-weekly basis. Peter and Bill offered their services to this committee. Fr. John also shared with Mr. Main our concerns with the land development planning thus far, indicating our interests with the McSherry engineering firm. Fr. John also shared his concerns with the new roofline crossing the center of the rear stained glass window of the Church.

We hope you are able to join up for the Fall Clean-up on Saturday, December 12th as we prepare for the celebration of Christøs birth. We will start by 9 am and be finished at noon. We hope to see you then! St. Johnøs Property Committee is one of the few ministries that serve all of our Churchøs other ministries. Weød love to have you join us on the first Monday of every month at 7 pm in the Becker House. We hope to see you then, too!



MDG UPDATE

"Lord, what do you want to do through me?"

A favorite music CD of mine is by an artist John Michael Talbot. In one of his songs õSt. Theresaøs Prayerö, he sings about how Christ has no body now but ours, no hands or feet on this earth but ours. So, we are his bodyí . õOurs are the hands; ours are the feet to which he walks, to do goodö.

The question in italics above was in our bulletin this morning and Father John also, included it in his sermon. I am not sure who I should credit the question but, I hope they dongt mind my being so bold as to borrow it, for this MDG article. I still say MDG even though the correct and updated name is now **Sustainable Development Goals**. You have been hearing about these in previous articles, and in the published weekly and monthly õMDG Challengesö. The UN has established 17 sustainable goals that will build on the previous 8 Millennium Development Goals that we all worked so hard to try and reach. There is a new 15 year timeline to continue the work and build on it. Christ needs our bodies, hands and feet but, also our voices.

The below is a quote from the UN siteí . https://www.tes.com/worldslargestlesson/
õOn September 25th 2015, 193 world leaders committed to the Global Goals for Sustainable Development. There are 17 goals to achieve 3 extraordinary things in the next 15 years; End extreme poverty; Fight inequality and injustice; Fix climate change. If every school in the world teaches children about these goals, we will help them become the generation that changed the world."
Christ needs us to teach.

We have been reporting over the last few months on the homework the committee has undertook to be able to propose how we at St. Johnøs may Create a Global Partnership for development. The homework part has been challenging. It seems every time we gather to discuss or, hear new information, more questions are raised. What will this look like and are the potential partners willing? At the heart of this process is the word Partnership. According to Merriam-Webster, it is ofthe state of being a partner: PARTICIPATIONÖ. So going backwards, a partner is one associated in action with anotherö. Partner has many synonyms, ally, friend, teammate, and collaborator. Christ needs us to participate, to hold each other's hands and sometimes hold each other up.

Our focus has been on three organizations, Echo, World Bicycle Relief and Rafiki. There seems to be so much potential for collaboration, participation, teamwork and establishing friendships. We are inspired by the opportunities for young and old, to participate. We heard and saw on MDG Sunday a very enthusiastic speaker Michael Galbraith, who spoke to us about Echo and its programs to fight hunger. His message included information about research to master farming techniques and crops in various climates, õusing what you haveö philosophy, seed distribution and particularly the Moringa tree which not only provides wonderful nutrition *but*, *the seeds purify water*!

We have been in communication with World Bicycle Relief and we are aware they are operating in Western Kenya. We continue to explore the potential for partnering and are currently gathering information. In addition some of our committee members have recently met with Dorothy Dulo and her husband Roger, to talk about what a partnership would look like for Rafiki, in Alendu in Western Kenya. Christ needs our whole bodies and minds. He needs our voices to ask, what are the needs? He needs us to ask, where and how are our hands and feet need to do good? Christ needs our minds to learn and our voices to share.

Please watch and listen for our updates as we progress. Also, you may want to mark your calendars and save the date, December 12, 2015 for the Alternative Gift Fair at the Lancaster Farm and Home Center. And, if you are inspired or just want to be part of the conversation, consider joining us in this ministry of working with the world to improve the lives of all people. Our next MDG Committee meeting is scheduled for November 12th at 7pm in the Becker House. Please look for the MDG Challenges and consider how you may incorporate them into your daily lives. Oh, I miss being with you! Even if I canot get to a wider world than my apartment just yet, as an outcome of the capital campaign, I will eventually get to try St. Johnos new elevator, and find you - I, sporting my limited mobility and a soaring spirit.

Ok, *for my sake*, I want the good stuff of belonging, and of being of use. No apology. And not shying away, either, from realizing I\u03c3m made (I think all of us are made) to want that same good for others, for all.

Ah! So, with a little less reluctanceí I dabble in õWhat (this day? next? long term?) do You want to do through me, God? To do through us, through this crew called St. Johnøs?ö What Your answer might be? Hmmm. I canøt exactly know the ÷where,øor the ÷with whomøor the ÷howøbut I do know that the ÷whenø is now.
