CHARLOTTESVILLE

It's not just political anymore.

My daughter and her family live in Charlottesville, Virginia. Nina works for the University of Virginia. Her job is to work with the college community and larger community to raise awareness about environmental sustainability. She is actively involved in the life of her city. She works closely with the students of UVA. She deeply cares about both.

Nina was not involved in the protests in Charlottesville. At the time she was vacationing with her family. While she was upset about what happened to her college and her city, I was glad she was not there. If she were, I know she would have been with her students and her neighbors protesting the presence of Nazis in their city. I know she would have been in the crowd. I know she could have been injured or killed like Heather Heyer. The events of Charlottesville are for me not just political. It's personal.

It is also about what is moral. The sight of Nazis carrying flaming torches and automatic weapons through our streets in the dark of night chanting slogans of hate for Jews, blacks and other minorities, is abhorrent in the eyes of God. We all have the right to free speech. But when free speech turns into hate speech it is up to the church community and other communities of faith to speak out against hatred and violence and to speak up for the equality and dignity of all people and the care and protection of every child of God.

There are those who point to violence "on both sides." What this view ignores is that Nazis and white supremacists have a history of violence. They came to Charlottesville intending to provoke and attack. The students and neighbors who opposed them came to react and defend. One group came with criminal intent. The other acted in self defense.

The greater danger is that violence begets violence, and those who oppose the haters become infected by the hate they oppose. It becomes unclear as to who is good and who is bad, a legal distinction, and muddies the moral distinction between what is right from what is wrong. This invites the perception of moral equivalency between Nazis and counter protesters. It alienates those who find themselves in the middle. It jeopardizes the just cause of those who stand against racism.

It is the responsibility of the church and other faith communities to break this moral stalemate. The resistance to Nazis and racists can not be only to fight fire with fire. The resistance must be led by those willing to combat hate with love, to meet violence with non-violence. Our vision of a just and equal society must be matched by the values and virtues that inspire sacrifice and instill the courage to change.

Television coverage and news reports of the protests noted the presence of clergy leading the resistance. It was the bishops of the Episcopal Church, with their clergy and laity, who were on the front line. It is clear which side the church stands for and a clue as to where God stands.

Racism is not new to our nation. It is our country's chronic disease. We may not be able to eradicate racism but we can put it into remission by overcoming hate speech with heart speech, by demonstrating that there are many more of us and very few of them, and by robbing Nazis and supremacists of their pride and instead showering them with their shame. The battle may be political but the struggle must be moral if we are to win the victory promised us by God.

A Word of Wisdom from a Voice Long Lived

It was 2002, a few months after the 9/11 attack. I was in a seminar at the College of Preachers at the National Cathedral in Washington, DC. The conversation drifted as most conversations of those days to the events surrounding the attack. It was a Pandora's Box of emotions: fear, anger, horror. And questions of what to do and how to be safe turned into declarations of reprisal and revenge. I distinctly remember the question: "What if they used guns in the 1960's Civil Rights Movement?" And I was stunned when a suggested alternative response of humanitarian aid and health care, education and suitable employment to impoverished people of many nations, including our own, was rejected wholesale. And the conversation turned bitter and unresolved.

Fast forward to 2017. We find ourselves confronted by much the same Pandora's Box. Only this time, it is from within—a cultural battle within our American borders—a spiritual struggle within our personal hearts. And the jury is still out, as they say.

This past Sunday, an interview on Meet the Press grabbed my attention. I generally listen to this news broadcast as I straighten up around my home. Did you know that Meet the Press, MTP as it is often now called, is the longest running program in TV history? It first aired in November 1947 with first moderator, journalist Martha Rountree, its creator.

This Sunday past, the current host, Chuck Todd, interviewed Ambassador Andrew J. Young. I sat down to listen. Andrew Jackson Young was born 85 years ago to a "well-to-do Negro" household in New Orleans. He began his career as a pastor in the South. Drawn to Mohandas Gandhi's concept of nonviolent resistance for social change, he became an ally and close confidant of Martin Luther King, Jr. He later became a U.S. Congressman from Georgia, US Ambassador to the United Nations, and finally Mayor of Atlanta.

Ambassador Young's words in this past Sunday's interview spoke a Wisdom to me and gave a greater context to the sights and horrors of this month's—these year's past. I want to share in part with you: "Well, it's a week of misunderstandings. We originally sought to redeem the soul of America from the triple evils of race, war and poverty.

"Most of the issues that we're dealing with now are related to poverty. But we still want to put everything in a racial context. The problem with the - and the reason I feel uncomfortable condemning the Klan types is - they are almost the poorest of the poor.

"They are the forgotten Americans. And, um, they have been used and abused and neglected. Instead of giving them affordable health care, they give them black lung jobs, and they're happy.

"And that just doesn't make sense in today's world ...

"...Our job was not to put down white people. Our job was to lift everybody up together. To come – so that we would learn to live together as brothers and sisters rather than perish together as fools. And that's been the way I have done it...

"...From 4-years-old, I was always taught-my father use to tap me in the face to try to get me upset and if I swung back at him he would slap me upside my head. He said see, if you start getting emotional in a fight, you're going to lose the fight. Don't get mad, get smart.

"And that's been serving-that served me well. And it served me walking in the midst of the Klan alone at night without a gun, without police protection, and the only reason I did it was because the only ones that were courageous enough to go there with me and who insisted that I go were women and children. The men, you know, hide behind militant solutions, but we have to keep our eyes on the prize – and the prize is not vengeance, not getting even, but the prize is redemption....

"...The people we should look up to are the members of Mother Emanuel AME Church [Charleston], who looked at this young man who shot nine of their members with forgiveness. And what they thought, you know, it didn't mean bringing the flag down. It meant giving that boy affordable health care – that the mental section– the mental evaluations that should go with an affordable health care would do more to help these angry people, black and white, because the world is in a tremendous strain...

"...A lot of these people are as old as me that are now militant. I don't know where they were back in the 50s and 60s. And now they, when it's safe, when it's cheap, they want to get over and get loud. They ought to quiet down and get to work. Register some voters, teach some children, treat their wives a little better, and, and learn what it means to be man in the 21st century. ... It doesn't matter what color you are. That lesson goes for everybody and any color."

VESTRY RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were addressed by the Vestry on <u>August 21, 2017</u>:

- 1. <u>HANDBELL REFURBISHMENT</u> Resolved, that St. John's Vestry approves the expensing from the Music Fund restricted account for up to \$1350 to refurbish the full set of St. John's handbells. (and be it further resolved that the Vestry pledges to budget annually in the operating fund \$300 that will be transferred each year to the Music Fund restricted account to pay for future handbell refurbishments.) *Sue Heilman called the question. The motion was defeated. After discussion Peter Novosel moved to amend the resolution, to remove the wording to budget the annual \$300. Glenn Miller called the question. The motion carried.*
- <u>REFRIGERATOR</u> Resolved, that the St. John's Vestry confirms the resolution approved by e-mail vote taken August 8, 2017 to purchase a replacement for the kitchen refrigerator in the Parish Hall and authorizes the expenses from the ECW Restricted Fund, a sum of \$3,262.04 payable to The Restaurant Store. *Tom Bond called the question. The motion carried.*
- 3. <u>DIOCESAN COLLATERAL</u> Resolved, that the Vestry of St. John's Church, Lancaster, reaffirms its May 15, 2017 commitment to the Binding Agreement and its direction to establish and fund a separate account in the amount of \$650,000 from the unrestricted endowment fund as a Diocesan Collateral Restricted Fund. *Sue Heilman called the question. The motion carried.*
- 4. <u>**RESTRICTED ACCOUNTS**</u> Resolved, that the St. John's Vestry approves the following proposed amendments to the Restricted Funds Account Descriptions:

DELETE: Exceptional Giving, Accessibility / Building, Labyrinth

ESTABLISH:

<u>A/V Fund</u> – This account was established by a gift from Frank Cummins in memory of his wife, Maureen Shannon, for the purpose of funding the upgrading our audio-visual equipment to current standards. Requests for use of these monies are made to Vestry by the Vestry Steward for Communications.

<u>Capital Fund</u> – The purpose of this account is to investment and preserve capital pledge funds for the use of paying for the 2017/2018 construction project. This project is to enhance the buildings with more accessibility, improvements to the courtyard and columbarium, welcoming gathering space and spiritual labyrinth.

<u>Diocesan Collateral</u> – Following the approval of the Binding Agreement by the Vestry on May 15, 2017, a sum of \$650,000 of unrestricted endowment funds were reallocated as a restricted account. These funds are to be held as collateral for the Diocese until the line of credit with Fulton Bank has been paid in full.

<u>Food Pantry</u> - These funds are contributed for the purpose of funding the Jubilee Food Pantry. These funds are to help offset the costs of food and supplies when the collected offerings are not enough. The Food Pantry coordinator has the authorization to access these funds.

<u>Liturgical Arts Fund</u> – Monies for this fund were first provided by memorial gifts received in honor of Richard and Phyllis "Poppy" Youngquist. The purpose of these gifts is for the conservation, maintenance and repair of articles of liturgical art given to St. John's: i.e., oil paintings, stained glass windows, leaded glass windows. Request for the use of these funds are made by the Vestry Worship Steward.

<u>R3 Fund</u> – This fund was originally established from a surplus of gifts given to repair the roof of the Parish Hall. It is additionally funded through the Building Fund envelopes. The fund's purpose is to set aside emergency monies to restore, repair and replace, non-budgeted and unexpected capital items. Requests for these funds are made by the Vestry Property Steward.

<u>Rector's Fund</u> - The St. John's Rector's Fund is the discretionary account established to provide for unbudgeted charitable needs and ministry-related expenses. Previously funded by the interest from a certificate of deposit, these monies have been invested with LaPorte Asset Management with five hundred dollars a quarter being transferred to the Rector Fund checking account. These funds are used at the sole discretion of the Rector.

<u>Rental Property Fund</u> – The net annual income from the Concord Street rental properties is deposited into this account and used to fund the annual rental property expenses, with all net income reserved for future capital repairs or improvements. Any annual net deficit is subtracted from the fund at the end of the calendar year.

<u>Student Assistance Fund</u> – The purpose of the Student Assistance Fund is to provide enhanced support for students who are homeless or at risk, especially those attending Robert Fulton Elementary School. The Fund was established using gifts given in the memory of Mary Lou Higgs. Requests for financial assistance can be made by the Principal or school staff person authorized by the Principal. All requests must be submitted in writing through the Eagle's Nest coordinator for Vestry approval. *Leslie Tahsler called the question. The motion carried*.

5. **FAIRSHARE PLAN** - Whereas the Binding Agreement with the Diocese concerning the building project requires St. John's parish plan to meet 100% of its Fairshare assessment by 2020;

Whereas St. John's parish as allocated \$50,000 for its Fairshare payment for this calendar year, which is approximately 66% of the assessment of \$76,000;

Whereas it will become necessary to meet the Fairshare assessment by using funds from various sources, the Fairshare assessment may/will increase;

VESTRY RESOLUTIONS (CONTINUED AND FINISHED)

Therefore, the Vestry of St. John's parish hereby adopts the following plan to increase our Fairshare payments over the next three years in the following increments:

2018 – 70% or \$57,000; 2019 – 85% or \$64.600; and 2020 – 100% or \$76,000. Sue Heilman called the question. The motion carried.

- 6. **<u>STEWARDSHIP</u>** Resolved, that the Vestry of St. John's supports the Fall Pledge Campaign by submitting their pledges at the September Vestry meeting and attending at least one of the Cottage Gatherings offered to parishioners. *Sue Heilman called the question. The motion carried.*
- 7. **<u>KATHY KYPER</u>** Whereas Kathy Kyper has volunteered numerous hours of service scraping, plastering, priming, painting, laying tile, building storage and creating better closet space;

Whereas she has generously provided the supplies and materials for these projects; Whereas she has performed a total makeover of the Vesting Room, brightened the Undercroft hallway; and constructed a new Guild Room to be used by the Altar Guild and Flower Guild;

Be it therefore resolved, that the St. John's Vestry sends to Kathy Kyper their deep thanks and appreciation for providing the members of the Acolytes, Altar Guild, Chancel Choir, Flower Guild, Lay Eucharistic Ministers and Vergers with beautiful space to support their ministries.

Pam Loose called the question. The motion carried.

BACKPACK & LUNCH BOX COLLECTION AT ST. JOHN'S

The Refugee Resource Group of the Diocese is once again working with Catholic Charities to provide needed items for refugee families. As school starts, refugee children in Central Pennsylvania are in need of new or gently used backpacks and/or lunch boxes for the coming school year. Items such as pencils, pens and paper can be included in the backpack.

This is one way we can show our concern for refugees as our neighbors. The backpacks and school lunch boxes will be distributed through Catholic Charities, based in Harrisburg.



PROPERTY CORNER

We thank Kathy Kyper for her work in the undercroft and in some of our gardens. The "guilds room" has been completely refinished, short of some paint. Please take the opportunity to take a look at her work, intended to encapsulate the breaking asbestos floor tiles in this space.

We have worked with Sue Martin to get the kitchen refrigerator replaced, as it was operating warm and continuously, making it inefficient. Sue received proposals from Clark's Restaurant Store, from which additional research was conducted to determine the best option for St. John's. Following this committee's recommendations for L H Brubaker and Martin's, research revealed that the double door units were too wide for the space we have available.

Our painter will be fitting us in later in the year due to the size of our project to get portions of the Becker House sealed, especially on sills. Plans call for A+ Masonry to be here next month to perform their budgeted \$7,500 amount of work, as well.

Despite getting permission for our gutter contractor to use the demolition crew's lift, the gutter contractor never made it in to do the work before the demolition crew left the job site. Our general contractor indicated that there will be other times that a lift will be on-site when our gutter contractor may be able to use a lift.

This month's Life Safety inspection found the Church's smoke beam failing. We will be looking into installing a smoke detector in this space to offer effective coverage. Our addition will require the upgrade of our alarm panel for the increased number of zones that will be required for the new devices on our system. It will also require considerable changes with the zone numbers and descriptions to accommodate the new addition.

Our construction committee firmed up the new columbarium design after receiving Eickof's proposal. The demolition company finished up in early August. We are still somewhat behind from our original schedule, but little time has passed with which to make up time. Careful coordination will be required, especially as it affects both electrical power and comfort equipment, which spans between the two buildings.

Our next meeting will be Tuesday, September 5, 2017, at 7 p.m. in the Becker House. We decided to have the Fall Clean-up on Saturday, December 9, 9 to noon, in preparation for Christmas.

Our committee consists of people of various backgrounds and experiences working for the benefit of St. John's many other ministries. What could you bring to our committee? We may never know, unless you join us. We hope to see you on the first Tuesday of every month at 7p.m. in the Becker House

Special Education with Rafiki

Even though it is summer here in the United States, school is still on the brain for one teacher. Meg Diller, a preschool teacher in Lancaster, left in June for her second trip to visit LightHouse Academy in Alendu, Kenya. In 2015, Meg, along with other volunteers from the US, visited Alendu to work with the teachers of LightHouse Academy. That trip made an obvious impact on Meg and her husband, Ken. So this summer, Meg returned to Kenya for a few weeks to continue the work started by the team in 2015.

Meg Diller traveled with the Worship Center team in the summer of 2015. On that trip, the team presented many different topics including Reading Assessment Training, providing training on analyzing data and creating educational goals for students, providing Special Education training, providing computer/email training to all school staff members, hosting a Vacation Bible School for all students at the school, providing marriage counseling to parents and teachers, and providing conflict resolution skills to administrators at LHA. Meg was one of the four educators on the 2015 trip and participated in the reading trainings for the teachers at LHA. Needless to say, it was a busy trip for the team.

On her current trip, her focus is to check on the progress of the reading program. Her work with teachers includes looking at the assessments that they have administered, analyzing the data and helping teachers create new goals for their students. In addition, Meg will also be working in the preschool through second grade classrooms to share her knowledge of Early Childhood Education with the teachers of those grade levels.

When Meg returns, she will be volunteering with Rafiki's education board to help develop new goals for the teachers and students at LHA.
