A MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR

To: Parishioners of St. John's Episcopal Church From: The Vestry for St. John's Episcopal Church Re: Special Parish Meeting to Discuss Concord Street Properties

We hope everyone is well and safe during these still difficult times. Our hope is that we are very close to "the light at the end of the tunnel", and we look forward to seeing everyone in person in church very soon.

The Vestry has been working hard during the COVID shutdown, dealing with numerous issues related to St. John's. One of the items that came up earlier this year is the current condition of the two properties the Church owns at 209 and 211 Concord Street. These are the two townhouses directly adjacent to our parking lot on Concord Street. Back in February, the Vestry was made aware of issues/ problems with the 211 unit. A visual inspection was performed, and we concluded that this unit was in very poor condition and in need of significant remedial work/ repairs.

The Vestry discussed the issues related to 209 and 211 Concord Street at our February meeting. In March, that discussion was expanded to include the current state of these properties, possible options related to their sale or future use. This included an in-depth discussion of the pros and cons of each option.

These topics were discussed in more detail at our April Vestry meeting held on April 18th. We also worked with outside realtors and contractors to get a rough idea of the current market value of the two properties and the costs estimated to make repairs to get them up to "market condition". We decided that it made sense to discuss these options with those in the parish who want to be part of this discussion. We want everyone to know the facts and the options the Vestry is considering, and we want your input and insight before any decisions are made.

We will be holding an open meeting on Sunday, May 23rd at 11:30 am in the Parish Hall for everyone who wants to attend. In addition, we will have a zoom link available for those unable to be physically present. The plan is to have a 30-minute presentation on the properties, and then 30 minutes for questions and discussion.

The hope is that after this meeting, and further discussion and discernment within the Vestry, we will decide as to the future use of these properties at our upcoming Vestry meetings.

We look forward to seeing you on May 23.

MESSAGE FROM THE DEACON

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Granny "Pattycake" was one of my favorite people to spend time with when I worked at an assisted living community. She always wore a silk flower tucked behind her right ear and smelled of lavender. Her windowsill was lined with African violets. It was her garden and she loved it very much. But one morning a new and very well-meaning nurse wanting to be helpful, poured water on them. This angered Granny Pattycake and so she snapped at the nurse, "I've told you repeatedly, my violets don't like that! 81 9¹ They take their water from the soil!" Feeling badly, the young nurse 18¦ offered to replace the African violets with some lovely Begonias she had at home. Granny Pattycake shook her head, "You don't understand, African 191 violets remind me of my mother."

21! When I am struggling with a situation the temptation is strong to spend all my energy in trying to figure out a solution. So, I immediately reference my past experiences to help me fix, what appears, to be the problem. The reality is however that other people may not have faced the same 25 challenges I have but certainly have their own difficulties to overcome. It is 26 important for me to remember not to assume anything about another 261 person's situation. 27

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Currently, I have a friend who is mentoring a young man who had a

reputation for being immature and lazy. My friend described their first

meeting as frustrating because he had to wait over thirty minutes due to the young man running late. To add insult to injury, he arrived to the meeting unshaven and half asleep. Yet as soon as my friend started listening to the young man's story the pieces came together. This young man wasn't unappreciative or not sincere about getting his life together, he just needed help after being aged out of the foster care system. No one had taught him how to tie a tie, how to shave or how to organize his time. No one had

taken the time to listen and discern what he needed.

Pentecost can help us to remember how God brings us together. In Acts 2:1-21, we learn how the Holy Spirit united a group of diverse people with diverse situations. Suddenly people were able to hear and speak a language that was no longer dependent on preconceived assumptions. The same is true for us today. When we actively listen with Love, the language of our faith, a person ceases to be a problem to be solved. We become capable of, like God, to listen for, hear, care about, empathize with and respond to the hurts of the wounded. What empowers us to truly listen and connect with someone isn't human curiosity or problem-solving thinking. It is Christ-like love and compassion.

VESTRY HIGHLIGHTS FROM APRIL

We ask that God grant us faith, hope, charity, humility, wisdom, and perception so that we may seek to know God's holy will. Annie Lattanzio-Hale opened our meeting with this Prayer of St. Francis.

What to do with our two rental properties on Concord Street was the center of our discussion at the April meeting. During the month we had learned that a number of parishioners had expressed serious interest in the outcome. Should we retain ownership? If so, what would we do with them? Should we sell? If so, what to do with the proceeds? Should we retain one and sell the other? How do we best carry on our mission at St. John's? In the end, we decided that we will have a Parish meeting on May 23 at 11:30 AM. At that meeting we will have pictures of the two properties and have an open discussion as to the present and future of these properties. The Vestry will then take a month to consider what we have heard and make some decisions beginning at its June meeting.

We have been blessed by a gift from The Rev. Paul Goddard Trust. He had served here at St. John's during the 1960's and is remembered fondly by some of our members who were in the Youth Group at that time. The Rev. Goddard gave us a gift of \$20,000 with no restrictions. The Vestry approved a motion to apply the gift to our Capital Campaign. Those who remember him felt that he would approve of this move.

A Resolution of Thanks to Bob Kilp for his years of service as Vestry Secretary was agreed to. It would be presented at the April 25, 2021 services.

We want to recognize Ben Webber who has taken leadership of the Property Committee. Ben is changing the approach of the committee to be more of a planning and preventive maintenance role rather than fixing what is broke.

A review of the church calendar showed that we have an active couple of months ahead of us. We have a cleanup effort, youth hike, End-of-Life presentation, men's gathering, women's gathering, graduation event, and a gratitude event over the next six weeks. If that is not enough Deacon Stacey is leading us into a new ministry in supporting returning citizens to society.

All this is possible in part due to your continued financial support. We finished the first quarter in a favorable position financially. Additionally, the Capital Campaign balance was reduced to \$107,000. during that time. Let's keep it up.

With faith, hope, charity, wisdom, and perception, we may seek to know God's will.

February 2021 FINANCIAL SUMMARY

March operating income was below budget but met all March expenses. Lower pledge contributions were somewhat offset by online auction income of approximately \$4000 (included as Other Income in the table below). March spending, net of Jubilee expenses, was right on budget. Unlike last year, no investment draws have been taken so far this year due to ample cash account balances. Our year-to-date bottom line is better than 2020 on the same (no investment draw) basis.

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Pentecost Fire Sticks

Pentecost falls 50 days after Easter, when we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit to the gathered followers of Jesus. "Suddenly a sound like the blowing of a violent wind came from heaven... they saw what seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and came to rest on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit" (Acts 2:2-4).

The symbols of Pentecost, based on the description from Acts, are wind and fire. Honoring Pentecost in your household helps focus on the gift and the work of the Holy Spirit, which fills us at all times and in all places (not just at church or churchy times).

The **Holy Spirit** is the real presence of Jesus, as he told his disciples: "And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another advocate to help you and be with you forever, the Spirit of Truth" (John 14:16-17).

Materials

- Sticks (wooden dowels, bamboo, or sticks from outside)
- Several long pieces of ribbon. Mostly red with a bit of gold and orange to look like flames
- A short piece of ribbon
- Craft glue, or hot-glue



How To Do It at Home

 Gather your household and read scripture. Try the passages from Acts 2 or John 14.
Make your fire sticks. Glue or fasten the long pieces of ribbon to one end of the stick. Then use the shorter piece of ribbon to wrap around the top of the stick – cover the glued ends so that it looks tidy.

3. Take your fire sticks outside. Watch the wind bring them to life. Remember that like wind, we cannot see the Holy Spirit, but we constantly experience its effects.

4. Enjoy! Leave your fire sticks out for the season after Pentecost, which lasts until Advent.


