

A MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR

Dear St. John's,

"The season of Advent means there is something on the horizon the likes of which we have never seen before... What is possible is to not see it, to miss it, to turn just as it brushes past you. And you begin to grasp what it was you missed, like Moses in the cleft of the rock, watching God's back fade in the distance. So stay. Sit. Linger. Tarry. Ponder. Wait. Behold. Wonder. There will be time enough for running. For rushing. For worrying. For pushing. For now, stay. Wait. Something is on the horizon."

Every year I find myself being drawn to this quote written by artist and author Jan L. Richardson. It's hard to believe that the season of Advent is upon us. Advent, which means *coming*, is a time of preparation, of patience, of remembering what grounds and sustains us. Over the course of the next four weeks, we are invited to prepare our hearts and lives to celebrate and receive the Christ child once again. Linger around coffee hour a little longer on Sunday mornings and connect with those who wait with you. Imagine the fulfillment of God's promises while sitting in a pew on a random lunch break. Behold the gift of Christ's presence in the bread and wine each week. Consider St. John's a safe space away from the hustle and bustle of daily life this December. Who knows, perhaps you'll even discover the light of Christ breaking through the darkness right here and now.

THE BISHOP IS COMING!

(OK, not until February 9th, however it's never too early to prepare!)



With the Bishop's visit officially on the books, it is time to begin our preparations for her visit. One of the roles of our bishop is the Confirmation, Reception, and Reaffirmation of members of the parish.

In the 1979 prayer book, we find this introduction to the rite of **Confirmation**: Those baptized at an early age are expected, when they are ready and have been duly prepared, to make a mature public affirmation of their faith and commitment to the responsibilities of their Baptism and to receive the laying on of hands by the bishop. (p. 412) Those baptized as children are usually confirmed during adolescence to publicly affirm for themselves the baptismal vows made for them by parents and godparents.

Reception refers to the rite by which a baptized Christian, confirmed by a bishop, is welcomed into the fellowship of the Episcopal Church. It too, is a public affirmation; like those being confirmed, candidates for reception also make a profession of faith and renew the Baptismal Covenant.

The rite of **Reaffirmation** is celebrated with a confirmed Episcopalian who, for personal reasons, wishes to again to publicly reaffirm their baptismal vows to the bishop and the community. It is comparable to a married couple publicly reaffirming their vows at significant times in their marriage. In both reception and reaffirmation, we pray that the Holy Spirit continues to transform and deepen the candidates faith.

Our staff of dedicated volunteers work hard each Wednesday to mentor and guide these students through a variety of activities that may include games, arts and crafts, homework assistance, journaling, field trips, meal planning, and cooking and family meal sharing.

In October, our Eagle's Nest students visited the Pottery Works, where 21 students were able to select and paint a unique piece of pottery. For Halloween, we enjoyed a party, complete with pumpkin painting, pumpkin bowling, and bobbing for apples.




ADULT FORUM - DECEMBER

UNDERDOGS AND OUTSIDERS by Tom Fuerst

Sundays in December 8, 15, 22 @ 11:30 a.m. in the All-Purpose Room

The Bible is full of surprises. At every turn, from the beginning of the Old Testament right through the end of the New, we find God working in unexpected, even strange ways to bring about God's purposes. During Advent, remembering this strange history of God working in our world helps us look forward to the birth of God's Son, Jesus. As if to remind us of this, the Gospel of Matthew presents a genealogy of Jesus before telling the story of his birth, including subtle references to the times God worked through unlikely people.

Matthew names five women in the family tree of Jesus: Tamar, a forgotten daughter-in-law and widow; Rahab, a prostitute; Ruth, a foreigner; the wife of Uriah, an adulteress; and of course Mary, a young virgin. This Advent study explores the stories of each of these five women, showing how they all played a pivotal role in God's purposes. Through the Old Testament stories the Gospel draws upon, Matthew reminds us to look for God in unexpected places during this Advent season. (From the foreword)

As we begin this Advent season, we are reminded of the most incredible gift the world has ever known ⁻ the birth of Jesus, given to us by God the Father. Perhaps this is where the beautiful tradition of gift-giving at this time of year originated.

There are many worthy recipients of our generosity -- medical research, educational and cultural organizations, caring for the less fortunate and, of course, St. John's. During this season of giving, please consider contributing a new or additional gift to our capital campaign. You will help pay the remaining balance on our renovations loan and reduce the total amount we will owe by decreasing the interest we pay each month currently approximately \$2,000.

In lieu of a cash contribution, you might be able to take advantage of one of the following tax-saving options when making a charitable gift:

Gifts from an IRA

When you're 70 ½ or older, instead of taking your Required Minimum Distribution (RMD), you may make what s called a **Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) directly to St. John's**. You are not entitled to a charitable deduction, but unlike an RMD, your donation won't increase your taxable income. For example, if you are in a 20% tax bracket and take an RMD of \$5,000, you will owe \$1,000 in federal taxes. If instead you make a QCD to St. John's, the church will receive the full \$5,000 and you will not be taxed.

Gifts of appreciated property held more than one year

The tax code is very generous toward giving publicly traded stocks, mutual fund shares, bonds and other marketable property. **Giving the asset to St. John's** eliminates potential capital gains taxes. St. John's, as a tax-exempt entity, will realize the full market value, less transaction costs, at the time of sale.

If you choose one of the above methods to make a new or additional gift to the capital campaign, please contact Financial Secretary Gina Keiser, Pastor Amanda or Rosemary Coverly for a special contribution form. Otherwise a check to St. John's clearly marked `Capital Campaign 2_ will be credited appropriately. All gifts of any amount are greatly appreciated.
