GROUNDBREAKING

Sunday, June 11th, 9:15 a.m.

The Groundbreaking ceremony for the \$1.5 million building program will be held between services on Sunday, June 11th. The Vestry meeting on May 15th approved the selection of our general contractor, the terms of the Binding Agreement required by the Diocese, and the establishment of a line of credit with Fulton Bank.

The Vestry received and approved the recommendation of the Construction Committee to engage Paul Risk Construction as our general contractor. Founded in 1933, they are a Lancaster County fourth generation family-owned firm with extensive experience in historic renovation, church construction and environmental (LEED) building. They were chosen by the committee following two rounds of biddings from five general contractors and multiple value engineering exercises. This produced a savings in construction costs of approximately \$600,000.

The Construction Committee achieved this cost reduction while maintaining the core goals of the project: handicapped accessibility, stormwater management, energy efficiency, columbarium expansion, outdoor labyrinth installation and the creation of a handsome welcome space. The savings did come at some reduction of scope. For example, the undercroft will not have elevator access and the size of the atrium skylight will be reduced. However, construction costs were held to \$1,234,000 and within budget guidelines of the Vestry.

The Vestry also received from the Diocese approval to secure a loan of up to one million dollars. The approval includes a Bidding Agreement that stipulates St. John's reserves \$650,000 in our unrestricted endowment as collateral for the Diocese. This dovetails with our funding strategy with Fulton Bank, recommended by the St. John's Finance Committee. The Binding Agreement also mandates the Vestry develop a plan to meet our full Fair Share asking to the Diocese in three years.

The loan with Fulton Bank negotiated by the St. John's Loan Team is a three-year line of credit with a fixed interest rate. As with a home equity loan, we have the flexibility to draw on the line only as bills come in and pay interest only on the amount we use. This also allows us to preserve the assets of our endowment while we pay our bills.

Initial construction is projected to begin mid-June and be finished before Christmas. The footnote is the delivery time for the elevator may push us later but we will have occupancy of the atrium by December. While under construction, the main entrance to the church will again be the doors at the top of the steps on Chestnut Street. For those who don't climb steps, a large screen TV is being installed in the Parish Hall for watching the worship service, and Communion will be carried over by Eucharistic Ministers.

Key to the success of our building program is the support of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania. Together we are partners in God's mission. The affirmation and encouragement of our Bishop Audrey Scanlan is the motivation St. John's needs to realize the potential of God's blessing as we represent the presence of Christ in Lancaster. A parish mini-meeting will be hosted by members of the Vestry, Finance and Construction Committees on Sunday, June 4th, from 9:15 to 10:00 a.m. in the Parish Hall. They will field your questions and note any of your concerns as we prepare for the next six months.

St. John's is about to enter the last stage of our six-year sojourn to make our church fully welcoming to all. Our celebration on June 11th will likewise be a celebration for all. Everyone will be invited to share in the shoveling of soil. Not just the clergy, Vestry, Finance and Construction Committees, Capital Campaign, Paul Risk Construction, Fulton Bank and diocesan representatives, but children and parents, teachers and choir members, Jubilee ministers and Voyager members, everyone is welcome to lift up a scoop of earth in thanksgiving to God for bringing us together in this shared ministry and in the promise of greater mission to come.



Pentecost: Living Every Day the Fiftieth Day

“When the Day of Pentecost had come, the disciples were all together in one place...and suddenly from Heaven there came a violent wind...”

Once there was a little child about six or seven years old and very active. It was hard just to keep track of such an inquisitive little being. Playing with friends in the neighborhood, the child wanted to explore and simply wandered off into the nearby wooded area. [Now there is a happy ending; the child returns safely home.]

In this forest, there were no lions and tigers and bears....oh my! but a fantasy world filled with flowers and berries and bugs. The child explored all the wonder, eyes darting in every direction. Then suddenly, the child bumped up against a big old oak tree! It was so big that the branches seemed to reach to the heavens and the roots surely to the center of the earth!

Amazed, the child discovered something quite miraculous: This old tree is alive! This tree is a living thing. “Separate from me,” the child thought, “different from me but alive! It doesn't run like I run. It doesn't have eyes or a mouth or ears. This old tree is stuck right in the ground and no matter what, the tree stays put.” Fascinated and a little frightened, the child ran back home, shouting: “MOM! The trees! The trees! They are alive! Did you know? And the flowers and the grass! It's all alive! MOM! Did you know that?”

A child's new discovery. And the most precious part is the child believes herself to be *the first in all creation* to ever have figured it out.

What that child might not easily recognize--and what many might miss--is the absolute wonder of the tree: giving shade and protection, a home for the birds and little critters, good leaf specimens for science fair projects and a dwelling place for the Spirit of God. The God's Spirit in every living creature--in you and me and in all creation--is *everywhere*: sanctifying, anointing, stirring...

It was another time and another big old oak tree. A young woman runs anxiously to yet another bar review class. She thought of little else but her study until that old oak tree, swaying in the summer breeze, grabbed her attention. Some months earlier, when she had what she described as a normal life, she discovered a rather novel prayer about the Holy Spirit. Praying that little prayer faithfully was like playing with fire. For in God's time, it opened her eyes to the wonder of the tree, the wonder of life, the wonder of God stirring in this old world. The discovery stopped her in her tracks:

*Holy Spirit, Comforter, Spirit of Truth,
You live in all places and fill all things.
You give us good life and all blessing.
Come, dwell in us and save us, O Gracious God.*

Like the little child who ran smack into the oak tree, the Spirit opened the young student's heart to see God's hand at work in her life: the Spirit of God in all places and filling all things...

Whatever our place or time of life, precious is that moment when we run smack into the Spirit of God, when we recognize the Spirit in all places and filling all things--our souls, our church, our world and enlivening each of us to be Spiritual Powerhouses in all the little every day events and challenges of our lives.

Sunday June 4th, we celebrate this year the Pentecost, the giving of the Holy Spirit to the disciples, to the Church and all People of God. May we this day and all days experience the Gift of Pentecost as we bump into the Spirit as simply and unexpectantly as that wondering child or anxious young woman.

The Spirit of Truth in all places and filling all things.
Dwelling is us! Alleluia óAmen!

VESTRY RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were passed at the Vestry meeting on May 15, 2017:

1. Appointment of Columbarium Policy Committee ó Resolved, that the Vestry recognizes the need for the establishment of formal policies and procedures governing the columbarium niches which are or may be located on St. John's property, as well as the use of the Memorial Garden area. Therefore, the Vestry authorizes the establishment of the Columbarium and Memorial Garden Policy and Procedure Committee. The committee shall consist of 3 individuals appointed by the Rector and charged with responsibility to provide policies and procedures governing the use and fees for the columbarium niches and interment in the Memorial Garden. The Committee is also charged to supply their recommendations no later than the scheduled October 2017 Executive Committee meeting.
2. General Contractor ó Resolved, that the Vestry of St. John's accepts the recommendation of the Construction Committee and approves the selection of Paul Risk Construction as the church's general contractor, with a construction contract not to exceed \$1,234,400.
3. Fulton Bank ó Resolved, that the Vestry of St. John's accepts the recommendation of the St. John's Finance Committee and accepts and approves the offer of Fulton Bank, Lancaster, Pa., to establish a three-year line of credit with a limit of one million dollars and with a most favored rate of interest.

5. Binding Agreement ó Resolved, that the Vestry of St. Johnø approves the Binding Agreement between the Episcopal Diocese of Central Pennsylvania and St. Johnø Episcopal Church, Lancaster, Pa., effective May 15, 2017; and directs the signing of the document by the Junior Warden, Senior Warden, and Rector.
6. Collateral Account ó Resolved, that the Vestry establishes a restricted fund in the amount of \$650,000 using funds transferred from the parishø unrestricted endowment fund to act as collateral for the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania.

PROPERTY CORNER

April was a very busy month with preparations for Holy Week, a funeral, and Rafiki, fire alarm system restoration, and an asbestos report for Vestry, along with a Sacristy leak repair.

We have received very positive feedback for our lighting within the Church. The bulbs were replaced in March in preparation for Holy Week. There has been no word yet from our contractor on replacing these fixtures with those containing longer-lasting LED bulbs. They should be returning for gutter work in the very near future.

Our plumber was called in to troubleshoot and repair the leak in the Church's ladies' room. The April 27th effort included troubleshooting that revealed the leak was coming from the 1¼" piscina line. It was repaired with the same materials to negate any issues with materials' requirements. We will continue to monitor the repair prior to refinishing the ceiling and wall in this room. This will also allow the wall a chance to dry out. The leak appears to have been the result of electrolysis between the copper pipe and the metal lath for the plaster walls. We appreciate everyone's patience as we worked around schedules to make this repair.

The asbestos report was prepared and shared with members of this committee and the Vestry on April 14th. This report included cursory findings of our meeting with Ted Gallagher of EHC, which set the stage for the air sampling conducted on April 25th. The sampling included the lower levels of the Church and the Parish Hall, which were both considered to contain asbestos. Although all samples contained concentrations below half of the action level, the undercroft contained nearly twice the concentration of the robing room and the Sunday School classrooms, the other areas tested. Fortunately, the concentrations were not within action levels. However, the initial evaluation did confirm asbestos being located in the Sunday School area, which resulted in it also being tested. Kathy Kyper has provided an alternative to allow use of our storage space in the undercroft.

We prepared the third floor Becker House office for occupancy by the Rafiki administrator yesterday. Peeling and chipping paint and plastered walls made this space barely usable. This loose material was removed and patched/primed to prevent these materials from falling onto the workspace here. This space should be placed on our list of interior painting locations for the future, after exterior painting has been completed. We thank Kathy for her restoration of the exterior sills, which were rotted.

Our construction committee met on 4/26/17 and 5/10/17 to review value engineering proposals from Paul Risk. We hope to break ground on June 11th. Your Vestry has passed a resolution for Paul Risk to complete this project.

The smoke beam for the fire alarm system in the Church was replaced and satisfactorily tested, helping May's life safety inspection, conducted on May 1st, to be unremarkable. A module was installed to permit synchronized evacuation alarms with our horns/strobes throughout the church. The pressure relief valve was also replaced on boiler #2 on 4/28/17, as it was passing water. The new valve seems to be working as intended.

Our next meeting will be Monday, June 5th, 2017, at 7 p.m. in the Becker House. If anyone is interested in joining us as we work to support St. John's many other ministries, we hope you can join us at that time.

WEEKLY SUNDAY ALTAR FLOWERS

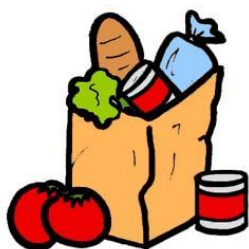

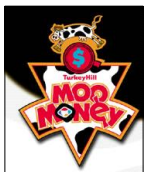

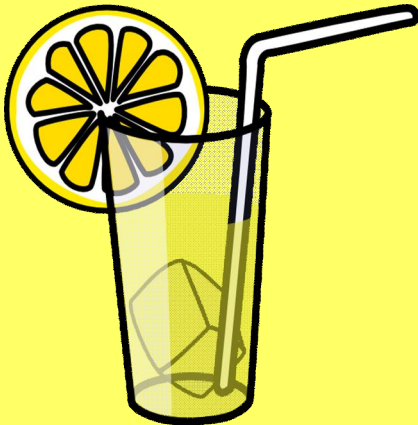

A VIGILANT EASTER

We transition from the Easter season into the season after Pentecost as we move from May into June, but I still have thoughts of Charlton Heston and a stuffed Easter bunny as I think back about the holiday. We began our Easter celebration at St. John's with the Great Vigil of Easter, found on p. 285 of the Book of Common Prayer. This Easter eve service consists of four parts: The Service of Light, The Service of Lessons, Baptism or the renewal of Baptismal Vows, and The Holy Eucharist.

In the Service of Lessons, nine lessons are listed and at least two of them are read. The BCP rubrics stipulate that one lesson of the selected lessons must be Exodus 14:10-15:1, Israel's Deliverance at the Red Sea. This year I was assigned to read the Exodus lesson at the Great Vigil, which describes the parting of the Red Sea by Moses so that the Jewish people could escape Egypt.

The next day's Easter Sunday Lancaster newspaper contained an article listing movies available "to help you celebrate the holiday." The list included Hop, Jesus Christ Superstar, Easter Parade, and The Ten Commandments. The review of Ten Commandments caught my eye, of course. It stated, "Yeah, it's an Old Testament story, so it has nothing to do with Easter or the New Testament, but it's become a holiday tradition to watch it. Charlton Heston is Moses...The Red Sea parts and Moses frees the Jews from slavery. Epic!"

The review of the classic Biblical movie did not catch me by surprise because I had read the same commentary before. My outrage was much more subdued this time. But, the thought that it has nothing to do with Easter because "it's an Old Testament story" makes me want to drag the writer to next year's Easter Vigil.

The vigil is a long service, The Ten Commandments is a long movie, and the deliverance of the Jews at the Red Sea is an integral part of both. The movie has something to do with Easter because, just as the Jews were saved from bondage in Egypt by God sending them Moses, all of mankind is saved from the bondage of sin by God sending us Jesus. In the Great Vigil of Easter, as Father John Morris put it in the April *Messenger*, we "...discover the ever-flowing stream of God's faithfulness."

We need to keep in mind, though, that not everyone with whom we associate has had the same religious experience as those of us who have grown up in the Christian faith. This was made clear to my daughter Amelia on Good Friday when she was invited to a friend's home for a small gathering of fellow high school students. It was asked by some what Good Friday was all about and it was described by the host dad as "Some kind of Christian holiday." Amelia was caught by surprise at this.

The week after Easter Day I was watching *The Tonight Show, Starring Jimmy Fallon*, and his first guest was a movie actor. Fallon asked him about his celebration of Easter with his young daughter. The actor described the big basket he and his wife gave the little girl with a stuffed Easter bunny on top. I thought to myself, "This story isn't gong to include anything Biblical." But, I was wrong. The actor related that they asked their daughter what she wanted to name the bunny and her answer was "Crucifixion." Both Fallon and I were caught by surprise. The actor explained that he and his wife had told the Crucifixion story to their little girl a few days prior to Easter.

A VIGILANT EASTER (CONTINUED)

The folks we come in contact with may not have had the traditional Christian experience we have had, but we must guard against presumptions that those who may not have had the same experiences as ourselves do not have as strong a faith and against making assumptions about people because of who they are, such as a Hollywood actor. Yes, even guard against making judgments about the writer of The Ten Commandments review.

I hope you had a Happy Eastertide and allow the power of the Holy Spirit into your life this Pentecost.
