#### WAITING FOR GEORGISA

Cindy and I are waiting for the birth of our second grandchild. We dongt know what to expect - a boy or a girl. But our children have chosen names for both. George, if a boy. Louisa, if a girl. As we wait for the birth, rather than refer to the baby as õit," wegve merged both names into one name - Georgisa.

Waiting for Georgisa is a busier activity than you might expect. Daily phone calls must be made. Text messages need to be monitored. Bags must be packed. The car, fully gassed. A cell phone must be present at all times.

We have been given an extensive list from our daughter-in-law, õdetailing the cosmic event that is Baby Morris 2k17.ö The list includes: where to find the hidden key to their house, location of light switches, names of neighbors, directions to the hospital, where to park, how to feed and walk the dog and contact information for the vet.

Grandparents are important. Obviously. We need to be in the loop. We have jobs to do.

All this makes me think about God (as most life events tend to do). As a grandparent I am only indirectly involved in the birth but I am also highly invested. My participation in the birthing process, while ancillary, is nonetheless significant and effects the long term quality of Georgisaøs life.

That is the way I feel about ministry. Clearly, I am not in charge of the way the world is, any more than I@m involved with giving birth. Creation is God@ business, not mine. At the same time, I am part of that creation and what I do does make a difference.

Ministry, like grandparenting, involves a lot of waiting. I am waiting for the birth of a better world. I want to see injustices corrected. I want the quality of life on earth to be improved. I want creation to be cared for and the lives of people to be valued. I want all of this for Georgisa.

Like waiting for Georgisa, ministry is active waiting. Prayer and worship. Building community and communication. Practicing self-care and good stewardship. Welcoming and nurturing others. These are things, that though in themselves may be small, when taken together impact our being in the world.

St. Paul talks about this in his Letter to the Romans, õFor the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of Godö (Romans 8:19). Pauløs point of view is that our lives are embedded in the creation and that creation is waiting for us, looking to us to emerge as the people God intends us to be. That makes us important. Obviously.

At St. Johnøs, these weeks of August may look unimportant. In fact, they are part of our active waiting. All the ministries of our church continue to function. It is not only our churchøs facilities but our ministries that are under construction. The first day of the week is still Sunday. Worship is happening in the sanctuary and in our makeshift-yet-surprisingly-pleasing-and-fully-accessible Parish Hall chapel.

Cindy and I stand ready to welcome our next grandchild. We are on pins and needles just like all other grandparents who await a birth.

May we all be also blessed with the same sense of excitement and anticipation as we look forward to our world to come, and be committed in a ministry of active waiting. We are important. What we do is important for the creation that eagerly awaits us and for Georgisa.

# CAUTION - This Is Not Your Typical Summer Reading

This past Saturday I traveled to the Diocesan Center in Maryland for a workshop. Although I live and minister in Lancaster and enjoy a good and growing relationship with Bishop Audrey, I am still õcanonically residentö in Maryland. Why? Well, every priest is always under the jurisdiction of a bishop. And there are many instances, mine included, where the priest remains connected to a bishop in one diocese while ministering in another diocese.

But back to the workshopô on Domestic Violence, its Identification, Prevention and our Churchesø Response. It is required of all Maryland clergy and leadership in addition to Safe Church (or Safeguarding Godøs Children/People) and Racism Awareness.

And that is a very good thing. I would advocate that every diocese follow Marylandøs lead in making the awareness and prevention of domestic violence a priority.

The Reverend Anne Weatherholt led the workshop. Author of *Breaking the Silence: the Church Responds to Domestic Violence*, she is active in local, state, church and national organizations and movements. She has been deeply involved since 1988.

Her message is pointed: õThree of every five persons around you have experienced domestic abuse, are in abusive situations, or have a family member being abused. They are hidden in plain sight.ö

Her message that Saturday was clear and sobering. And hopeful. Because in our awareness, our communities <u>are</u> the place where the silence can be broken and where healing and peace come for allí victim and abuser, family and friends.

Anne+ writes:

õThere are victims of domestic abuse all around you in church. So when the sermon is about forgiveness, when the topic of the day is reconciliation or the sanctity of marriage or the family, and there is no mention of the reality of abuse, *[those in abusive situations]* do not hear -good newsøbut only hear that they are to go back into the situation where they are batteredô emotionally, financially, spiritually and maybe physically, and that the church they love is unaware of their pain.

õ...We want everyone in church to be okay. We assume that, because they are in church, for the most part everyone IS okay. As the victims look around, they think they are alone, the only one who is afraid to go home. There is a conspiracy of silence that infects both church and society...ö



For as Anne+ reassures: õThe silence surrounding domestic violence is a difficult wall of denial on the part of abusers and victims alike, and it is a subject that most people don¢t want to talk about. But once the door is opened, be prepared for a flood of stories and the wonderful opportunity, not just to help, but to save lives.

# **SENIOR WARDEN**


Demolition has begun, and stopped. There have been many conversations going around in regard to this latest pause in our progress. In short, our demolition crew was a little eager to get things started before we had all of our ducks in a row! We are almost there and hopefully demolition will begin again within the next week. I for one am a little thankful for the pause. Once final approval from the diocese was received, things started happening very quickly. Our beloved courtyard tree was lying on the ground, the Browns were hard at work removing the rest of the cremains from our Memorial Garden, our beloved breezeway and arches were a little battered, the ramp was gone, and suddenly we were surrounded with construction fencing and signs. I personally had not quite prepared myself for actual demolition and what that would mean. There go so many memories! So, I am thankful for the pause; it has given me time to say good-bye to those memories and prepare myself for moving into our new space mentally as well as physically. It has also given staff, clergy, and our liturgy teams a chance to work out the kinks of how and where we do worship in the Parish Hall, how we get the able bodied in and out of the sanctuary, and bring unity to the different bodies that are worshipping together in separate spaces, on our campus as well as virtually via Facebook. I hope others have taken this pause to also prepare for the good-byes and prepare for the new.

There have been a lot of mixed emotions and feelings in regard to our building project. Some support this wholeheartedly, some not so much, and everything in between. I admit that I have been on a roller coaster ride in regard to this project. My thoughts and feelings have been all over the place. As a warden for the past two years, I am all too aware of the laundry list of items that need to be attended to across our campus and our limitations in being able to attend to them all. So, I understand the angst all too well. Then I found myself in a class this summer entitled Psychological Aspects of Individuals With Disabilities. In a nutshell, we discussed how society views and responds to those with disabilities. This did not include just those with intellectual, mental, or physical disabilities; it also included those groups of people who are in danger of being pushed out to the margins of society. We discussed how the social narrative has allowed this to happen and how well-intentioned people do not even realize what they are doing because the social narrative is so ingrained. It takes a very conscious effort to recognize it. I couldnøt help but think of our family here at St. Johnøs and how we minister to those on the margins. Personally, I think we do a great job, and then I thought about our handicapped accessibility as it is now and has been for so many years, and I looked at it through a different lens. Suddenly, it became all too clear to me the message we were sending, and I wasnøt quite so proud. Yes, we have provided a way to access our church, but it is not very welcoming or embracing. We didnot even have a button to press so that the back door could open on its own, if you didnot have someone to help you open the door, you were out of luck. Was this really the best we could do? No, it is not.

Our building project is the final piece of the puzzle for St. Johnøs to become fully accessible and welcoming to all people. I pray that all those who find themselves on the margins of society find a welcoming and embracing home at St. Johnøs, now and in the future.

# **VESTRY RESOLUTIONS**

#### The following resolutions were addressed by the Vestry on <u>July 17, 2017</u>:

- 1. <u>Handbell Refurbishment</u> Resolved, that the Vestry approves the expensing from the Music Fund restricted account up to \$1350 to refurbish the full set of St. Johnøs handbells; and be it further resolved that the Vestry pledges to budget annually in the operating fund \$300 that will be transferred each year to the Music Fund restricted account to pay for future handbell refurbishments. *Tom Bond called the question, motion tabled until August meeting for further clarification.*
- 2. <u>June Resolutions</u> Resolved, that the Vestry affirms the resolutions approved by email vote on June 21, 2017: Pipe Organ Refurbishment, Web Streaming, Parish Hall TV, Asbestos Abatement, and Fr. Bill Archer. *Lynn Hayford called the question, motion passed.*
- 3. <u>Escrow</u> ó Resolved, that the vestry of St. Johnøs Episcopal Church authorizes the release from capital campaign funds a sum of \$68,059 made payable to the City of Lancaster, PA, to be held in a city escrow account as mandated by the city to secure the costs of site improvements. *Lynn Hayford called the question, motion passed.*

# **PROPERTY CORNER**

We thank the Browns and Angela Cuthbert for their help with our Memorial Garden and the Columbarium. Many hours have been spent over several days relocating portions of both of these sacred areas of our church campus, requiring an entire family effort, for which we are extremely grateful. Kathy Kyper continues with her handiwork. While finished with the undercroft floor, walls and partitioning, she has moved on to the Narthex entrance. The undercroft work started with the removal of lots of storage from this space.

We are working to get the kitchen refrigerator replaced, as it is not keeping temperature. Your Vestry has passed a resolution to replace this unit, which is now about sixteen years old and using Freon 22, which we are told will no longer be produced after the end of the year.

We are awaiting a quote from a painter for the exterior of the Becker House. A menu-type quote was requested so that we could hit the bad areas while still remaining under our budgeted \$5,000 amount. Plans call for our masonry contractor to be here in August to perform his budgeted \$7,500 amount of pointing, as well.

Fortunately, we were able to get permission for our gutter contractor to use the demolition crewøs lift. It was thought that we could make use of it, so as not to have to pay for a lift rental to have our gutters cleaned and repaired. Our contractor is going to work around several jobs and our construction to make this work happen for us. I havenøt heard any complaints from those using our facilities during our project. We continue to work on signage and the worship space in the Parish Hall to offer ease of accessibility during our project.

Julyøs Life Safety inspection discovered both the smoke beam in the Nave and the one in the Auditorium to be not functioning. Select Security came in to resolve this situation on July 12th. The rest of the inspection was unremarkable.

Our construction committee continues to work on the new columbarium design toward a formal proposal within the next week from Eickhof Columbaria. This company has been very cooperative and extremely patient with the many revisions we have had in this process. In addition, we have secured our Builderøs Risk policy with Church Insurance, our current insurance carrier. We are currently working through a changing approval process with our construction, with hopes of being able to move on our project within the very near future. We appreciate everyoneøs patience in this process.

Your Property Committee is one of the few ministries that serve all of St. Johnøs other ministries. Its strength come from the dedication and diverse backgrounds everyone brings to the table. We are very blessed to have some new members. And, we would be even more fortunate to have your expertise. Our next meeting will be Tuesday, August 1<sup>st</sup>, 2017, at 7 p.m. in the Becker House. We hope to see you then!

# Special Education with Rafiki

Even though it is summer here in the United States, school is still on the brain for one teacher. Meg Diller, a preschool teacher in Lancaster, left in June for her second trip to visit LightHouse Academy in Alendu, Kenya. In 2015, Meg, along with other volunteers from the US, visited Alendu to work with the teachers of LightHouse Academy. That trip made an obvious impact on Meg and her husband, Ken. So this summer, Meg will return to Kenya for a few weeks to continue the work started by the team in 2015.

Meg Diller traveled with the Worship Center team in the summer of 2015. On that trip, the team presented many different topics including Reading Assessment Training, providing training on analyzing data and creating educational goals for students, providing Special Education training, providing computer/email training to all school staff members, hosting a Vacation Bible School for all students at the school, providing marriage counseling to parents and teachers, and providing conflict resolution skills to administrators at LHA. Needless to say, it was a busy trip for the team.

Meg was one of the 4 educators on the 2015 trip and participated in the reading trainings for the teachers at LHA. On her trip this June, her focus will be to check on the progress of the reading program. Meg will work with teachers to look at the assessments that they have administered, analyze the data and help teachers create new goals for their students. In addition, Meg will also be working in the preschool through second grade classrooms to share her knowledge of Early Childhood Education with the teachers of those grade levels. Meg has been looking forward to this trip since her trip in 2015 and will be an asset to the teachers of LHA while she is there. When she returns, she will be volunteering with Rafiki's education board to help develop new goals for the teachers and students at LHA.

# **CHRISTIAN EDUCATION (CONTINUED)**

From July 10<sup>th</sup> through the 14<sup>th</sup>, a group of 12 high school youth from our diocese embarked on a spiritual journey to Edmond, Oklahoma, for the triennial Episcopal Youth Event (EYE17), which is a worldwide youth event sponsored by the Episcopal Church. This particular event was hosted by the Episcopal Diocese of Oklahoma, led by The Rt. Rev. Dr. Edward J. õBishop Edö Konieczny. There were approximately 1,300 youth and their adult chaperones.

The event started with an opening Eucharist which included praise music from the EYE band, welcome from Bishop Ed, and Episcopal Church Staff Officer, Youth Ministries, Bronwyn Clark Skov, and a rousing sermon by our Presiding Bishop, Bishop Michael Curry. The EYE participants then had opportunities on both Tuesday and Thursday to attend two Praxis sessions each, ranging from an informative session with Bishop Curry talking more in depth about õThe Jesus Movement,ö along with a Q&A period at each session, õOur Family: 85 million members,ö Digital Tools for Ministry, Episcopal Service Corps, UN Path to Peace, and many more sessions.

On Wednesday, all 1,300 participants were loaded onto buses, and taken on a tour of Oklahoma City, including the Oklahoma City National Memorial, OKC Museum of Art, Oklahoma History Museum, The Cowboy Museum, Oklahoma State Fairgrounds and Horse Show Arena, and both St. Johnøs Episcopal Church and St. Pauløs Episcopal Cathedral in Oklahoma City. The evening included the õRed Dirt Festivalö which was a festival including foods from Food Truck Vendors from the area, and ended with a peace walk from the festival to the OKC National Memorial park, where a candlelight service was held, with a sermon from Bishop Ed. Everyone was then loaded onto the buses again and returned to the University of Central Oklahoma, where the group was housed in its dormitories.

Thursday saw another day of Praxis sessions available to everyone, and another rousing closing Eucharist with the EYE band, introductions to all those responsible for the successful planning and execution of EYE17, and a sermon from the Rev. Winnie Varghese, Director of Justice and Reconciliation at Trinity Church, Wall Street, NYC.

Our contingency consisted of 12 high school youth from our diocese, led by our Bishop Audrey Scanlan, Rev. Gina Barrett of St. Johnøs Marietta, and Diocesan Youth coordinator Mary Ellen Kilp, and her husband Bob.

The youth were responsible to raise part of their costs on their own, and then took part in fundraising efforts to earn the rest of their way. They were supported financially in part by their own funds, a portion of funds from their parishes, and from the diocese. They were also given funds by the generosity of A.L.E.R.T. (All Lancaster Episcopal Response Team), ECW, and through a service project provided by St. Thomas Episcopal, Lancaster, PA., and some anonymous donations.

The group embarked on the journey beginning at 3:00 am, from St. Paul Episcopal in Columbia, PA, with the Rev. Patrick Peters sending them off with prayer, to BWI airport in Baltimore. From BWI, the group flew to Dallas, TX, and drove the rest of the way in a 15-passenger van, to Edmond, Oklahoma, with the return route the same, in reverse. The group arrived back in Columbia in the early morning hours of Saturday, the 15<sup>th</sup> of July.

A great time was had by all, and the group is so appreciative of the support they received from their own parishes, as well as from their parents, and all the other groups that helped to make the trip possible. They all felt very privileged to be able to spend almost four whole days with their Bishop, and have such a moving, and somewhat life-changing, experience!

I, along with 11 other youth from our diocese, 3 chaperones, and Bishop Audrey Scanlan, had the opportunity to attend Episcopal Youth Event (EYE) in Oklahoma from July 10th to the 14th. About 1,300 people journeyed to EYE from around the world. We heard from many different speakers throughout the week, including Presiding Bishop Michael Curry during Opening Eucharist, and people impacted by the Oklahoma City bombing. On Wednesday, we spent the day in Oklahoma City visiting different museums and churches. It was an incredible week of worshipping, singing, laughing, and praying.



The regular coffee hour is between services during the summer months, and a quick light refreshment of lemonade only is offered at 11:30 a.m.




