A MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR

Dear St. John's,

Let's go back to the beginning. The very beginning. I'm talking Genesis, the creation story, and the way in which God breathed life into the world. We know the story. The first day, the second day, and on and on, until day number 7. Genesis 2:2-3 reads, "On the sixth day God completed all the work that he had done, and on the seventh day God rested. God blessed the seventh day and made it holy, because on it God rested from all the work of creation."



God rested – let that sink in for a moment. The image of God kicking back in a meadow taking a nap or going for a stroll and skipping rocks into the ocean makes my heart sing. In a world that measures one's success by one's busyness, I find great comfort in the call to rest. It's not just a suggestion, but a commandment. Ranking #4 on the list of the ten commandments, we hear, "Remember the sabbath day, keep it holy." In other words, rest. If God can, shouldn't we?

Friends, we have been through a lot. I know I say that often because it's true. For the first time in a long time, we are finally able to gather with loved ones and break bread with friends and neighbors. We can celebrate weddings, graduations, and other milestones. We can gather to lay loved ones to rest and attend family reunions. And we can (and should) rest.

Over the past year and a half, I have lost sight of the importance of resting. I have fallen short on remembering the sabbath day and keeping it holy and I am guessing I'm not the only one. Rest is as equally as important as the work we do. One without the other creates an imbalance. When we rest, we allow our hearts and minds to catch up to our hands and feet and vice versa. When we rest, we create space for God to speak and heal and breathe life into us in new ways.

This month, I am reintroducing myself to the sabbath over a three-week period (I have some catching up to do)! From July 11-August 4, I'm going on vacation to reconnect with God, my family and friends, and to lay in a hammock (while imagining God relaxing in the one next to me).

VESTRY HIGHLIGHTS FOR JUNE

Following through on the Parish Meeting of June 2020, the primary business of the June Vestry meeting was continued discernment regarding the Concord Street properties. The following Resolution was passed unanimously after a great deal of discussion:

Whereas, the Vestry of St. John's Episcopal Church in Lancaster, PA, has been discussing the best uses of the properties the church owns at 209 and 211 Concord Street.

Whereas, regardless of the outcome, there are necessary maintenance work items at 209 and 211 Concord Street that need to be completed in the next 30 days.

Whereas the Vestry believes it is in the best interests of the Church to continue to collect more information and engage in more discernment with regard to the resolution as to the property located at 211 Concord Street.

It is hereby Resolved that the Vestry has agreed upon the following actions related to the properties located at 209 and 211 Concord Street:

- 1. To keep the property located at 209 Concord Street and continue to rent this property to the current tenant.
- 2. Contract with Kuhn's Enterprises to perform mold remediation work at 211 Concord Street pursuant to the proposal dated 6/14/21 (a copy of which is attached to this resolution).
- 3. Approve a maximum of \$3500 to perform tree removal work in the back yards of both 209 and 211 Concord Street.
- 4. Following the inspection and gathering of additional information, a decision will be made at the August Vestry meeting.

SENIOR WARDEN UPDATES

I hope everyone is well and safe, and enjoying what is starting to feel like a "normal" summer.

I wanted to provide you with a quick update on the Vestry's discussions about the properties St. John's owns at 209 and 211 Concord Street.

First, I want to thank everyone who participated in our Parish meeting about the Concord Street properties. Your comments, insights and thoughts were very helpful. This information was extremely helpful in the Vestry's discussion as to the best disposition of these two properties.



Based on our Vestry meeting on Sunday June 20th, I can provide the following updates:

- The Vestry voted to keep the property at 209 Concord Street and continue renting it with the current tenant.
- The Vestry decided to continue our discernment and fact-finding mission with regard to the property at 211 Concord Street. We will also be awaiting the results of a Lancaster City Housing Inspection of 211 Concord Street that will occur on Tuesday, June 29th. Our plan is to make a final decision on the 211 Concord Street property at our August Vestry meeting.
- In the interim, we have approved certain remedial work related to the black mold and other items in 211 Concord Street.
- We also approved tree removal work in the backyards of both the 209 and 211 units. This relates to trees that are encroaching on the Church.

DEACON'S MESSAGE



I am very grateful to The Reverend Kevin Barron, transitional, Deacon for his educational and uplifting reflection in this month's Deacon Message.

The term intersectionality is defined by sociologist as "The inequalities produced by simultaneous and intertwined statuses and how that influences the life course of an individual or group. In my case, as an African American male who is also gay, the combination of these two identities function together to produce experiences that are not realized by only being African American or only being gay. It's that in between space that makes you a subset of both the African American and LGBTQ communities. I am a member and have a have a kinship with both. Yet, depending upon the set of circumstances, sometimes I experience the commonality with one

community more than the other. And although I am a member of both communities; I still feel the exclusion of one of those communities because of my membership in the other.

The month of June both of my communities have cause to celebrate. For my African American brothers and sisters, June was the month in which Juneteenth, the day commemorating the emancipation of my ancestors, resides. For my brothers, sisters, and non-binary companions in in LGBTQ community, June is PRIDE month, the month my ancestors stood tall and fought back in the face of oppression. One celebration joins us together by race. The other joins us together by shared sexuality.

Although I experience struggles in both communities, the struggles are different. As a gay man, I may just as easily experience discrimination based upon whom I love within the African American community as racism in the LGBTQ community. My shared identity with both fails to shield me from these things.

As an African American man who is gay, I my realization of kinship in these two communities happened at different times during my social and physical development. My first realization that I was different based upon my race happened when I was five years of age. I was born into a family, a community, of shared experience based upon the color of skin. In many ways, being black in the world is defining.

Conversely, my first realization that I was different based upon my sexuality happened after I reached puberty. While I didn't have a name for what I was experiencing, I knew that this aspect about myself set me apart from other boys. While the other boys talked about their desire for sexual involvement and entered relationships with girls, these things held no interest to me.

Yet, society tells us that these aspects were defining for what it meant to be in the world as a man. It was the natural order of things. Additionally, within the African American community, it tapped into the hypermasculinity that is a product of slavery that sought to question if not strip the masculinity from my male ancestors. Even today, navigating through a society that believes opposite sex relationships are the norm and therefore upheld as the example of being in the world, can prove to be more challenging as a member of a race of men still having to prove their mettle as men. However, I may navigate the waters of my shared identity in these communities, I hold closely to my heart the words found in Psalm 139. The psalmist, speaking to God reminds each of that we are who we are meant to be. "For it was you who formed my inward parts; you knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made." I say joyously to myself, Happy PRIDE and Happy Juneteenth.

After high school, he studied music at Messiah College, where he formed a barbershop quartet called "The Grantham Gents", who released a CD upon graduation.

Douglas enjoyed singing in the concert choir at Messiah, under the direction of Linda Tedford. He is a proud member of the Barbershop Harmony Society, and sings with the Hershey Chapter, Parkside Harmony, and went on to win a 3rd place international medal with the chorus in 2019 in Orlando. FINANCIAL SUMMARY

After soft March and April, pledge income rebounded in May resulting in a \$6,427 operating surplus. This is a very positive result given the typical slow down in giving as we approach summer season. Pledge income YTD is \$14,020 behind 2020 actual, but \$24,676 ahead of 2019. In aggregate, May and YTD spending are running slightly below budget.
