HAPPY (and exciting) NEW YEAR

The year 2016 promises to be monumental for us at St. Johnøs Church. As the vestry spends the day together at their annual retreat developing our vision for the future, they will have much to prayerfully consider. Three on-going mission imperatives will certainly be on our list.

BUILDING PROGRAM ó Our ideal would be to begin construction this spring following Easter. Before that happens, there is much to be done. The Construction Committee working with our architects, Marriotta/Main, need to complete the design development stage of the project. This entails creating the detailed construction documents that will be used by the general contractor. Once these documents are completed, the Construction Committee will obid them outo to local contractors. Those interested in our project will then be interviewed by the Committee. Through this process the general contractor will be selected and the cost of project determined. With the cost in hand, a construction loan will need to be secured. This too will involve a bidding process with local banks. At the same time, we will need to seek diocesan approval to assume a commercial loan.

about the Millennium Development Goals, the vestry has accepted the MDG Committee® recommendation to establish a global mission partnership with Rafiki African Foundation and the Lighthouse Academy in Alendu, Kenya. Rafiki® founders, Roger Godfrey and Dorothy Dolu, own and operate the Rafiki food stand in Central Market. They use the proceeds from their business to fund the Lighthouse Academy in Dorothy® hometown. The MDG Committee selected Rafiki as our primary global mission partner because of our local connection and because the Academy® mission addresses many of the MDGs including education for women and girls, teaching sustainable farming practices, offering maternal and infant health care, and reducing poverty in the community.

SAFECHURCH ó Our vision for St. Johnøs in becoming a completely safe place for all children takes its next step in the formation of the Child Protection Committee (CPC). Co-Chaired by Marylee Sauder and Anne Carroll, the ministry of the CPC will be to oversee the implementation of the Child Protection Policy created by the SafeChurch Committee and approved by the vestry. The CPC will guide and oversee the certification process for all our staff and volunteers working with children, and serve as a clearinghouse for questions. They will also be consulted by the Construction Committee to ensure all new building is child safety appropriate.

These are by no means the only things that will be on the vestry mission horizon. Each of our ten ministry areas will be reviewed and re-imagined at the vestry retreat. SafeChurch, Global Mission Partnership, and Building Program are but three of our 2016 ministries which will make this year exciting and transformational for all of us at St. Johnøs.

Now, the memory of such ordinary times together brought a sweet feeling.

At Church, I joined the work crew in the back parking lot and began to clear the small plot of groundí trimming back the butterfly bush and weeding. It is the kind of work I love to do: digging into the good earth and the sense of simple accomplishment when the work is done.

Not long after I started, I literally tripped over a sizeable stone hidden from sight by all the underbrush. Full of mud and debris, it was a stone carving of the Holy Family! Mary and Joseph gazing lovingly at the ChristChild swaddled yet with arms outstretched.

It was a special discovery this Advent day as we prepared our Church for the Coming of Emmanuelí GOD with US! And indeed, Christ *is* always there waiting for us with arms reaching out. Yet, sometimes our busy lives obscure our vision; we loose sight and all but forget Christ dwelling with us always in all the activities and tasks and responsibility of our lives.

Perhaps, these twelve days of Christmas might just be the time to take pause, to reassess the focus and commitments of our lives, to clear away any spiritual underbrush that might obscure our focus of the great gift of Christmas: Christ With Usí dwelling in usí in all the ordinary times and special memories as well as all the every day tasks of our everyday lives. So that like Mary and Joseph, we too might keep our gaze lovingly on the Christ Childí all year long.

I washed the stone and placed it back in the garden asking a special prayer for blessing and joy and discovery. Perhaps you too might stop by and spend a moment. I really like that it is there...

Child Protection Committee "Safe" Conversations Will Continue In 2016

The St. Johnøs Child Protection Committee is beginning to take shape. The Samaritan Counseling Centerøs SafeChurch program recommended that the Rector appoint the committee chair. Father John Morris invited Anne Carroll and Marylee Sauder to co-chair the committee. Both accepted the co-chair positions.

The Child Protection Committee will be responsible for ensuring that the SafeChurch policy is a living, breathing document and that our parish is informed and knows how to support our children and each other. Once formed, the committee® initial tasks will include summarizing the policy to share with the congregation, working with church ministries to implement the policy, and identifying ways to provide ongoing education about how to keep children safe.

Ideally, the committee will include representatives from Church School, Journey to Adulthood (J2A), Eagles Nest, Martin Luther King Day, other St. Johnøs ministries that work with children, Property Committee, and interested parishioners. If youød like to learn more or you want to join the committee, please talk to Anne Carroll, Marylee Sauder or the clergy. They will meet after the holidays to develop a plan of action, then will reach out to ministry leaders and people who have expressed an interest in the committee.

Together, our St. Johnøs family will continue to enhance the safety of children in our church and in the community!

TREASURER'S REPORT

First, let me thank all who contributed to the annual pledge campaign as well as the capital campaign. The 2016 pledge number announced on 12/20/2015 was just under \$295,000. This reflects a significant increase in the average pledge. The number of pledges received was 112, which was lower than previous years. If you have not been able to submit your pledge card, please do so even though the campaign has ended. Your pledge allows us to better plan how we will handle the day to day expenses that keeps St. Johnøs in the fore-front of Jubilee Ministries.

Our 2015 financial year ends on December 31st. With the additional authorizations provided by the Vestry, we will have all of our outstanding invoices and commitments for 2015 paid. This includes paying the total amount that we pledged the Diocese. During the past year we encountered a few significant unplanned expenses. I am sure that we will continue to have other õsurprisesö in the future. I am most grateful for the counsel and support that I received from both the Finance Committee and the Vestry in meeting these challenges.

As most of you know, I am õretiringö from the position of Treasurer effective with the Vestry meeting in January 2016. It has been my pleasure and honor to be given this responsibility for the past eight (8) years. As of this writing, no one has been named as my successor. I strongly encourage anyone with financial or budgetary experience to consider volunteering for this position.

Finally, I would like to thank all of the Wardens with whom I have served on the Executive Committee, the Vestry Stewards that have had faith in my many recommendations, the Finance Committee for their continuous support and counsel, and of course Fr. John for his leadership. Most of all, I thank you my parish family for having faith in my handling of the various financial challenges that we have encountered.

May God continue to bless us as we move forward with our building project.

As we scurry at a hurried paced during this holiday season, I wanted to take a moment and highlight just a couple of many exciting moments this month at St Johnøs.

First I wanted to pause and thank all who, though their prayers and thoughtfulness have given to St. Johnøs for both he the annual Stewardship drive and to the Capital Campaign. As of December 20, the pledges for the annual Stewardship drive totaled \$294,557 with 12 new pledges and 38 renewals with increased amounts. The Capital Campaign on December 20 saw an amount of \$889,014 pledged from 114 families. This also included funds from the memorial gifts of Nelson and Peggy Craige, as well as from Dr. Joseph and Nancy Eckenrode. These processes are still ongoing and increasing, and your gifts and pledges are still welcome. I also want to thank and extend deep appreciation to the recipients of our St. Johnøs award this year. The recipients are:

VESTRY RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were passed at the Vestry meeting on: <u>December 21, 2015</u>

- 1. <u>2016 Budget</u> ó Resolved, that the vestry of St. Johnøs Episcopal Church, Lancaster approves for 2016 a spending plan with a projected income of \$760,800.00 and projected expenses of \$760,800.00.
 - Pledged income is \$300,000.00. Additional draw from investment will be \$220,300. That is in addition to the \$56,000 which is the normally expected draw which is 5% from the 3 year average on June 30th. Total expected additional draw is \$276,300.00. This resolution came from Finance Committee and was vetted by the Executive Committee. After a lengthy discussion, Leslie Morgan called the question. The motion carried.
- 2. Clergy Housing Allowance ó Resolved, that the total compensation paid to the Rev. John W. Morris for the calendar year 2016 shall be \$88,529.00 of which \$40,000.00 is hereby designated as housing allowance pursuant to section 107 of the Internal Revenue Code. And be it further resolved that the total compensation paid to the Rev. Barbara J. Seras for the calendar year 2016 shall be \$54,080.00 of which \$21,000.00 is hereby designated as housing allowance pursuant to section 107 of the Internal Revenue Code. This resolution comes from the Executive Committee. Sue Heilman called the question. The motion carried.
- 3. <u>SafeChurch Committee</u> ó Resolved, that the vestry of St. Johnøs Church sends their deep thanks and appreciation to the members of the St. Johnøs SafeChurch Committee: Cynthia Minnich, Cindy Morris and Mary Woolson; and to committee chair: Marylee Souder; for their tireless and dedicated efforts to craft the Child Protection Policy for St. Johnøs, helping us to take our first step toward our parish goal of becoming a completely safe place for all children. And further resolved, that the SafeChurch Committee is discharged of their duty with the gratitude of the vestry. *This resolution comes from the Executive Committee. Toni Ehrhart called the question. The motion carried.*
- 4. <u>Steve Latshaw</u> ó Be it resolved that St. Johnøs Episcopal Church receives the resignation of Steve Latshaw as the Treasurer with many thanks for his eight (8) years of dedication and service. Under his leadership, St. Johnøs has made strides toward a more transparent accounting process, meeting generally accepted accounting practices, a break out of capital expenses from the operating budget, and the necessary organization to responsibly head into a capital campaign. *This resolution comes from the Executive Committee. Sue Heilman called the question. The motion carried.*
- 5. <u>Global Mission Partnership</u> ó Whereas, the Millennium Development Goal Committee has worked over eight years to Educate, Inspire and Advocate on behalf of the eight Millennium Development Goals established by the United Nations in the year 2000; goals that were then adopted and embraced by the Episcopal Church in the worldwide effort to eliminate poverty over a fifteen year period.
 - Whereas, great progress was made but the work continues now, worldwide under a new plan- the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) to maintain and build on those achievements.

VESTRY RESOLUTIONS (CONTINUED)

Whereas, the members of the Millennium Development Goal Committee resolve to continue the work started with the St. John's Parish; believing the best way to continue this work is to build on the last of the Millennium Development Goals: õDevelop a Global Partnership for Developmentö.

Whereas, after due diligence the committee recommends that a primary partnership with one organization for a minimum of three years, focusing on how we can work with the SDGs be established.

Therefore be it resolved, that the vestry of St. Johnøs Church, Lancaster affirms the establishment of a global mission partner relationship with Rafiki Africa Foundation and the Lighthouse Academy in Alendu, Kenya.

And be it further resolved, that the vestry thanks the leadership of the Millennium Development Goal Committee and especially Ken Brown, Anne Carroll, Bill Cater,

Tammy Collier, Julie Gittens, Sue Heilman, Barbara Landis, Marla Lester, Dave Martin and Brad Zuke for their many years of service and discharges them with great appreciation. Sue Heilman is taking the leadership position on this, and has become a board member at Rafiki. This resolution comes from the Executive Committee. Bruce Waskowicz called the question. The motion carried.

6. <u>Honaman Memorial</u> ó Resolve: In keeping with the custom of St. Johnøs of reserving the display memorial plaques in the churchøs sanctuary to Bishops of the parish, the Vestry accepts the memorial gift from Fred and Eleanor Honaman honoring the 60th anniversary of Bishop Honamanøs consecration and authorizes the acquisition and installation will be covered by the Honamans, and is to be coordinated with the Worship Committee and Rector. *This resolution was presented by Steve Latshaw. The motion was seconded by Leslie Morgan. Bruce Waskowicz called the question. The motion carried.*

NEWS FROM ANNOUNCEMENT SUNDAY (DECEMBER 20)



Honoring Our Past... Welcoming Our Future, our capital campaign, was given a big boost with very generous gifts from the estates of two longtime loyal and dedicated families. Because it was known that both families strongly supported making St. John's accessible and welcoming to everyone, the Vestry voted to remember these families by designating a part of each of their bequests toward making this a reality. Therefore, we are grateful to Peggy and Nelson Craige for the addition of \$50,000 to the campaign from their bequest of \$100,000 and to Nancy and Joe Eckenrode for the addition of \$100,000 from their bequest of \$346,000. Although the Craiges and the Eckenrodes won't see the final results, they will be fondly remembered by a congregation who will benefit from their generosity for years to come.

Pledges and Gifts: \$889,014 from 114 families Gifts Received: \$293,600 from 56 families

The generosity of St. John's members and friends has exceeded the expectations for Phase I of this campaign; however, the total cost of the project is expected to be in the range of \$1.2 to \$1.5 million. Additional commitments now and in the future are welcome and appreciated as they will allow us to reach our goals of accessibility and facility improvements sooner and reduce the amount of construction loans.

Pledges from 112 families, for a total of \$294,557

This includes 12 new pledges and 38 increased pledges (as compared to 2015), and it is about 87% of our total pledge amount for 2015. The number of pledges is only 83% of the number we received for 2015, so we still need and hope to hear from several more families. These pledges, offered to the glory of God and in community with our parish family, support our ongoing worship and ministries.

Committee News

We are pleased to announce the selection of Jeff Gromis as Property Committee Chair. Jefføs extensive background in facilities management is a tremendous asset to our work. We also welcome back Bob Fields, who brings comprehensive experience in real estate management and maintenance to our team. Thank you both for your dedication and service.

Maintenance Update

Our HVAC vendor confirms that the heat pump serving the nursery and all purpose room is need of replacement, which we hope can be delayed until the cooling season. Replacement of our failing water heaters is high priority and slated to be addressed in January.

We thank the City of Lancaster for re-engineering the ramp at Concord Street which we hope will prevent water runoff onto our sidewalk, reducing erosion and freezing.

A+ Masonry completed the second phase of re-pointing some of the missing and loose mortar joints on our rental properties, as well as areas of the church campusô and well below anticipated scope and cost.

Rental Properties

Finance and Property committee representatives have been interviewing and securing proposals from rental management companies to handle our rental properties. At the direction of the Finance Committee, notices of rent increases were sent to tenants, taking effect February 1, 2016.

Thinking Outside The Box

Two recommendations to increase revenue were discussed and forwarded to staff: A day-care operation during the week in our Sunday School area, and a contemporary service to attract new members. These strategies would complement our evangelism efforts, while taking advantage of the greater opportunities our renovation project and SafeChurch program will provide.



"Happy are those who keep his decrees, who seek him with their whole heart, who also do no wrong, but walk in his ways." --- Psalm 119: 2-3

Resolutions are synonymous with decrees and promises. Resolved is synonymous with determined and steadfast.

Itøs that time of year again. After all the presents are opened, the cookies and pies are almost gone, and we start thinking about taking the decorations down, many of us will also begin thinking about the coming New Year and what our Resolutions will be. What will we try to change, improve or promise to stop? What will we be more resolved and determined to fix in our lives or for others?

The Millennium Development Goal Committee and the St. John Parish has worked together over eight years now, on behalf of eight Millennium Development Goals. Established by the United Nations in the year 2000 the eight goals were adopted and then, embraced by the Episcopal Church. There has been a worldwide effort to eliminate poverty over a fifteen year period.

We have submitted our Resolution to the Vestry for approval for developing a Primary Global Partnership with Rafiki Africa Foundation and the Light House Academy, in Alendu Kenya.

The Millennium Development Goals Committee is resolved to continue to Educate, Inspire, Advocate and also, Facilitate on behalf of this Global Partnership. In this New Year, we see opportunity, hope and a renewed commitment. We are resolved in building a Primary Global Partnership that will take St. Johnøs to the next level in the steadfast work of eliminating poverty, here and there.

Keep watching and listening as we transition from the MDG Committee and the MDG challenges to a new name, emphasizing our õ*Global Partnership*ö. And, if you are inspired or just want to be part of the conversation, consider joining us in this ministry of working with the world to improve the lives of all people. Our next MDG Committee meeting is scheduled for January 14, 2016 at 7:30pm in the Becker House. Please look for the *Global Partnership Challenges* and consider how you may incorporate them into your daily lives.
