Dear St. John's,

A few years ago, a dear friend of mine gave me a gratitude journal. It has a beautiful green cover with leather binding and is filled with crisp white blank pages just waiting to be covered in heartfelt words of thanksgiving. When I first received this gift, I sat with it often in the mornings, jotting down names, objects, experiences, all of which exuded gratitude from within me. But like many of my practices, it didn't last. Days, weeks, and months rolled by and not a letter was spilled. The blank pages remained empty and my spiritual practice of giving thanks became buried underneath a pile of to-do-lists, activities, and the daily lament of not having enough time in the day.

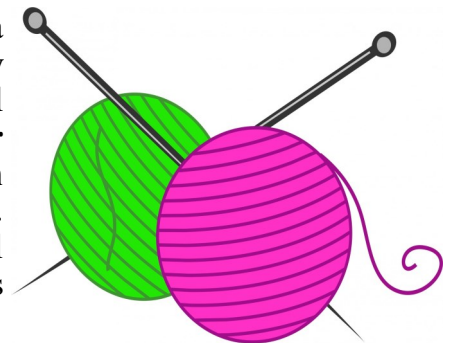
ELECTION DAY BAKE SALE NOVEMBER 2ND

VESTRY UPDATES

Monthly Budget

St. John's continues to have a healthy balance in its checking account and has been in the black for the nine months ended Sept. 2021. We are about \$20,000 below budget on year-to-date pledge income, but our expenses were also about \$20,000 lower, so we have remained on track. That said, we will have to take a one-time draw from interest on our unrestricted endowment account this fall to get us through to the end of the year. In years past, we drew 4.5 percent of interest on the endowment as an income source, so it is remarkable that we may finish the year without taking the whole amount allotted for draws.

Draft 2022 Budget

Clergy, Gina Keiser, the Executive Committee, the Finance Committee and Vestry have been reviewing the draft 2022 budget. Based on analysis, pledges will need to reach \$380,392.55 to make a balanced budget for 2022. That is a 12 percent increase over 2021 pledges. One necessary adjustment is an increase in staff salaries to meet inflation. Based on that, an increase of 4 percent in compensation is suggested. The Property Committee has provided a five-year plan with capital expenditures, and those improvements will be paid from a capital budget — not the operating budget. More information about the 2022 budget will be shared at the Annual Meeting on Nov. 7. The Vestry will vote on the budget at its Nov. 21 meeting.

IT Challenges/Expenses

St. John's Information Technology (IT) system is antiquated and prompts Amanda and the entire staff to spend more time than necessary on simple tasks. After a lengthy discussion, the Vestry voted to reorganize and upgrade of the IT infrastructure. The WIFI, firewall and telephone system will be upgraded, and the estimated cost is about \$10,000. This will be a capital expense and will be funded with additional money that was raised from the capital campaign, with advanced approval from the people whose capital campaign pledges will be used. Joe Way, a professional IT specialist, is helping oversee the process.

Staffing

No one has applied for the advertised parish administrator position, and the clergy, Personnel Committee and Vestry are discussing whether a different staffing structure — one that includes a communications director rather than a parish administrator — would serve the parish better. Details are still being discussed, and Vestry is looking into the possibility of using someone from a temp agency to staff the position until a good match for the permanent position is found.

Rich Kuhn is St. John's part-time sexton, but with all of the work he does, he puts in full-time hours. Amanda will be interviewing a candidate to clean four to five hours a week.

Annual Meeting

The Annual Meeting will be held on Nov. 7 and will include a breakfast and an update on the parish. The theme of the meeting is "Celebrating Another Year of Connections," and the parish will vote on the incoming Vestry class.

Here he was covered with flour and sticky eggs from head to toe and all he wanted to do was make something very delicious for his Nana and Pops but it wasn't turning out quite as he had planned. The final straw was when the gallon of milk proved heavier than he expected and slipped out of his small hands landing on the floor with a discouraging “thump.” It can be so very difficult when we try something new.

I discovered Ethan, sitting in the middle of a pool of milk with big crocodile tears. “I sorry Nana, I wanted to make you and Pops pancakes.” Smiling at him, I walked through the mess, picked up our crying grandson and hugged him, kissed him and thanked God for him while getting my own pajamas wet and sticky in the process.

STEWARDSHIP NOTES FROM 2021

Last year we had 107 pledges for a total of 50% of our parish. Imagine the ministry we could achieve if we increased our pledge units to 150 pledges!!!

Did you know our largest pledge in 2021 was \$19,800 and our smallest was \$60? Every gift given is a gift used to build up God's kingdom here in Lancaster. No gift is too large, and no gift is too small!



Last year we had 11 new pledges and 50 pledges increased! Due to the generosity of so many, our food pantry distribution increased, we didn't have to turn anyone away in need of rent assistance, and we were able to make numerous repairs to our campus!

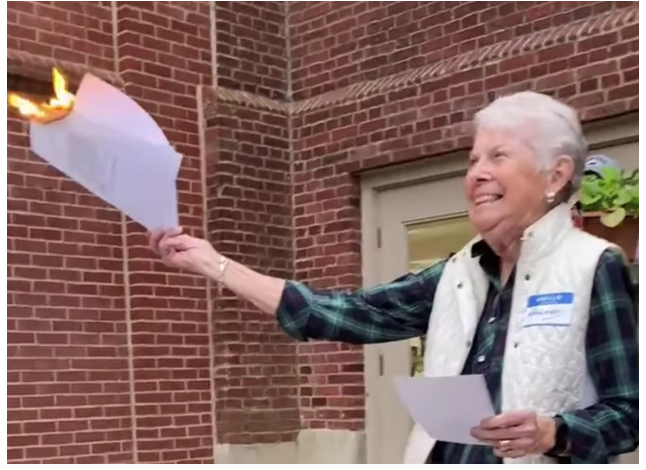

FINANCIAL SUMMARY

The capital loan was officially retired with a final payment to Fulton on October 11. St. John's is officially debt free thanks to the generosity of this parish. Sager, Swisher and Co. LLP has completed a financial review of our 2020 books with no exceptional findings. Vestry work to finalize a 2022 operating budget is underway in earnest.

Operating results (shown below) follow the same pattern as reported in recent months. September income was very good on the strength of generous contributions, but YTD still lags 2020 by about \$20k. Expenses however, are lower than 2020 for both the month and YTD. The net result is positive, and so far no withdrawals from our unrestricted endowment account have been required for cash needs. If current trends continue, we should finish the year with an operating surplus as budgeted.

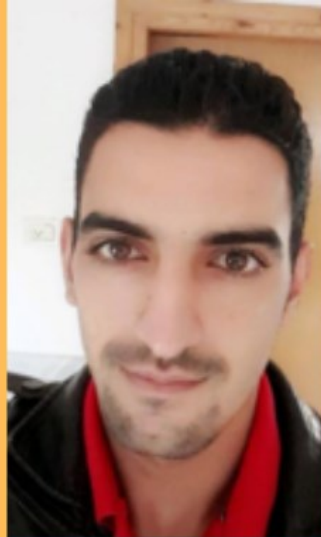
