### **POSTURES OF WORSHIP**

Dear Friends,

At the beginning of this month, we will embark again upon the great journey of Lent. One of the singular joys of a liturgically oriented tradition such as ours are these cycles of the church year, which bring with them different `lenses\_ through which we experience our faith. We confess `one\_ faith, but there are a great variety of facets of that faith, and an equally great number of ways to experience that faith.

One of the ways I experience my faith differently is through different `postures.\_ Put simply, there are times that I m called to my knees in prayer or confession. There are other times it beckons me to sit quietly. And there are still other times that I m called to rise to my feet in joy and gladness. There are times my head is bowed, and times it s lifted up. Times my hands are clasped in prayer, and times that prayer flows through open, upturned hands.

At the outset of Epiphany, someone in the choir asked me `should we stand or sit for the prayers and the Eucharistic prayer?\_ It was a reasonable question, because in many respects the choir in our tradition serves as liturgical leader, helping the congregation know what to do corporately. Yet, my feeling, for many years has been this: We may *encourage* one another towards one posture of piety or another from time to time, especially in different liturgical seasons. But that said, worshippers should feel the freedom to assume the posture that they want, regardless of the season! In any season, I look out from the altar each week, or at the altar rail itself, and I see folks in a great variety of postures.

For me, the season of Lent is one of a return to penitence, and thus I find myself wanting to kneel more than I might otherwise. Conversely, in Eastertide, the joy of resurrection life pulls me to my feet, and my face to heaven, like the disciples at the end of Easter on the day of Ascension, looking heavenward.

So, as we start the Lenten journey this year, `should you stand or sit or kneel?\_ My answer is that you should do exactly what feels right and most meaningful to you. Kneel throughout Lent and stand during Easter perhaps. But if you choose to do otherwise, that s fine! Like the cacophony of voices on the Day of Pentecost, we may express ourselves differently, knowing that on our knees or on our feet, we are one people, of one baptism and one faith.

Blessed Lent to you all!

## **SENIOR WARDEN**

St. John's Vestry met in January for its annual retreat. Retreat is the usual name for this gathering, but the day is not entirely spiritual. Yes, we do pray but much of the day is spent getting to know our new members and looking at the coming year and the challenges we face.

In past years, we have done some strategic planning or goal setting. We did not do this but rather spent the day reflecting on just who and what a Vestry is and its focus. Fr. Miller invited Mr. Rick Wolf, who has had quite a bit of experience leading groups like this in reflection on leadership, the importance of joy which is founded in faith, and true collaboration. It was an excellent discussion.

The Vestry did conduct some regular business but spent a bit of time on the role of Vestry Steward. Each member of Vestry has traditionally been assigned an area of parish life for which they were given responsibility of communicating the Vestry's mission action plans to their committees and then bringing back to Vestry reports of the committee activities. You may remember the listing of the Vestry on the back of the Sunday bulletin and their areas of responsibility.

The Vestry discussed and refined the role of steward. Communication to and from the Vestry is still the primary role of the steward, but some committees need assistance in restructuring. The Vestry steward should not be the committee chairperson. Some areas of parish life do not have a committee to support them. The Vestry as a whole will work to correct this in cooperation with the specific steward. All of this is most important as we near the arrival of our new permanent rector. The Vestry will need to assist her closely as she becomes accustomed to our parish life.

An important decision of resurrecting the Personnel committee was made. The former committee dissolved with the retirement of Fr. John Morris. A new committee will begin to work with the new permanent rector.

During the quiet phase of the campaign to repay the debt of our wonderful renovations, \$370,800 has been pledged toward the \$600,000 goal, and we've received \$145,461 towards those pledges. ### **PROPERTY CORNER**

The Property Committee thanks its many contributors of 2018 service to our Church, including those participating in the Fall Clean-up, Carolyn Maxey and her friend Kate for their plantings in decorative pots throughout our campus. Thanks are also extended to Janice and Kevin Henry for their coordination of decorating our Church for Christmas. The committee also wishes to extend its gratitude to Bruce Waskowicz for his service to the Church as Property Steward on Vestry. Bruce joined the many other members of the committee for whom Bill is extremely grateful.

The Capital Campaign gratitude dinner in the Parish Hall and celebration in our auditorium have highlighted the special appeal these spaces have to offer. While we expect more activity in these venues and our building use rates have not been updated in some time, the committee is in the process of evaluating our rate structure for the use of our facilities.

Grid-One water meter conversions have been completed on our property, including rental properties. New remote readers have been added to our meters, as required by Lancaster City Water.

We've had J & J Heating & Cooling out to fix the Becker House Heater, supplying the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> floors. We may continue to see the decline of this heater, which was slated to be replaced this year (Property/Finance Plan) along with flat/crown roofs, computers, Church compressor/ chiller, additions to BH alarm system, stained glass window restoration, Sunday School rooms floors, steeple repointing, All Purpose Room/Nursery wing HVAC, Chestnut Street brick walk, replastering of Church and Becker House basements, and Church basement floor remediation/ repair. And, this work in addition to 2016 items, including leaded window repair in the Parish House, North clerestory window covers, and Parish house and Church emergency lighting, which have yet to be completed.

Thyssen-Krupp was in twice in December to correct conditions involving the elevator being inoperable, including a Sunday. When discussing my dissatisfaction with this equipment, they suggested a maintenance plan at an additional cost. With the elevator being relatively new, the committee felt that service to this important accessibility device should still be handled under the manufacturer's warranty, which has just expired.

Since our last meeting in November, undercroft fluorescent fixtures have been converted to LED to conserve energy. Other fixtures will be considered after a trial period of these fixtures, Stained glass window memorial plates have been replaced along the parking side of the Nave. These memorials, which were removed for the refinishing of the stained-glass window frames are provided to remember those for which the clerestory windows were provided. Also, our boilers were inspected on January 22, 2019, as part of our Travelers Insurance policy.

Clark was in on December 13<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> to service one of the kitchen dishwashers for inadequate temperature. There have been incidents when notes have been left on the dishwasher indicating problems with no description of the problem or contact information for the one leaving the note. Matthews Memorials has been contacted regarding additional urns, support inserts, security bolts and their driver for our original columbarium. We are still in need of about 50 urns and supports in order to fill out this columbarium. This columbarium was relocated during our renovation project, running completely along the Parish House wall now.

As a result of our construction project, we are currently working with Select Security regarding the rezoning of the alarm system, after which our keyholders will get an update. We thank those who have stepped up to the plate to work with the fire company and secure our facilities during an alarm activation.

With Holy Week just about upon us, Spring Clean-up will be held on April 13th starting at 9 a.m. We hope to accomplish many of the tasks needed to have our Church looking beautiful for this special time in our Christian lives. We hope to see everyone then.
