#### A MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR

Greetings St. John's family and friends,

I found myself mesmerized by a single candle in worship this past Sunday. As the first candle of our Advent Wreath was lit, I felt all consumed by its flicker and flame. In that moment, I was drawn into everything that candle represented and everything I needed it to represent. I was so consumed, I almost forgot to continue the service with the opening acclamation! It was as if time was standing still as I just lingered in that gaze, pausing long enough to allow the Spirit to speak. For many, the world seems void of hope. Our yearnings for wholeness, peace, healing, justice, reconciliation, or a different future spill over into every aspect of our lives. The season of Advent invites us to consider our greatest longings and to cling to our deepest hopes.



I'm always amazed at how different elements in our worship services can open us up to the presence of God in our midst. This year, it's the candle of hope that is burning bright, illuminating the path of my Advent journey. I wonder which candle is captivating your attention. If not a candle, is there a piece of music, the taste of the sacrament, a blue vestment, the sound of a Sanctus bell, a brightly lit Christmas tree, a gift wrapped for someone outside of your own immediate family, the smell of pine, or a simple liturgical act that is drawing you in to receive the greatest gift ever given; the gift of Christ himself.

Advent means "coming." We gather week after week to hear, again, the story of our savior's birth, and yet, we also long for Christ to return and complete what God began. But in between, in the here and now, we acknowledge that Christ is always coming into our lives, always entering a wayward and struggling heart. Henri Nouwen once wrote,

The Lord is coming, always coming.

When you have ears to hear and eyes to see,
you will recognize him at any moment of your life.

Life is Advent; life is recognizing the coming of the Lord.

I pray you recognize Christ in your midst this Advent season. I pray you slow down long enough to allow yourself to be consumed by the presence of Christ through all of your God given senses. Remember, "Life is Advent, life is recognizing the coming of the Lord."

#### ANNUAL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

The Annual Meeting was held November 7, 2021. After a breakfast served by the Community Breakfast Team, the meeting was called to order. There were 89 Parishioners present in person and over Zoom.

Amanda+ began her Rector's report by showing a video of many of the ministries at St. John's. We remain an active and vibrant congregation despite the pandemic. She continued by addressing our Staffing issues. We must rethink our office staff, including the Sexton's job. Also, in order to continue to increase our service to our community and our parishioners, we need to address the lack of a full time Assistant Clergy.

Matt+ expressed thanks to the Music Minister Search Committee for their diligence in seeking the best possible candidate. He also reported on our current Adult Formation program.

Charles Wear presented our financial report. While supporting our ministries, we also are on pace to achieve a Balanced Budget for the second year in a row. In presenting the 2022 Budget, we are again projecting a balanced budget. This budget allows us to hire a full time Assistant Clergy in July with the continued support of our parishioner's stewardship pledges.

We thanked the retiring Vestry members, Debbie Carter, Webb Cook, Tim Huber, and Molly Moyer. The new Vestry members elected are Nick DiPace, Andrew Welaish, and Paula Wolf.



#### **VESTRY HIGHLIGHTS**

This is the time of year where the Vestry takes stock of our current year status and makes plans for the coming year. The Annual Meeting was our opportunity to present this to the parishioners. We are pleased to report the following:

In this time of pandemic, St. John's has become an even stronger supporter of the Lancaster community at large. We continue to be on of the strongest teams at the Community Meals site and grew our Food Pantry program to almost six times its previous size. We added the Blessings Box and the "Fence Ministry" to our efforts. We deepened our relationship with the Fulton Elementary School as shown by the enthusiastic response that Eagles Nest has received from the students.

Through our Deacon's leadership, a formidable team has been active in supporting returning female citizens. Some members have begun the initiative to make it known to the public that we are an Open and Affirming Church.

Adult Formation has become as active part of our Sundays. We welcomed a new Deacon and a new Minister of Music.

We paid off the Capital Campaign loan on time.

At our November meeting the Vestry approved updates to the Church Bylaws. We also approved a new Building Use Policy subject to the review of our Safe Church policy.

Looking ahead to 2022, we are supporting our Rector's efforts to redefine our staffing needs in order that we can further our ministry efforts by adding a full time Assistant Clergy. Your continued support of our Stewardship campaign efforts will make this possible.





#### FINANCIAL SUMMARY

St. John's received at substantial bequest as a residual beneficiary of the Winthrop Everett trust in October. That, coupled with paying off our capital loan mentioned last month, has almost doubled the church's net financial assets since the beginning of the year. Details were provided at the annual meeting on November 7.

Operating results below show pledge and other income for the month of October to be within typical norms. Expenses were relatively high for the month based on the \$3500 fee for auditing our 2020 books and about \$9000 in property expenses for brickwork and church HVAC repairs. As reported in previous months, our income and expenses YTD are both below budget and below last year. The net effects are offsetting; we are still operating with a favorable net surplus which was budgeted for the year.

#### A MESSAGE FROM OUR DEACON

#### **God Loves Blue Too**

"I think there must be something wrong with me, Linus. Christmas is coming, but I'm not happy. I don't feel the way I'm supposed to feel."-Charlie Brown, A Charlie Brown Christmas

Charlie Brown is not alone. There are all kinds of folks who feel the same way as Charlie Brown does about Christmas. Some of us are confused because we don't feel so jolly, we aren't experiencing Christmas cheer as we believe we should. For others, it goes deeper than that. Christmas is a reminder of what our life was or what our life isn't.

There are many reasons why some of us experience a painful Christmas. Maybe because there is an empty place at the table. At a time of the year when family is being celebrated, loss is magnified and it doesn't matter if it is the first Christmas or the twentieth Christmas, grief isn't an easy journey. Perhaps, it is the harsh reality of economics. The trappings that our consumer culture demands pressure us because we don't know how we are going to make ends meet. Or maybe we are feeling a bit like Winston Churchill who often spoke about his "Black Dog," a name he gave his depression which followed him throughout his life. Finally, it can simply be weariness or as J.R.R. Tolkien wrote, "Why, I feel all thin, sort of stretched, if you know what I mean: like butter that has been scraped over too much bread."

Understandably, we often try to ignore the tension during Advent, between the joy of the coming of Christ and the reality that Jesus came into a broken world. But isn't this what an authentic Christmas is all about? Theologian Wink succinctly. "Jesus Walter states it incarnated God in his own person in order to show all of us how to incarnate God. And to incarnate God is what it means to be fully human." God chose to be with us in our anxiety, depression, poverty, loneliness, grief, injustice, sickness and everything else that could make us want to hide until Christmas is over.

God comes near to bring us near to God. God is also with us for peace, healing, well-being, good will and love. He wants to be with us and among us, in all our joys and sufferings.

If this time of year is proving difficult for you, invite Jesus into your heart. Talk with Him, weep with Him and allow Him to hold you in His loving arms. Our God is a faithful God, know you are not alone, know you were made out of Love, for Love. Listen for Love's prompting in your heart and ask God to show you, who you can bless with a simple phone call during our holiday season.

This Advent, as we draw closer to God's coming into our world, may we be blessed and be a blessing. May we hold gentle space in our broken world for ourselves and for each other with the love of Christ.

#### Next Step on Our Journey to Becoming An Open & Affirming Church

St. John's believes that every person is a child of God; no exceptions.

Is there more we can do to live out this belief? Yes.

We can enhance how we reach out and how we invite people in. We can learn more. Share more. Love more. And do it all with humility, grace and authenticity.

At its November meeting, St. John's Open & Affirming Committee started working on a Welcoming Statement that will let people know that St. John's is an open and affirming space for our LGBTQIA+ siblings. The committee will share the draft statement with the parish for input in early 2022.

The group brainstormed on words and phrases that would reflect St. John's commitment to this journey. Words such as dignity and worth, faithfulness, loving, intentional and unconditional acceptance made the list. So did phrases such as:

- You are welcome as you are.
- We are called by Jesus to love all.
- Everyone is invited to the table.
- We embrace this challenge with God's help.
- We will learn and grow together.
- We believe in the sacred worth of all people.

The committee recognizes that parishioners may have different comfort levels and levels of awareness on this topic, and it will reach out to the congregation for input in the form of a survey or questionnaire in early 2022.

As Amanda stated during the meeting, "For this to come to life, it has to be authentic; it has to be real." The Welcoming Statement and other work the committee will undertake are working toward St. John's aspiration to be a fully Open & Affirming church. With the parish's help and with God's help, we will continue to move closer to that goal.
