During the summer months after Pentecost, as our beautiful trees, shrubs, vegetables, and flowers do what they do best, green is the dominant color in the outside world here in Pennsylvania. The green season is a "growing time" because this is the portion of our faith year when we focus – through Bible readings and prayers – on how we can grow as Christians to be more like Jesus. It is when we think, both personally and communally, about what it means to "be Christ in the world": what it means to "be Christ in the world": what it means to share kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, peace, joy, love, and selfcontrol (Galatians 5:22-23) with the world around us.

How does growing these fruits changes our daily lives and our everyday choices? Let's explore those questions together this summer!

Ordinary Time?



In the church year, the green season is called Ordinary Time. There are two chunks of ordinary time in the church year. Ordinary time starts after Epiphany and goes until Lent. Then it starts up again the Monday following Pentecost until the evening before Advent.

Meet a Saint: Mary Magdalene Feast Day: July 22

Mary Magdalene, a companion (friend) of Jesus, was from Magdala, a town on the shore of the Sea of Galilee. We learn about her first as a woman whom Jesus heals. She traveled with Jesus and the disciples, supporting them in their ministry.

When Jesus died on the cross, the men except for John ran away, but Mary Magdalene stayed with Jesus until the end. She went to his tomb to help prepare his body for burial, and she was present when he rose again. Two of the gospels (the books that tell the stories of Jesus's life) record that Jesus appeared to Mary alone. It was Mary who took the news of his resurrection to the other disciples—the men. For that reason, she is called "the apostle to the apostles."



In a time and place when women belonged to their fathers or their husbands, could not own property, could not go out alone in public, could not talk to strangers, could not read or study the Hebrew scriptures (the part of the Bible we call the Old Testament), Jesus treated women as equals. Mary Magdalene was one of his most trusted and loved disciples. She was strong, brave, and faithful.

Most of what we know about her comes from the New Testament, but there are writings not included in the Bible that tell of her being a powerful leader in the early church and the one who teaches Jesus's followers to better understand him and his message of life-changing love.

Jesus, your saints are the lights of the world in every generation. Help us to shine as they do, letting your light glow in us that through us others might see you. Amen.

- Maybe you want to find a way to generously serve a forgotten community, such as the seniors in your neighborhood, or foster kids who have aged out of the system.
- Perhaps you need to all practice patience together on a long road trip.
- Or faithfulness in seeing a DIY project through to the end together.
- Maybe you can all practice self-control in your media consumption.

As you go along in your practice, try to notice and discuss what is working and what might need tweaking. Maybe you made mistakes (like I did planting my pumpkins next to my tomatoes), or maybe you discovered something life changing (like how much better the tomatoes do when weeded and stripped at the bottom!)

Whatever it is you do, remember that growth is often slow going and occasionally uncomfortable, and never really ending. But don't give up! Keep heaping mounds of Christ love and grace on each other! For grace and love and are to our souls, what water and sunlight are to the tiniest seeds in the earth: vital for growing healthy, ripe, delicious fruit.

Summertime Fun: Exploring Flowers



Can you find these parts on a flower?

Peduncle: The stalk of a flower.

<u>Receptacle</u>: The part of a flower stalk where the parts of the flower are attached.

<u>Sepal</u>: The outer parts of the flower (often green and leaf-like) that enclose a developing bud.

<u>Petal</u>: The parts of a flower that are often conspicuously colored.

<u>Stamen</u>: The pollen producing part of a flower, usually with a slender filament supporting the anther.

<u>Anther</u>: The part of the stamen where pollen is produced.

<u>Pistil</u>: The ovary, style and stigma. The ovary often supports a long style, topped by a stigma.

<u>Stigma</u>: The part of the pistil where pollen lands and then grows a tube down to the ovary.

<u>Ovary</u>: The enlarged lower portion of the pistil where ovules are produced. The mature ovary is a fruit, and the mature ovule is a seed.
