POSTLUDE	Carillon de Westminster	Louis Viernne

As indicated by the title, *Carillon de Westminster* is a fantasia on the <u>Westminster chimes</u>, played from the <u>Clock Tower</u>, <u>Palace of Westminster</u>, since 1858. The chimes play four notes in the key of E major, G#, F#, E, and B in various patterns every fifteen minutes. The Westminster chimes are in 5/4 time, whereas Vierne's piece is in triple time. Vierne's friend Henry Willis hummed the tune for the composer upon Vierne's request; possibly, either Willis hummed the tune incorrectly or Vierne misheard his friend upon transcription. Vierne misquoted the second quarter of the chimes. However, at some points in the piece, Vierne uses this second phrase in its correct "Westminster" version.

Did you know St. John's has a team of pilgrims who travel every week to the very places we pray for in the Anglican communion? Follow John as he shares a little bit about the church and the places he visits! These letters are read in our Sunday School classrooms each week and are a reminder that our church extends far beyond St. John's and Lancaster!

Dear Pastor Amanda,

November 7, 2021

Kia ora from Wellington, New Zealand! Kia ora means "hello" in Maori, the native language of New Zealand. Most people speak English here now, but New Zealanders feel strongly about respecting the culture and traditions of the Maori people. The Maori were the first people who lived in New Zealand, and some historians believe that they arrived as early as the year 800 AD!

I am a long way from Lancaster, and thanks be to God that I arrived safely in this beautiful island country. As I look out my hotel window, I can see sandy beaches, the Pacific Ocean, and brightly colored homes and buildings. There are many boats in the harbor. Would you believe that it is springtime here? New Zealand is south of the equator, and it takes more than 20 hours to fly here from Lancaster! If you are reading this letter just after church on Sunday, it will be Monday for me in New Zealand because of the time difference!

This Sunday the worldwide Anglican Communion is praying for the Church in Aotearoa, New Zealand and Polynesia. This province includes New Zealand, Fiji, Tonga, Samoa, and the Cook Islands. Aotearoa is the original Maori name for New Zealand, and it means "The Land of the Long White Clouds." As I walked along the beach, I saw these beautiful clouds that swirled together in the sky. They seemed to reach all the way to heaven and back. I feel so grateful to be exploring this magical place where so many different cultures, peoples, languages, and ways of life are honored. It made me realize that when we travel the world, we learn so much from each other. We all bring different gifts, languages, and experiences, and we are united in Christ.


On Sunday, I will worship at St. Peter's on Willis. It is a historic church from the 1800s, just like St. John's. I will keep you all in my prayers.
