A MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR

Dear St. John's,

It is quite simply amazing what a little time and a couple hundred thousand vaccines can do to change a community! Last week, we received updated guidelines from the diocese regarding how we gather as a community of faith here at St. John's. At first, I was ecstatic that many of our safety measures have been lifted, but then after a little time, I began to question. Are we sure we're safe to remove masks if we're vaccinated? What about those who because of their age or medical history prevent them from being vaccinated? Can we really belt out our favorite hymns again? How is this happening and so quickly??? Perhaps you share some of these questions.

When things change, the spirit always pushes me to pray and to spend time listening. Over the past several days, I have sought the wisdom of our vestry, numerous colleagues, and our staff. We all realize our community's sensitivity to these changes and the mixed emotions they bring. We are called to hold the tension between joy and possibility and doubt or fear. That's what walking the Way of Love is all about – holding tensions and remembering we belong to one another.

As we continue to walk in the way of love, I am hopeful that life and ministry will begin to feel fuller in the days to come. Below you will find several changes we will be making ,effective immediately, that will impact our time together:

- Those who are fully vaccinated will be free to worship/serve/congregate without masks. Those who are NOT vaccinated are strongly encouraged to wear a mask.
- We will no longer require a signup sheet for worship services. However, we will continue some social distancing measures to help those unable to be vaccinated feel safe. Once our church reaches capacity, additionally seating will be made available in the parish hall where the service will be livestreamed.
- We will continue to livestream our 10:00 AM service and will continue the practice of having a full text bulletin for those unable to attend worship in person. Our books are back in the pews for those who have missed perusing the pages!
- We will be reinstating an informal fellowship hour on Sunday mornings. Utilizing our courtyard, our Fellowship Hour Coordinator, Gretchen, will be reaching out for assistance.
- Eucharist will continue in one kind only for the time being. During worship, you will be invited, by the ushers, to the front steps of the chancel to receive the sacrament.

VESTRY HIGHLIGHTS FOR MAY

A meeting was called to solicit feedback from the parish regarding two rental properties on Concord Street owned by St. John's. The vestry has been investigating possibilities after we learned of the condition of 211 North Concord Street. To this point the following actions have been taken. We assisted the tenant in 211 in finding new housing. A team of people cleaned out the personal property that was left behind by the tenant. The building is now vacant. Vestry members have taken a tour of the vacant building. The Senior Warden and members of the property committee have contacted real estate agents and property developers to get opinions of what needs to be done to make the property habitable and what needs to be done to sell the property. The church also owns 209 North Concord Street. At this time there is some maintenance work/updating that needs to be done but it is not an urgent need. The meeting was attended by 32 people in person and 12 people via Zoom.

A summary of the concerns raised, and some answers provided follows:

- Are the buildings deeded separately? Yes.
- Would insurance cover the damage? No. This was neglect over a period of years.
- How bad is the roof? It is bad enough to have caused significant water damage and mold throughout the building.
- Have we received any professional assessment as to the real estate value? Yes. We have received estimates of \$140,000 for 211 as is. If it were fixed up, we could get \$240-250,000 for it. However, it would require about \$70-100,000 to repair. The plumbing, wiring and roof all need to be replaced. We could get about \$165,000 for 209 as is. It would need about \$30,000 in repairs to get us about \$240-250,000 for it.
- What about continuing to rent? We received \$900 per month in rent for each building before 211 became vacant. If we did the repairs, we could charge, at minimum, \$1200.
- Do we have legal action against the property manager? We do not believe so. These conditions appear to have been in place prior to the rental agent being hired. We no longer have the rental agent.

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• Does the diocese own the properties? Yes, all property is technically owned by the diocese, to sell property we must have approval from the Standing Committee.


- Why were they purchased? At one time 209 was used to house a staff member. It has been a rental property for over 20 years. We purchased 211 to house staff when the Becker House was being upgraded. It has also been a rental property for about 20 years.
- How would the funds be used? This would be a Vestry decision.
- Have we considered a line of credit to do the repairs? We have not gotten that far yet.
- A lively conversation regarding whether to sell or hold onto these properties was discussed. There are many opinions regarding what to do with these properties. One thing we all agree on is the need to do something! The current condition/operation of these properties are not serving our mission. There was also agreement that the vestry would be supported in their deliberations regardless of outcome. We are a united community even amid our diversity.

The Vestry will meet on Sunday, June 20 to decide what the next step or steps should be.







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May 2021 FINANCIAL SUMMARY

April operating income was lower than expenses, resulting in a \$16,261 monthly deficit. This is our first monthly deficit of the year, but well within historical patterns and norms. Contribution income YTD is \$28,119 behind 2020, but \$7,325 ahead of 2019. April and YTD expenses are running below budget. April closing balance of our operating checking account was \$75,098, a healthy surplus due primarily to unspent PPP funds.

MESSAGE FROM THE DEACON

In appreciation and celebration of Black Music Appreciation Month, I am honored and certainly humbled by the privilege of having artist Maria Thompson Corley generously share her wisdom with us in this month's Deacon Message.



Maria Thompson Corley (MM, DMA, The Juilliard School) has appeared as a solo and collaborative pianist on radio, television, and concert stages in Canada, the United States, Central America, the Caribbean, Bermuda and Europe, including performances in Budapest at the Liszt Academy, and in Carnegie Recital Hall, Aaron Davis Hall and Alice Tully Hall, all in New York City. She has collaborated with such artists as Metropolitan Opera soprano Priscilla Baskerville, internationally renowned clarinetist James Campbell, Peter Kenote, a violist in the New York Philharmonic, and Dara Morales, principal second violinist in the Philadelphia Orchestra. Her engagements as a soloist with orchestra include the Tallahassee Symphony Orchestra under the baton of Gunther Schuller, the Lancaster Symphony Orchestra, and the Allegro Chamber Orchestra. She has also performed with the Philadelphia-based Black Pearl Chamber Orchestra. Maria Thompson Corley and cellist Sara Male formed Duo Chiaroscuro in 2011; the group has recently begun a series of concerts for people with special needs, or other challenges to strictly observing concert protocols. Dr. Corley has recorded CD's for Naxos, Albany, and independent labels. Excerpts from her discs have been featured on

radio, nationally and internationally. Her recording of Margaret Bonds's "Troubled Water" was included in the HBO special, "Kabreeyah's Salad Days" and her recording of Leslie Adams's "Etude in C Sharp Minor" was included in award-winning director Timothy Greenfield-Sanders's documentary, Toni Morrison: The Pieces I Am. Maria Corley is also a published composer and arranger (Walton, Classical Vocal Reprints), voice actor (Unisys, University of Pennsylvania, SunTrust) and writer (Huffington Post, Broad Street Review). An award-winning poet, her first novel, Choices, was published by Kensington, and her current release, Letting Go, is available on Amazon, Barnes and Noble, and Createspace.

When most people think of African American music, they focus on gospel, jazz, reggae, soul, R&B, hip-hop, or some more regional form. Similarly, when most people think of African American female musicians, the first people who probably come to mind are singers. This phenomenon is also true for those who enjoy Western classical music, and for good reason; until very, very recently, women of African descent who do anything else but sing have been overlooked. I'm grateful to say that, at least in the realm of composing, times are changing; hopefully, for good.

Although my training in classical piano began when I was 4, I learned about African American composers well into my twenties. My education included the established canon—Bach, Mozart, Chopin, Beethoven, Debussy, Prokofiev, to which a few Canadians were added when I lived in the Edmonton area, and an American or two after I arrived at Juilliard. However, aside from spirituals, repertoire by composers of African descent was hard to find. That said, I can't claim to have been intellectually curious. My teachers were of European descent, and I had a long list of music by dead European males I'd always wanted to play, so I went along with the program.

One of the first inklings that something was missing came when my piano literature professor said that music by Black composers wasn't performed because it hadn't risen to the level of meriting inclusion into the mainstream. Maybe I misunderstood him (I hope so). Regardless, the comment has stuck with me

for nearly thirty years. At the time, I didn't have a single piece or name with which to refute him. If I'm honest, I recall having the sinking feeling that he might be right. That I could accept, even reluctantly, the idea that an entire group of undoubtedly musical, innovative people hadn't mustered even one classical composer with music worthy of study dismays me. That I was a member of that group is even worse. The Schomburg, with its repository of music by African Americans, was within reach. I visited, but did no research. I even performed powerful excerpts from operas as a collaborative pianist for Opera Ebony, but somehow, that was enough for me.

The tide turned when I got a position at Florida A&M University, a historically Black college. My colleague, Dr. Mary Roberts, introduced me to "Troubled Water" by Margaret Bonds, a fantasia on the spiritual "Wade in the Water." Later, I added "Juba" by William Grant Still and "Deep River" by Samuel Coleridge-Taylor to my repertoire. Then, in 1997, I met Dr. Darryl Taylor, the founder of the African American Art Song Alliance. Through him, I formed a connection with Dr. H. Leslie Adams, a renowned African American composer of art songs. Prior to a performance Darryl and I gave of his *Nightsongs* at Weill Hall, Leslie asked if I'd like to learn his solo piano etudes as well. I agreed. (The debut was on September 9, 2001. I arrived home just before all flights were suspended). A few years later, having been connected by Darryl to the former CEO of Videmus Records, Louise Toppin, I released a recording of 12 Adams etudes as my first solo CD.

Buoyed by the positive reception, I decided to record more music by African American composers, this time focusing on works by women. The result was *Soulscapes* (2006)...and that was it. With two children, one on the autism spectrum, a failing marriage, and a need to focus on paying my bills, investing large amounts of hours and dollars in recordings that I wasn't sure anybody really wanted seemed foolish. I continued to perform works by composers of African descent, but it never became my focus.

Fast forward to the pandemic. With time on my hands and a growing awareness that people (including two phenomenal London-based Black female pianists) actually appreciated and were inspired by *Soulscapes*, an offer from another pianist I've never met in person (neither Black nor female) to help me if I ever decided to record again birthed an idea: I had acquired more knowledge and curiosity, so why not find and record another collection of piano music by Black women?

Well, time and money. But I had time, and I'd been offered help with the money, so I took a leap of faith, buying some scores, commissioning one, writing a few more, determined to include a wide selection of female composers from across the diaspora. I picked way too much difficult music, but with only sporadic performance opportunities, God had given me a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for spending huge swaths of time banging away on the piano. I'm still not sure it makes sense to spend the funds required to record and release this project properly, especially since a GoFundMe campaign fell short, but I'm trusting that I wouldn't have gotten this idea without a good reason.

If this article has made YOU curious about this previously-neglected body of music, I'm performing a free concert on Saturday, June 12 at 3:00 p.m. at Church of the Apostles UCC. Composers on the program have roots in Africa (Emahoy Tsegué-Maryam Guèbrou, a nun from Ethiopia, and Nigerian-American Nkeiru Okoye, a recent Guggenheim winner), the West Indies (Eleanor Alberga and Errollyn Wallen, who are renowned in Great Britain, and Maria Thompson Corley, born in Jamaica), Canada (I was raised there), and the United States (Florence Price, Julia Perry, Betty Jackson King, Joyce Solomon, and Krystal Folkestad (formerly on faculty at LBC)). I promise a wide array of styles in manageable bites (most of the pieces are less than five minutes long) which, when digested, will prove my Juilliard piano lit teacher wrong.



Anne Kinderwater Carroll, Millersville and Shippensburg Universities

Anne earned her Doctorate in Educational Leadership. On her mother's 90th birthday, August 24, 2020, Anne successfully defended her dissertation "Teacher Attitudes and Perceptions Influencing the Recognition of Giftedness in Underrepresented Elementary Suburban Populations." She is now prayerfully allowing the next steps to unfold, so that she can best serve teacher candidates to address equity in leadership, curriculum, and instruction.

Danielle Di Pace, Lampeter Strasburg High School

In high school, Danielle played soccer and ran track. She was a part of the Interact club, the Varsity club, MiniTHON, and National Honor Society. She is so grateful to her siblings and her parents for their endless support. She would also like to thank her St. John's family for being there for her every step of the way. Danielle will attend the University of Vermont in the fall to major in Environmental Geology.

Emma Di Pace, LaSalle University

Emma graduated from La Salle University in January with a double major in Religion and Spanish and a minor in Education. During her time at La Salle, Emma was a student leader for La Salle Christian Fellowship, a member of the La Salle Votes team, and was involved in Neighborhood Tutoring, Big Brothers Big Sisters, and the Resident Student Association. She also had the opportunity to participate in a La Sallian Immersion and Volunteer Experience to Nyeri, Kenya, where she spent 3 weeks with the boys of St. Mary's Secondary School. Her favorite course was called Women and Social Change, a course she took at Riverside Correctional Facility with half La Salle students and half women who were incarcerated. Some of her favorite memories of La Salle are ice skating with her friends, doing puzzles with her roommates, and venturing into Philly on the weekends. Her favorite part of La Salle was all of her friends that quickly became family. She is currently working as a nanny and as an Instructional Assistant at Kennett Middle School, and she hopes to do something involving Religion.

Emily Sipe, Elizabethtown College

Emily earned her Bachelor of Health Science this year. She will continue her studies at Elizabethtown to obtain her master's degree in occupational therapy.

Hal Williams, Hempfield High School

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN NEWS

On Pentecost Sunday, Pastor Amanda shared a formidable two-part image of how the power of the Holy Spirit works within us and throughout the world. She helped us visualize that sometimes the Spirit's impact is explosive and spectacular. At other times it's a slow, one-step-at-a time, infusion of power. The Holy Spirit has been present during St. John's entire capital campaign journey. We have experienced both the explosive and the channeled power of the Spirit's presence. Several extremely large gifts have had tremendous impact, and hundreds of equally important, more modest contributions have kept us going for the long haul. As we come closer to retiring our debt, it is clear that we would not have arrived at where we are today without the Holy Spirit moving each generous member of this congregation in the appropriate way.

This chart shows where we are to date in our final thrust to make St. John's debt free. Will we reach success with a few explosive gifts? A whole lot of smaller ones? Or will we continue to experience a combination of the two? The Holy Spirit is walking beside each of us to help us discern what role we will play.

CHURCH SCHOOL NEWS




