


A MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR:

A MESSAGE FROM THE MINISTER OF MUSIC, PAUL REESE:

Dear St John's Family,

I was originally enthralled by the stunning beauty of the St John's building. I happened in one Sunday between services and was immediately met and greeted by Aaron Spicher, who gave me an impromptu tour. COMMUNITY BREAKFAST NEWS:

Dear St. John's Friends,

The good news is that Saturday breakfast is returning to First Reformed starting in September!! This is a great step. Bad news is that we will serve outside, "brown bag" only, and not enter the church kitchen at all. BUT, we can do this as requested and pray for a full return when it is safe. For those of us who are anxious to get back to volunteering, there are definitely limits, and we can't use everyone. First Reformed Church volunteers are taking over from the Moravian Church group on Saturday, Sept.19 and 26. We have been invited to check out their process by distant observation. The rotation will return in October, with Saturday the 17th as our first official feeding opportunity. While there will be a need for folks to greet and hand out a bag (using a table in front of the garage doors), it will not be more than two or three. The greater need will be to plan and shop on Friday (Oct. 16) and prepare bags in our kitchen, and transport to First Reformed, between 8:00 and 9:00 AM on Saturday morning October 17. We will have a better idea of numbers (although we are told it has gone down), and what supplies we will need to have. This has generally been a cold meal, but it could be possible to create breakfast sandwiches in our kitchen and wrap to keep warm. I believe that observing the process on the two Saturdays in September will assist our planning. So hang tight! Thanks for your faithful patience.

Our grocery card sales for the months of July and August were \$3,060.

FOOD PANTRY IS HELPING TO MEET INCREASING NEEDS:

Dear St. John's Family,

During this pandemic, most of our ministries have had to adapt, and our Food Pantry is no exception. We've streamlined our process and added cleaning and distancing precautions. Maria Weaver-Hollowniczky, whose official responsibilities are in nursery and security, has become the public face of our food pantry, distributing food and occasionally delivering a box or two. From 2017 through 2019, we gave out an average of just over 8 boxes of food per week. But from April through August of this year, we have served an average of 26 families each week! This has only been possible because you have stepped up your giving, of both food and money, to enable us to provide for our neighbors' increased needs. (And we've temporarily taken over a Sunday school room as a warehouse!)

Many thanks to Maria and our 3 teams of volunteer buyer-packers, who have researched bulk buying options and kept the food flowing in and out!

A MESSAGE FROM THE STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE:

"Take what you need; give what you can" has been the Yard Give motto for the last five years, but not in our wildest dreams could we have imagined what that meant before this year's Yard Give.

First, parishioners cleaned out their closets in a huge way! During July, the Stewardship Committee used the auditorium stage to collect donated items. But by the last two weeks of collection, we had outgrown that space and we were working our way down the sides of the auditorium.

Volunteers sorted all the items onto the tables in the Parish Hall <u>and</u> the Auditorium. Clothing and accessories dripped off the tables in the Parish Hall, and the Auditorium was filled with electronics, appliances, art, tools, kitchen items, small chairs, lamps, toys, office supplies, decorations, and books galore. When we opened the doors on Friday, August 7th at 7:00am, the magic started. There were already seven people waiting to enter the building. Yard Sale regulars, neighbors, and folks from every walk of life walked through the doors of our church to find their treasures. Some were in search of a bargain while others found necessities that they couldn't otherwise afford. We estimate that we saw between 100-150 shoppers over the course of the 2 days. Thankfully, we had dedicated volunteers that helped at the various levels and entrances of our church. These volunteers welcomed the people, helped to maintain safe practices, and shared our beautiful campus with those who came to shop. These volunteers heard many stories of gratitude for our work at St. John's.

We met Lily, who fled domestic violence in New Jersey. She has been staying on the couch of someone who lets her stay with him in exchange for a small fee and cooking and cleaning. We watched a single mother with teenage twin boys who regularly get food from our food bank bring a toy that they no longer could use in exchange for some clothing that fit their growing bodies. A neighbor, who is not a parishioner but knows the work of the Yard Give, asked us to give out \$20 bills that she provided to those coming to the Yard Give in need. *It was just one God Moment after another*.

Thank you St. John's for continuing to carry out this ministry of being good stewards to our environment, our neighbors and each other.

FINANCIAL UPDATE:

Pledge and offering income for August was on budget while year to date remains about 5% ahead of budget. Overall expenses are also favorable. Through August, **no withdrawals** from our investment account have been required to meet our operating cash flow requirements, thanks in part to Paycheck Protection Program funding.
