Dear friends,

This month, as we put the parish newsletter together for April, we have just come off of a week where the world once again witnessed the horror of a mass shooting, this time targeting brothers and sisters of the Islamic faith in New Zealand. I would say that I struggle to make sense of it all, but point in fact, there IS no sense to this. My friend and colleague, Amy Butler, pastor of Riverside Church in New York, offered the following comments in the wake of this tragedy and they sum up my own feelings. I offer them to you this month with Amy's blessing.

"As I hear the news about the mass shooting at the mosques in New Zealand, I must confess I am overcome by one sensation more than any other: I am tired. I am tired because of the more than 300 mass shootings that occurred in the US alone in 2018 and nearly 50 in the infancy of this year.

"I am tired because of the endless anti-Muslim, anti-immigrant, anti-Semitic, anti-woman, anti-goodness and basic decency coming out of the highest offices in our land, and echoed in halls of power the world over, words that dehumanize and carry the force of deadly violence.

"I am tired of churches sitting passively or sinfully ignorant on the sidelines and sending thoughts and prayers for innocent victims (or saying nothing at all), and refusing to speak and act unequivocally in the name of Jesus Christ about changing conditions that create such violence in our world.

"Our silence and inaction are sin.

"The ceaseless onslaught of violence in word and deed is meant to dull our senses, to inure us to human suffering, to wear us down until we see no point in fighting. So I am also tired of being tired.

"We do not have to live like this. We do not have to accept the world as it is. With imagination and courage, we CAN remake the world as it should be.

"In this season of Lent, we are reminded that speaking words of truth may lead to suffering and rejection. But it is also the only way we will find our way to new life."

Blessings to you all, and to our sin-sick, suffering world, in these holy Lenten days.

Dear St. John's,

Over the past decade I have served as the associate rector of St. James' Parish in the Diocese of Maryland, the Camp Director of the Bishop Claggett Camp and Conference Center, and in 2012 I was called as rector of Emmanuel Episcopal Church in Delaplane, Virginia.

My husband, John, and our two children Ruth (6) and Caleb (4) are as excited about this call as I am! As we begin transitioning from life here in Virginia to life in Lancaster, there are many things I am eagerly anticipating. I am excited to hear your stories and learn about your passions and dreams for St. John's community. I am looking forward to visiting the local neighborhoods, schools, and nonprofits to build connections and discover where Christ's hands and feet are currently serving and where they might be needed. And I'd be lying if I didn't tell you I was looking forward to hitting up Central Market for some baked goods as well...

Although June may seem like a long ways off, it will be here before we know it! In the meantime, please know I am praying for each of you by name (thank you Tom for the directory!) and I look forward to putting faces to those names and prayers in just a few short months.



Phase I of the capital campaign was to run through the end of 2018, so if you have not yet completed your pledge, please join the 85 families who have already done so.

During the quiet phase of the campaign to repay the debt of our wonderful renovations, \$380,800 has been pledged toward the \$600,000 goal, and we've received \$147,541 towards those pledges. Look forward to a spiritual journey and the opportunity to participate in the success of this ministry in the coming months.

Visit to Donegal - April 27, 2019

"Beauty, reverence, serenity, spirituality" -- Portia Brian
"An oasis of peace and tranquility in a madcap runaway world" -- Wayne LeFevre

Where, oh where is this place? Donegal Presbyterian Church, c. 1740, the oldest church in continuous use in Lancaster County, and the most notable center of the early Scots-Irish in America.

Our own Wayne LeFevre, a member of the Donegal Society and an ardent photographer of Donegal's campus, has arranged for us to visit Donegal for a tour of the church campus and a light catered lunch in the church's stunning new fellowship hall on Saturday morning, April 27; tour at 10:30 a.m. followed by lunch.

Our St. John's Church has two unusual connections with Donegal. In a garden area fronting the Donegal Church stands a bronze memorial tablet recounting the famous 1777 event which occurred under the Witness Tree. The tablet was presented to Donegal in 1919 by Rev. George Israel Browne, rector of St. John's 1908-1920. During Fr. Browne's tenure, our parish house was erected. The second connection is here at St. John's. The stained glass window at the head of the south aisle, just outside the chapel, is a memorial to Della Breneman Hartman who, before her marriage, was organist at Donegal.

Set in the midst of its 22 acre campus and glebe fields, the little stone church, its c. 1960 twin (the Christian education building) and its c. 2007 1.8 million dollar fellowship hall are complemented by wide sweeping lawns, flower gardens, groves of tall old trees, a wild flower meadow/ labyrinth, and the Donegal Spring emitting 2 million gallons of water daily.

In the church narthex hangs a splendid copy (the original is in a bank vault) of Donegal's 1740 deed from William Penn's sons, Thomas, Richard and John. *And*, possibly, Donegal's 18th century pewter communion service from London will be on display.

Oh, yes! There is a squirrel on the organ, and a horse is buried beneath the pulpit!!!


Thank you to everyone who supported our youth in the Shrove Tuesday Pancake dinner. We greatly appreciate all the support for our youth.



New Beginnings #2 A retreat for youth in grades 6-8

What is New Beginnings? "New Beginnings" is a unique ministry in the Diocese of Central PA that shares the love of Christ with the middle school-aged youth of today. Throughout the retreat weekend, the high school youth will minister to the middle school youth. "New Beginnings" speaks, listens, and challenges middle school youth to be positive about themselves, their friends, families and their communities, in a critical time in their lives. This ministry reminds them that we are all children of God, we are special, we are loved, and there is nothing that we cannot overcome with Christ.

Who can go to New Beginnings? Anyone in grades 6-8 may attend. You can attend the weekend as many times as you want during these years.

When is New Beginnings? The "New Beginnings" check-in begins at 6 p.m. on Friday April 5th and continues through a special Eucharist at 11 a.m. on Sunday the 7th. (The entire weekend concludes around 12 noon.) Activities include a series of songs, skits, movie clips, and small group discussions. Topics such as God's love, prayer, self, friends, parents, siblings and school are explored with talks introduced by the high school youth and adult members of the team.
