With a simple statement, Jesus invites two brothers to drop what they are doing and follow him. The crazy part is they do it! Like the disciples, I've witnessed many of you accept a similar invitation from Christ.

In March of 2020, just a week before the pandemic paralyzed our nation, The Rev. Matt MacDougall said yes to a call to serve as Associate Rector of our parish. For two years, Matt+ has served faithfully as we navigated our way through online church, zoom forums, and the search for a new Music Minister. Matt+ also follows a call to empower young people and serves as a social studies teacher at York Catholic High School. Teaching is his greatest passion and one he is looking forward to focusing on in the coming years. To do that, Matt+ will be stepping down as the quarter-time Associate at the end of February. It has been an absolute joy getting to work alongside Matt+ during his tenure at St. John's.

The story of Jesus and the fishermen continues after those first two brothers drop their nets and accept Jesus' invitation. Jesus immediately turns to two others and extends the same offer. Hard to believe, but they, too, accept the call. Prior to my arrival at St. John's, there had always been two full-time clergy. Over the past two years, our financial challenges prevented me from calling someone full-time. I am happy to report that thanks to the current financial health of the parish, we are now able to step out in faith and hire a full-time assistant.

I am thrilled to announce that Jennifer Trenary has accepted the call to serve here at St. John's and will be joining the team beginning February I. Many of you know Jen, but for those who do not, Jen is a candidate for Holy Orders in our diocese. She completed her seminary training at Lancaster Theological Seminary, ministered as Chaplain at Lebanon VA Medical Center, and serves as co-president of the Daughters of the King, Lancaster Chapter. Jen has an M.A. in Community Counseling and spent numerous years serving as a therapist specializing in children, adolescent, and family therapy. God willing and the people consenting, Jen will be ordained this spring or summer.

Jen is passionate about pastoral care, communications, and worship, and will be a fabulous addition to our St. John's family. Jen's desire to minister to those inside and outside of the church walls is a beautiful testimony to her faith. I look forward to seeing where Jesus leads us in the coming months and years! It's time to drop the nets and follow Jesus, St. John's!

A.L.E.R.T. BY DON DURAND

Last month (and this month!), there was a request for socks to be given to your A.L.E.R.T. representatives. You may be wondering, what is ALERT and who are the representatives? Allow me to enlighten you.

ALERT is the All Lancaster Episcopal Response Team. It is comprised of Lancaster County Episcopal Churches to offer support and help in emergency situations. It was formed in response to Hurricane Sandy. At that time, ALERT sent 137 five- gallon buckets of cleaning supplies to the impacted area.

Since then, we have provided in-person service and financial support to refugee families, participated in the Transform Jersey Shore rehab

Program, shared in maintenance work at the Food Hub, helped staff the


women's emergency shelter, offered financial assistance to several

- parishes impacted by natural disasters, assisted at Fresh Express,
- maintained the AIDS Garden, collected and distributed clothing and
- cleaning supplies as needed, and many other projects.

We meet monthly to determine what the current needs are and how we can respond to them. We use prayer as an important resource in our work. ALERT meetings are a delightful way to hear what other parishes are doing and enables us to make connections with our fellow siblings in Christ. VESTRY NOTES BY JOHN GOUVEIA, SECRETARY

In past years, the January Vestry Meeting would be held as part of the annual Vestry Retreat. At the retreat we would examine the results of the past year and set goals for the coming year or years. Like many other things in this time of COVID, this had to be postponed. However, we did examine the results of the past year in order to set the stage for the retreat when we can then concentrate entirely on our upcoming opportunities.

There was a time when our financial report at the Annual Meeting would be accompanied by the theme from "The Good, The Bad, and The Ugly." If we were to use a similar approach for 2021, we could use the hymn "How Firm a Foundation". For the second consecutive year, we expanded our missions and simultaneously finished with a financial surplus. This was due to the generous giving of our members, the effective monitoring by our treasurer, the careful work of our committees, and yes, the use of the PPP funds. When we plan for the future, we believe we can count on your continued support in continuing our mission efforts and accepting the greater challenges in the church and the world.

Among the challenges we face in-house, we recognize that our current staffing level is not sustainable. Our rector believes in collaboration and St. Paul's imagery of many members, one body. Our current staffing structure is missing some of those members. We also must support our Property Committee as they move to address our maintenance needs on an annual basis rather than relying on capital campaigns. We need to monitor our rental property more closely in the future so that we do not repeat our mistakes of the past.

As first steps in the process our new slate of Vestry Officers was chosen. Mary Waskowicz is the new Senior Warden. Leslie Morgan, John Gouveia, and Charles Wear were re-elected as Junior Warden, Secretary, and Treasurer. The Rector led a discussion on the new office hours that were implemented. The vestry has committed to support the Rector in her search for new staff members and great progress is being made. The work continues and the vestry is eager to follow God's call to serve.

FINANCIAL SUMMARY

December operating financials ended as expected, impacted by a budgeted income draw from our investment funds and various other transfers to and from restricted accounts to true-up end of year accounting. A surplus of \$27.8k was achieved for the full year, slightly ahead of budget. Lay staff savings off set overspending in property maintenance, office and audit expenses. Overall, the one-time PPP grant was key to our 2021 financial success.

A LENTEN OFFERING

Dear fellow pilgrims on the way,

In just a few short weeks, we will embark on our annual Lenten pilgrimage to the cross and the grave. Last year, we offered a Lenten Devotional written by our members. My journey through Lent was enriched by the words, stories, and reflections that were shared. I've heard many of you were also impacted by the discipline. The daily offerings connected us to each other and to the journey we share as God's beloved.

With the season of Lent quickly approaching, I look forward to offering this gift a second year, but we're going to need your help! We are looking for 40 people to reflect on a daily scripture passage and write a short reflection to help us on our Lenten journey's. You don't have to have a theological degree or wear a collar to share your thoughts on scripture!

Following are the instructions for writing your reflections.

- 1. Read your passage, pray, and write!
- 2. Your reflection should be no longer than 200-250 words. Remember brief is beautiful!
- 3. To submit your reflections simply write the date and passage at the top of the page and include your reflection below it.
- 4. All reflections need to be emailed to amanda@stjohns-lancaster.org by FEBRUARY 20.
- 5. There are no wrong ways to do this; whatever is speaking to your heart is what you should write. Remember personal connections make scripture come alive for others. If you are really struggling with what to write, call me! I'd be happy to work through it with you.
- 6. Make sure to write your name at the bottom of your reflection. (If you would like to remain anonymous we understand and will honor that, however we'd love to give credit where credit is due and I have found these writings to mean so much more when we know who they're coming from.)
- 7. Finally, enjoy this process. This practice is designed to inspire conversations with God and with each other.

DEACON'S MESSAGE

THE MEMORY OF FAITH



Have you ever gone for a walk on the beach or through the fields and noticed a random stack of well-balanced stones? If you have, did you wonder why they were there? And if you haven't, are you wondering why would anyone create a pile of rocks in the first place?

The art of rock balancing or stone sculpting predates the bible and is multicultural. Many different people had many different reasons to place one stone on top of another. Today, people stack stones to relax, relieve stress, meditate, create and play.

Artist Shane Hart states he was drawn to stacking stones through a love of improbability. "It was the seeming impossibility of it is what drew me in, and I'm still amazed when I slowly pull my hands away from a stone and it remains there defying gravity, it becomes a work of resiliency."

When I hold a stone in my hand, I am reminded of the story in which Samuel constructed a memorial after God saved the Israelites from the Philistines: Samuel took a stone and set it between Mizpah and Jeshanah, and named it Ebenezer, for he said, "Thus far the Lord has helped us" (1 Sam. 7:12, NRSV). The purpose of the Ebenezer memorial stone was to remind the Israelites of God's help and faithfulness.

I now have a regular spiritual discipline of keeping a mental list as I attempt to balance my Ebenezer stones. I think back to all the ways God has been faithful in my life. I think of a specific time I needed forgiveness, a time I was prayed for or a time I needed help to get through a valley, to name only a few. When I remember God's help in the past, I am encouraged and sustained in the here and now, especially when I wonder where is God while I experience or witness suffering.

Often the beginning of a new year is a time of looking forward. But this year instead of only looking forward, I am going to be more intentional about remembering all the ways God has helped me and other folks in life.

I hope what has proven true for me also proves true for you-that the more you look for those moments of God's faithfulness in your life the more you will remember them.

February 20th


World Day of Social Justice


