Dear Friends,

This week, as we began the most sacred time in the church year, we all looked on in horror as one of the most iconic symbols of the Christian faith burned. It seemed impossible, surreal. Notre Dame Cathedral, the `Lady of Paris,\_ has stood strong and unchanging for nearly a millennium, watching over Paris, glorious symbol in many ways of our unchanging Christ watching over all of his people.

There is no way to minimize the catastrophe in Paris. But the signs of Christ's unchanging presence in the midst of this disaster have been palpable. The picture of Christians gathered during the blaze in the shadow of the Cathedral, singing `built on a rock the church shall stand, even when steeples are falling\_; the initial pictures of the interior after the fire, with the altar and cross and candles still intact, surrounded by smoldering ash; the realization that while much was lost, a great deal had miraculously been saved; and of course, the immediate outpouring of support and commitment to rebuild <sup>-</sup> over \$500 million committed within scarcely 48 hours. In the midst of tears of grief, even more tears of joy and hope and faith.

We know something of rebuilding after a disaster here at St. John's. I can only imagine that our people here reacted, and then acted, in very similar ways <sup>-</sup> initial shock and grief, then the realization that `even when steeples are falling\_ the Church remains, and then bold and generous commitment to rebuild. And how fortunate we are that they did!

I have drawn on the vision and generosity of our forebearers at St. John's several times as we have moved into the final phase of our campaign this Spring. As the world watches what has happened at Notre Dame, and as we watch it rise again from the ashes, we have yet another source to inspire and motivate us. Here, in our own treasured house of prayer, we too must come together and finish the good work that the Spirit began in us, that this place too may continue for generations as a house of prayer for all people. Here, empowered by that same Spirit, we can show commitment and generosity equal to our task.

A blessed Eastertide to you all!

# **SOLES FOR SOULS 2019**

Soles for Souls has been a `community\_ project here at St. John `s for a number of years. 2019 was again, a Lancaster `community\_ reaching out in caring to a world `community\_ by providing shoes that go all over the world.

Our Lancaster community is St. John's members and their friends at work, in various neighborhoods. St. John's Methodist in Paradise has partnered with us for several years, as has John Beck Elementary School in Lititz. This year our local community also included St. Edwards, James Street Mennonite, Lancaster City donors as well as folks at Landis Homes.

Phoenix Courier has since the start of our gathering, partnered to pick up without any payment and deliver the shoes to New Jersey where they are sorted and distributed. Without their caring help, we would have to raise money at \$1/pair to be picked up and transported.

A simple pair of shoes can keep people from dealing with diseases, allow children to go to school, etc. Imagine if you had to walk to church on any Sunday from your home barefooted in varying weather.

Some of the shoes we get are brand new, some barely worn and some have had some journeys. Those with greater adventures are used to teach people in varied countries how to repair shoes and can then be a new life with a job.

Every year, our young people staying over night on Maundy Thursday line up and pass the boxes of shoes from the church onto the truck. If you've ever watched them in this project, the smiles on their faces extends to their hearts and something they won't forget. Get ready to smile as you read that this year we collected  $\check{u}$   $\check{u}$  1744 pairs!

Think of that number for a moment, imagine ǔ ǔ .people - ALL ages, varied countries and circumstances lined up in smiling thanks for your generosity and caring to peopleǔ Here, There and Everywhere.

#### **PROPERTY CORNER**

What a great Spring Clean-up we had on the morning of April 13<sup>th</sup>! There was a great turnout with beautiful weather to get the tasks at hand completed. Thanks to all who contributed in one way or another to make our Church look beautiful for Holy Week!

Thanks to Janice and Kevin Henry for their continued work around campus with our planters, Lenten greens around our Sanctuary and the flowers for our Easter celebrations.

A warm welcome greeted everyone this Easter thanks to Carolyn Maxey and her friend Kate who planted flowers in the pots by our entrances for Easter.

A recent re-lamping of the lights in the Sanctuary was conducted to replace blown bulbs, which accounted for roughly a quarter of the bulbs. This condition is further jeopardized by light use when this space is in its idle setting (55F). These bulbs are getting more difficult to find.

A recent review of the wooden floors in our Parish House has revealed that our auditorium floors may have just one refinishing left. This space is used hard by two dance groups during each month and has seen its share of patch repairs and refinishing with an Eagle Scout project and just recently for Fr. Morris's farewell event held there. With the use of this space already increasing with its enhanced accessibility, the reflooring has been added to our list of long-range projects to be completed. It may be wise to have insulation added to enhance the sound absorption between the auditorium and the Parish Hall.

A considerable amount of work has been conducted with Select Security's fire alarm system to correct conditions associated with our notification devices in our atrium and Church.

Our recent life safety inspections have led to the replacement of one emergency lighting unit and the replacement of the batteries of one unit in the undercroft. More units are still needed in the basement of the Church.

As a result of our e-mail poll, it was decided not to pursue a 5-year \$180/month elevator maintenance agreement with ThyssenKrupp. Although covering most of the maintenance costs, it would only apply a 50% discount on weekends, which is when most of any issues would be realized. Therefore, it was felt to be of little use for our needs. We are currently locked into a similar agreement for our trash removal with Waste Management, which will not expire until next year.

After our last meeting a proposal was shared to increase our Building Use fee structure, which hadn't been done since our rates were instituted several years ago. With the increase in venue fees and our costs since its inception, it is prudent to adjust our fees accordingly.

## LANCASTER GENERAL HEALTH FRESH EXPRESS

What is Fresh Express? Fresh Express is a year-round program operated by Central Pennsylvania Food Bank that distributes fruits & vegetables, milk, and eggs to low-income families each month.

Fresh Express Columbia operates on the fourth Friday of each month. It began in July 2018 and runs from 3:30-5:30 p.m. at Park Elementary School (50 S. 6th Street).

Who does this program serve? Fresh Express is open to individuals and families in the Columbia area making less than 150% of the federal poverty level (about \$37,650/year for a family of 4).

Who runs the program? Fresh Express in Columbia is a partnership between Central Pennsylvania Food Bank, Community Action Partnership, and Lancaster General Health.

What exactly happens at Fresh Express? At 2:00, the Central PA Food Bank truck arrives, the driver unloads the food in boxes on large pallets and delivers them into the cafeteria at Park Elementary. Volunteers unpack the food and organize it on tables. At 3:00, LG Health staff will begin checking in clients at the registration desk and direct clients to the waiting room. In the waiting room, clients can sample recipes and watch a cooking demonstration. From 3:30-5:30, clients will walk through the cafeteria and select their food items, one client at a time. Each item is labeled with the quantity they can take based on their family size. At 5:30, leftover food is taken to other Columbia food pantries. Volunteers and staff clean up, and everyone is finished by 6:30.

What do volunteers do? Volunteers make this program possible! Following are the common volunteer tasks:

Unpack food and help organize and display items; refill tables as needed Help staff with client registration Host the waiting area and let clients know when it is their turn to select food Help staff with cooking demonstrations and recipe sampling in the waiting area Explain the process to new clients and answer questions Keep shopping carts, shopping bags and boxes organized Clean up empty boxes and pack up supplies

Several members of St. John's have participated as volunteers and found the program well run and a great service to the Columbia community. If you are available in that Friday afternoon time slot and are interested in serving as a volunteer, the program is a worthwhile endeavor. Numerous volunteers come from other Episcopal churches within the Lancaster Convocation.

Volunteers should complete an online Child Abuse Clearance and a Criminal History check and bring the printed records with them to their first volunteer experience. Location: 50 S. 6th Street, Columbia, PA 17512
