
THE FOURTH SUNDAY AFTER EPIPHANY

THE FIRST LESSON: Jeremiah 1:4-10 (please be seated)

The word of the Lord came to me saying, "Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, and before you were born I consecrated you; I appointed you a prophet to the nations." Then I said, "Ah, Lord God! Truly I do not know how to speak, for I am only a boy." But the Lord said to me, "Do not say, 'I am only a boy'; for you shall go to all to whom I send you, and you shall speak whatever I command you, Do not be afraid of them, for I am

with you to deliver you, says the Lord." Then the Lord put out his hand and touched my mouth; and the Lord said to me, "Now I have put my words in your mouth. See, today I appoint you over nations and over kingdoms, to pluck up and to pull down, to destroy and to overthrow, to build and to plant."

THE SECOND LESSON: 1 Corinthians 13:1-13

If I speak in the tongues of mortals and of angels, but do not have love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. If I give away all my possessions, and if I hand over my body so that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing. Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never ends. But as for prophecies, they will come to an end; as for tongues, they will cease; as for knowledge, it will come to an end. For we know only in part, and we prophesy only in part; but when the complete comes, the partial will come to an end. When I was a child, I spoke like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child; when I became an adult, I put an end to childish ways. For now we see in a mirror, dimly, but then we will see face to face.

Now I know only in part; then I will know fully, even as I have been fully known. And now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love.

THE HOLY GOSPEL: Luke 4:21-30 (please remain standing)

CelebrantThe Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.PeopleGlory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus began to speak in the synagogue at Nazareth: "Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing." All spoke well of him and were amazed at the gracious words that came from his mouth. They said, "Is not this Joseph's son?" He said to them, "Doubtless you will quote to me this proverb, 'Doctor, cure yourself!' And you will say, 'Do here also in your hometown the things that we have heard you did at Capernaum.'" And he said, "Truly I tell you, no prophet is accepted in the prophet's hometown. But the truth is, there were many widows in Israel in the time of Elijah, when the heaven was shut up three years and six months, and there was a severe famine over all the land; yet Elijah was sent to none of them except to a widow at Zarephath in Sidon. There were also many lepers in Israel in the time of the prophet Elisha, and none of them was cleansed except Naaman the Syrian." When they heard this, all in the synagogue were filled with rage. They got up, drove him out of the town, and led him to the brow of the hill on which their town was built, so that they might hurl him off the cliff. But he passed through the midst of them and went on his way.

THE SERMON

THE NICENE CREED (Please stand)

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God. begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Holy and wondrous God, long ago you spoke to our ancestors in many and various ways. And in these last days you have spoken to us in your Word made flesh, Jesus, who proclaimed your dream of peace. St. John's Traveler Letter: Connecting us to our siblings in Christ across the world Did you know St. John's has a team of pilgrims who travel every week to the very places we pray for in the Anglican communion? Follow John as he shares a little bit about the church and the places he visits!

Dear Pastor Amanda,

I hope you are enjoying winter in North America! This week I write to you from sunny Madagascar, a large island in the Indian Ocean and one of the islands featured in this week's Anglican Cycle of Prayer - the Church of the Province of the Indian Ocean. I've spent the past few days traveling by plane to the different islands that make up this province, and I've never seen water so blue!

Earlier this week, I was in the tiny island nation of the Seychelles, which isn't too far off the coast of Africa. To give you an idea of how small it is, it's only about twice the size of Lancaster city! I spoke with some of the locals there, many of whom work in the tourist industry. The few farmers I ran into grew some pretty interesting crops, including sweet potatoes, vanilla beans, and cinnamon - I don't think you see much of that growing in Pennsylvania!

While I was both there and in Madagascar, I was reminded of the good work done by Episcopal Relief and Development, a group within the Episcopal church that works with almost 40 countries to combat hunger, fight disease, and respond to disasters across the world. In 2018, when Tropical Cyclone Ava hit Madagascar, Episcopal Relief and Development donated money and provided help to the people on the island to recover from that horrible disaster. For example, they were able to send a certain type of quick-growing rice and bean seed to affected families so that those families who depend on these crops for their livelihood can recover faster than ever. It's inspiring to see and hear about!

It's a wonderful thing to be over here and, despite all the negative stories you see in the news, see firsthand all that is good out there. The world can be a scary place sometimes but if you're like me, talking to regular people and hearing their stories can make everything a little more bearable. The people of Madagascar and the Seychelles have been so good to me. I hope the people around you have been the same - after all, we are all the same people, all made in the image of God.
