Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Soí one more transition in St. Johnø quiver! As you all know by now, Mother Barbara will celebrate her final Sunday with us at the end of this month of September, and with it, conclude not only her time as assistant and associate priest at St. Johnø, but also, with her retirement, her distinguished career in parish ministry. (At least õofficiallyö ô Iøm sure there will be many opportunities for her in retirement to continue utilizing those gifts.)

While my time as a colleague with Barbara has been brief, it has also been a blessing. I shared with her very early on that I was very grateful to not be coming into a parish as active and vibrant as St. Johnøs alone. I have enjoyed Barbaraøs keen intellect, her deep, abiding commitment to Christøs people, her thoughtful preaching and liturgical leadership, and her impish sense of humor. I will miss her along with all of us at St. Johnøs.

It is not every parish that has two priests retire in the same calendar year! This could quite understandably be cause for some anxiety among us. You have all developed bonds of affection with Barbara as you did with Fr. John. And you may be wondering how we will fare, for a time at least, with just one priest. You may be thinking õanother change?!ö

We should acknowledge both grief and anxiety where we find it. But what is most important to say in the midst of all this is that õChrist is the same, today, tomorrow and forever.ö Priests and Rectors come and go. Parishes face transitions and changes of all sorts all the time (like new building programs, to name just one!) But the Gospel that grounds and creates our life together is unchanging.

In a recent õreflectionö paper I submitted to the Vestry, following my 120 days or so on the job, one of my observations about St. Johnøs was how õhealthyö the transition following Fr. Johnøs retirement felt to me. In fact, I went even farther and said that in my view, it seemed that St. Johnøs has had a tradition of very healthy transitions between Rectors for many years.

That a sign of a healthy congregation - a congregation that holds affection and respect for its priests, but that also understands who is *truly* at the center of things, Jesus Christ. As this month draws to a close, we will say our goodbyes to Mother Barbara. I hope you will also take the time to let her know how she has touched your life and the life of this wonderful parish. And then, we will pick up and move on, knowing that the same Lord who was with St. Johnøs in its first priestly transition a century and a half ago is with us in this one as well.

Costa Ríca - Land of Pura Vída!

It was a whirlwind week of discovery, community, ministry and fun for the J2A youth, their adult companions and Wonder Voyage guides! From the surfing beach of Jaco on the Pacific coast to mountains of the Monteverde Cloud Forest, then back to the outskirts of San Jose, our group traveled in two õmini vansö complete with Wi-Fi and amazing drivers who showed us places (restaurants) that most visitors would never enjoy. We covered a lot of territory and engaged in some amazing ministry and adventures.

The first days, we ministered with Horizon Church, a mission in Jaco, working with Sarah and Daniel Barrett, pastors, at the Churchøs construction site one morning and at the Childrenøs Park the next day: a pick-up soccer game, making bracelets (a big hit) and just being with the youngsters and their parents. The connection there with the kids was deep and offered a brief insight into CR life. Saturday Eucharist overlooking the Jaco Coast was beautiful. And Sunday morning worship with Horizon Church, an Evangelical Church, with Sarah and Daniel, was a new experience for many of us.

Then on to Monteverde, traveling mostly unpaved roads up the mountain. I will forever remember (and hopefully repeat) whitewater rafting on the Tenorio River. While in three rafts, it truly felt like we were õoneö as we braved the rapids (they say these are Category 4, which is high!) and swam in the smoother waters. And the zip lining over the canopy the day before was....well...zip lining over the canopyí

For me, I bring home many forever snapshots of moments with those in our group and those whose path we crossed along the way. I encountered experiences I dongt know I would ever have enjoyed otherwise and I am grateful.

And I bring home a phrase that truly embodies the Spirit of the People: *Pura Vida*! Literally it means õpure life.ö *Pura Vida*! is so much more than a simple phrase; it is a way of life. Costa Ricans (called Ticos) use this phrase to say hello, goodbye, or even to let people know everything¢s good! I remember when I went under the water when rafting, Roberto our guide, smiled as I came to the surface: õ*Pura Vida*!"

Pura Vida! is a good reminder to be grateful for all the blessings of this life...for life itself. It is a reminder to be positive, to see the cup half full...maybe even brimming over the top. Life is too short and we might best use the time we are given to gladden the hearts of those who make this earthly pilgrimage with us...even those who cross our path for only a brief moment in this life.

On Sunday, September 30th, at both the 8 a.m. and 10:15 a.m. Eucharist, our J2A pilgrims, now returning as Young Adults in the Church (YAC) will share snapshots of their travels. Please be there to welcome them home officially and to hear their amazing stories! For there is no better vision of *Pura Vida*! than to see the smile in their eyes as they share tales of their time together.



VESTRY RESOLUTIONS

The following Resolutions were passed at the Vestry meeting held on Monday, August 20, 2018:

1. RESOLVED, upon the recommendation of the construction committee, that the Vestry approve a gift of \$200.00 to Ron Crawford, in grateful recognition of the additional time and effort expended beyond hours billed on behalf of St. Johnøs during the construction project.

This resolution was vetted by the executive committee, and approved unanimously by Vestry.

2. RESOLVED upon the recommendation of the search committee that the Vestry approve the Parish Profile document for use in the search for a new Rector for St. Johnøs.

3. RESOLVED that the Vestry approve a grant to Lancaster Theological Seminary on behalf of Seminarian Jen Trenary for Theological Education from the restricted endowed funds for same. The amount of the grant shall not exceed 5% of the value of the fund, or the cost of 2018/19 tuition, whichever is the lesser.

This resolution was vetted by the executive committee, and approved by Vestry with one recusal.

4. RESOLVED to engage the accounting firm of RKL to complete a financial review for St. Johnøs at a cost of \$4,750.00.

SEARCH COMMITTEE UPDATE

At the August Vestry meeting, the Parish Profile that we will use to attract rector candidates was approved. Please thank Joel Cliff, Ruth McFarland, and Fran Gouveia for their efforts to produce such an amazing piece of writing. This work was further enhanced by the efforts of Drew Dorgan, who graciously provided us with free use of her companyøs marketing team to add the pictures, graphics, and formatting that you see on the Rector Search drop-down menu of the Leaders tab on our website <u>https://stjohns-lancaster.org</u>

This situates us perfectly on schedule with our plan to advertise the job for six weeks, from the beginning of September until mid-October. Assuming we get a healthy number of interested candidates, we will review the resumes of the candidates who apply and arrange video interviews for the month of November.

As December is a busy time for both priests and laity, we plan to slow down in December but set up a second round of interviews with the top few candidates in January and early February. After we determine a candidate to bring forward to the Vestry, both the Bishop and the Vestry will need to approve.

Assuming that all the moving parts are in sync up to this point, we hope to be calling a priest in the spring, hoping that person will join us over the summer.

Please continue to pray for the Search Committee for wisdom, patience, and grace throughout this process.


Thanks to everyone for your generous support of our goal of õmaking the doors a little wider and the invitation a little warmerö!

As promised in the August "Messenger," we are pleased that we have scheduled The Rev. Dr. Barbara Seras as our speaker for the September *Voyagers'* meeting, especially in light of the recent announcement that Mother Barbara will soon launch her own voyage into retirement! You can expect a lively, funfilled presentation about her trip to Ireland this summer along with her experiences with the J2A pilgrimage to Costa Rica. We'll see you in the Parish Hall at 10:00 a.m. on the 22nd of September. Welcome, one and all!

PROPERTY CORNER

We thank Kathy Kyper and Dave Martin for their painting of our Chapel. We also thank Kathy and Pam Loose for the new plantings in the courtyard. Through these many efforts, we are getting ever closer to the completion of our project. Remaining items include a rain downspout, date stone(s), and more plantings, including a tree on the corner. A tree is being ordered for the corner in memory of our Past Verger, Aaron Spicher. And, arrangements are being proposed for the rerouting of the downspout from the Church to the Atrium. There has been no word yet from our Architect regarding the status of remaining items of our Atrium Project. We thank everyone for their assistance and patience, as we progress forward with the final portions of our project.

Andy Carroll and Kathy were very helpful with the Sunday School and undercroft space cleanouts. Without their hard work, they would not have gotten completed. Special thanks to Kathy for her refinishing of the Narthex entrance sculpture. It is beautiful! Again, we appreciate everyone scontinued patience while we move forward.

The hydrology tests of the Sunday School floors revealed a heavy amount of moisture, for which changes needed to be made with carpet tile selection. The project would have been finished by now if it weren¢t for the discovery of asbestos in the flooring material, including the mastic and old tile underneath. A meeting was held with a remediation company to get a quote for remediation. The materials for the re-flooring are on-site. It is hoped that we can have the project completed with minimal impact on Sunday School.

With improved access to our auditorium, some improvements are being requested to our air conditioning system to remove air in the pipes to enhance the movement of chilled water to provide the cooling we need for this space during the hot summer months. This work will be completed between seasons to minimize downtime for the appropriate type of comfort. We appreciate everyoneøs understanding while we make this transition.

This monthøs Life Safety inspection was coordinated with Select Securityøs annual functional test on July 30th. Our system responded admirably when smoke from the seized-up Church chiller motor caused a smoke condition in the choir room last month. However, this situation revealed a need to address fire/evacuation areas and an alarm time-out condition with Select Security to allow the fire department easier identification of alarm activation. The lock box is also in the process of being updated for their use. We are in the process of updating our keyholder/responder list for Select Security. People on the list are chosen for their ease of response and knowledge of our campus to assist the fire department in identifying alarm location(s), as well as securing our facilities once they are finished. When chosen, these individuals would only be called in the event the Property Manager is unable to respond. We thank these individuals for stepping up to the plate under these circumstances.

We are in the process of working out some kinks with our new microphones and hope to have these ironed out shortly. The speakers in the Atrium have been installed and are providing more inclusiveness to those in our Atrium. There may be a need to further refine the sound quality, which we will continue to monitor.

Considerable time has been spent bringing our memorials up to date. Two plaques have been ordered and mounted in the courtyard, memorializing loved ones for which enhancements were offered there. Also, the Memorial Garden plaque has been installed and is in the process of being made current.

Property is one of the few ministries that serve the rest of St. Johnøs many ministries; we hope you can join us on the first Tuesday of every month in the Becker House at 7 p.m.

FOOD PANTRY UPDATE

In a parable in the book of Matthew, the Son of Man says to the righteous, õFor I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me.

St. Johnøs food pantry doesnøt attempt to do ALL of these things, but we try to take care of the first one in our little part of the world. We do this by preparing boxes of food and giving them to people who come to our door. People may come once a month, but this food is meant to be a supplement, not a monthøs supply of food. (We donøt require prior õqualificationö ô after all, Jesus didnøt say, õI was hungry, even though I was working full time and spending money wisely, and you gave me food.ö)

Here is some basic info, "Food Pantry in Bullet Points":

WHO DONATES FOOD?

- You, our parishioners, on Sundays, and especially during our Lenten food drive
- Scouting for Food
- VFW food drive
- USPS¢s õStamp Out Hungerö national food drive
- Attendees at special celebrations (weddings, birthdays, anniversaries) to which honorees ask guests to bring food donations

FILLING IN THE GAPS:

Weøve already spent over \$2,000 this year to fill the gaps in food donations, so we also need cash to buy food. We get this from

- donations on Souper Bowl of Caring Sunday (in February)
- regular or one-time donations from you, our members. (Please write õFood Pantryö in the check memo.)

We really *s-t-r-e-t-c-h* these dollars, taking advantage of discount stores, grocery store sales, and coupons!

OUR DEMAND HAS INCREASED SLIGHTLY IN THE PAST FEW YEARS:

- In 2016, we gave out 395 boxes.
- In 2017, we gave out 418 boxes.
- In the first half of 2018, we gave out 233 boxes.

BONUSES:

In addition to our usual shelf-stable foods ô see p. 14 we sometimes give bonus items as available:

- Other foods (including fresh produce) that have been donated
- Toiletries, dental health items, soap (We welcome unopened full-size or hotel/trial sizes.)

WE ACCOMPLISH THIS WITH THE HELP OF:

- A coordinator and 3 other behind-the-scenes parishioners who sort donations, shop for food, and pack the boxes, in preparation for distribution
- A volunteer coordinator and 6-8 volunteers who give out food to visitors on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons



Spots for vendors are filled, so there will be many African crafts, food and artifacts available for sale. Specific African countries will be featured at booths. Attendees will interact with Africans from those countries and learn about their culture. The Photo Booth will be a place to take personal and group professional photos with African attire. And lastly, the event will close with an African Flag Parade.

CITIZENS' CLIMATE EDUCATION

"Young People's Climate Burden"

The Episcopal Church powerfully witnesses care of the environment. Our General Convention policy calls on lawmakers to significantly reduce carbon emissions, to promote renewable energy technologies, and to financially support developing nations as they transition away from fossil fuels.

For of love for us, God created a pure, clean home here on Earth, vibrant with healthy nature to provide for our needs. God also gave us free will to choose how we treat our Earth. We have a moral responsibility to be good stewards of Godøs creation, preserving the Earth for our children. The profit-based priorities of a few have forced our climate out of balance, degrading Godøs creation, damaging our land, water, and air and harming us all - especially the least among us. *(Adapted from Episcopal Church Office of Government Relations: Faith and Climate.)*

On Thursday, September 20, **Sophie Kivlehan** will speak at Franklin & Marshall College about Young Peopleøs Climate Burden. Ms. Kivlehan is one of the plaintiffs in õJuliana vs the United States,ö the lawsuit filed by õOur Children's Trustö against the United States government over the government's failure to limit greenhouse gas emissions.

In addition to their emphasis on environmental justice, the plaintiffs are invoking the Public Trust argument - the concept that the current generation has obligations to future generations.

They argue that young peopleøs constitutional right to life, liberty, and property is violated when the government approves mining of fossil fuels and emission of high levels of CO2 into the air, despite being aware of its damaging effects. The case goes to trial in October of this year. https://www.ourchildrenstrust.org/
