Dear Friends,

I recently experienced what I am pretty sure was a õfirstö for me as a priest. In the middle of a recent sermon, the congregation broke into applause. It was humbling. I wish I could also say that it was applause for something wonderful. But sadly, it was applause for some things I was saying about our government recent actions separating young children from their families at the southern U.S. border. I was grateful for the affirmation of my message of course. I am more grateful still for serving a congregation that seems to so clearly understand the Gospel and what it calls on us to say and do at times.

As a pastor of the church, it is always been important to me to be onon-partisan. I have always taken the position that I must be pastor to all regardless of political or other affiliations. As St. Paul writes, in Christ othere is neither slave nor free, Jew nor Greek, male nor female. That said, there is a clear and critical difference, however, between a pastor of the church endorsing a political candidate or party, versus taking a clear stand on issues that the Gospel of Jesus Christ calls us to address.

An example of the difference comes from early in my parish ministry years. Around the time I was ordained, Apartheid, the systematic oppression of blacks in South Africa, had finally become a front-burner issue in America. In the Lutheran church in America, we were debating in National Assembly one year whether to ban financial investments in South African countries as a means of protest.

As the debate raged on, both in our church's assembly and in the halls of our own government, what I came to understand was this: Good people, good *Christian people*, could certainly disagree over the *means* by which we helped end such a travesty of justice. But what was *not debatable* was the injustice itself. Some folks felt divesting was the right approach. Others disagreed. But no one was suggesting that disenfranchising an entire group of people because of their race was an acceptable thing.

As I mentioned in that sermon, the Gospel that Jesus proclaimed wasnot just about õreligion.ö Jesus was out to change the world. And so too must his followers be. We may disagree at times on the means or the details. And to be sure, there are plenty of times when things are more grey than black and white. But there are just as many times when the mandate of the Gospel is as clear as clear can be. At those moments, the church, and her members, must speak.

Thank you for õbeing churchö at St. Johnøs. God bless you.

The Day Ireland Searched Its Soul

I have struggled these past months trying to reconcile the current USA political and social discourse with the Gospel. Perhaps you have experienced similar challenges. I know in truth, there are no easy, one-size-fits-all answers. In response I have committed to and pray for reconciliation, for the Spiritøs leading, for justice and peace.

I am convinced that our core values as Christian people can and will ultimately turn us around and bring us to a peace of mind where we can heal and put away the rift=where we can reconcile and restore that Oneness that Christ seeks for all of usô a place of rest where we can find relief from the vitriol and vulgarity so prevalent in our culture, in the news media, in the political arena, and at times, even in our interactions with one another.

Colleagues and friends ask repeatedly: how can we begin again to live together as One in the Community of God: to reveal the Love of our Creator, to preach the Good News of Christ Jesus our Savior, to discern in truth the leading of the Holy Spirit? That is the call and crux of our Christian faith. Yet it seems these days a tough order to fill. Even as I write, a queasy uncertainty questions whether I even want to broach this subject at all.

Recently I returned from an amazing time traveling around the Emerald Green Island of Ireland--driving on the other side of the road with a manual transmission, no less! The days were filled exploring planned visits. Yes, I kissed the Blarney Stone--I have a photo to prove it! We saw Mizen Head and the great Wild Atlantic Way, the Lake at Gougane Barra, the 6th Century Monastic Community of Glendalough, and the enjoyed sites and music in Dublin.

And as with any travel, there were the unplanned experiences. For me, the most significant was the events surrounding the national referendum to repeal the Eighth Amendment of the Irish Constitution. It was, as one commentator put it, othe day Ireland searched its soul.ö The country was deeply divided: whether or not to repeal the Amendment that prohibited abortion, with limited medical exceptions.

I heard talk in the pubs and prayers in the churches. Most markedly were the posters that flooded every street in every county we traveled. It was hot=emotions ran deep. The decision each voter faced no doubt dug deep into the soul.

The Amendment was repealed in an unexpected landslide. But it was not the election results but rather the people of response that speaks a word to our own national and spiritual discourse:

The Irish people treated each and all with respect and dignity.

Indeed those supporting the repeal were exuberant and those opposing voiced disappointment. But not a word of disrespect or disregard was spoken=rather a commitment to work together to pass legislation and to move on together.

And that is what I bring home. The manner in which the people of Ireland moved through a difficult issue with grace.

The Collect from Pentecost 3 seems to speak a word: "O God, from whom all good proceeds: Grant that by your inspiration we may think those things that are right, and by your merciful guiding may do them; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.ö

God gives us the grace to know the things that are right. It is a matter of discerning Godøs desire, not a matter of debating our own ideas. AND God grants us the grace to do what we discern is the right that by Godøs õmerciful guiding may do them...ö It is not a matter of staying stuck in the muck. God gives us a way out.

So, it would seem a good time and about time we begin in community to open this discussion safely, prayerfully, respectfully.

FROM LESLIE MORGAN - SEARCH COMMITTEE CHAIR

Dear Fellow Parishioners,

Several members of St. John Episcopal Church approached members of the Search Committee regarding how much they have enjoyed Fr. Glenn Miller. They spoke highly of his amiable personality, the quality of his preaching, and the ease with which he has transitioned to his interim position. As such, they suggested that we should consider stopping the Search Process for a new rector and just offer it to Fr. Glenn right now.

After speaking with Fr. Dan Marrow, the Canon for Congregational Life and Mission, who is our liaison with the diocese to help us in the search process, I also spoke to Fr. Glenn, who said he was õtouched and flattered by the very lovely ÷vote of confidenceøö that members have expressed about his leadership.

All that being said, Fr. Glenn cannot become our permanent rector for several reasons. As Fr. Dan and Fr. Glenn both pointed out, every interim rector signs a letter of agreement in which it is clearly stated that by virtue of being õinterim,ö you are not a candidate for the permanent position. This is a clear rule of the diocese, and it was explained to the Search Committee and the vestry from the beginning by Fr. Dan.

Second, Fr. Glenn has pointed out that perhaps even more important than the rule is the value in the õstudy processö we are currently engaged in. This process in which we are engaged, including Appreciative Inquiry, the Focus Groups, and the Search Survey are important steps in understanding who we are as a parish and what we need for our new rector. As Fr. Glenn has pointed out, St. Johnøs needs to let the self-study process work. We cannot possibly know if we have the right person for the job if we donøt take the time to honor the process and gather the information.

Improve y glad the members who brought this matter to the forefront did so, as it shows a vested interest in the future of St. John. The best thing we can do for that future is to continue faithfully in the process we have started, including completion of the survey so that we might gain the best picture possible of who we really are and what our needs as a congregation are. It is only through your cooperation and observations that we can create our compilation of who we are and what we are looking for.

In the meantime, as Fr. Glenn has said, õletøs all trust in the Spirit to continue guiding us both in our mutual discernment processesö. And by all means keep the questions, concerns, and suggestions coming. We want to hear from you!

BUILDING SECURITY AT ST. JOHN'S

Dear Friends,

Now that our construction project is completed and we are fully oino the building, we are enacting some new security measures to insure both the accessibility and security of St. Johnos.

Beginning a few weeks ago, we extended our employment agreement with Maria Weaver-Hollowniczky (our Nursery Caregiver) to now include õclosing upö the buildings following Sunday morning liturgies. Having one person, properly trained, is already turning out to be a great blessing in insuring that the building is properly secured. In order for this to work, however, members will need to observe a few new procedures moving forward:

After regular Sunday services, all exits may be used up until 12:30 p.m. After 12:30, EVERYONE should use the lower level glass doors by the parking lot or the Atrium doors, both of which will lock behind you when you exit the building. This exit policy includes coffee hour volunteers and other keyholders. If you must use an alternate exit for any reason, such as loading/unloading, please let the security person know beforehand so adjustments may be made. Please do NOT prop doors open or leave unlocked once they are secured. If you must exit/open a secured door, please see security person, (and if you have a key, please MAKE SURE you@ve re-locked the door behind you!) This policy will of course be adjusted on special event occasions, such as interments, etc.

Please direct any questions or special needs regarding security to Maria. While we are blessed to have Maria doing this important work, it will be to no effect if, once doors are secured, individuals unlock and leave them open. The safety and security of our upgraded facility will be a group effort. We appreciate your support and adherence as we enact these changes.

PROPERTY CORNER

We thank Fr. Miller, Doug Brown, Dave Martin and Andrew Carroll for the restoration of our columbarium to its final setting. We also thank Kathy Kyper for the new plantings behind the columbarium and the weeding throughout our campus. Through these many efforts, we are getting ever closer to the completion of our project. Remaining items include a rain downspout, banner, date stone(s), bench memorials, and more plantings, including a tree on the corner. There also remain some code compliance items that need to be addressed. We thank everyone for their assistance and patience, as we progress forward with the final portions of our project.

The work around our campus has also resulted in the need for some clean-up and reorganization. The Sunday School area and the undercroft are in desperate need of clean-up in preparation for Sunday School in the fall. As the damaged floor in the Sunday School was not part of the construction project, a Request for Proposal was issued to have the floor redone in the hallways to reduce trips and falls. This project is currently slated for July after preliminary testing is completed. Our aim is to have our children welcomed back into a very inviting space in the fall. Stay tuned. Again, we appreciate everyone patience while we move forward.

The moving of the baptismal font was quite an undertaking! Even after finding interested contractors to review the project, none were interested in assuming the risks for the many challenges it presented. It was only through our contacting Weaver Memorials that Vickie Martin and her husband Jeff, offered to move the very large and heavy font. Its movement to the Atrium also would not have been possible without the assistance of Paul Reese, our organist, who aided with the rigging and muscle for the bowl, which was extremely heavy.

And, while we're talking about help, please check out the painting of the Chapel and the Narthex entrance at the blue doors. While Kathy Kyper took lead on both projects, she was assisted in the Chapel by Dave Martin and Paul Reese. Please check out this beautiful work and thank them when you have an opportunity!

With improved access to our auditorium, some improvements are being requested to our air conditioning system to remove air to enhance the movement of chilled water to provide the cooling we need for this space during the hot summer months. Fortunately, we have been blessed with a mild increase in temperature to still allow use of this space without the unbearable heat. We appreciate everyone understanding while we make this transition.

Joe Way and your Property Committee have taken the initiative to improve the sound in the Church and the Atrium to enhance everyone worship experience. Proposals have been received to replace some of the lavalieres used by our clergy during worship, while adding speakers to our Atrium to improve our sound quality. Our older lavalieres use 9-volt batteries, which have been requiring replacement of batteries after each service to get through both of our services. The new lavalieres will operate using AA batteries, which handle our power requirements more efficiently. We hope to benefit from better sound quality with this much needed upgrade.

Your Property Committee is one of the few ministries that serve to benefit the many other ministries at St. Johnøs. We meet on the first Tuesday of every month. If interested, please consider joining us. Our next meeting will be August 7th in the Becker House. We hope you can join us!


