Dear St. John's,

O God, who on the holy mount revealed to chosen witnesses your well-beloved Son, wonderfully transfigured, in raiment white and glistening: Mercifully grant that we, being delivered from the disquietude of this world, may by faith behold the King in his beauty; who with you, O Father, and you, O Holy Spirit, lives and reigns, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

(The Collect for the Feast of the Transfiguration)

This past February, I had the incredible privilege of traveling to the Holy Land with 37 other pilgrims from all over the country. Hosted by St. George's College in Jerusalem, we participated in the course, "The Footsteps of Jesus." From entering the church of the Nativity in Bethlehem where Jesus was born, to standing knee deep in the Jordan River where Jesus was baptized, we experienced one Holy site after another. Every place we traveled to caused me to pause and breath in deep the stories of Jesus and the disciples, but it was on the Mount of the Transfiguration that I found myself breathless. The church built on top of that mountain is stunningly beautiful with golden mosaics of Jesus, Elijah, and Moses.



The church itself is reason enough to visit, but it was the gardens and the view that took hold of my imagination. It is said that on top of that mountain Jesus was transfigured before his three dearest friends, Peter, James, and John. In that space, he allowed them to see him for who he truly was in all of his glory and splendor. It was a moment of deep vulnerability and trust between friends. A moment that would change their relationships and provide them with the courage they would need to walk with Jesus to Jerusalem in the days that followed. The transfiguration was an experience that would sustain them for the remainder of their ministries.

I remember standing in that holy space thinking about the power and privilege of being vulnerable with one another. Sharing our hopes and dreams, revealing our deepest passions and desires, opening ourselves up to one another can be risky and even terrifying, but the transformations that result from such vulnerability always makes it worth it.

On August 6th we will celebrate the Feast of the Transfiguration. As we remember Jesus' transfiguration on Mount Tabor in Galilee, I am excited to embrace our own transfiguration as a community of faith. It has been a joy getting to know many of you over the past month and I look forward to learning even more in the weeks and months to come. Please know my door is always open and I am eager to hear your hopes and dreams for St. John's and our beloved community.

As you consider your participation and sacrifice, be guided by the simple prayer, "Lord, what do You want to do through me?"



WE ARE NOT ALONE—JUBILEE MINISTRIES

Since 1988, St. John's has been designated by the Executive Council of the Episcopal Church as a Center for Jubilee Ministry because of the "direct and dynamic link between our theology and our ethics," demonstrated in numerous outreach and neighborhood ministries. St. John's takes very seriously God's call to feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, welcome the stranger, clothe the naked, and care for the sick. (Matthew 25:35)

Pastor Amanda's first sermon at St. John's focused, in part, on how much more can be accomplished by collaboration. Many of St. John's Jubilee Ministries demonstrate that concept.

The following ministries exemplify the outreach through which St. John's serves our community. Some are truly St. John's efforts and would help fulfill the criteria for our continuing Jubilee status. Listed here are the ministries, including the name of any partnering group or group that receives the benefit of the ministry. Ongoing Ministries

Community Breakfast Program: 40+ members from St. John's serve a free monthly breakfast of pancakes, sausage, eggs, juice, cereal, and pastries to the downtown community at First Reformed United Church of Christ, 40 East Orange Street.

<u>Volunteers are always welcome!</u> For those who volunteer regularly, please don't forget to let Dave or Sue Martin know if you can't help so they can reach out to those listed as substitute helpers.

St. John's **Food Pantry** serves the local community with food items and monetary donations from **our congregation**. Donations of nonperishable food items can be delivered to the church office or given to the ushers on Sunday. Monetary contributions help us buy food to fill gaps in donations. (Please write "Food Pantry" in the Memo line on your check.) Food boxes are organized for families and single people and are distributed from the courtyard entrance to our Parish House on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons to those in need. We need a few more volunteers — can you spare an hour a month to help our neighbors?

Martha's Ministry is looking for knitters, crocheters, quilters, and crafty folks. One of our goals as a Jubilee ministry is fellowship. We gather together every Tuesday, from 2-4 p.m., in our Parish Hall to share ideas, friendship and, sometimes, tasty treats. Prayer shawls, sweaters and other items of this nature are prepared for an annual sale. Proceeds from this sale are used to benefit outreach ministries, usually Eagle's Nest. Please join us when you have the time. Summer is here and we have plenty of yarn to share. Thank you!

St. John's supports the **Alendu, Kenya, community and its LightHouse Academy school**. Office space for the U. S. part of the ministry is in the Becker House. Prayers and financial support come from the **St. John's congregation** as well as **other sources within the community.**

St. John's partnership with **Robert Fulton Elementary School** includes a before-school-year luncheon in August for the entire staff. We support various school projects as requested, and we also serve as shelter in the event of an emergency,

St. John's participates with other volunteers to help facilitate **Fresh Food Express**, which is operated by **Lancaster General Health** and serves the community of Columbia.

In partnership with ALERT (All Lancaster Episcopal Response Team)

Several members of St. John's support a refugee family from Sudan, an **ALERT** and **Church World Service project.**

St. John's tends the **Betty Finney AIDS Memorial Garden** as we partner with **Lancaster City Department of Parks**. Assistance comes from several **ALERT member churches and neighbors from the Lancaster community**.

Seasonal Ministries

Eagle's Nest is an after-school program for 4th and 5th grade students from Robert Fulton School..

St. John's hosts a weekend of honoring **Martin Luther King, Jr.,** with both a Sunday concert and Monday Day Camp activities for **school-aged children from the Lancaster Community.**

The Christmas Angel Tree provides gifts for a variety of mostly young people in the community. St. John's congregation participates as the project is an ECW ministry.

Members of St. John's have responded to community emergencies, present and past. Requests come mostly through ALERT or the diocese; we provide volunteers and offerings for the winter overnight shelter for women and children, and volunteers for the Lancaster Food Hub, work camps, work mission trips, hurricane and wildfire relief, as well as offerings from special events. Items from St. John's Yard Give are given directly to community members and distributed to other community agencies.

St. John's has been a collection point for Styrofoam in a separate marked large garbage can by our dumpster for many years. Parishioners then transport the large amount to **DART**'s drop-off shed on Pitney Road where it is recycled into picnic tables, rulers, etc.

Let us not forget that our campus provides gathering spaces for special worship services and activities, including weddings, funerals, concerts, receptions after special events, as well as meetings of Alcoholics Anonymous, Narcotics Anonymous, Citizens' Climate Lobby, and Lancaster Interchurch Peace Witness.

The people of St. John's, along with friends, neighbors, and members of other churches, have touched communities far and wide with their compassion, time, talents, sweat, giving, and love for one another in times of need.

Financial Support for Jubilee Ministries

Jubilee Ministries are supported financially through the sale of grocery cards to our congregation. (The stores sell cards to us at a 5% discount and we sell them for face value.)

Total grocery card sales for June, 2019 - \$5,980 with \$299 going to Jubilee Ministries

Did you know that it's easier to use a grocery card at the store than to peel out cash or write a check... and the amount remaining on your card is recorded on your receipt? Whenever you buy one of our cards, 5% of its value goes to our Jubilee ministries. It is truly a "WIN-WIN" situation! Grocery cards also make great gifts!

CITIZENS' CLIMATE EDUCATION

FOR the LOVE of the EARTH Excerpts from "For the Love of the Earth"

A Letter on Creation from the Most Reverend Michael B. Curry

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

The Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. often said: "We shall either learn to live together as sisters and brothers, or we shall perish together as fools." His words feel especially poignant today as we awaken to the chilling realities of global climate change. We are interconnected. We are tied into networks of mutuality as brothers and sisters on this fragile planet, and the truth is we need each other.

When it comes to climate change, what affects one part of the planet affects the whole planet, and what affects one part of the human family affects the whole family. As members of the Anglican Communion we share a commitment to face the imminent threats to our climate and to the biodiversity that sustains all life. These threats know no national or natural boundaries.

Friends, we Episcopalians have seen the devastation of surging storms and the ravages of climate change in the U.S. Virgin Islands, the Florida Keys, Puerto Rico, California, Houston and beyond. We have seen too many of the children of God suffer the interconnected pain of economic, racial and environmental injustice.

We today are presented with a simple choice: will we live as friends, as brothers and sisters, as Beloved Community, or will we be subsumed under the rising waters of chaos? If we choose community, we can move – and protect – mountains. I know we can do this because of the old spiritual that speaks of God's relationship to God's creation: "He's got the whole world in his hands."

We human beings have been charged with being trustees, caretakers and stewards of God's creation. We can and must do this. With the policies we advocate on Capitol Hill, with the solar panels on our church rooftops ... with the prayers on our very lips.

My prayer is that we in the Episcopal Church and the Anglican Communion will follow the way, the teachings and the Spirit of Jesus by cultivating loving, liberating and life-giving relationship with God, with all in the human family, and with all of God's good creation. For it is certainly true that "he's got the whole world in his hands." It is also true that he has placed it in ours.

How do we live into these mandates?

We must go "beyond the traditional avenues of Christian charity to the work of justice - changing the systems that necessitate charity in the first place." (Episcopal Public Policy Network, EPPN)

Educational inequity

Did you know that in state funding of public education, of all the states in the union, Pennsylvania has the widest gap between its funding of wealthy districts and its funding of poor school districts? Our state gap is twice that of the national average. Numerically, Pennsylvania children in poor districts receive from the state 33% less per pupil than do those in its richest districts.

Defining Pennsylvania's regressive state funding of schools: giving the poorest districts the least money per student and, at the same time, giving to the wealthiest districts the greatest amount of money per student.

In 2015, with strong bipartisan backing, the Pennsylvania Legislature moved to address this glaring inequity. The Fair Funding Formula was devised as a vehicle through which state money earmarked for school districts would be distributed to all children fairly. Right now, however, less than 10% of state funds are distributed according to that 2015 fairness formula. Pennsylvania continues to sit dead last in the nation on fairness in funding basic education. Why? Because the fair formula was (and remains) designed to be applied only to "new money" allocated for public school education, and not to apply to any state funds previously allocated.

Concerning, but why particularly concerning to me? To us?

As a priest and a school counselor of 20 years, I am compelled to respond to educational inequities know firsthand. Besides the immediacy of children losing ground, the stalled status-quo not only doesn't champion equality, it serves to further entrench race and class inequities.

To us as citizens, it is morally troubling for Pennsylvania to demonstrate an utter lack of resolve to change this situation.

Who loses?

- Pennsylvania operates under an educational caste system. While race is not explicitly included in the state's historical funding formulas, the results clearly show a persistent pattern of racial bias¹.
- Those most negatively affected by this system are students in majority non-white school districts. The School District of Lancaster (87% non-white student population) is shortchanged by \$40 million per year. Where is that \$40 million now going? The direct relationship between a district's percentage of white students and its distance from the per-pupil fair funding level points to the answer. In schools composed of 60% or more white students, current spending-per-student is \$500-\$2000 *more* than the Fair Funding Formula would allot if it were applied. Schools composed of 60% or more of non-white students receive \$500-\$2000 *less* per student than what the Fair Funding Formula would allot.

For more than two years the Lancaster Clergy Team and people of faith have been working with POWER (Pennsylvanians Organized to Witness, Empower and Rebuild) to remedy this injustice.
