Celebrate Making a Difference

A young woman appears at the front door of Becker House asking for financial assistance. She was working and taking classes at HACC to earn her degree but she just got laid off from her job and needs \$250 to cover her rent for a room. Can St. Johnøs help?

Itøs back to school time. Teachers and staff at Fulton Elementary School are getting ready to welcome back students to their classes for another year. But Fulton has a brand new principal. He would like to do something special for his faculty. He calls St. Johnøs. Can St. Johnøs Eagles Nest volunteers host a luncheon for the teachers like last year?

Saturday night. Phyllis Gbur sends an email to the clergy. She has just finished making phone calls to coordinate a visit from a Lay Eucharistic Visitor with one of our home bound parishioners. She asks, can the clergy to have an LEV kit ready to be sent out at the end of the 8:00 AM service?

õYesö is the answer to all these questions. Of course St. Johnøs can help. It is what we do. Everyday, in ways large and small, the people of St. Johnøs are making a difference in the lives of those with whom õwe live and move and having our beingö.

Jesus, speaking in parables, would sometimes refer to the leaven or yeast in bread. How only a small portion of this active ingredient would affect the whole loaf of bread to make it rise. That describes our ministries at St. Johnøs. Our efforts may sometimes feel small to us but they have a disproportionate benefit to those around us.

Jesus also talked about a sower scattering seed. That too is St. Johnøs. We scatter the seeds of Godøs mission throughout our congregation with ministries of community and pastoral care, throughout our city with ministries of advocacy and outreach, throughout our diocese with ministries of youth leadership development.

Now St. Johnøs has begun to go global. Building on our years of preparation with Millennium Development Goals we now have a committed global partnership with Rafiki Africa and the Lighthouse Academy in Alendu, Kenya. The seeds of St. Johnøs ministries are being blown by the Holy Spirit worldwide.

At St. Johnøs we celebrate making a difference. We see each opportunity to serve, whether in worship or in outreach, in education or evangelism, as our chance to proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ in word and deed.

On our two Stewardship Sundayøs, October 2nd and 9th, will celebrate the ways St. Johnøs makes a difference in our lives. We will hear the personal stories from the people of our parish of how they have been touched by St. Johnøs. Sometimes it is in a situation of serving. Sometimes it may be moment of being served. In all cases it is living in a relationship of giving and receiving because that is the life dynamic of Christian stewardship. It is Christøs way of making a difference in each others lives.

I invite you to join our celebration of making a difference. Whatever difference we make, it is because we make it together. It is like the Sending of our Eucharistic Visitors when we say, õWe who are many are one body; Because we share one bread, one cup.ö At St. Johnøs, together we are making a difference. *John*+

I love Septembers. I love the fresh coolness in the air. I even love the return to the õroutineö that comes as schools open and offices get down to business. So too, life changes at St. Johnøs as we begin again our calendar of exciting events and special Sundays. There is a sparkle in the air.

On Education Sunday our Church School reconvened and we gave special thanks for the host of individuals who are part of the leadership team...teachers, vestry, youth advisors, nursery care givers...and our kids. The next week we celebrated Choir Sunday. The bell choir and chancel choir were simply over the topo wonderful! All summer long we enjoyed very special presentations...and how blessed we are that the beauty continues!

And there is more...

On Rafiki Sunday, we at St Johnøs embark on a journey of friendship with the people of Kenya as part of our growing global partnership with Rafiki Africa. We will celebrate and ask Godøs blessing as we seek those ways of growing our personal and corporate relationships with folks around the world.

And there is still more...The first weekend in October, two special events are planned. First (not in chronological order), is the Acolytesøvisit to the Washington National Cathedral on Saturday October 8th. Thousands of acolytes from across the church will gather for Holy Eucharist (all processing!) and workshops. This is the second year our acolytes will travel with the acolytes of the other Lancaster Churches. It is an amazing time!



And on Friday October 7 (First Friday) St. Johnøs will celebrate our first õFrancis Fest,ö the Blessing of the Animals. Bring your four footed, feathered or gilled friends. Invite your neighbors to come with their pets. It is a special time to give thanks for those animals who bring such joy and companionship to our lives.

The Blessing of the Animals has become a common event worldwide every year around October 4th, the Feast Day of St. Francis. There is indeed a light hearted aspect to the day, the event and the saint credited with bringing this service to the Church as a celebration of all Creation.

Francis of Assisi (nee Giovanni di Pietro di Bernardone), born in the late 12th century, only lived into his mid-40¢s. Legends abound about the amazing life of this most popular saint who loved all Creation: õHe preached to the birds; blessed fish that had been caught, releasing them back into the water; communicated with wolves, brokering an agreement between one famous ferocious wolf and the citizens of a town that were terrified of it and used real animals when he created the very first, live, Christmas nativity scene.ö

But there was also a serious side to Francis and his message. For he emphasized that creation includes more than humankind. In his *Canticle of Brother Sun and Sister Moon*, Francis praises God for õMother Earth, who sustains and governs us, producing varied fruits with colored flowers and herbs,ö and for Brother Sun...beautiful and radiant with great splendor...who bears the likeness of God Most High. It is an important lesson and invitation for us 21st century Christians... õa striking witness that when we are at peace with God, we are better able to devote ourselves to building up that peace with all Creation which is inseparable from peace among all peoples.ö

Lynn Hayford called the question. The motion carried. This resolution came from the Executive Committee.

2. <u>J2A Fundraisers</u> ó Resolved that the St. Johnøs Vestry approves the following J2A fundraisers for 2016-2017: Advent Wreath and Roping Sale, Scrap booking event, Shrove Tuesday Dinner, Berry Festival, Auction/Dinner/Talent Show, Mini Golf, Chocolate Easter Egg Sale, and Sandwich Sales.

GRIEF WORSHOP

God Gives Us What We Need!

I was reminded of this when my best friend, who lives in Michigan, showed up unexpectedly this weekend. I had a weekend planned with lots of time at work, cranking out grades for the latest writing assignment, planning for next week, and trying to get ahead with the copying that needs to get done.

While I was overjoyed at her appearance, I was a little bitter about my plans being wrecked. Of course, I was going to drop everything and spend the time with her. This is someone that I love dearly, but whom I rarely get to see. I was just going to have to rearrange my plans to fit with this good news.

Similarly, I was initially disappointed about not beginning the construction project this summer to finish before Christmas, but I have come to regard this as good news. I initially wanted to make it someone's fault - it was the diocese's fault for not approving our request for permission to build; it was the architect's fault for failing to recognize the costs of our project put his initial plans way over our budget; it was the finance commIttee's fault for not securing a loan. This additional time (waiting until Spring of 2017) was not our original plan, but the time we are putting into value engineering allows us to keep the project within the scope of our budget, as well as collect a few more of those dollars in pledges from the first campaign. It also allows us more time to share this information with the congregation so that everyone can get a transparent understanding of the decisions the vestry is making.

This weekend worked out for the best. I got to visit with my friend, and by reprioritizing, I am able to accomplish all that needs to be done today. Rather than spending all my weekend working, and probably getting tired of it, my friend provided just the right amount of respite and play to refresh myself for another week.

Earlier this week, someone told me that God laughs at us when we make plans. We forget who is really in charge. I chose to believe God has big plans for us at St. John's, and it is our responsibility to listen to them. Then we can rejoice in those unexpected surprises.

PROPERTY CORNER

We thank Andy Carroll for his continued assistance with free parking at the Parking Authority sgarage on Water Street. Just recently, we learned that the authority was implementing some changes that required payment for parking. Andy looked into this situation with his contacts and had our parking arrangement restored for 3 hours of free parking when entering between the hours of 7:30 and 10:30 a.m. on Sunday mornings.

We had the air conditioner removed and the pane restored in the Sherman Study. This room has seen the infiltration of rain, which has collected on the floor and can cause damage to the floor cover and the All Purpose Room below. The air conditioner is no longer needed, and has probably remained since this portion of our campus was equipped with cooling.

The revamping of our construction project has caused us to re-plan our work around campus. Some areas that should have already been demolished, are now in need of weeding and pruning. Cracks that were supposed to be distant memories are now in need of patching to reduce falls.

We had our parking lot storm inlet cleaned out, as water was very slow to drain. It was reportedly filled with sediment, leaves and sticks above the sump, causing water not to drain. It appears as though we'll be having sporadic interruptions of parking lot use due to construction. In addition to our parking lot storm drain being cleaned out, we had some concrete patching of curbs and the steps out of the rear classroom also completed.

We are preparing to receive new tenants in 209 Concord Street by making improvements to its interior. And, the exteriors of both properties are being worked on.

We recently learned that Peter and Laurie Eaton will be moving to Maine. The Eatons both hit the ground running when they first joined our parish, being very active at the 8 occlock service, on Vestry and our committee. Although they will be sorely missed, we wish them the best that life has to offer in their new home.



Looking at our calendar, our Fall Clean-Up is scheduled for December 18th after the 10:15 a.m. Coffee Hour. It is our understanding that the decorating of the church has also been scheduled at this time. We hope you can spend some time as we prepare for Christmas.

The Property Committee is one of the few ministries at St. Johnøs that supports all of our parish ministries. We meet on the first Monday of every month at 7 p.m. in the Becker House. We value a variety of perspectives on many of the challenges we meet. We hope you can join us!

Imagine walking to church any Sunday morning barefoot, or going grocery shopping and then carrying your bags back home, regardless of the weather and on unpaved roads, barefoot.

Also know that through the extremely kind heart of Phoenix Courier, here in Lancaster, the transport of those shoes to their shipping point in New Jersey costs us nothing. Major saving to us.

Bring your shoes to church, place in the Parish Hall on the Chestnut Street side under the table and we will smile, along with new owners and pack them from you for gifting. We already have several hundred pairs collected and want to have a new high number this year. Don't forget to ask friends, fellow workers, your kids and grandkids and their friends. All are welcome!

Our major push will be during the 2017 Lenten season with the shoes shipped off on Good Friday morning, April 14th, 2017. Please, please check your closets, under the bed, garage, any place shoes might be quietly resting and if they are new, gently used and aching to be worn, bring them for another of God's children. And don't forget to ask friends, neighbors, fellow workers, believe me, they will thank you as will those receiving your loving gift.
