A MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR

Dear St. John's,

On March 13, 2020, I sent a letter to the parish stating that public worship and gatherings of any sort would be suspended due to the COVID-19 virus. I stated in that letter that I anticipated we would be "closed" for a couple of weeks...wow, did I miss the mark on that one! Here we are entering the third year of pandemic ministry and like many of you, I still find it hard to believe.

Like communities of faith all over the world, we've experienced great loss in the past two years. Loss of loved ones, jobs or opportunities, loss of our sense of safety and security, loss of how things used to be... yet, we have gained so much through this forced wilderness time. We've gained a new sense of purpose, a reprioritizing of values, and a commitment to staying connected by any means necessary. We've adapted, grieved, celebrated, questioned, and hoped; and through it all God has remained present and faithful.

I don't think it's a coincidence that our wilderness journey with COVID began at the beginning of a Lenten Season. Two years later, we're not in the same place as we were in 2020. Like the Israelites in exile, we've crossed our own version of the Red Sea, we've spent time wandering in the wilderness, and now we're embarking on a different kind of Lenten journey. COVID-19 hasn't magically disappeared, yet it feels like we're standing on the outside edge of the wilderness and a new promised land awaits us.

Lent means "to lengthen" referring to the season of spring and the lengthening of days. It's a time of spiritual renewal, a type of "spiritual spring," where the light grows brighter with each passing day. This season is designed for our growth. The fasting, praying, and giving is meant to renew our relationships and strengthen us for the journey that lies ahead. On March 13, an opportunity to reflect on where we've been, what we have learned, and how God has transformed our community will be offered. This Service of Light and Hope will take place at 7:00 p.m..

I am beyond grateful to have traveled through the wilderness with you all these past two-plus years. And I look with hope and joyful expectation at the possibilities that await us.

A MESSAGE FROM JEN

Happy March, St. John's!

I would like to take this opportunity to introduce myself to any of you who may not know me. My name is Jennifer Trenary, and I am your new Lay Pastor. As a candidate for Holy Orders in the Episcopal Church, I am hoping to be ordained this year as first a Transitional Deacon. (Everyone on the way to priesthood starts as a deacon first.) My goal is to then go on and, God willing, be ordained as an Episcopal Priest when appropriate.

Let me tell you a little bit about myself. As many of you know, Heather Trenary is my wife, and we live in Columbia, a beautiful little borough right by the water. We have lived in Pennsylvania for just over five years now, and both originally hail from Ohio; hence the banter with Pastor Amanda about football rivalries. :)

My work background started in the business world, but after getting my MBA and working in the field, I knew I wasn't using the gifts that God gave me. I went back to school to get a master's degree in counseling and was a mental health therapist for children and their families for several years. My work was mostly for nonprofit companies that were funded via Medicaid, thus there were strict roles about discussing religion in any depth with the children to which I wanted to supply a source of hope.

Between this and the challenges of working with the juvenile justice system, when we moved to Indiana for Heather's next job, I opted not to get licensed there. As an academic advisor for a small community college, I continued to learn, and worked with folks who faced their own set of hurdles as mostly first-generation college students.

At the same time, Heather and I joined Education for Ministry at our local Episcopal church, and I was slowly developing an urge to know even more. My questions led to even more questions, and I eventually felt the call to go to seminary to deepen my own faith journey. When we moved here for Heather's job at Eurofins, I attended Lancaster Theological Seminary and got in touch with the Bishop Audrey, through Father John, and started the process to heed my calling to the priesthood.

Which leads me back to St. John's and you all! I am so excited and humbled to be here collaborating with you to fulfill our mission to "Grow in God, Act in Service, Witness in Love".

DEACON'S MESSAGE

I am grateful to Tom Bond for sharing his inspirational story with us in this month's Deacon Message. May we all continue to pray and support those who respond to God's call in their lives with joy and gratitude. Stacey+

There have been a couple of times when I have had a moment where the proverbial light bulb comes on in the back of my mind. Or, to put it another way, inspiration happens. It happened when visiting the Notre Dame campus and meeting students working toward a master's degree in liturgy and I knew that that was for me. Another time was visiting St. John's and welcomed by several people even though they did not know me, and I knew I had found a parish home. God was telling me something in both instances.

I was participating in a Lancaster convocation with Bishop Scanlon prior to the diocesan convention in 2019. In her remarks she described a new position in the diocese – lay parish administration (now called lay pastor). The purpose would be to help parishes continue to function in situations where there was not a full-time priest. Details were few as it was a new concept. But it was another of those moments. I knew God was telling me something.

With the help of Rev. Robyn Szoke-Coolidge, I began taking courses through the Stevenson School for Ministry.

Mother Robyn was also instrumental in suggesting I discern whether the diaconate was something God was also calling me to, starting spiritual direction, and looking at other parish ministries that I had not to that point been involved. Now, 2 years later, I am completing my course work (only one more course to go). I have received certificates as lay worship leader and lay preacher. I am awaiting Bishop Scanlon's permission to do both. I now need to complete a process with the diocese and the Commission on Ministry to be certified as a lay pastor.

Amanda has been very supportive of me in this process. Several members of St. John's have lent their support and have walked with me in this journey – even listening to my practice sermons! The two years I spent as Senior Warden of the Vestry has also enabled me in this process.

After getting my master's degree from Notre Dame, I spent 15 wonderful years working as the director of the Office of Worship in Des Moines, IA. It was my dream job. I got to work with many wonderful, faith-filled people in many different parishes – large and small. The clergy of the diocese were not only supportive but also great role models and mentors.

God and Bishop Scanlon willing, I hope to spend many years in the future collaborating with people in the parishes of the Diocese of Central PA. God has blessed me with the tools. I pray I can do some good with them.

SOLES4SOULS

For about the last ten years St. John's has supported an international effort to fight poverty, protect the planet, and provide relief by donating shoes to those who would go without them. We collect shoes of all sizes, shapes and fashions and ship them to Soles4Souls. As with every successful effort, we do not do this alone. We have received shoes from James Street Mennonite, St. John Methodist in Paradise, our neighbors in downtown Lancaster, and friends of our members. The shoes that are functional are sent to places where they are needed. Those that are fashionable, but not necessarily functional, are sold with the profits used to provide shoes and services where they are needed.

Barbara Landis and Brad Zuke prepare and box shoes that may come in during the year. At St. John's we kick this effort into high gear during Lent. Then on Maundy Thursday, our youth complete the packing and preparing the shoes for shipment. Shortly after Easter a truck arrives, and the shoes are shipped. Over the years the size of the truck has increased greatly. If you have any shoes you would like to donate, a box will be set up in the Parish Hall to collect them. Please tie the pairs of shoes together as the numbers of pairs will be large.

REFUGEE MINISTRY

Over the last 40 years St. John's has been involved in Refugee relocation efforts many times. We have sponsored refugees from Cambodia, Viet Nam, Uganda, Yugoslavia, Ivory Coast, and Bhutan among others. We also supported ALERT (All Lancaster Episcopal Response Team) when they sponsored a family from Serbia and assisted one of our families when they took in a young woman from Congo. It has always been a team effort with many St. John's members taking part. We are now preparing to take in a Refugee family or individual from Afghanistan.

Our Chair for this effort will be Rich Garon. Rich is a relatively new member at St. John's, but he brings with him an experience that is rarely found. Before coming to Lancaster, Rich served in our federal government for 25 years rising to the position of Chief of Staff of the House Committee on International Relations. In that position, he dealt with such agencies as UN High Commission for Refugees. Rich is first to admit that even with that background, he is not familiar with the Lancaster efforts and that is where we can all help. Whether it is finding a place to live, places to work, transportation, social service agencies or any of the myriad of needs, we need people to step forward and be part of the team.

On **March 6**, Rich and the Rev. Amanda Knouse will be leading a communication and organization meeting at **11:30 AM** in the Auditorium (top floor of the Parish Hall). Anyone who is interested in learning more about our Afghanistan refugee effort or is willing to be part of the team is strongly encouraged to attend. Everyone was invited to come together for worship regardless of wealth. The goal of openness to ALL God’s children continues as we welcome everyone regardless of race, wealth, loving connections, past history, into a caring, accepting environment within the church and within the community we serve every day of the week.

PRISON MINISTRY

Lancaster County Prison is beginning the process of authorizing volunteer ministers for re-entry. We encourage those who are called to prison ministry to begin the necessary paperwork and fingerprinting. It is a bit of a long process but our office is here to help and guide you through it. If you already have a badge for entry, please call us and ask what needs to be updated. Please be patient with us because we need to adhere to the security policies that are in place for you and the incarcerated individual. If you are discerning a call to prison ministry, I would love for us to talk.
