A MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR

Dear St. John's,

Outside of Easter and Christmas, All Saints' Sunday is hands down my favorite Feast Day of our liturgical year. There is something sacred and inspiring about remembering and honoring the great cloud of witnesses that have gone before us. We need saints. Saints intercede on our behalf and join us as prayer partners. Saints remind us of the Holy Community we belong to: a community that transcends time and place. Saints encourage us by their witness and devotion to sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ. Saints model faith in real, tangible, and authentic ways. Most importantly, saints illumine the path that is set before us – enabling us to continue our own journeys with Christ.

On All Saints' Sunday we will commemorate the Patriarchs, Prophets, and Apostles of biblical times. We will give thanks for the church giants and mystics like Perpetua, Augustine, and Teresa. And on All Saints' Day, we will lift up and remember the saints known to us personally: the men, women, and children whose love of God and love of neighbor continue to shape and inspire our own lives. During worship (9:00AM) and continuing into our annual meeting we will have the opportunity to give thanks, break bread with one another, and build upon the foundation the saints have laid before us.



Worship on All Saints' Day could certainly be referred to as a thin place, where the veil between heaven and earth is opened and we experience, even more profoundly, the gift of belonging to this holy and sacred community. I hope you will remember with gratitude all those who have impacted your faith, who intercede on your behalf, and who invite you to join them in God's ongoing work to heal, comfort, and restore the world. As we remember those who have gone before us and build upon their legacy, rest assured God is actively remembering us. For as the apostle Paul reminds us, "Nothing in all of creation will separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus."


STEWARDSHIP UPDATE



CONVENTION REFLECTIONS



Representing St. John's at the 149th annual Diocesan Convention in Harrisburg during October 18-19 was an honor and privilege for all of us! This year's theme was "Shaped by Faith," Bishop Scanlan's new initiative to discern a way forward for our church by both holding on to what is true for us and embracing the courage to explore new ideas. We will need to pray, listen deeply to each other and to God, and engage in courageous, honest conversations as we "explore, discover, and reshape our Diocese to serve God's

The weekend was full of energy, fellowship, and worship. Our keynote speaker was architect Duo Dickinson, Jr, who invited us to think about how God shapes and creates our faith in sacred spaces, and we are grateful to St. Paul's Episcopal Church who hosted a beautiful Evensong service. The Cathedral Taskforce, the Aging and Seniors Committee, the Environmental Stewardship Committee, and Finance Committee shared reports, and we passed the 2020 budget. Delegates also approved resolutions endorsing continued support for the Episcopal Home and minor amendments to the Constitution and Canons. Finally, we elected new members to a variety of Diocesan committees and deputies to the 2021 General Convention. Liturgy was woven throughout the sessions to keep us grounded in the presence of the Holy Spirit during our time together.

What was most meaningful from the weekend? That's a tough question to answer, because there were blessings abound. Building community with churches in our Diocese, dreaming about the future, strengthening bonds within our own St. John's family, and being so proud of our St. John's youth who participated in many ways, including taking the stage to serve as lectors, were among the many highlights for me. I am deeply grateful to have a found a home in this Diocese and at St. John's, and we all thank you for the opportunity to represent you at Convention this year.



"Paris to Pittsburgh"
