Dear Friends,

Each day, I receive an email "daily devotion" that I have come to treasure. Like anything of this nature, some days offerings are better than others. Some days speak to me more than others. Last week, I received the following:

"I ask all of you, dear brothers and sisters, to view these things that are happening in our historical moment with a spirit of hope, generosity, and sacrifice. And let us do what we can. We can all do something and be more understanding. If we illuminate with Christian hope our intense longings for justice and peace and all that is good, then we can be sure that no one dies forever. If we have imbued our work with a sense of great faith, love of God, and hope for humanity, then all our endeavors will lead to the splendid crown that is the sure reward for the work of sowing truth, justice, love, and goodness on earth. Our work does not remain here; it is gathered and purified by the Spirit of God and returned to us as a reward." Óscar Romero, from "The Scandal of Redemption"

This was one that struck me powerfully. I almost think that I don't really need to explain why it struck me. To say that these have been "difficult times" feels like a vast understatement. On the Sunday recently that I spoke on just one of the many troubling issues we are confronted with daily – the separation of children from their parents at the southern border – many worshippers spoke to me afterward, expressing not just their support for my words, but pouring out their heartbreak and daily anxiety and even sleepless nights as they struggle over the things happening in our time, and perhaps most especially, *what are we to do about it.*

I have thought almost as much about our common pain and anxiety over these things as I have the things themselves. And then, this gift from the late Bishop Oscar Romero was delivered to me. View it all "with a spirit of hope, generosity and sacrifice." Yes, we should be concerned. Even outraged at some things. And yes, we should, we *must* "do what we can" – for we can all do something. But Romero reminds us that our concerns, our passions, must not lead people of faith to despair. For despair is the absence of faith.

I know I needed to hear this in these troubled times. I suspect that you might need this word of hope too.

Living into the Vision of General Convention 2018

The 79th General Convention of the Episcopal Church is now over. Thousands of deputies, bishops, exhibitors, technical, A/V and support staff, visitors and news media pack up and head home to the 17 sovereign countries that make up the Episcopal Church: Taiwan and Micronesia, Honduras, Ecuador, Colombia, Venezuela, Haiti, Dominican Republic, Virgin Islands, Puerto Rico and Churches in Europe: Austria, Belgium, France, Germany, Italy, Switzerland and the United States.

While in session, General Convention (GC) set forth The Episcopal Church's Vision for the Triennium (the next three years) and perhaps even further into the foreseeable future. Hundreds of resolutions (about 400 this Convention) covering a spectrum of social, canonical, worship, faith and ministry topics were debated and decided over the course of only 10 days.

As General Convention comes to a close, the real work of the Church begins and continues on in our Parishes, Missions, Dioceses and Provinces. For while General Convention set the vision of The Episcopal Church (TEC), it is the mission we engage and the discussions we pursue here at St. John's and in parishes across the Church that bears the fruit of mission, the spirit of worship and the breath of inclusion. Our actions and experiences in these next three years set the stage for General Convention 2021...which will be held at the Convention Center in Baltimore, MD!

It is impossible here to provide more than a glimpse of what GC addressed while in session. In the months and years to come, take time to get acquainted with these resolutions and to live into them. A synopsis of just a few of the Resolutions passed by General Convention is printed elsewhere in the Messenger. And other resources abound in periodicals and on the internet.

An amazing resource is the [Virtual Binder at www.vbinder.net/menu](http://www.vbinder.net/menu). This website provides the Legislative Process, the Resolutions categorized by Committee and by 72 topic categories, and provides Committee Reports, Canons, and the 2019-2021 budget.

In addition, the GC deputies representing our diocese are available throughout the next several years to speak to groups and parishes and give a fuller, deeper understanding of the work of General Convention.

One last note. General Convention was not just about those long legislative sessions each day. The Episcopal Church Women (ECW) convened the ECW Triennial in conjunction with General Convention, including the Distinguished Woman Ceremony that recognizes a woman of distinguished ministry in each diocese.

Other major events included: an old-time Revival with PB Michael Curry preaching (click [here](#) for video or [here](#) for text), a Listening Liturgy to hear the stories of sexual harassment in the Church to seek justice and reconciliation, the Opening and Closing Eucharists which drew thousands, a Prayer Service outside T. Don Hutto Detention Center in Taylor, and a Texas Barbecue. These Holy Eucharists and events can be seen at <https://eventmobi.com/79gc>

I pray each and all of us will give time to study, reflect and give life to these great milestones in the life of our Episcopal Church.





Here is the J2A pilgrimage itinerary, for those of you who would like to follow along with the pilgrims:

Day 1 ó On the Journey (Thursday, July 26) Welcome to Costa Rica, one of the most awe-inspiring destinations in Central America! Our journey toward the heart of God takes us from the city to the coast, through the jungle, and back again; it will be a week of challenge, discovery, hard work, laughter, and beauty. After landing in San Jose we set our sights on the coastal town of Jaco. This small town is our home away from home for the next several days. As we settle in and meet our hosts, may our hearts and minds be open to the wonder and learning this adventure will bring.

Day 2 ó Faith and Action (Friday, July 27) The day begins in the surf town of Jaco. This beautiful town is known for its amazing waves and laid-back attitude. But even though Costa Rica is the most developed and prosperous of the Central America nations, many challenges still exist. As we immerse ourselves in the culture today, we spend some time helping the local church with a work project and a Surf Camp for the local

kids. As we engage in these activities during the day, we are challenged to think about what it means for our faith and our actions to be in line with one another. In the evening, we begin a daily ritual of spending time in discussion and personal reflection as we look back on the day.

Day 3 ó Be Strong and Courageous (Saturday, July 28) Sometimes doing new things can be difficult and intimidating, and today's adventures may be new experiences for many of us. A mountain hike in the rainforest will be a challenge for some, while hosting an outreach for children in a local park may be the greater challenge for others. In our lives of faith we face the same types of challenges. Trust, perseverance, and obedience are often the best ways to embrace new and unknown challenges.

Day 4 ó On the Sabbath Day - Rest & Recreation (Sunday, July 29) It is the Lord's day today, so we begin with the unique opportunity to worship in a local church with Christian brothers and sisters from all over the world. The afternoon affords us the opportunity to enjoy the beach that Jaco is famous for. Whether the recreation is swimming, surfing, or just lying on the beach, it is certain to be a time of rest and rejuvenation.

Day 5 ó A Journey Of Awe & Wonder (Monday, July 30) Today brings a change of scenery and a change of location. The journey leads us away from the sunny coast toward the northwest and the Monteverde Cloud Forest. Our drive will take us through lush natural beauty: cloudy mountain passes, dense jungles and alligator-infested waters. Each new vista brings with it the opportunity to be filled with childlike wonder and appreciation for God's creation. The afternoon brings new adventures: ziplining and hiking in the Monteverde Nature Preserve. When evening comes, what stories will be shared about the experiences we had today?

Day 6 ó Breathtaking Adventure (Tuesday, July 31) The journey thus far has allowed us to see Costa Rica from many different perspectives - from the sunny beaches in a small town, to the trails of a nature preserve, and the amazing heights of a zipline in the cloud forest. The view today is from the Tenorio River where a whitewater rafting adventure awaits. These thrills and the views are sure to take your breath away.

Day 7 ó To Celebrate and To Share (Wednesday, August 1) The adventure in Costa Rica is winding down. After some final exploration time around Monteverde, the journey leads back to where it began, the town of Alajuela on the outskirts of San Jose. A hearty meal, a time of celebration, and a sharing of stories, memories, and prayers await you this evening as the transition toward home begins.

Day 8 ó Always on the Journey (Thursday, August 2) As we depart this lovely country, we take the lessons of this adventure with God along with us. The challenges, the discoveries, the friendships, the work, the beauty will all be a part of who we are. May the things we learned about ourselves, about one another, and about God be an everlasting part of this journey that is life.

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED!




