RESURRECTION FRAGMENTS Lent to Easter

As I write this, the temperature outside is seven degrees. The wind chill puts it below zero. It is cold and dark. It feels like Lent. I think the Polar Vortex was created for Lent. It makes me hunger for warmth and sunshine. It makes me anxious for spring. Lent makes me long for Easter. I have an ache in my bones for some resurrection.

I know spring will eventually arrive. Of that I am certain. I we seen it happen each of my sixty four years on this earth and I we told it been like that as long as anyone can remember. I also know that spring s arrival is spotty. There will be both warm days and cold days as we make our way to spring. The coming of spring is predictably unpredictable, unless you've willing to believe a ground hog.

That is the way I feel about resurrection. In the course of my life time I have witnessed countless resurrection fragments. Bad things that suddenly, unexpectedly turned into good things. Healings that we not supposed to happen. Losses that lead to new life.

All this is not to deny that life is full of terrible, horrible tragedies ó war, disease, illness, hatred. That is just a handful of evils from a very long list. However, life is not all like that, nor always like that. Winter does melt into spring. Peace does return when people allow it. Life does find a way and so does love.

As the progression from winter to spring, Lent to Easter, death to resurrection is both natural and inevitable, I guess I could just wait for it to arrive. This is a time honored approach in the Christian community. Pacifists who welcome peace just by not participating in violence and war. Contemplatives who withdraw from the world all the while showering the world with their prayers. Let go, and let God. Do less, and love more.

Equally legitimate is the churchøs instinct to become part of the procession to resurrection. We can not turn winter into spring or death into resurrection. Those are beyond our mortal means. But we can be participants in Godøs process of positive transformation. We can become champions for new life. We can stand as advocates of justice and healing. We can build in the direction of the resurrection.

This March we begin in Lent and end with Easter. In our life at St. Johnøs fragments of the resurrection can be found everywhere along our way. Lenten Study learning about global mission in Africa. Parish Meeting presentation of the new building program. Ecumenical Lenten worship and lunches. Vestryøs newcomer Welcome Brunch. And of course, ending the month with our many worship offerings for Holy Week and Easter. Each of these is like one of those sunny days we find on the way to spring. Each of them and more are reminders of the reality of resurrection we all hope for, all build toward, all desire.

As we journey together through Lent to Easter, may we be led to gather up the fragments of resurrection that surround us. May we be given the Spiritøs larger vision to see in them the pattern of our wholeness and the promise that we too are being made holy.

Some experiences are just too grand...too big...to capture in a few words. So it is with Happenings #9. Many of our high schoolers with our youth adult leadership headed this weekend past to Camp Mount Luther near Mifflinburg, PA. I went as a õHappener.ö

There are few words that adequately describe the amazing three days: a youth retreat? a once-in-alifetime experience? a camping weekend? None of these quite fit. Perhaps that is why the weekend is called õHappenings.ö The name aptly describes the experience that õhappensö and unfolds as the Spirit leads. It is an opening to Godøs Presence that strengthens and transforms, nourishes and educates each participant...young and not-so-young alike. There are few places and few times that I have experienced and witnessed such a loving, fun-loving yet serious days.

And this weekend comes as a gift that is given in the yearlong planning and detailed preparation by many of our youth (all õHappenersö from previous years). It is a gift that is given in the behind-the-scenes work setting up for activities and events. It is a gift given in the amazing, deep, thought-provoking talks on faith, discernment, grace, forgiveness in which the young presenters plumbed hearts and souls.

The weekend format includes a series of talks given by the youth, small group activities and worship. Some parts of the weekend are kept under wraps...not because it is secret but rather because there are good and moving surprises along that way that say: õYou are unique and loved. God loves You and So do I.ö Happenings is a time of laughter, fun, faith, fellowship, worship, Godøs grace and new friendships.

I believe Happenings opens new vistas of understanding in the individual youthøs spiritual journey and creates a deeper commitment to Christian Community as well as a stronger connection among the youth. I believe lifelong friendships are made; lifelong values and faith are nourished. And it is just plain good fun.

The days were long and full of activity. But somewhere along the weekend, in a quiet moment, it came to me that we are all on a lifelong journey...a sacred undertaking to be and become the daughter...the son...the Child of God that each of us has been created and called to be. It is our birthright and destiny. And it is that sacred transformationí Godøs gift to us...that comes to each of us as we open ourselves to the healing, reconciling Love of Christ.

I witnessed that sacred undertaking in the young people at Happenings. I caught a glimpse into the beauty and profound depth of their faith and vision. Yes, todayø youth struggle with the demands, challenges, and losses as much as they enjoy success, advantages and accomplishments. AND above and beyond, todayø youth give us the *clearest, unmasked picture of faith placed in God...*that Jesus Christ is present with us, involved with our lives, guards us and guides us. We can count on it. So I say...Thanks, guys! Thanks for a most incredible amazing weekend...thanks for being a part of my life.

Upon reflecting on the success of the Capital Campaign, I realized that one of the most powerful parts of the experience for me was the prayerful question, õLord, what do you want to do through me?ö It was that question that led to our successful fund-raising for our building project.

This project will bring us an elevator to allow all of our members and guests complete access to every level of the church property. For me, that is reason enough to build this elevator. What I didn¢t consider were some of the added bonuses of this elevator. Currently, our choral and bell choirs need to use the stairs by the lower level vesting room. This means that someone who is having mobility issues, struggles to get to the practice space and then back to the sanctuary. Similarly, the bell choir needs to carry up heavy tables, cushions, and bells. All of this can be facilitated by the large elevator. In addition, our elevator can be used to bring in equipment to change the lightbulbs in the rafters of the church. It could also be used for bringing in a gurney to assist someone in a medical emergency who is on the upper or lower level.

Now, I am asking you to continue praying, õLord, what do you want to do through me?ö I want you to think about what parts of the St. Johnøs mission speak to you. Your new vestry wants to keep serving our parishioners as well as our neighbors, but we canøt do it alone. Whether you are drawn to helping our teens, singing in the choir, working to help us manage our wealth, or caring for our historic property, there are plenty of opportunities to find your niche. Tasks range from writing notes, raking leaves, baking cookies, to reading, knitting, financial planning, and greeting. There is some way that every one of us can help.

Please join your vestry in dreaming about what our church could be. Then help us get there.

"For one believes with the heart and so is justified, and one confesses with the mouth and so is saved" --Romans 10:10

It is mid February and Punxsutawney Phil did not see his shadow and gave us hope that Spring is just around the corner. As I write this, it is snowing and not looking or feeling at all like Spring. Have *heart* and *faith*, it is coming.

February is designated as õHeartö month so that we focus on heart health. We sacrifice something and/or we take something on, like *sharing our hearts* and *growing partnerships*. Please join us during Lent on Sunday evenings through 3/13/16 when we will conclude with a celebration dinner with food prepared by Rafiki. You can visit them at their Central market stand to sample some of the foods of Africa. Look for the details in the Sunday bulletin, for each Sundayøs activities planned. Each weekøs journey will be posted as well, on the bulletin board in the Parish hall. Join us for all or as many evenings as you can. This journey promises to be fun filled as well educational and inspiring. Also, again this year, will be collecting shoes for the "Soles for Souls".
