I've been so grateful for the opportunity to step more actively into ministry these past few weeks while Amanda+ has been on vacation. I'm equally grateful for the joy and enthusiasm I've experienced among you during this time.

After long seasons of ministry, parish life often slows down over the summer months. Formation for all ages tends to



go on hiatus, the vestry takes a pause from its regular meetings, the choir tends to take a break, and even the clergy go on vacation. It's important to find opportunities to take a break in order to experience necessary rejuvenation. This is especially true after these last twelve months, when many of us have sought to navigate ministry during a pandemic. I think we can all agree that we are ready for a short breather!

A MESSAGE FROM THE ASSOCIATE RECTOR

In thinking about ministry in these times, I'm reminded of those stories in the Gospels when Jesus took his disciples to the top of a mountain or away to a private place where they rested and prayed after a season of ministering to all sorts of people. I am also reminded that those quiet moments were not a cessation of ministry, but a pause in which they prepared themselves for their next season of active discipleship.

Like the disciples of Jesus' time, we steal away for moments of solitude not as an end, but as a pause. Like them, we know that a new season of discipleship and ministry is just around the corner. Living within the tension of taking rest and being an active disciple is one aspect of balancing our spiritual journeys. Yet as we seek to live within that tension, making space for discipleship that is both active and passive, we are reminded even by the stories of mountain top respite that God is always the central focus of all our moments.

VESTRY HIGHLIGHTS

The Vestry was not scheduled to meet during July.

A special meeting was called electronically to deal with the air cooling system.

The Property Committee has reported the following as respects the air-cooling system in the Sanctuary. As a result of the failure of the system to work, the Sexton and members of the Property Committee have consulted with Frey Lutz, a contractor who has done significant work on the system in the past. The part needs to be replaced is a TXV. The cost to purchase, install and make other adjustments to the air-cooling system would be up to \$4,400. The work would take three days. Since time is of the essence, we would forego the usual bidding process. The Property Committee requested Vestry approval of the expense limit and waive the requirement for competitive bids.

Vestry Action. It was moved that an electronic vote would be held to approve the recommendation of the Property Committee. The vote was taken July 16-17, 2021. The vote was 7-0 with three members not responding.

OUTREACH HIGHLIGHTS

Grocery Card Sales on Hiatus

For many years, perhaps over two decades, we have relied on the grocery card sales to fund our Jubilee Ministries. At first it provided supplemental funding and then over time it was the sole source of funds for our Jubilee Ministries. This situation arose due to the constant shortfall of funds we experienced. We are pleased to report that for the second year in a row we are projecting a balanced budget. This has been accomplished due to the generous response to our stewardship efforts and the careful management of our Rector, staff, and Vestry.

We now have sufficient funds available to provide for our Jubilee Ministries through your continued support of our stewardship efforts. For this reason, we are placing our Grocery Card sales on hiatus. When we find a need that can best be met through raising funds again, we may bring back the Grocery Card sales. In the meantime, we do have a supply of unsold grocery cards. We will announce a schedule for their sales in the near future.

We want to thank the volunteers who have made it possible to have grocery card sales available as well as those who have purchased the grocery cards over the years. Our Jubilee Ministries could not have existed without all your support.

PRAYER at REPRESENTATIVE JOHN LEWIS VIGIL by FAITH+



John Robert Lewis (February 21, 1940 – July 17, 2020) was an American statesman and civil rights activist who served in the United States House of Representatives for Georgia's 5th congressional district from 1987 until his death in 2020. Among his many distinctions and honorary degrees, he was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 2011. He dedicated himself to respectful discourse and breaking down walls of racism often at cost to his safety. (Adapted from Wikipedia, John Lewis)

John Lewis' words: "Ordinary people with extraordinary vision can redeem the soul of America by getting in what I call 'good trouble', 'necessary trouble'. So I say to you, walk with the wind, brothers and sisters, and let the spirit of peace and the power of everlasting love be your guide."

On July 30, 2020, on the day of Representative John Lewis' funeral, St. John's joined communities throughout Lancaster and the nation in mourning and honoring this honorable statesman by ringing our church's bell 80 times in 80 seconds - once for each year of his life.

July 17th marked the one-year anniversary of John Lewis' death. That evening, across the country, hundreds of individually organized vigils honored John Lewis' memory and message - a message that the good of the country depends upon access by all to the rights of our democracy.

I signed up to attend a vigil, a virtual one, organized by the Women of Color Coalition. Not having a clergy-person, they asked me to prepare something to say, and I agreed. I found it both a struggle and a privilege. Recognizing how doing this helped me grow in God, I share this prayer with you, the saints of St. John's. The prayer closed the evening's vigil.

I hope we'll share our experiences that has helped us "Grow in God, Act in Service, Witness in Love." I encourage us to share our stories with one another and/or send our stories to the Parish office.

A Prayer

John Lewis knew: Too many people are left out. Too many people are left behind.

John Lewis knew: For Beloved Community - for Justice - to reign, the right to vote is not only precious, but, sacred!

With courage, John championed *the* most powerful - and nonviolent - tool in democracy: the vote. And John worked to right wrongs with nonviolence with love, with every breath, until his last.

Source of All Love and Justice,

You are the air from which John drew breath. A champion of the disenfranchised.

In his final words to us, John Lewis commissioned *us* to use our communal power to change wrongs of society. CAPITAL CAMPAIGN NEWS: ST. JOHN'S OLYMPIC EVENT

With the 2020 Olympics in full swing this month, we compare our capital campaign to one of the world's premier athletic events – the MARATHON.

In place of the usual 26.2-mile-long run, we began our race six years ago not knowing that our goal would be 1.7 million miles long -- if we equate dollars to miles. Unlike the Olympics Marathon, which challenges the individual, ours has been an amazing team effort. Like so many long-distance runners whose ambition is simply to reach the finish line no matter how long it takes, we are taking a long time to reach our goal, and we are on the verge of success. Having achieved more than 99% of our goal with only 5,000 miles – or dollars -- to go, our gold medal for achievement will be awarded in October when St. John's becomes debt free.



We all can help bring our team to the finish line in one of two ways: with a new or additional gift of any amount

or

by completing our pledge as soon as possible.

Let's join St. Paul who reflected on his ministry in 2 Timothy 4:7 I have fought the good fight. I have finished the race. I have kept the faith.

FINANCIAL SUMMARY

St. John's Episcopal Church

Pledge income dropped in June, typical of summer trends, but YTD continues to track budget. Total income reported shows a large surplus due to recognition of one-time PPP funds totaling \$60,522 included in Other Income. These funds, originally received as a federal loan in April 2020 as part of the CARES Act, was officially converted to a grant by the SBA last month. Our June operating statement and balance sheet were adjusted accordingly. As for expenses, both June and YTD are below budget.

DEACON'S MESSAGE



BOOKS FOR PRISONERS

A few years ago, my husband took a tour of the Lancaster prison during which he learned that prisoners needed books. However, the only acceptable book donations had to go through churches or other similar institutions—not through private individuals.

As an author and editor, myself, I've always believed in the life-changing ability of books, so I began looking into how one could arrange a prison book donations project. Changes of personnel (at the prison, at our own church) slowed the

process a bit until this spring when St. Edward's Episcopal Church in Landisville endorsed a books-for-prisoners project through their Faith in Action Committee.

We reached out to St. John's Deacon Stacey Catigano for help and guidance because of her role as a prison chaplain, and she supplied a list of books, what she needed as a chaplain, the types of things prisoners liked to read and didn't have access to through other means, and more. What a delight Deacon Catigano has been to work with! Joyful and generous of spirit! St. John's is blessed to have her.

From her list, we then approached a librarian, the daughter of two St. Edward's parishioners, asking for help to identify similar titles. She came up with a wonderful expanded list of devotionals, biographies, and meditations, and we shared the list at last with St. Edward's parishioners, telling them about the project and how to donate to it. Our goal was to collect books and donations for two months, in May and June, after which we would go through the titles to make sure all were appropriate, that any personal information was removed from used books, and come up with a plan on where to store books Deacon Catigano can't use right away due to limited space at her prison office.

When we began this project, I must admit I would have been happy to hand over a couple dozen tomes to her. It's a complicated request to make of parishioners. We're not just asking them for books but for specific kinds of titles, using our list as a guide. I figured it might be a tough project to launch, given how busy people are.

What a surprise then to see, as of this writing, around 120 books donated (some in Spanish, as requested!), and around \$200 in donations received to purchase more! What a great outpouring of love for the incarcerated!

In the coming weeks, we'll be working on how to distribute the books. If anyone is interested in setting up similar projects in their churches, I'd be happy to share more details on how we put this one together. We are indebted to Deacon Catigano for her cheerful helpfulness and can-do spirit.

BACK TO SCHOOL LUNCHEON



Here's one more thing that makes us feel "normal" again. On Friday, August 20, the Fulton Elementary teachers and staff will have lunch in our parish hall to celebrate the back to school event. A tradition has been to support teachers with school supplies for their classrooms. It is always much appreciated and raises some excitement, not only with them but with St. John's. Your support is requested by donating ANY school supplies you can manage to bring in. Choices should be made with the teachers in mind - items to make their classroom life easier.

Suggestions are: <u>good</u> scissors, staplers, calculators, sharpie markers, dry erase markers, mini white boards, Kleenex, Clorox wipes, spiral notebooks of different sizes, stickers, post it notes. Good items for students are crayons, pencils, pencil sharpeners, extra erasers, rulers, etc.

There are approximately 20-25 classroom teachers who can use our support (and don't forget the art teacher!). Bring items to the parish hall any time in the next six weeks. Contact Sue Martin with questions.
