A MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR:



"Sing to God a new song, for God has done marvelous things. Let the floods clap their hands; let the hills sing together for joy.

"Together." We used to think we knew just what that word meant, didn't we? We never used to wonder, most of us, how the definition might be stretched, how important togetherness might become or how clever we'd need to be to make it happen.

The events of this past year have challenged our way of being together. Amid a sea of confusion, fear, and discord, we suddenly became desperate for some kind of joy, precisely when it became impossible to get together in most of the ways we knew (dinner parties, choir rehearsal, Sunday morning worship, fellowship hour, Saturday mornings at the market, soccer games, and band concerts, or neighborhood block parties). So, we stretched, hard. Flexed more than we thought we could. Groaned and reached and complained and expanded and swore (only a little) and wept (sometimes a lot!). And we discovered joy when:

- Volunteers shopped, stocked, compiled, and gave away *hundreds* of boxes of food for the hungry. Over two dozen volunteers dreamed of a way to support the kids of this city and created The Village where students receive academic and social support during an unusual school year. The staff threw open the doors of Becker House and provided sanctuary for those in greatest need. Musicians and worship leaders rose to the occasion and offered songs of praise and opportunities for worship week after week after week.

And in the end, we were together, weren't we? When we logged on for Zoom meetings, streamed worship services, organized online formation opportunities to ward off loneliness, gathered our youth together for birthday parades, and congregated for food and fellowship in the courtyard or in the local park, we were together in joy, weren't we?

Our togetherness may not have happened in the sanctuary, or in the parish hall, or in the Sunday school rooms, but it happened! And through it all, we were together with God, whose love covers every distance and heals every heart.

In the coming week you should receive a letter, a pledge card, and a prayer from our Stewardship Committee. I hope you will join me, Pam, Leslie, Nicole, Rosemary, Debble, Charles, and your vestry in that prayer as we discern together our giving for 2021. So much is different; so many circumstances have changed. But here's what I know: with God's help, the music we create, in person or in spirit, will be well worth the rejoicing.

Friends, I eagerly look forward to celebrating what is possible when our voices, hands, and hearts join together in the song of generosity. Our Ingathering Sunday on October 18th may look a little different, but the joy will remain the same!

Dear St. John's Friends,



A few reminders:





A MESSAGE FROM DEACON STACEY CATIGANO:

Dear Church Family,

Greetings in Christ!

It is with great joy in the Lord and His leading in my life that I now begin my journey here at St. John's Episcopal Church serving as your deacon! I look forward to meeting you, through livestream and in person, on my first Sunday, October 4, 2020.

I would like to take this opportunity to share a little about myself and the deaconate.

After 24 years of serving in the U.S. Army my husband James and I were blessed to retire here in Pennsylvania with our two, now, adult children, Nicole and Anthony. We have been married for 33 years and are ridiculously silly grandparents to our 3-year-old grandson, Ethan. 

FINANCIAL UPDATE:

For the first time this calendar year, our YTD pledge/offering income has dropped below budget due to below-average receipts in September (\$17,956 actual versus YTD monthly average of \$34,000). To supplement income and meet expenses, we made our first withdrawal from investment savings this year (\$20,000). Expenses remain well below budget so our overall financial position continues favorable.

FOOD PANTRY NEWS:

Dear St. John's Family,

St. John's Food Pantry recently received a very welcome gift in the form of Hal Williams's Eagle Scout Project. This gift consists of five wall-mounted racks for storing and dispensing cans and two fold-down tables to hold boxes for packing. Hal was able to obtain grant money to fund the project, and he enlisted the help of Mike, his dad, and other scouts in constructing it.

Hal actually proposed the project to Food Pantry coordinators Debbie Carter and Marion Wear a few months before the coronavirus complicated lives and increased food insecurity among our neighbors. He delivered and installed the completed project in August, and he created an instructional video for our food buying and packing teams: https://youtu.be/MK7MoVO4qpY

When our neighbors' needs for food increased with the coronavirus, we quickly outgrew the closet that had housed our food, so we moved everything into a Sunday school classroom (which, of course, wasn't being used for classes). Now that Sunday school will resume meeting once a month, Hal's project has come just in time for us to move our inventory of canned goods into the racks, so we welcome the additional space they'll give us.

Thank you, Hal, for taking the time to ask about our needs and to develop your project to meet them!

It's Fall, got an extra coat your aren't wearing - give to someone in need; Gloves, scarves, hats, new socks - someone on the streets would be thrilled and warm.


October 18th
