ST. JOHN'S "REVEALED"

St. Johnøs will host a First Friday event on June 3. St. Johnøs Revealed will be our official public announcement of our planned building program. Starting at 6:00 PM and concluding at 8:00 PM our parish hall and sanctuary will feature displays of our building plans, learning stations about St. Johnøs and our mission, and videos including an animated walk through the new Atrium.

Now that our plans have been reviewed and approved by the Historical Architectural Review Board [HARB], Lancaster City Council, and the Lancaster County Planning Commission, we are ready to go public. Much neighborly interest has been sparked by the posting of HARB meeting signs and the spray paint marking of utility lines.

Neighbors are being directly invited to the Reveal in a number of ways. Personal invitations in the form of post cards will be hand delivered to the doors of those living in the blocks immediately surrounding the church. A Facebook invitation is being sent to those in the Chestnut Hill online community and regular posts area being added to the Chestnut Hill Neighbors Facebook page.

As part of our general invitation to the public, St. John will be listed on the First Friday website, a First Friday banner has been hung on Chestnut Street and our Journey to Adulthood teens will be passing out invitations to passersbys on Chestnut and Prince Streets. We hope to welcome to St. Johnøs as many people as possible.

LNP newspapers have been asked run an announcement about the Reveal in the Community section. They have also have been invited to run a feature article. WGAL, who covered our MLK Day celebration, expressed interest in returning for The Reveal.

Inside the parish hall, our guests will be offered light refreshments. Our architect, Don Main, and members of the staff of Marotta/Main Architects, along with members of the Construction Committee will interpret the architectural drawings on display. More õhands onö activities for children will include Create Your Own Stained Glass Windows, and Build Your Own Lego Church.

In conjunction with the Reveal, families of those with departed loved ones who are interred in the columbarium and memorial gardens are being contacted. They will be invited to attend services on June 12 when we will conclude the 8:00 and 10:15 AM liturgies with prayers and blessing before the cremains and sacred soil are removed for storage during construction.

St. Johnøs Revealed promises to be a fun and informative evening for neighbors and parishioners alike. It will be our first step to living into our vision, õHonoring our pastí Welcoming our future,ö as we open the blue doors of St. Johnøs to our neighbors and guests to share with them our mission for today and our dreams for tomorrow.

Be sure to make St. Johnos a stop on your First Friday in June and experience, St. Johnos õRevealedö.

My Summer Vacation

The first year I was ordained, I took my vacation in mid-May. I flew to Chicago and caught up with my best seminary friend, Mary Martin, and we took off to travel cross country with her two cats, Snickers and Calle, destined for Los Angeles and her June ordination. It was quite a ride. We stopped at a bierstube in Amana Colonies, Iowa, passed by countless small Nebraskan hamlets of several hundred people with huge granaries and spent a night listening to the whistling winds across the open prairie. St. George Utah, Mormon country, on a Sunday Morning and the wide expanse of the Rockies added to the cultural plunge and began to open my eyes to the vast realities of our nation, its history and peoples.

On my return home, my Sunday sermon began with a focus on my travels 4 and as I ran though the litany of places and people, the rector reputedly leaned over to our deacon and said, of this sermon is: My Summer Vacation by Barbara Seras. Eater that morning our deacon, a close friend and colleague, could hardly repeat the comment because he was laughing so hard! And so was I!

But joking aside, it struck me that trip as it strikes me returning from my recent travel that our nation is amazing, blessed with such a richness of geography, history and culture. There is so much we have to relish now *and* to preserve for the future. I am again busting with tales of things seen and experiences had as my friend Julia and I motored our way up the coast from Florida to Pennsylvania.

So my friends: PROCEED with CAUTION! Here is my latest installment of: "My Summer Vacation by Barbara Seras."

olt is amazing that in fewer hours than most folks work in a day, I could leave the chill of a Lancaster morning to sit on the warm sunny Florida sands watching pelicans dive for their supper. Palm trees replace the budding trees at home. And the change of pace and the change of scenery already brings new thoughts and new perspectives to mind. First stop on the road was St. Augustine, the oldest continually occupied US city with a deep history, both good and corrupt. It was the early destination of Spanish explorers and European immigrants; it was a pivotal site of the Civil Rights Movement of the 1960. The historic district brimmed with elegant shops, tourists and fine eateries. Yet only a few blocks further north, the buildings were dilapidated and the neighborhood, frankly, was scary. The contrast was not unique. As we traveled north, there was a distinct demarcation: enclaves of wealth and security, generally ethnically or racially segregated.

Florida to Georgia, peaches not quite ripe but a ramshackle restaurant: Sisters of the New South, sporting a wall with the world depicted and the caption: õAll over the world, Everyone is a Sister.ö It reminded me of Tyler Brentonøs Kenyan project. South Carolina, good bar-b-que and beaches but many beaches with limited public access as the wealthy grab up the beach access and make it private. North Carolina, Virginia, Pennsylvania¹/₄ each with its beauty, unique character and amazing people and each a state of sharp contrastsô economically, socially, racially.

As I traveled, the political rhetoric of this election cycle came to mind. It focuses precisely on these realities. Yet I hear in this debate an anger and division that has no place in this world or in our Christian values. Indeed, we Americans are a people who have struggled with our differences...struggled mightily. My travels confirmed and raise this to my awareness. Yet we are a people who are generous and kind as a reflection of a people of faith.

I returned home and again on Sunday found myself in my beloved Community. And the perplexities and pleasures of my recent jaunt found resolution and meaning: õThere is One Body and One Spirit; There is One hope in Godøs call to us; One Lord, One Faith, One Baptism; ONE GOD AND FATHER OF ALL!ö

I dongt know the answer to all I see and experience. But I trust that giving over my doubts and perplexities to the wisdom of Christos Spirit, in prayer and ministry, we will find the way past the divisions, the õismsö, the poverty, anger and despair. And the stories we share bring home of our summer vacation adventures not only brings us closer to one another but also opens us to live in that Oneness of transformed mindfulness, prayer and action.

It is good to be home.

HELPING AT REFUGEE RESETTLEMENT IN LANCASTER

The All Lancaster Episcopal Response Team is answering a community need by becoming a member of a "Circle of Friends" to a recent arrival of a single mother from "Africa" with 6 children. The children range in age from a few months to being in their teens. Church World Services is currently working with the family and many of the resettlement needs are already in place. St. John's along with the other ALERT churches have committed to assisting the family. The main focus of this relationship is to encourage and empower the family to become self sufficient and self reliant by offering assistance in four ways. 1) Tutoring; 2) Providing transportation to/from medical appointments; 3) Serving as a financial and literacy mentor by helping with paying of bills, balancing a checkbook, etc; and 4) Provide material donations which may be needed by the family. Being in a relationship which supports community and cultural integration for the family is the overall goal for this endeavor. Many details of this commitment are being worked out If anyone from St. John's who would be interested in helping in the above stated specific ways a sign up sheet is posted on the bulletin board in the parish house. PLEASE CONSIDER. There is a definite need for immediate help during the summer months. PARKING ON SUNDAY MORNINGS

St. John's has made arrangements with the Lancaster Parking Authority to provide parking for St. John's at the Water Street Parking Garage (on Water Street, between West Chestnut and Walnut Streets).

The gates at the parking garage will be open from 7:30 a.m. until 10:30 a.m., at which time you can enter the garage. If the gate is down when you are leaving the garage, there is an exit lane with a "push-button" that will open the exit gate.

We encourage you to use the Water Street Parking Garage in lieu of the private lot on West Chestnut Street, which is for the residents of the Stevens School apartments. In addition, if you are able-bodied, we encourage you to use the Water Street Parking Garage to save spots in our church parking for those with mobility challenges. Thank you.

PROPERTY CORNER

It is with a deep sense of sorrow and loss that we received a note of resignation from Deb Smith in May. As with the many others before her, it would be selfish of us to question her decision to resign after her hard work with moving our parish forward. We wish Deb the peace and comfort that come with our deepest understanding and experience shared for the devotion and commitment she has offered to the Property Committee and our parish as a whole.

It was good to realize the last use of our portable ramp on primary election day in May. The wooden structure is warped, slippery and falling apart, making it more of a risk than a benefit. Election day didnøt go without a hitch though. It was brought to our attention that the scanner wasnøt working due to faulty electrical outlets in the All Purpose Room. The two outlets in questions had lost their tension, creating a bad connection when a plug was inserted. The outlets were replaced later that week

We have also been addressing the photoelectric switches with our exterior lights. Years ago photoswitches were installed in them so they would turn off during the daylight. As most of them have since been stuck on, we have been making adjustments and in some cases replacing the sensors to increase our efficiency. Please let us know if you see any of our lights going ON and then, OFF while visiting the church at night, while we continue to monitor them.

We had our slop sink off of the Parish Hall overflow after a rag blocked the drain and the water wasnot turned off completely. Water was found in one of the lower level classrooms during a walk-thru on April 11th. Signs have been posted to make sure rags are not in/on the tubs and to make sure the water is turned off completely. Please do your best to adhere to these preventive guidelines, as we continue to monitor this situation more closely. Our cleaning crew was also made aware of this situation.

After a number of issues regarding the e-mail server Drew Dorganos team converted our server to Google-mail. The new provider still allows us to retain our addresses, while providing greater reliability and security. She also updated our office suite to Office 365, which provides cloud-based operation. Our staff is getting up to speed with the new format and idiosyncrasies, while we attempt to facilitate operations. Improvements have also been made to our web site. Please thank Drew for these contributions the next time you see her.



GLOBAL PARTNERSHIP COMMITTEE UPDATE

"Very truly, I tell you, the one who believes in me will also do the works that I do and, in fact, will do greater works than these....."—John 14:12

A lot of work and activity can be seen going on right now. The weather is breaking and everywhere you look, there a lot of outdoor activity. Whether it working on a cleanup project, planting for the new growing season, getting some exercise, attending or organizing an outdoor event, we all just want to get out there and get busy and be active.

Thereøs been a lot of activity in Alendu, Kenya with our global partners, Rafiki Africa and the Light House Academy. The recent Well drilling took place and the bore hole was successful. The next steps are to complete a distribution system and put taps into place. Eventually, it is hoped that the welløs water distribution will help to earn revenue for Rafiki. There is still an additional \$26,000 to be raised to see this project completed.

On April 24th there was a Water Sunday event and a local church participated helping to raise funds for Rafikiøs Well project. Water Sunday is an annual interdenominational event promoted by Water Missions International. It was held on April 24th this year and õí churches across the country participated in Water Sunday; a special Sunday service set aside to focus on the global water crisis. In addition to a variety of activities, studies, and sermons, Water Sunday incorporates a special offering to provide safe and Living Water for those in desperate needö; https://watermission.org/. Water Missions International is the organization working on the Well in Alendu. Molly and George Greene are the founders who operate an environmental engineering company in Charleston, SC. They started out responding to a need in Honduras in 1998. Struck by the global water crisis, the Greeneøs took action in 2001 and formed Water Mission and their mission õis to be a best in class Christian Engineering Ministry that transforms lives through sustainable safe water solutions.ö We urge you to visit their website and read about their mission, values and solutions. *Think about it, if your family was always in a constant search for drinkable water, when would your kids have time to go to school or study? How would that affect your ability to work, produce and succeed economically?*

Inspiration to take action is how Rafiki Africa began. First, Dorothy Dulo was inspired to make a personal commitment to sponsor one student. Joined by her husband Roger Godfrey and her brother Kenn, Rafiki was born and now serves over 300 students and the families in the Alendu community. What started out as a small act to make a difference, has grown into a project that benefits over 400 families. There is local leadership there and here as they expand their network and build partnerships. Rafiki engages in activities that will empower their community and be self-sustaining. Much has been achieved from the small beginning. There are still ongoing needs in addition to the water project. There is always a need for trained teachers as well as building maintenance and expansion as classes grow. They now have classes from K-8 but, hope to expand through grade 12. We encourage you to learn more about them and other activities that benefit their projects and more importantly, how to get involved. Please visit http://www.rafikiafrica.org/ or talk to a Global partnership committee member.

There will be more information coming from the GPC about the journey, the vision and the activities that will support our global partner, Rafiki. We have and can only share a small amount of the story and information here in our articles. Another resource, are the individuals from our local area, who have traveled to Alendu, Kenya. We heard from Amber Geist during our Lent program but, there have been other students, teachers,

and medical professionals who traveled there and worked in the community. Some students from Conestoga Valley visited Alendu, Kenya this year, in March. One of the students made a personal video of their experience available to watch https://www.youtube.com/watch? v=Q0T8bxSyfjI. This video was put to music with lyrics that say more than just their words. õI could not bear the thought of people living in povertyí í How it is ever going to turn around. God why donøt you something?!í ..I didí I created you.ö

Many have been inspired by the journey thus far and the vision of what can be. Much work has been done but, there is much more to do. We will continue to share information about our global partner and upcoming activities.

One date to mark your calendars for is Sunday, September 25th, Global Partnership Sunday. Keep listening and learning and if you are so inspired, take action. Consider joining us in this work, in this ministry of working with the world to improve the lives of all people, "It is time...we need to do something". Our next GPC meeting is scheduled for the 2nd Thursday, 6/9/16 at 7pm in the Becker House.

Please look for the Global Partnership Challenges and consider how you may incorporate them into your daily lives.
