A DIFFERENT KIND OF CHRISTMAS

Christmas 2016 will be different from most other Christmases. This year Christmas Day, December 25th, falls on a Sunday. This raises the question, ∹õDo we celebrate following our usual Sunday practice of services at 8:00 AM and 10:15 AM, or do we follow our usual Christmas Day practice of one service at 11:00 AM?ö

After lengthy discussion by Liturgy Team and the Worship Committee, and in consultation with Vestry, the decision was reached that this year we should celebrate Christmas Day with an 11:00 AM service of Holy Eucharist, Rite II.

Because it will be Christmas Day and Sunday, the service will be a little different. It will be a little more quiet, a little more reflective. We will not have a choir but we will have music. We will not use the organ but we will sing Christmas carols. We will have a sermon but we will also have time for silence.

We envision a Christmas Day Sunday service that will be a unique worship offering in its own right. For those who attend a Christmas Eve liturgy with all its pomp and excitement, Christmas Day Sunday will be an experience of simplicity and calm. For those who chose not to attend a service on Christmas Eve, Christmas Day Sunday will still be their chance to celebrate Christøs birth with the traditional readings of scripture and singing of nativity hymns. For those seeking to practice their spiritual discipline of regular worship on Sunday, Christmas Day at St. Johnøs will be special sabbath observation of the Lordøs Day.

Another Christmas difference will be the nativity creche. St. Johnøs has many parish traditions associated with the creche. Some will stay the same this season. Others may see some changes. We will continue having a crèche in the sanctuary and in its customary location by the lectern. We will also have the Sunday-to-Sunday procession of the figures of Mary and Joseph from window sill to window sill through the season of Advent.

What will change may be the arrangement of the creche to make it more simple and requiring less space. This is to accommodate other liturgical offerings like the expanded handbell tables to make room for more and larger handbells. This may also affect the tradition at the early service on Christmas Eve of processing the figure of the Christ child to the nativity scene. Another possible change might be the weekly progression of the silver Moravian Star up the side aisle of the nave.

Traditions like these take root in a church because they help us to connect our lives with the living narrative of the Gospel. They assist us in making the story of Jesus our own. That means to keep these customs alive we need to claim them as a parish. They cannot be just one personose practice. They need to be more than just something we have always done. To be true traditions they need to be something we all share and have a share in.

That is why traditions change. Because we change. As we change, we find new ways to discover our connection with Christ. The past does not so much disappear as it evolves. What is perceived as new is more accurately understood as the outgrowth of what has gone before. As Jesus once observed, "You canot put new wine in old wine skins or the wine skins burst. New wine needs new wine skins."

This Christmas season at St. Johnøs will be different from years past. Together we will look for and find new ways to keep our faith fresh. While this may be a different Christmas, it is always the same Christ we celebrate - Jesus, the Son of God, born for us and for all.

Being a People of Prayer - Be Still and Know that I am God

Intercessory prayer can penetrate the hearts of those we cannot open and shield those we cannot guard and teach where we cannot speak and comfort where our hearts have no power to soothe. Prayer with its unseen hand, can enter where we may not.

I found this Truth many years ago taped to the wall of the convent guesthouse kitchen next to the calendar where the daily meal count was recorded. Having no copier, I scratched these words on a scrap of paper. The message has shaped and challenged my life since.

Intercessory prayer and petition is responding to God by thought or deed, with or without words, bringing before God the needs of others as well as our own needs that God's will may be done. (adapted from Book of Common Prayer Catechism)

õ...responding to God...that Godøs will may be done...ö It is a mighty endeavor to offer our own needs and concerns, seeking Godøs response, guidance and care. And these days, it seems an indispensable thing to do. For the gift of prayer might well be the greatest gift we can give to one another.

I have always said my life has been good and stable...no matter what...because of the prayers of my own mother. My spiritual mother, Catherine Grace, used to tell me she went to chapel for a time of silent prayer once a day and when a day became out-of-control or too demanding or chaotic, the she would go pray a second time...or third. Things she said seemed always to iron out a little better.

Often we hear in scripture that õJesus went to a place apart to pray.ö And universally in all the major faiths the routine of prayer is honored: Praying the Hours, reciting Mantra, gathering in Minyan, The Jesus Prayer, The Rosary, Japa Mala, a Prayer Ropeí

If you have found your prayer practice, continue. If you are beginning, may you find the prayer of your heart. If you are uncertain, ask for ideas.

And it need not be fancy: Each day sit quietly in a favorite chair for 10 minutes; or read a passage of scripture or a daily meditation at your kitchen counter or table; listen like õPray-as-you-goö (Jesuits) or World Community for Christian Meditation (WCCM) on your way to work.

Perhaps this offerings seems naïve or unmanageable in the õreal world.ö We have so many commitments and responsibilities that keep us running. There is no time! Yet I have come to know and trust that it is just the opposite. On my good days, when I am faithful to my prayer, the days rolls out better. And I am more grateful and steady because of it. Ask anyone who knows me well.

And it will transform us...transform the world. And as I recently read: õTransformation is not the same as mere change. Change comes and goes, like headaches. As the labels on the pills say, if the symptoms donot go away, see a doctor... But to change the pattern permanently and resolve the issues for an enduring good, we need commitment to a transformative practice. We need to engage and collaborate with the process of transformation which, whether we know it or not, is at the core of life. We are born to be transformed. *Meditatio, Laurence Freeman, OSB*

Stewardship is the care and management of something. At St. Johnøs each vestry person is referred to as the vestry steward for community, property, finance, and all the other areas. We also just experienced the stewardship campaign in which all the parishioners prayerfully considered what they could give financially to support the mission of the church.

On Sunday, November 19th, a new group of concerned church members met between the services to brainstorm ways to take care of our facility given our current budget deficit. As was highlighted in the Parish Meeting, the vestry stewards and their committees have done an excellent job of managing expenses. The parish has faithfully pledged what they can. Now we are working on addressing the shortfall in thoughtful and creative ways.

At this first meeting, the Brainstorming group started talking about how to better invite new-comers to join us. This is something that we can all do a better. First, let we wear our nametags. There is nothing harder than trying to make connections in a place where you know no one mame. When we have a dedicated space in our Atrium, this will be even easier, but we need to get back in the habit of wearing our nametags from the minute we walk in the door, to the minute that we leave.

We also need to all take part in greeting newcomers. This can be as simple as, õHave we met before?ö or õHi. I don¢t believe we¢ve met before. My name is Leslie.ö It is talking to someone you don¢t know in line to exit the church or during coffee hour. It is greeting people when they walk into the Parish Hall looking confused. We have a warm congregation, but it is all too easy to fall into conversations with are current friends, forgetting to be stewards of welcoming and greeting our guests.

This Brainstorming group will be meeting again on Sunday, December 11th at 9:00am in the Becker House. We would love to have more folks join us in considering ways to better use our facilities to generate income to help us reach our budget goals. Please consider joining us to learn more and share your ideas. Together we can accomplish our dreams.

MULBERRY STREET IS NOW: Two-Way!!!!!!!!

We ask everyone to please exercise caution when turning left from Chestnut Street onto Mulberry Street. And, be sure to look left before leaving our Mulberry Street parking lot. We have been blessed not to have any accidents with this new traffic pattern. We figure the signage, cones, and announcements about two-way traffic must be working along with everyone diligence.

Did we say signage?í í the committee felt that the signage, cones and caution tape were providing enough in the way of demarcation and warning of the uneven walking surfaces in the courtyard, eliminating the need to patch these surfaces at a cost of \$1,400.

A special thanks goes to Vestry Steward, Bruce Waskowicz for his donation of a sandwich sign board that he crafted to replace the original one which was stolen last Christmas.

Access to the leaking Lady's Room floor drain was obtained and it confirmed a corroded drain trap. The entire floor drain system was installed at the same time. So, the current leak may just be an indication of the two other traps becoming compromised, as well. Fortunately, the drainpipe itself appears to be in good condition. Bill hopes to have the leaking trap replaced with a non-corroding PVC one soon. Please excuse the appearance of the lower level restroom while we pursue this repair. We hope to have it back to normal as soon as possible.

We discussed estimates from Carrol Fontaine for the cleaning of our spaces. Notice was given to end our current contract with Jan-Pro and hire Carol Fontaine for \$225/week. Our new cleaner will start at the beginning of the new year. That budget line was modified to reflect this change.

Just a reminder about <u>FALL CLEAN-UP</u> STARTING AT <u>NOON</u> ON <u>SUNDAY</u> <u>DECEMBER 18th</u>. We may also be helping with the greening of the Church that day. And, although it should go without saying, everyone¢s help is always appreciated, as more hands make for lighter work. We hope that you can join us!

Speaking of joining us, St. Johnøs Property Committee is one of the few ministries that aids St. Johnøs many other ministries. Our committee is a collaboration of many different perspectives, offering solutions to the repair and maintenance of our mid-1800øs church campus. We would love to have you share your perspective with us. We meet in the Becker House at 7 p.m. on the first Monday of every month. We hope you can join us.

ALL LANCASTER EPISCOPAL RESPONSE TEAM

The circle of friends, which is the group helping with the Sudanese family is in the need of a volunteer who will assume the role of handling Mariam's finances and teaching her how to navigate through a checking account, writing checks and forming a budget with her expected income. The need is great to pick up this ministry. If anyone from St. John's would feel called to pick up this ministry, contact either Don Durand or Dave Martin.

The ALERT group will provide refreshments for a party where the Angel Tree gifts will distributed to the six refugee families which are being sponsored by Church World Service. A meeting was scheduled for November 16 including two members of ALERT with the Islamic Community Center of Lancaster to determine how the ALERT and Islamic Center can coordinate assistance to the Sudanese family.

The Work Mass was very successful. We had 24 volunteers who helped with the cleanup, and we got done in no time at all. We pruned, mulched, raked, weeded and planted red tulip bulbs. Twenty-five yard waste bags full of debris were collected and set out for the city to pick up. Pete Greenfield discussed replacing two of the missing memorial stones at a cost of \$30 each. Since there is an endowment for the maintenance of the AIDS garden, it was decided to pursue other avenues of funding for this. Pete Greenfield moved and David Martin seconded a motion that we clean up the AIDS garden every year during our fall Work Mass, which will be held on the Saturday closest to November 1/All Saint's Day. The motion passed unanimously.

It was noted a Refugee Discussion Group is being held on 11/30, 12/7, and 12/14 from 6:30 -8:00 p.m. at Holy Trinity Church in Lancaster. Use the following link to register: http://www.signupgenius.com/go/10c0f4ba5af2caafc1-adiscussion

There have been numerous inquiries about how one might volunteer to help with the refugee Sudanese family in the way of tutoring. My recommendations follow. One of the most effective ways is to work at creating teaching moments, by making personal contact with the family to establish an informal relationship and build trust.

There are 6 children - Khadidja - 18 years, Nouracham - 15, Ibrahim - 13, Djalale - 10, Rania - 5 and Hawaa - 1 year old. All are struggling with English. The five older children are eager to have new and interesting experiences. Each one of the children has needs which can be ascertained by getting to know them. Inviting any one of them to visit a museum, or a sporting event, take a hike or go for a bus ride, are activities which create times for education beyond their school work. A drop-in at their home on evenings may find any one of the children willing to share with you their school work. One can easily build on that. The children have ample materials their teachers have provided for them to work on at home. A volunteer does not need to have more than a picture book or a very easy read book to have with them as a back up. When I visit I try to have a food item with me. They love fruits, especially apples and as always veggies. Any arranged formal tutoring, after the kids have been at school all day would be difficult to implement, in my opinion.

The family lives on Green Street in Lancaster. If you would like to visit or contact Mariam, the mother, see me for the house number and her phone number; for security reasons, they're not included here. The family needs assistance in navigating stores and pricing of items, especially Mariam and Khadidja, who do most of the shopping. If anyone has any interest in helping the family through the adjustment to life in this country and you have more questions on how to implement these suggestions, I would be happy to have a conversation with you. *Dave Martin*

WHAT IS A CURATED EUCHARIST?

A Curated Eucharist combines the beauty of the Eucharistic Liturgy from the Book of Common Prayer, and the creativity and encounter of an interactive art exhibit. The Eucharist follows Rite II, until it comes to the Liturgy of the Word. Here the individual members are invited in to explore the unique stations set up throughout the liturgical space. These stations incorporate Scripture, reflection questions and an interactive component (action, art, movement, etc.). After a period of time, the young people are invited to come back together and share their thoughts and reflections as the sermon for the community.

The goal is to allow young people to experience God deeply within the context of a recognizable and familiar worship service.
