It's been a long time since many of you have entered our space, but I hope you've driven by, walked the labyrinth, or simply sat amidst the beautiful gardens recently. If you have you may have noticed the care that's gone into maintaining this space. You may have seen the new food pantry banners that reiterate our desire to feed the hungry with "no questions asked."

GREETINGS FROM THE CAPITAL CAMPAIGN COMMITTEE:

Taking an Interest in Interest

Perhaps you thought the Honoring Our Past...Securing Our Future initiative was complete. We wish that were true. In fact, our committee was planning a thoughtful awakening of capital campaign goals during the Lenten season in April—an effort to wrap up something that was begun two years ago. And then Covid-19 crashed our plans as it did so many others.

Here's an update on where we stand today:

- We owe \$254,000 on our capital loan that is due to be paid in full in October of 2021.
- We have \$13,000 in the capital campaign account.
- We are currently paying interest on this loan of approximately \$1,200 per month.
- We expect pledge payments of \$150,000 by December of 2021.
- We need to raise in excess of \$100,000 to meet our responsibility.

Can you help?

- Early payments on your capital campaign pledge will decrease the amount of interest we pay each month.
- Your new or additional pledge will help us meet the 2021 deadline.
- Your gifts of any amount will help lower interest costs and reduce the loan balance.

We are all experiencing the same Corona Virus storm but we are not all in the same boat as we weather its effects. One thoughtful parishioner shared that he had received a stimulus check from the Federal Government. Because he didn't really need it, he chose to contribute it to a worthy cause. Perhaps this is something you might consider.

If you are able to help in any way, please contact a committee member, Financial Secretary <u>Gina Keiser</u>, or Pastor <u>Amanda Knouse</u>. Your support is critical to St. John's and will be gratefully received. If you are among those who are suffering financially during this pandemic, know that you are in our prayers as we weather this storm together.

THE FOOD PANTRY MINISTRY IS THRIVING:

Our Food Pantry ministry is meeting increased needs of neighbors who are struggling to make ends meet during this difficult time.

- Over the past three years, we have given boxes of food to an average of just over 8 households per week. Since the beginning of April of this year, we have averaged 26 boxes per week! This, of course, means that we are giving out a lot more food than in the past.
- We are using a new streamlined, socially-distanced distribution process: Maria, our Nursery and Security specialist, is now handling all of our food distribution, outside in the courtyard, on Tuesdays and Thursdays (2:30 – 3:30). Three teams purchase food (to fill in gaps in donations) and fill boxes in preparation for distribution.

- Some additional boxes of food are delivered by clergy, staff, or volunteers to families in need.
- We were delighted to be able to share some fresh lettuce from the garden of Dave and Sue Martins! If your garden is overflowing, please wash and bag your offerings in portions for families and deliver it to the church (communicating with Maria or the church office so we know to look for it).
- A new "Free Little Food Pantry" see photo was placed in our All-Purpose Room, with an invitation to participants in our AA, NA, and VA groups: "Take what you need – Give what you can – Above all be blessed"



Thank you for your continual support of this important ministry! We will make good use of your monetary donations (please write "Food Pantry" in the memo of your check) or donations of food or toiletries – brought to church or to the back porch of Becker House.
