#### AARON SPICHER TRIBUTE SUNDAY

#### Sunday, July 10th

All are invited to offer a tribute of thanksgiving to our St. Johnøs Verger, Aaron Spicher, on Sunday, July 10th. Aaron was a member of St. Johnøs since 1987 and for the last twelve years has served as our first and only Verger. We all knew Aaron from Sunday morning. Depending on which service you attend, Aaronøs role changed slightly. But essentially as Verger, Aaron had been the chief lay liturgical minister of the parish.

In the course of his ministry, and by his own count, Aaron provided his liturgical assistance to 10 bishops, 8 rectors, 11 assistant priests, and countless visiting clergy and guests. He helped to guide the development of our Altar Guild, provided aid to our Flower Guild, worked closely with our Lay Eucharistic Ministers, Lay Eucharistic Visitors and Lectors. He led the training multiple generations of Torch Bears, Servers, Crucifers, and Thurifers who all affectionately referred to him as, õMr. Aaronö.

Because of the many õhatsö he wore, Aaron¢ presence was essential at all weekly meetings of staff and Liturgy Team, and all monthly meetings of the Worship Committee and Ministries Council. In addition, Aaron volunteered to serve as the distributor for our food pantry¢s Door Ministry on Tuesdays and Thursdays, helped with our monthly Community Breakfasts, and generally served as the St. John¢s ambassador to those living on the margins of our community.

While the celebration on June 15th of Aaronøs life and ministry was a beautiful testimony in words, music and liturgy, not everyone who wanted to attend Aaronøs service was able to do so, and not everyone who wanted was able to speak. Given the many lives Aaron touched, the Vestry approved a suggestion to have a special time of gathering simply to share stories and remembrances of Aaron.

During Coffee Hour (between the two services) from 9:00 to 10:00 AM, we will gather in the Parish Hall with a special cake and with the sound system set up to offer words of remembrance and appreciation. If you have any pictures or photographs of Aaron, we will also have a picture table with a foam board for you to post them to share.

I hope you will be able to be to join us on Sunday, July 10th and to help us express our love for Aaron Spicher and our deep appreciation for his ministry.

Or time set aside for a walk or bike ride with child or spouse or friend? A summer evening concert series? Or sitting quietly outside in the beautiful summer nights? (the lightening bugs are back!)

What might you remove from your day? Busy schedules are renewed by õletting goö of some activity for a rest.

Where do you experience that peace and renewal? Ask the question...and the answer *really will* well up in your heart. We can trust that. And then I bid you, do it.

## **VESTRY RESOLUTIONS**

#### The following resolutions were passed at the Vestry meeting on: June 20, 2016

Life Safety ô Resolved, that the Vestry of St. Johnøs approves the expense of up to \$3,200.00 for the installation of gas and carbon monoxide detectors in the basement and the third-floor utility room of the Becker House. The work will be done by Select Security, and the alarms will report through our fire system with Select. These installations are critical to life safety in the buildings and are upgrades the fire marshal requested. The Property Committee recommends that these life-safety upgrades be handled as a capital expense from the endowment, as previously arranged at the request of the Finance Committee.

*Lynn Hayford called the question. The motion carried. This resolution came from the Executive Committee.* 

2. <u>Capital Budget and Loan</u> – Resolved, that the vestry of St. Johnøs Episcopal Church, Lancaster, approves the recommendation of the Finance Committee to seek approval from the diocese for a construction loan in the amount not to exceed \$1,770.000.00. This does not represent the Vestryøs approval of spending that amount.

Jenn Hreben called the question. Lynn Hayford seconded. The motion carried. This resolution originally came from the Executive Committee. It has been amended by the Vestry. Thus the reason for the motion and second by the Vestry.

Since I was six-years old, I have lived with the cycle of the school calendar, first as a student and now as an educator. It is a rhythm that defines my life. Each part of the year has a role.

In the fall, I get so excited to meet the new kids, try out the latest approaches, and navigate the ever-changing curriculum. Everything is so fresh and exciting; there are brand new notebooks, pencils, and posters. Everyone is wearing their favorite outfits and sporting new haircuts.

In the winter, we are all comfortable and in our routines. The students know what to expect from me, and I usually know what to expect from them. I know who I will need to support more or challenge more. These routines and comfort with one another allow us to accomplish a lot of learning.

By spring, we are all tired. We worked hard, and we all need to take a break. It can be hard to push through those last few months and weeks, but we do so, knowing that summer is close at hand.

Finally, we get to summer. The extended time outside, the chance to try new activities, and the casual get-togethers are all part of what makes this season so special. It is during this season, that I sleep in, renew my energy, and begin to plan for the next year. It is during this time when our family plans a vacation.

Church life seems to follow this same pattern, probably because of the connection with Sunday school. Frequently, after the church school stops for the summer, the number of people attending St. Johns dips. Some folks are visiting the beach, mountains, or out of town family. Others are sleeping in for the first time since September. Everyone is doing some kind of renewing of body and mind.

I hope that during this summer õbreak,ö you find your refreshment and refuel for the year ahead. While you are vacationing and sleeping in, I encourage you to experience other churches and forms of worship. I want you to enjoy the quality time with the family.

My concern is that our financial responsibilities do not go on vacation during the summer. We still have electric, payroll, cleaning, and security expenses. At a time when we are approaching the diocese and banks asking for a loan, we cand be delinquent in our bills. If you go on vacation or take the kids to camp, and you miss a Sunday, please dongt miss your pledge to our operating budget or your capital campaign pledge. You can get ahead for the weeks when you know you are going to be out, send your pledge through the mail, or catch up when you get back.

Your vestry stewards work tirelessly on your behalf to make wise decisions about how to control costs and spend wisely. We count on your pledges to allow the plans we have to come to fruition. When the funds arenøt there, we are forced to make tough decisions about dipping into the endowment, not paying our bills, or not spending money on important parts of our ministries.

Please help us continue to take care of St. Johnøs by remembering your financial promises as you feel the sand between your toes.

## CAPITAL CAMPAIGN UPDATE

## Honoring Our Past... Welcoming Our Future: Capital Campaign Update

Excitement is building as we approach the start of our property renovations! At the risk of making some eyes glaze over with too many numbers, hereøs a quick update (as of mid-May) on the financial support for this undertaking:

Toward total pledges of nearly \$772,915, we@ve received \$290,220. We@ve also received \$1,595 as one-time gifts (not associated with pledges). And we have the \$150,000 in bequests from the Eckenrode and Craige families.

So we@ve received a total of \$441,815, towards an expected total of \$924,500 (pledges + bequests + one-time gifts received). Thanks to everyone for your generous support of our goal of õmaking the doors a little wider and the invitation a little warmerö!

## **PARKING ON SUNDAY MORNINGS**

St. John's has made arrangements with the Lancaster Parking Authority to provide parking for St. John's at the Water Street Parking Garage (on Water Street, between West Chestnut and Walnut Streets).

The gates at the parking garage will be open from 7:30 a.m. until 10:30 a.m., at which time you can enter the garage. If the gate is down when you are leaving the garage, there is an exit lane with a "push-button" that will open the exit gate.

We encourage you to use the Water Street Parking Garage in lieu of the private lot on West Chestnut Street, which is for the residents of the Stevens School apartments. In addition, if you are able-bodied, we encourage you to use the Water Street Parking Garage to save spots in our church parking for those with mobility challenges. Thank you.

## **PROPERTY CORNER**

First of all, we acknowledge and thank Janice Henry and Steve Latshaw for their help in preparing temporary space for our cremains during the construction project. Janice was also very instrumental with our Memorial Garden preparation. Much work still remains with relocating sacred soil to a secure location in preparation for our construction project. Notifications were sent to next of kin of those interred to keep them abreast of these changes in hopes of relieving any anxiety during this process. Thanks are also due to Debbie Carter, who was very instrumental in making these notifications.

In addition to the cremains preparation, time has been expended preparing for community notifications of our construction project with our newspaper coverage on May 23<sup>rd</sup> and our First Friday Revealed event in June. These events were very positive opportunities toward community transparency and more importantly, inclusion. Both events were very well received.

With there being many changes on our Property Committee, we are in need of updating our alarm response telephone list. This call list allows us to respond to assist the fire company anytime they respond to an alarm and the Property Manager is unable to assist. As our alarm system is just about complete, a training session will be arranged to familiarize all stakeholders with the systemøs operation. Please let us know if you can help in this regard.

Father John requested that the Property Committee work to provide a figure for the additional costs associated with the Church managed portions of the construction project as soon as possible. The committee added this request to their agenda for the meeting and figured an additional cost of \$84,000 for work on the electrical panels, fire alarm and security access systems, sidewalk and ground pitching, and potential tree removal.

Marylee Sauder reported on the joint meeting between the Finance and Executive Committees with the Property Committee. She outlined the plan of action that resulted from this meeting to include funding of the Capital Expense Budget, which was not part of this yearøs expenditures. The plan has the wardens attending meetings of the Finance and Property Committees, our meeting minutes being emailed to the Wardens and the Finance Chair, the Life Safety resolution being on the June Vestry agenda, Sherry Qualls meeting with the vestry to discuss strategies for spending in a deficit budget environment, the capital expenses having a line item in the 2017 budget, consideration given to amending the 2016 budget with capital expenses, and future proposed Property budgets including details of operating and capital line items. Consideration will also be given to re-establishing an R3 account and reconvening in 3 to 6 months to review progress.

Below are some of the items your Property Committee is working on:

**Alarm Transmission** – The committee agreed to move a resolution forward for an alternate transmission system for communicating alarms from our fire alarm system. Several recent events had us without alarm monitoring due to communication issues. The new system is also more reliable and cost effective.

**Exterior Painting** – The committee agreed to pursue spending up to \$3,000 for spot painting of the exterior Becker House. In addition to the recent repointing, the paint will help reduce the infiltration of moisture above grade level. Horizontal surfaces, such as water tables and sills are showing signs of water damage due to peeling paint.

## **PROPERTY CORNER** (CONTINUED)

**Men's Room Stalls Replacement** – The committee agrees that it is necessary to replace the Menøs Room stalls with non-corrosive panels. The current stalls are heavily corroded, making them impossible to clean effectively. Bill will look into obtaining the panels and replacing them himself.

**Compressor Replacement** – The committee wants to get the replacement of the (exterior) church compressor on the radar as it is approaching 30 years in age. Most people would consider it to be on borrowed time. Anticipated cost will be \$65,000.

**Lightning Protection** – The committee was apprised of our current (non-standard) lightning protection being compromised by the relocation of downspouts onto the yard areas. This relocation does not allow the flow of current into the underground pipe, thereby removing the grounding capability that was once afforded by this connection. The relocation was performed in our attempts to reduce storm water removal from the cityøs combined waste/stormwater system. Bill will get sufficient conductor and connectors to bond the downspouts to the cast underground pipes.

Your Property Committee is honored to serve St. Johnøs many ministries by coordinating repairs and maintenance to our campus, used by many ministries, both within St. Johnøs and our community. Our committee is always looking for more members to serve in this capacity. We meet on the first Monday of every month, except for holidays, at 7:00 p.m. in the Becker House. Due to the Independence Day Holiday, we will be meeting on Tuesday, July 5<sup>th</sup>. Why not come out and join us?

## A.L.E.R.T. REFUGEE RESETTLEMENT PROJECT

The All Lancaster Episcopal Response Team is answering a community need by becoming a member of a *"Circle of Friends"* to a recent arrival of a single mother from Sudan with 6 children. The children range in age from a few months to being in their teens. The oldest, Khadidja, (17) Nouracham, (15) Ibrahim, (13) Djalale (10) Rania (4), and Hawaa (10 months), make up the family with their mother Miriam. Pictures of the family are posted on the bulletin board in the Parish Hall.

Church World Services is currently working with the family and many of the resettlement needs are already in place. St. John's along with the other ALERT churches have committed to assisting the family, especially over the summer months. The main focus of this relationship is to encourage and empower the family to become self sufficient and self reliant by offering assistance in four ways. 1) Tutoring; 2) Providing transportation to/from medical and program appointments; 3) Serving as a financial and literacy mentor by helping with paying of bills, balancing a checkbook, etc; and 4) provide material donations which may be needed by the family.

Being in a relationship which supports community and cultural integration for the family is the overall goal for this endeavor. It is hoped each of the older children will avail themselves of special programs for refugees which are being offered in the community over the summer. The opportunities are there and the young people have been admitted to these special programs and it will be to their benefit if they agree to participate. Several people from St. Johnøs have already volunteered their interest in helping make the childrenøs summer more meaningful by tutoring and providing life experiences for them.

NOW is the time for more folks from St. Johnøs to become involved. Many details of this commitment are being worked out If anyone from St. John's would be interested in helping in the above stated specific ways a sign up sheet is posted on the bulletin board in the Parish Hall. **PLEASE CONSIDER!**
