OUR DECEMBER TO REMEMBER

December 2017 at St. John & Church will be memorable for many different reasons and in many different ways. For one, we will continue to be a church under construction. But we will be in our final phase. That in itself will make this Christmas at St. John be like no other.

Another need to remember. This year the Fourth Sunday of Advent and Christmas Eve are both on December 24th. That will put a wrinkle in our service schedule that you will need to be alert to and remember as noted below.

Add to that the fact that all of our Advent Sunday and Christmas services in December are unique and memorable in their own right.

The First Sunday of Advent, December 3rd, commences with the **Lighting of the Advent Wreath** by a family from the congregation. The Nativity Scene will also be in place as the figures of the holy family of Joseph and Mary begin their procession from the rear of the nave guided by a star.

The Second Sunday of Advent, December 10th, a service of **Advent Lessons and Carols** with Holy Eucharist, will be celebrated at 8:00 and 10:15 a.m. The telling of õThe Story Before Christmasö is combined with beautiful Advent hymns.

The Third Sunday of Advent, December 17th, **St. John's Sunday** will be observed. We will honor at both our services those whom we recognize as õsaints among usö: the Cuthbert-Brown family, Angela, Doug, Chloe and Sophie; and Joe and April Way. Add to that, the 1915 date stone will be cracked open by our resident stone mason, Doug Brown, at 9:15 a.m. in the Parish Hall, revealing the 102-year-old contents of the time capsule.

The Fourth Sunday of Advent, December 24th, will be observed with an 8:00 a.m. Rite I Eucharist only. There will **NOT** be a 10:15 a.m. service.

Christmas Eve celebrations will begin at 3:30 p.m. with a Rite I Eucharist featuring the St. Johnøs Handbell Choir. At 6:30 p.m. will be our family service of a childrenøs Nativity Pageant and Eucharist Rite II. Our service of Festive Choral Eucharist Rite II, with accompaniment by the Lancaster Brass Quintet, begins with a Prelude of Music and Carols at 10:30 p.m.

ST. JOHN'S WILL BE ACCESSIBLE TO ALL for Christmas Eve services. While we will not have an occupancy permit for the atrium, we will be provided safe passage to the sanctuary. The atrium will be roofed and glassed in. The Chestnut St. ramp will be usable. Handrails and lighting will be installed. For the first time since June we will all be able to worship God together in our sanctuary.


THE REV. JOHN W. MORRIS (CONTINUED)

Christmas Day, December 25th, a service of Holy Eucharist Rite II, with sermon and Christmas music and hymns, will be offered at 11:00 a.m. One of the few Christmas Day services in town, the music of Paul Reese makes it the best Christmas Day service in town.

The First Sunday of Christmas, December 31st, our liturgy will be a service of **Christmas Lessons** and Carols with Holy Eucharist at 8:00 and 10:15 a.m. We hear the whole story of Christøs birth as we sing Christmas hymns for the last time until next year.

That is much to remember and all of it will be unforgettable. What is more memorable still is the reason for our recollection - Jesus Christ. Through Jesus we recall the message of the prophets. In Jesus we are reminded of the tender love of God for us. With Jesus we commemorate Godøs saving grace. Because of Jesus we are a people God never forgets but always remembers and keeps forever.

An Advent Tradition

Every year about this time I reach for a book õDonkey Bells: Stories, Traditions and Meditations from Catherine Doherty.ö Catherine, born in Tsarist Russia, was baptized and raised in the Russian Orthodox Tradition; she later became Roman Catholic. Over her lifetime, through her writings and uncompromising spirit, she introduced the great heritage of Russian Orthodoxy to the West.

Reading her book every year is my way of preparing for Advent leading to Christmas. It gives a special meaning to the season in my home, a special reminder of this time of Advent Waiting.

My most treasured tradition and story is õBells and the Donkey,ö which Catherine® mother did for her children every Advent. There are many practices to prepare for Adventô the Coming of Christ among usô such as Lighting the Advent wreath. Revisiting this story and tradition is mine:

A little donkey carried Mary as she traveled from Nazareth to Bethlehem with Joseph. She soon would give birth to the Christ Child. The little donkey had bells around his neck and as they traveled, the little bells would tinkle. Imagine it. Mother Mary riding on this little donkey, carrying Christ in her. She was the "first church!" And the little donkey, carrying Mother Mary and sounding the bells: the "first church bells."

Around the second week of Advent, Catherine mother wore a little bracelet with tinkling bells. As she moved about the house, the children heard the bells. Each week a few more bells made the sounds much louder. And as the Advent weeks passed, the children imagined stories of Mary and Joseph traveling to Bethlehem. They talked about how they too could prepare to go to Bethlehem. And as Christmas approached, the bells became a bit louder and the children executement grew.





SENIOR WARDEN

Advent will soon be upon us and with it the messages of hope and joy. It couldnot come at a more needed time. I try not to listen to the news or even read the news, but even so, news of mass shootings are hard to avoid, along with the news of men of power taking advantage of and treating women poorly, the racial divide that still exists in this country, and the devastating wildfires and hurricanes that so many are still recovering from. We are so in need of those messages of hope and joy.

I was looking through an Advent and Christmas meditations book for the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd entitled, õLiving in Joyful Hope.ö It begins with Isaiahøs Prophecy of the Light: õThe people who walked in darkness have seen a great light.ö How fitting for our current times. Iød like to share with you the prayer that accompanies this reading.

It begins with verses from Psalm 119, verses 105, 111, 130:

Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path. Your decrees are my heritage forever; they are the joy of my heart. The unfolding of your words gives light; it imparts understanding to the simple.

The prayer then continues:

When all around me is darkness. O Lord. I turn to vour word. I open my heart to your ancient teaching, to the sacred mystery of your scripture. One verse from the Bible imparts joy beyond all telling. I will turn again and read of how you commanded the light to be light. I will arise: my own light will shine because your Word is within me. One day your Word will overtake the world completely. What a light it will be when all have arisen and all shine with your glory! Amen

As we prepare to move through Advent, let us continue to keep up the good work Jesus has asked us to do and spread the light through the darkness that surrounds us.

PROPERTY CORNER

Our HVAC contractor was called to make repairs to our boilers. Due to all of the construction work, both unit required cleaning to provide efficient firing. Through our construction effort, our comfort and electrical systems have been redesigned to increase efficiency and access for maintenance. This effort was included as part of the system redesign for the new addition.

With upgrading our electrical service, handling our Parish House and Church, the old panel had to be removed and replaced with a new panel. The new panel had to be inspected by a construction official, prior to PPL restoring power to these areas of our campus. This process took a little longer than anticipated, resulting in restricted use of our Parish Hall for meetings. The upgrade was necessary to accommodate the additional electrical demand for our addition, especially the elevator. Again, we appreciate everyone¢s understanding as we navigate through this and our other temporary construction challenges during the usual busy use of our facilities by our many ministries, including support groups.

We took the opportunity to remove the tulip poplar tree and will be repairing the sidewalk on the Mulberry Street side of our campus, both required by the City of Lancaster. Although not being funded by the capital campaign, it was felt that using the contractors available through the construction project would be the most cost effective means of meeting our needs and those of the city. We apologize for the temporary inconvenience this effort has posed to our members and those whom we serve. Everyone¢s understanding in this effort is appreciated.

As you have already figured, our construction project has occupied much of your Property Managerøs time. October saw the relocation of the gas service for the Church building. Much time was spent evaluating effective options for the drain lines of our roof downspouts and rain gardens to improve efficiency while dealing with root-clogged underground drainpipes. We thank the city for their assistance in locating viable options for our overflow from our proposed rain gardens.

As part of our package insurance policy, the builder risk policy was renewed at our 10/02 renewal. Other coverage features, such as payments, exclusions and limits, are now handled through the Finance Committee. A cursory review of our policy revealed limited, if any, changes from the policy last year.

This monthøs Life Safety inspection was completed on November 1st and required batteries to be replaced in two emergency lighting units and bulbs to be replaced in one. Select Security has relocated the fire alarm panel to the lower level of the Parish House stairtower. This relocation was required to provide a streamlined system, where the main alarm panel and related equipment would be located away from the new Atrium, while being located on the lower level of the Parish House. The panel will also be updated to handle the additional devices required for our new addition and the elevator.

With the City of Lancaster recently passing a lead ordinance for rental properties, we reached out to Younger Realty Management Company for their perspective on the Cityøs requirements. We are in the process of getting that information as of this writing. But, provided the lead remains undisturbed, we should only require testing.

We are always looking for new or different perspectives on our committee. Our meetings are held on the first Tuesday of every month, with our next meeting being Tuesday, December 5th, 2017, at 7 p.m. in the Becker House. Weød love for you to join us! And, donøt forget our Fall Clean-up will be Saturday, December 9th, from 8:00 - 11:00 a.m. in preparation for Christmas. We look forward to seeing everyone then, as many hands make for light work!

RAFIKI AFRICA

This holiday season, Rafiki Africa is sharing the story of our student **Esther Akoth**.

As a child, Esther and her family lived in Kisumu, where her mother sold vegetables and her dad was a city TukTuk driver. When Esther was 12, her mother died in childbirth. Her family had to move from Kisumu town slum to the village, where living is less expensive but has limitations such as access to health care, education and water.

Since Esther was the oldest sibling, she now took the responsibility of her mother for her family. She started to budget daily for food, go to the market to shop, prepare meals, clean the home and collect water from the river a half mile away from home. After her mother¢s funeral, she and her siblings did not attend school for several months. Their maternal grandmother knew of LightHouse Academy (LHA) but was not sure if they could be admitted, since it would be very difficult for Esther¢s father to afford taking all of them to school. One day, she sent them with their father and we immediately fell in love with the family, and admitted all 3 siblings to LHA. Rafiki has helped this family access good education and meals for the kids while at school. We have also helped with family support by providing resources for a better home, meals at home and health care.

Finally this November, Esther graduated from 8th grade, which will allow her to attend high school and eventually college. She says $\tilde{o}I$ am so blessed to be a student at LightHouse and for my siblings to go to the same school. I have learnt so much including how use computers. I am so thankful for all my school sponsors. \tilde{o} Esther has very impressive leadership skills that she has used to help her father take care of her family and at school. She wants to be a nurse and go back to help her community. Currently she is in student government and helps coordinate a lot of activities on campus.

Esther is one out of 19 students graduating from LightHouse in 8th grade. Each of her classmates has a story. They need support to be able to continue with their education in high school. Please consider partnering with Esther and her classmates to reach their goal of \$10,500 by the end of the year. EYES TO SEE

This fall I scooped up a poster, wanting to share it with you all. The poster shows a renowned figure, with the image balanced by few words.

The figure ikeness to the likeness I am used to seeing is vague at best. Not enough mitre nor reindeer to make the bishop easily recognizable. This rather young looking figure cradles a sphere ó the sphere, undoubtedly, earth. Is that you, old St. Nick?

The posterøs words few, simple, directí maybe too direct for someí sit above and below this odd facsimile of our beloved, familiar, warm and cuddly legend.

Despite its drawbacks, the poster does something I would do, but canot do as well.

In we invited St. Nicholas to help me invite you to recognize the fact that we, people of God on earth, have agency on this earth, and for this earth. We have God-given reason, responsibility and power to affect the health of the fragile island on which we and others live.

In his time, St. Nicholas, Bishop of Myra, could not turn his face from children in need and danger. He was truly a man of wisdom and, in his day, remarkable perspective. Yet, I wonder if in his time he might have been bemused to conceive thereød be any connection between the children in his protection and the earthøs North Poleí a connection that commands both near and far-sightedness today. But, now, however, if he were informed perhaps by science data* or by his own sleigh sightings of polar ice sheet disintegration, I wonder if this patron saint of children, sailors and others - in colorful red trim of his Episcopal office - would send RED ALERT alarm that earthøs network of life (as he knew/we know it) is in full jeopardy.

In a sentenceí (eh, make that three sentences) We are the subject. Reversing climate disruption is the object. The Spirit predicates all.

Can we turn our eyes from the havoc, now and future, of climate disruption? Sure, we could. Will we?

RED ALERT urgency?

Urgency - yes, for several reasonsí Hereøs one: It isnøt just that warming raises sea levels. The question is not how high, but how fast levels rise unchecked. Warmingøs resulting rapid population retreat from coasts, experts predict, will throw human society into chaotic crisis for which our political and economic and technology systems are unprepared.

Here comes the õaskö: I ask, õDo we have the spiritually armed will to move together toward solutions?ö St. Johnøs has been environmentally attuned: Recycling, replanting trees, expanding permeable surfaces and gardens to manage storm water, hosting CitizensøClimate Education sessions, and participation by parish leadership and individuals in our national churchøs conferences on climate. That is good, but it is imperative for each of us individually to grapple with the responsibility to pray and act, alone and together, for the good of the Creation weøre given to steward.

In praying õCome Holy Spirit, renew the face of the earth!ö could we add, õSaint Nicholas, aid our hearts and souls and wills to be servants of the common good.ö?

* Rapid Artic ice-melt releases methane from permafrost in the soil – a greenhouse gas 85 times more harmful than carbon dioxide. Of note: The Guardian Newspaper wrote that NASA engineers observing the glaciers visibly losing mass, sighed and wondered aloud if America has lost eyes to see what they were seeing, has lost eyes to see the facts. (The Guardian, 7/27/17).
